Cut Wheat 30 Per Cent.

Housewives need not mix these in their baking, though this is urged. President Wilson, in his proclamation, ordered reduction in wheat by 30 per cent, "a reduction imperatively necessary to provide the supply for overseas."

Wholesalers, jobbers and retailers, he stated, may purchase and resell to their customers only 70 per cent of their last year's requirements.

In addition he declared that all manufacturers of biscuits, crackers, pastry and breakfast cereals should reduce consumption of wheat flour to 70 per cent also.

> The following suggestions and instructions to registrants have been sent out by the department of justice at Washington:

> Persons required to register should understand that in so doing they are giving proof of their peaceful dispositions and of their intention to conform to the laws of the United States.

> Every registrant should read carefully the form of registration affidavit handed to him and ask the registration officer for explanation on all points not clear to him before attempting to fill out the blanks. Registration officers are instructed to give registrants all possible aid in the way of explanation and advice.

> Each registrant is required to furnish four unmounted photographs of himself, not larger than three by three inches in size, on thin paper, with light background. All four photographs should be signed by the registrant across the face of the photograph, so as not to obscure the features, if the applicant is able to write.

# SUGAR CONTRUI SAVED MILLIONS

American Consumer Profited by \$180,000,000-French Situation Helped.

### HOME PRICE HELD AT 9 CENTS.

This Nation's Sugar Supply Reduced to Seventy Per Cent. of Normal. Java Stocks Unavailable.

Sugar control has saved the American public \$180,000,000, Herbert Hoover, United States food administrator, declared the other day.

He pointed out that sugar was selling for 11 cents a pound last August and that it would have advanced to 20 cents a pound, with the world shortage as a stimulus, had not the food administration secured the co-operation of the reliners and wholesalers and fixed a sugar price that today enables housewives to buy sugar at from 81/2 to 9 cents a pound.

"Every 1 cent raise in sugar from September 1 to January 1 means \$18,-000,000 to the American consumer, Mr. Hoover said. "Numbers of gentlemen will tell you that 20 cent sugar would have prevailed and the public robbed of \$180,000,000 this year if we had not taken these actions." Later Mr. Hoover called attention to the fact that uncontrolled sugar advanced to 35 cents a pound during the Civil War.

### France Got Our Sugar.

allotted 70 per cent, of its normal supply. Before the war the average annual household consumption here was 55 pounds a person. In England the annual consumption during the war is 24 pounds, and in France each person is allotted a little over one pound a after-effects.

"In August the French government found itself unable to maintain even this ration," Mr. Hoover declared. "An appeal was made to America, France needed 100,000 tons. We agreed to fill this demand and up to the meantime an appeal was made to ar consumption, and requests were made to distributors to supply the confectionary and sweet drinks trade with 59 per cent, of normal supply This has been generally followed, al though such regulations were voluntary, as the food administration had no authority to impose them."

Domestic Price is 81/2 to 9 Cents. Retail grocers throughout the coun-

try are supposed to take a profit of no more than 50 cents a hundred-half a cent a pound-on sugar. By reason of food administration regulations, binding refiners and wholesalers, the retailer, is able today to buy sugar at from 8 to 81/2 cents a pound. This enables him to sell to the housewife at 846 to 9 cents a pound.

There have been some violations of the sugar rulings. Mr. Hoover said recently: "Sales of sugar from 16 to 20 cents per pound have been reported and followed up vigorously and stopped and is evidence itself of the prices at which consumers would have been mulct had we not intervened. We have Mr. and Mrs. Thos. Garrett of San forfeited wholesalers' licenses in aggravated cases, and we have issued warnings to first offenders in a great many instances through our local administrators."





MAJOR TOWNES REVIEWS COST OF THE DRAFT LAW

Declares Exemption Boards Have Not Made Money.

Austin, Texas, Jan. 23.-Major John C. Townes Jr., supervisor of the selective draft in Texas, in a desire to correct an erroneous impression relative to the cost of the administration of the selective draft law under the old system, has issued the following statement:

It has come to my notice that some of our good citizens have misunderstood and misconstrued an article which appeared in some of the news papers about the 14th inst. with reference to the cost of the administration of the selective service law under the old system. I also notice in the public press of the 20th inst. that a member of the legislative investigating committee has commented on the cost of the administration by the Federal authorities of the selective service law in Texas. I was somewhat surprised at this, as no one has requested an investigation, and the gentleman making the comment apparently did not understand the subject in hand.

The average per capita cost of recruiting in the United States in the year 1914 was \$24.48, in the year 1915 \$19.14, and the per capita cost of recruiting for the first nine months of the fiscal year 1917-July, 1916, to April, 1917, inclusive-was

WHERE THE GERMANS MAY STRIKE IN THE WEST

Frank H. Simonds, the American historian and expert reviewer of the present war, believes the Germans, in their threatened great offensive in of four distinct points which he designates on the Western battle line in

Mr. Simonds designates these points entirely on that section of the line held by the French, as he says upon. the northern end of the line the Belgians and British occupy high ground, favorable to ward off a German attack, while the French, except at Verdun, occupy south of Rheims very much the same ground they have occupied for the past two years.

This writer believes the Germans will strike at the French because they hold the ground most advantageous to attack, and because the man power of the French have been depleted more than that of the British.

But Mr. Simonds is not pessimistic

of the results to come from the impending German offensive. He says: "I find on many sides great apprehension expressed as to the probability of a German success in this great offensive. Well, of course, the enemy always has a chance of winning the battle; but when this enemy had everything in his favor he failed at the Marne, when he had ninety chances out of a hundred at Ypres and the Yser he failed, when he had at least a three-to-one chance at Verdun he failed. In his next attack he will not have more than an even chance, if he has that, and all the odds of "past performances" in the West are against him. To accomplish anything he has got to break "clean through," he has got to get a decision of the character of Waterloo or Sedan, and if he doesn't get this decision he will have to abandon the offensive for good and carry weight for the rest of the war.

"Just now every German journal is beating a drum or making some sort of horrendous noise to shake the nerve of the Allies in advance of the attack, but this method is not always a proof of supreme confidence. When the German attacks he is going to gain ground; this always happens.
