Fifty-Three More Men to Be Sent From San Saba County---The Rest to Be Discharged

the state's quota will be twenty per cent, instead of forty per cent, as first planned.

2. The movement of these men will begin Monday, Oct. 8, instead of Wednesday, Oct. 3, as first planned.

3. As in the case of the second increment, this installment must be made up entirely of white men. This will mean that some of the counties having a large negro population will not be able to furnish any men for this movement and that other counties having a heavy negro population will be unable to supply the full twenty per cent of their quota. This will require many of the remainder of the counties to furnish at this time all the white men in their respective quutas who are available. This county falls within the class just mentioned and, according to orders just received from the Adjutant General of the state, the county is called on to send forward the remainder of its quota or 53 men.

4. This board is this date mailing notices to report at its office at 9:30 o'clock a. m., Monday, Oct. 8, for entrainment for Camp Travis, San Antonio, Texas, to the 70 of its registrants who hold the lowest consecutive order numbers in its available list of men who have been certified back to it from the District Board at San Antonio as registrants who have not been discharged or exempted from military service. From these 70 men, or as many of them who report on the date in numbers and entrain them as the remainder of the county's nio, Texas: quota of 97 men. The rest of the registrants who report will be excused until the next draft is made. The date of the next draft and the number of men it is to include are two things yet to be determined by the President.


