New Law Turns This Work Over to Market Department.

No measure recently passed by a Texas legislature has at tracted so much attention an comment as that part of th markets and warehouse law which gives the commissione pervisory and warehous publi weighers who weigh cotton an other farm products. The law not only makes it the duty of the commissioner to supervise all public weighers, but it makes it his duty, as the law says: "In all cases where any discrepancy arises in the mat ter of weights and measures of cotton and other farm pro ducts, made between weigher in different sections of this state, or between public and private weighers, the difference shall be subject to review by the commissioner, and have such cotton or other farm pro ducts re-weighed, or re-mea ed, for the purpose of ascer-
taining and deciding the correct weight and measure there of. Recent development show how far-reaching
beneficial the amended law be when sanely and legally en forced.

The department has been re ceiving, requests from all parts of the state asking that scale be tested and difference in weight be adjusted.
