bank failures averaged annually 28-1000 of 1 per cent of the aggregate deposits of the na-
tional banks during those years. During the fiscal years ended June $30,1915,1916$ and 1917, ed banks to total deposits of all banks has averaged only about $3-1000$ of 1 per cent, or les than one-eighth of what thes losses averaged during the pre ceding 33 years.
This reduction in losses, ac cording to Comptroller Wil liams, is largely the result of the improved system of national bank examination, of the greater thoroughness exercised in
