The Census

The Fourteenth Decennial census is to be taken during the month of January, 1920, and will be the most complete census ever taken. The constitution of the United States requires that a census of the United States be taken every ten years. It is by this means that the apportionment of members of the house of representatives is made as to states. The census enumerator will ask some very pointed questions. Don't be surprised when he, or she, walks in and asks your name, age, sex and excuse for living. This matter is all held confidential by the census bureau, and you may have no fear that what you tell the enumerator will be made public, or fall into the hands of the tax assessor. Everyone should lend all assistance possible to the census enumerator, as this is the only way Uncle Sam has of finding out what the country is doing; whether it is progressing or not and if not, why not. It also serves to get a check on the population, shows what percentage is native-born and what is foreign born, and what they are doing. After the scare we had at the beginning of the war, over foreign-born and disloyal citizens, this feature alone is worth the cost of taking the census.

Lost the Passengers

An outlaw train—i. e. a train running without a schedule—consisting of a string of box cars and a passenger coach, arrived in Spearman Monday afternoon and the engineer, Carl Shapley, was very much surprised on reaching the end of the rail to learn that he had left his passengers, conductor and brakeman about 12 miles down the track toward Perryton. E. J. Tierce was in a "Zulu" next to the passenger coach and saw it break away from the train, but could not signal the engineer to stop. Only a few minutes was required to run back and get the missing members, and no damage was done. Conductor Joe Storey was in charge of the train.

The house-moving outfit which will be used in moving the larger buildings out of Hansford, was unloaded here Monday and the work will begin as soon as the weather will permit.

The John L. Hays Mercantile Company are receiving new goods at their new store building every day, and expect, by the latter part of the week to have the shelving in and stock arranged in a tip top manner.

Joe R. Spivey, former citizen and ex-sheriff of Hansford county, was a business visitor here last week. He is now located at David, New Mexico, and is well pleased with his new location.

Chas. Endicott left Monday for Blackwell, Oklahoma, to spend a week with Mrs. Endicott and the children, who are spending the winter there, that the children may attend school.

The Spearman postoffice is a busy place on mail days, Monday, Wednesday and Friday, but Mr. and Mrs. Head are taking to the work like old-timers and handle the large amount of mail now coming in with perfect ease. As soon as the regular daily mail service is established a larger building will no doubt be required. Mr. Head expects the new fixtures to arrive in the next few days and after they are installed, everyone who so desires may have a lock box.

Plains Farming

George M. Whitson was in town Wednesday from his ranch ten miles southwest of Spearman. In conversation with Mr. Whitson we learned that he has now in the bins from this year's crop, 8401 bushels of wheat; 3474 bushels of oats and 2623 bushels of barley, which is not bad for a city farmer. Mr. Whitson was formerly a railway mail clerk, with a run between Kansas City and St. Louis, and had been in the service over twenty years. Growing tired of a salaried job, about two years ago, he decided to give it up and try farming on the plains. The above is the result of his first year's effort, with the exception of an excellent row crop, garden, etc. Mr. Whitson has 600 acres sown to winter wheat, which is most all up and growing fine, and expects to put a large acreage to spring crops. This is only one instance of the thousands that could be mentioned, where men have given up the grind in a city and taken up plains farming, with the result that they make more money from one crop than they would have saved in an ordinary lifetime at their old job.

Building Delayed

The inclement weather has stopped all carpenter work for this week, but with the first sunshiny days it will be resumed with renewed vigor. A dozen or more buildings are now under construction and many others will be begun as soon as the weather permits. Spearman is growing at a rapid rate, notwithstanding the handicap of a shortage of building material and the great difficulty in securing carpenters and contractors. The Guaranty State bank building was the last brought over from Hansford before the snow storm struck us.

Baptists Will Hold Meeting

Rev. Younger, pastor of the Baptist church at Dumas, will preach in Hansford on Sunday morning, December 7, at 11 o'clock. Bro. Younger is reported to be an excellent preacher. Let us give him a good audience.

C. E. Reike, the popular and accommodating clerk for the Hannan Supply Co., who has been located here since the coming of the railroad, informs us that he will leave about Christmas for Buenos Ayers, South America.

Owing to the busy time of the year the Wallin sale, held last Saturday, was not as well attended as it might have been, but we are informed that most everything sold well except the horses, for which there seems to be no demand at present.

Hudson & Snyder drove a herd of about 2,000 steers from their range in Hansford and Ochiltree counties to White Deer last week, and shipped them to the south plains for the winter. They were just in time to miss the great blizzard now raging.

R. L. Johnson, representing the Texhoma Elevator Company, was in Spearman Monday, looking for a site for an elevator. This company is owned by Riffe brothers, live energetic young business men, and the Headlight would be glad to see them locate here.

The many friends of W. H. Douglas will learn with deep regret that he suffered a very painful injury at Texhoma on last Friday afternoon, when in some manner his clothing became caught in the machinery of the electric light plant and he was dragged into a cog wheel. Mr. Douglas was taken immediately to the Trans-Canadian Sanitarium at Dalhart, where his wounds were dressed, and at last report he was doing as well as could be expected.

Mountain Time and Coal Shortage

This office is in receipt of the following communication from Frank R. Jamison, secretary-manager of the Panhandle-Plains Chamber of Commerce. With reference to the Panhandle having been placed in mountain time, he says: "The application has been made today for a re-hearing before the interstate commerce commission, who will send a man to Amarillo for this rehearing. Of course we do not know what will be the ultimate outcome of this hearing, but we are quite disposed to believe and are assured that we will again be placed in central time. Numerous applications have come to this office expressive of a very great desire to have this portion of the state returned to central time. If you desire this change you will please indicate it by a statement of your views to this office and make known the fact among your citizens that this application is being made, and be prepared to have your community represented at the rehearing of this case when the time is named."

"Next, the shortage of coal over the Panhandle is a matter of the strictest concern. On last Saturday morning a meeting was held in this office, with R. E. John, agent for the Santa Fe, J. W. Farley, agent for the C. R. I. & P., and J. B. Gibbon, for the F. W. & D., who defined specifically the plans which the railroads had instituted for the purpose of preventing distress in case of blizzard or zero weather. Coal, which has been taken over by the various railroads has been so taken for the purpose of sending it out where it might be needed to establish comfort. You are therefore notified in case of emergencies, to apply to your local agent with assurance that relief will be obtained."

Mr. Bumpus, the agent here, has notified the agent at Shattuck that a blizzard is raging here and Abe Green of the Panhandle Lumber Co. wired the home offices of the company to send all the coal they could spare at once; that if coal was being held for a blizzard now was the time to turn it loose. Nothing definite is known at present, but it is thought that coal will arrive in Spearman Saturday or Sunday.

Red Cross Christmas Seals

The spirit of Christmas comes first to Texas with the coming of Santa Claus on the Red Cross Christmas Seal, which will be on sale in this city and county next Monday, December 1. The gift which the jolly old Saint Nick brings to the people is good health. Organization of counties all over the state has been practically completed, announces Campaign Director O. M. Lowry, and a tremendous and successful Seal Sale is expected. Hansford county has completed its organization and workers in the cause of good health are now being enrolled by Mrs. J. H. Buchanan, county chairman, who expects to raise the quota for the county. The money which is raised in this city and county will be used wholly and exclusively for health work, especially in the fight against tuberculosis, from which disease there were 4,651 deaths reported in Texas last year.

Panhandle Blizzard

Hansford county was visited by a fine rain on Tuesday of this week, which was greatly appreciated by the farmers, as the young wheat was needing moisture. But the rain was followed by a cold north wind, sleet and snow, which has put a stop to all outdoor work and played havoc with our mail service. Wednesday was cold, Thursday was colder and today is simply fierce. The rain put everything in good shape for winter and gives the wheat growers an excellent start on next year's crop. Cattle are fat and strong, there is plenty feed in the country, so the loss to cattlemen from the blizzard will be very small.

Percy Smith and Miss Sallie Bean of the Wilbanks community, motored over to Lipscomb last week, where they were quietly married. The marriage came as quite a surprise to the relatives and friends of the happy young couple, who were not aware of their serious intentions. She is an accomplished young lady and stands high in the estimation of her friends. 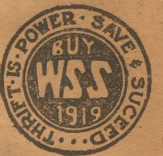

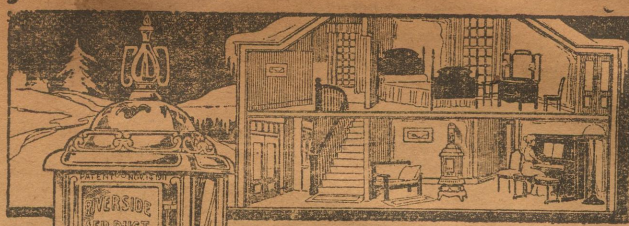

We Are Responsible for All Damages to Foreigners in Mexico Since 1910

By SENATOR A. B. FALL—Debate in Congress



The Calvo doctrine, as acknowledged and accepted by Latin-American countries, provides simply this, in effect:

No government shall be responsible for damages to any of its citizens occurring during a revolution, or by virtue of a riot.

No citizen of a foreign country shall be entitled to collect damages against this government except as a citizen of this country would be entitled to collect damages. Under the Calvo doctrine, as it was presented at The Hague tribunal and refused, we could not have

interfered diplomatically in Mexico to recover damages for any of our citizens, either for death or otherwise.

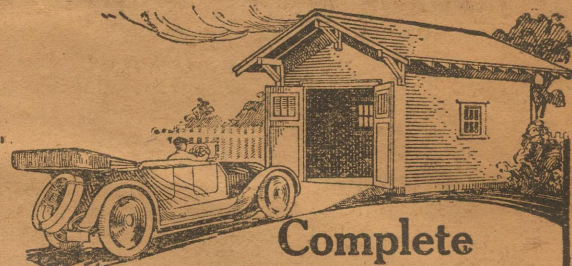
In 1913, prior to the recognition of Carranza when he proclaimed himself first chief of the revolutionary forces, and when he was seeking recognition, he issued a decree known as the Calvo decree, and in that decree he pledged himself to us, because he filed it in the state department of the United States government, that immediately upon the success of his revolution he would go back to the year 1910, to the inception of the Madero revolution, and that he would, by a joint commission, ascertain all damages done to any foreigner or to his property up to the time that he founded his government substantially in the City of Mexico, no matter from what source, whether by revolution or by riot; in other words, that he would not do as they had continuously done, put in a defense that the damage had occurred by revolution.

But the decree of 1915, which the president sent to the senate, as the foundation of his recognition of Carranza, repudiated the decree of 1913 and adopted the Calvo rule and we recognized him upon it; and what is the consequence today? That we are bound by every rule not only of morality but of international law to every government under the sun for every dollar of damage done to any foreigner in the Republic of Mexico from the time the revolution occurred in 1910 down to date, because the secretary of state and the president of the United States called upon France and Germany and Great Britain to yield to us in handling Mexican affairs, as was announced by the state department, and they yielded.

When they yielded Carranza's decree agreeing to pay damages was in full force and effect. We handled Mexican affairs, and when we recognized Carranza we recognized him under an absolute repudiation of that decree.

Have we not placed the Monroe doctrine at least on a foreign government?

World Is Forced Into New Activity for the Protection of All Children

By JULIA LATHROP, Children's Bureau

It is not too much to say that the world is being forced willy nilly to a new activity for the protection of all children—not a few, not favored children, but all children. War losses of population and of wealth force Europe. A decent self-respect would force the United States even if it were not plain that the nations which are to maintain leadership will be those which most wisely and generously equip the children of today and tomorrow.

First, as to illiteracy, the United States is perhaps ninth among civilized nations; that is, Australia, the United Kingdom, New Zealand, the Netherlands, Switzerland, Denmark, Sweden, Germany all have a larger proportion of the population who can read and write than has the United States.

Second, as to maternal mortality, the United States is fourteenth in the list of civilized nations, judged by the proportion of deaths of mothers from causes incident to child-bearing. That is, in thirteen countries the mother's life is safer than it is in the United States.

Third, the United States is eleventh among civilized countries, tested by its infant mortality rate, a rate whose searching value as a sign of social well-being is axiomatic.

Considering the exemption this country enjoys from the poverty and hunger and devastation of Europe, it is not less than our reasonable service to make the United States stand first in every phase of child welfare in any list of countries. The war has left us no sectional questions. We have only the issue of a nation's welfare.
