I exclaim against the foul pollution! I call upon every apostle of liberty left to assist in driving the usurper from the temple of the people. Has the money-power enlarged the minds of all men? I fear the spirit of servitude is the leprosy which is tearing us! Has the stroke of steady policy been arrested for the purpose of a general surrender? Will honest men be benefited? Will the People's property be protected? Will the People's stocks and specie be kept together? Power and purse have joined hands, and—wrest for the few of the party!—we for the many of the People! All are drunk on the day of the harpies' harvest—oh! who shall be the gleaners?—I will refuse to be a party to any such transaction.

Sir, why refuse an investigation? If there be any thing foul or corrupt in the Treasury, surely it should be known; and, if all be pure within, should not men who are honest enough to demonstrate their rectitude; and what danger will there be of exposure? The more they are exposed, the more should be above suspicion; and always, therefore, in every instance, of Hamilton, Crawford, and Calhoun, no sooner was suspicion directed than investigation was demanded by the Secretaries themselves. But, sir, I plead in vain. I know the state of things must remain as they are. I know the money must remain in the Treasury, not only for the sake of the banks and Whitney & Co.'s private speculations, but for the use of the party. Who now can compete with Whitney & Co. in bribery for presidential candidates, for the State of New York, with the Hamilton Banker's money. What now is obviously the maxim of "the party" by which to rule and govern? "Give us the golden key and we will unlock the hearts of the People." I say if the People are as faithful to their liberty as Peter was to his God—and they should be, for liberty is the gift of Heaven—they will say to him, as Peter said to Simon Magus, "Thy money perish with thee—thou hast neither part nor lot in this matter."

## TWENTY-FOURTH CONGRESS, FIRST SESSION.

WEDNESDAY, MAY 11.

### IN SENATE.

Petitions were presented by Mr. BLACK, Mr. LINN, Mr. BENTON, and Mr. BUCHANAN. Mr. HENDRICKS presented the petition of the inhabitants of the village of St. Joseph's, in Michigan, praying for an appropriation to build a bridge over the river St. Joseph's at that village; also appropriations for the completion of various roads in Michigan. Referred to the Committee on Roads and Canals.

Mr. HENDRICKS also presented the petition and docket of the executors of Laurent Bazadone, deceased, praying compensation for property seized and appropriated to public use by General George Rogers Clarke, at Vincennes, in the year 1783. Referred to the Committee on Revolutionary Claims.

Mr. DAVIS presented the petition of the inhabitants of Gloucester county, Massachusetts, praying for additional defenses.

### MEXICO.

Mr. CLAY, from the Committee on Foreign Relations, to which was referred the message of the President of the United States concerning an additional article in the treaty with Mexico, reported a bill to provide for carrying into effect the treaty of limits with the Government of Mexico; which was read, and ordered to a second reading.

Mr. CLAY said that the bill was in exact conformity with the former one, and that it was a necessary consequence of the expiration of the treaty. The Committee on Foreign Relations were desirous that it should pass without delay. There was a peculiar propriety in so passing it, resulting from our existing relations with Mexico. A survey was to be made; and we were endeavoring to ascertain, as precisely as possible, the true boundary line between that country and our own. In the meantime the General commanding our forces in that quarter had taken up a position in or near this disputed territory. Existing circumstances were such as to make it absolutely necessary that proper officers should be authorized to carry out the provisions of the treaty, thereby vindicating the sincerity of our intentions, and the fidelity of our engagements.

The bill provided for the services of a commissioner and surveyor, but not for those of a clerk. A provisional appropriation was introduced, however, to pay the salary of such officer, and the Executive empowered to appoint him if it was deemed necessary.

The bill was then read a second time, and was ordered to be engrossed. Mr. WEBSTER, from the Committee on Finance, reported a bill from the House, to provide for the defence of the Western frontier, with an amendment; which was ordered to be printed.

Mr. WEBSTER gave notice that he should ask the Senate to take up this bill for consideration to-morrow.

Mr. EWING, of Ohio, from the Committee on Public Lands, reported a bill for the relief of John Brahan, which, and the report of the committee, were ordered to be printed.

Mr. EWING also reported a bill to authorize the appointment of a surveyor in Wisconsin; which was read, and ordered to a second reading.

The same committee, in reference to the petition of James Jones, asked to be discharged from the further consideration of a bill in the same name, which was agreed to.

Mr. PRENTISS, from the Committee on Public Lands, reported the bill from the House of Representatives, for the relief of James Trumbull, without amendment, stating that the committee were of opinion that the bill ought not to pass.

Mr. HUBBARD offered a resolution in reference to a pension.

The private bills, ordered on yesterday to be engrossed, were severally read a third time, and passed.

Mr. PRESTON, from the Military Committee, to which had been recommended the bill to authorize the President to accept the services of corps of volunteers, &c. reported the same, with certain amendments.

The resolution offered at the same time since by Mr. BENTON, asking of the President to say if any of the Departments had suffered any injury from the delay in the passage of the appropriation bills, was taken up.

Mr. NAUDAIN asked for the yeas and nays, suggesting that the appropriation bills had been passed by the Senate as soon as they were received from the House.

Mr. KING, of Alabama, moved to lay on the table the adoption of such a resolution, moving to lay on the table; which was agreed to.

Mr. WHITE's resolution, offered some time since, on the subject of rescinding the resolution of March, 1834, which Mr. BENTON's resolution proposes to exchange, being taken up.

Mr. WHITE said he wished to have an opportunity to take the sense of the Senate on this resolution during the present session, and he should feel it to be his duty to present the views which his own mind had taken of the subject. But he did not wish to retard the progress of the appropriation bills, if any gentleman desired to bring forward an appropriation bill, he would postpone his resolution.

Mr. BENTON signifying a wish to take up the fortification bill.

On motion of Mr. WHITE, the resolution was postponed, and made the special order for Monday next.

Several resolutions lying on the table were taken up and agreed to.

### HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.

Mr. FRY, from the Committee on Revolutionary Pensions, reported a bill for the relief of E. Powers. Read twice, and ordered to be engrossed.

Mr. MILLER presented the petition of the Trustees and Faculty of Dickinson College, in the State of Pennsylvania, asking that a portion of the public lands may be appropriated in aid of the several incorporated Colleges within the United States. Referred.

Mr. SHIELDS, from the Committee on the Whole on the subject of the bill providing for the payment of certain pensions, and it was brought into the House, and, after some amendment, was ordered to be engrossed, and read a third time.

Mr. BELL, from the Committee on Indian Affairs, reported a bill for the adjustment of certain claims to reservations of land, under the 14th article of the treaty of 1830, with the Choctaw Indians. Referred to the Committee on the Whole on the subject of the Union; and the report accompanying the bill was ordered to be printed.

Mr. CLAIBORNE said, that as this bill involved considerations of the greatest interest to his constituents and to the country at large, and as the report accompanying the bill presented a new and important subject, he moved the printing of five thousand extra copies of the report and bill; which motion was agreed to.

Mr. BELL, from the same committee, reported a bill to provide for the speedy adjustment of claims to reservations of land and grants of land under Indian treaties; which was read twice, and committed.

Mr. BELL, from the same committee, reported a bill for the relief of Silas Fisher, a Choctaw Indian. Read twice, and ordered to be engrossed for a third reading.

Mr. PEARCE, of Rhode Island, from the Committee on Commerce, reported a bill making an appropriation for the erection of a marine hospital at City Point, in the State of Virginia. Read twice, and committed.

Mr. ADAMS, from the Committee on Manufactures, reported a bill for the relief of James Clark, a Choctaw Indian, to which was referred the bill from the Senate for the reduction of certain duties, and the repeal of others, reported the same, with amendments. Committed, and ordered to be printed.

Mr. MERCER, from the Committee on Roads and Canals, to which was referred the bill from the Senate for the

continuation of the Cumberland Road, reported the same with amendments. The bill and amendments were committed, and, with the report accompanying them, ordered to be printed.

Mr. FAYLOR, from the Committee on Revolutionary Claims, reported a bill for the relief of J. Ketchum. Read twice, and committed.

Mr. W. JACKSON, of Massachusetts, from the Committee on Roads and Canals, reported the following joint resolution:

Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the Secretary of the Navy be authorized and requested to cause an experiment to be made for the purpose of ascertaining the practicability of applying steam power to the navigation of canals, pursuant to a plan invented by Dr. Planou, provided he deems the same to be expedient; and that four thousand dollars be, and the same is hereby, appropriated therefor, out of any money in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated.

Mr. PARKS, from the Select Committee on Patents and Patent Rights, to which was referred the bill from the Senate extending a patent right to James Barron, reported the same without amendment; and the bill was committed.

Mr. MERCER asked leave to submit a motion to direct the select committee of 24, to which was referred an inquiry into the proper mode of managing contested elections before the House, to ascertain whether a better Hall for the purposes of a deliberative body than the present Hall of Representatives can be provided within the Capitol, and have leave to report by bill or otherwise.

Mr. MERCER then made a short statement, which he thought would satisfy the House that the resolution ought to be adopted. He said he had gone to the Hall of the Library with an experienced architect, and had examined the room and the walls, and he found that a room could be provided there, of the dimensions of ninety feet, by fifty. He said the chisel of the circle of the present Hall was ninety feet, and the space occupied by the House was about fifty feet deep. He was satisfied that a Hall could be made where the Library now is, as good and convenient for a deliberative assembly as could be devised if a capitol was about to be constructed anew; and he hoped the resolution would be adopted, that the House might have the report of a committee upon the subject.

Mr. ADAMS rose to explain. He said he had never, while he acted as Secretary of State, made a single change of a public printer from political causes. While he was Secretary of State, he had seen the printer who was opposed to him as any editor could be to any candidate; but he had never changed one of them from any political motive. He did make one change at Gen. Jackson's personal suggestion; it might, however, Gen. J. would recollect it or not, he could not tell. It was in the case of an editor at Nashville; when Gen. Jackson and his colleague in the Senate came and personally requested it as a favor, for it was supposed the editor was favorable to Gen. Jackson, he did make the transfer; but it was without knowing either of the editors. The motive for this change was afterwards the subject of much misconception. He did not mean to charge the present or any Secretary of State with partialities in relation to changes of this kind; but he did mean to say, that he did not recollect any one who was Secretary of State for political considerations; and further, that while he held a more elevated situation, he never removed one person from office for political causes; and that, he believed, was one among the principal reasons why he was not more successful as a candidate for a second election.

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roads and canals and public roads—appropriations only six months ago in high disrepute, as monstrous monopolies, but now in high favor with that party which wishes to prevent a distribution of the surplus revenue to the People of the country. PORTFOLIO BILL. The House, on motion of Mr. CAMPBELL, proceeded, in the presence of the speaker and the members of the House, to the further consideration, in the Committee of the Whole on the state of the Union, (Mr. MANN, of New York, in the chair,) of the "bill making appropriations for the fortifications of the United States for the year 1836."

The question being on the motion of Mr. CAMPBELL to amend the bill by inserting a clause making an additional appropriation of \$700,000 for the armament of the fortifications.

Mr. TOWNES, who was entitled to the floor, rose, and addressed the committee about two hours, on the various topics heretofore brought into the debate. He maintained that the amount of the surplus revenue had been greatly overrated; that the public lands, as had, he said, been so confidently stated by the honorable gentleman from Tennessee, (Mr. Bell,) would not, hereafter, yield more than a million of dollars annually; and that the state of things on the Southern and Western frontier, and the general condition of Europe, admonished us to reserve whatever surplus we might have, whether it was ten or twenty millions, for the great purpose of national defence.

Mr. CAMPBELL, in answer to the speech of the gentleman from Tennessee, maintained the merits of the different candidates for the Presidency, and vindicated the present Administration from some of the charges brought against it. The prescriptive policy was, he undertook to show, established and acted upon, in the Administration preceding that of General Jackson, and before that time, while General Jackson, in his private capacity, was in the office of Secretary of State. He adverted, particularly, to some transfers of public printing, made by that Secretary of State.

NAVAL SERVICE.—The bill making appropriations for the Naval Service for the current year has at length passed both Houses of Congress, and, as it will undoubtedly be approved by the President of the United States, may be considered to be a law. As it will be probably some weeks before it finds a place in our columns in the course of our publication of the acts passed at this session of Congress, we have, in the following lines, summed up, for the information of our friends, in and out of the Navy, the principal particulars of the bill:

THE VIRGINIA ELECTION.—The returns of the Election for Delegates to the Legislature of Virginia having now been received, we are enabled to state the general result of it. Out of a body consisting of about 130 members, the Jackson majority is 18 or 20. The Whigs have neither lost nor gained any thing of consequence in the composition of the House of Delegates; but the election is said to establish, beyond reasonable doubt, that the majority of the voters of the State are on their side. Our friends in Virginia are in high spirits. The Kanawha Banner thus pleasantly discourses on the subject:

THE ELECTIONS.—We had not much hope that the eyes of the Public could be sufficiently opened for the Whigs to beat their opponents at this election; but we are really running them a pretty heat. Some of the expungers have had black marks drawn around them, and the words plainly written on their faces: Expunged by order of the People. Some of the Senators have been placed in the exact position of Mr. LEON, by the votes of their constituents. Now, we will see whose ball it was that gored our ox.

So far we have run their neck and neck. We have passed the distance pell at least. Well, says Old Virginia: The fools are never read that we thought for. Henceforth any thing we gain will be clear profit. Our party has to fight against forty thousand office-holders; against the influence of thirty millions loaned to fierce partisans; against five thousand bank directors and their friends; against the whole Post Office Department; in short, we have to fight against all those things which are usually considered as infallible engines to move public opinion.

Hear ye Representatives in Congress from the old States! Hearken to the voice of the oracle which foretels your destiny, if ye be not wise in time! The Detroit Free Press, the organ of the Spoils party in Michigan, cries out against the passage of Mr. CLAY'S Land Bill, and predicts its defeat—arguing against present action upon it in the following terms:

"When both Michigan and Arkansas shall become members of the Union, the new States will be strong enough in the Senate to defeat any measure which may be injurious to their interests, if not powerful enough to accomplish what will promote them. It is highly important for the new States that Mr. Clay's bill, now before Congress, should be defeated."

We perceive, by the English papers, that Mr. FEATHERSTONHAUGH, the United States Geologist, has had the honor conferred on him of being elected a Fellow of the Royal Society. This distinction, emanating from the most celebrated body of learned men in Europe, and over which the great NEWTON presided, must be in every sense gratifying to the individual who is honored by it, for it is rarely conferred; and, as far as we recollect, of individuals now living in the United States, is only shared by our eminent fellow-countryman Mr. BOWDITCH. We were accordingly, when we published Mr. F.'s Geological Report of the past year, that it would be cordially received in Europe; and so it has turned out. We rejoice, on the public account, that it is so. We are pleased always in the belief that the scientific men of Great Britain are glad of opportunities to honor those who are strengthening the interests of science and of mankind, in this country, with whom they have so many congenial relations.

The Arkansas Gazette of the 12th inst. contradicts the statement that was current about a month since of the murder of Gen. COFFEY and his hands, about twenty-five in number, by the Camanche and Pawnee Indians, on the frontier of Arkansas.

ANAPOLIS, (Md.) MAY 7. Dr. GIBSON WHITE, late surgeon in the United States Navy, who followed the remains of his venerable father to the grave on Friday last, was on the succeeding Wednesday deposited by his friends in the same graveyard. The symptoms of disease had certainly marked its victim for some time. The rupture of a blood-vessel a few months since, left him in very delicate health. He was walking out, however, on Monday; but on Tuesday morning a renewal of the hemorrhage suddenly terminated his life.—Alec. Rev.
