EXTRACTS FROM A WORK NOW PREPARING FOI PUBLICATION, ENTITLED "SCENES ON THE SLAVE COAST.'

THE RIO PONGAS.

It was one of those genial days in November, when, on the African coast, the rainy season being at last over, we welcome once more a suspension of the gloomy rains and burning sunbeams, and the climate assumes the character of the spring of temperate climes. It was, as I said before, a day fraught with the invigorating influence of the African spring, that, assembling together my Grummettas, and placing myself in the stern-sheets of the Koonckee, we pushed off from the mangroves that lined the shore, and dropped down the river with the ebb tide. The English schooner had left the evening previous, and, desirous of despatching let-ters by her, I had hoped to overtake her, either at Hellgate ters by her, I had hoped to overtake her, either at Hellgate or at the bar of the river. Much, however, to my disap-pointment, on reaching the former place, she was no longer visible. To increase my annoyance, there was every ap-pearance of an impending storm; and at once perceiving how dangerous it would be to proceed onward, I directed the boys to pull up a branch of the stream leading to a na-tive town, that we might take shelter in the copees of the mangrove till the storm subsided. It was nearly sunset, when, running in close with the shore, and the Grummettas having made all fast to the stem of the mangrove, they betook themselves to the village, while I, coiling myself up in the stem-sheets of the boat, with my cloak around me,

in the stem-sheets of the boat, with my cloak around me, prepared there to pass the night. It has been said that coming events throw their shadows before; it may be so; at least my thoughts, during the gloom of that night, and amid the war of the elements, the crashing thunder and flashing lightning of the heavy storm, assumed a sombre character, while a strong presenti-ment of impending misfortune weighed heavily upon me, as if in warning of what so shortly befell. The heavy rain during the night had dispelled the mists which so generally settle down on the African rivers at even, and the sun was again shining forth brightly and joyously, when the lads, again shining forth brightly and joyously, when the lads, returning, took their accustomed places, and, bending to their

oars, swept rapidly down the stream, keeping time with their hands and feet to a native air. Mid-day had elapsed ere we reached the bar of the river, and put out to sea in the hope of still meeting with the schooner; we failed, however, in our object, for along the horizon not even a distant sail was to be discerned. It was now a perfect calm, with a heavy swell setting in, when, resolving to return, we tried to make the northern bar that we might reach a native town at some distance from the mouth of the river, and obtain the necessary supplies o food and water.

We had nearly effected our object, and were fast ap proaching the bar, when I discovered one of those tornadoe so common to the coast darkly brewing to the eastward, from the sombre aspect of the heavens and the bending of the trees which lined the shores. The mouth of the river look-ed black and agitated by the coming tempest, clearly cutting out all hope of entrance, and offering no chance of safety for our little bark, but that of scudding before it out to sea. Loosing the fore-brail, and sheeting before it out to sea. mighty waters, sending our little bark with the speed of an arrow before it Finding that she was too light and buoyant, I directed the negroes to lie down in the bottom of the boat, that she might have more weight below the water line, and thus, in degree, compensate for her tiny spar aloft, while guiding the helm, I kept an anxious eye upon her bellying sail, whilst the spray of the waves dashing over her server to increase the alarm and fears of the Grummettas, who being river men, were little accustomed to storms at sea. The first violence of the tornado had now expended i self, and a degree of safety seemed to present itself, from the suspension of the sudden gusts, while a steady breeze had followed, which, with the now heavy seas, left us no rebut to drive before it.

During the whole night we continued in this situation During the whole night we continued in this situation, and at daybreak, owing to the thick haze bounding us, we awaited with anxiety the rising sun, which, by dispelling the mists, would furnish us with our true bearings. The sun did rise, beautifully bright; the morning was cool and refreshing, and the land was just discernible by a faint blue streak on the eastern borizon. The breeze had died away, the swell was gone, and, with just enough of air to cause our sails to draw, we steered for the shore. By noon the little wind we had gradually ceased. We

By noon the little wind we had, gradually ceased. We were now exposed, parched with thirst, to the heat of a meridian sun. Our want of water and provisions made me doubly anxious to enter one of the entrances of the rive. and we laid to our oars with continued effort.

To save time and expedite our object-that of speedily refreshing ourselves-I endeavored to pass over the Ker At this critical moment a short sea struck us, and the tiller not being firmly grasped she broached to, and the succeed-ing wave turned her bottom upwards.

e Soosoos, like all other tribes on the seabord, are ex cellent swimmers, and being myself no indifferent one, we struck out to avoid collision with the boat, now tossed among the waves of the breakers. But he ought to have rather been astonish-⁶ ed that human beings should so often place their happi-⁶ ness and their satisfaction on things of but little import-⁶ ance, or, indeed, injurious. This primitive misconcep-⁶ tion once made, the other follows as a certain conse-⁶ quence. From the moment that a Russian, in the time ⁶ of Peter I, placed so much interest in wearing his long ⁶ beard, which was probably a ridiculous inconvenience; ⁷ or that a Pole was passionately attached to the possession ⁸ of his LIBERUM VETO, the scourge of his country, it was ⁸ very obvious that either would regard themselves as ex-⁸ cessively tyrannized over, when they saw themselves de-⁶ cessively tyrannized over, when they saw themselves de-⁶ prived of these pretended advantages. In fact, they were ⁶ in reality severely subjected when thus despoiled, because ⁶ the most powerful effort of their will was restrained, and rendered their persons and wishes subject to the will of

"Montesquieu replied to himself when he added this re-markable phrase : 'In brief, every one denominates LIBER-ry that Government which is conformable to his inclinations.' That must be so, and cannot be otherwise; and so far, every one is right; because every one is truly free when all his inclinations are satisfied; nor can he be so in any other manner."—Destutt de Tracy, Commentary on Montesquieu, page 145.

It is very unnecessary to travel far from the Capitol of the United States, or to pursue our researches very far back into history, to find people who have placed their SUPREME GOOD on objects of doubtful efficacy. The Russians and Poles are not alone amongst nations who have set their hearts on things about as respectable in themselves as long beards and the Liberum Veto. A nation might be cited who have made the ABSO-LUTE VETO a primary section of its organic law, and the members of which boast of being the freest on the face of the earth-a nation which is in a fair way of placing the right of petition above every other right, and of conferring on every individual the legal authority to call the attention and employ the time of its National Legislature, on any subject, however remote from the direct interests of the petitioner. But to quit a train of thought very difficult to pursue with becoming gravity, let us once more hear a response from DE TRACY:

" It is not the form of the Government which is in itself ⁴ a matter of much importance. It would be a very weak ⁵ reason to urge in its favor, to say, that it was, more than ⁴ another, conformable to the true principles of reason, be-⁶ cause definitive. It is not speculation and theory which ⁶ regulate the affairs of the world, but practice and its results, ⁶ as it is there which a first individual who are available at the as it is these which affect individuals who are sensible and positive, and not ideal or abstract beings."-Ibid, p. 148.

As a practical commentary on this last quotation, we have the following in the National In-telligencer of February 3, 1836:

"Sir, the whole mass of power which is conferred by the Constitution [of the United States] on all the departments Constitution [of the United States] on all the departments of this Government, is nearly as great as the whole power of any Government of any civilized People. But the theory of our Government so distributes this power among differ-ent branches or departments as to check and counterbal-ance, restrain and control, each other mutually. Power with us is so neutralized to do harm, and so well poised to do good, in the theory of our Constitution, that the Govern-ment was made free at the same time it was made effi-cient. But, sir, the practice of the Government has of late so perverted the theory of the Constitution, that, through corruption, we are fast becoming bound hand and foot, and corruption, we are fast becoming bound hand and foot, and a single department is absorbing the whole mass of power. The principle of "the party" is now warring upon one of the cardinal principles of the Constitution, to keep separate, distinct, and INDEPENDENT, the Legislative and the Executive Departments. That principle, without which this Govern-ment cannot remain free, is totally undermined by the policy of parties to elect legislators to support—that is, to do the will of—Presidents! Is there no jealousy of the Execu-tive left? No esprit du corps in Congress? Gone! gone!!" — Vide speech of Mr. Wise, in the House of Representa-tives, Jan. 22. tives, Jan. 22.

In brief, let who will be President of the United States, let his talents, his virtue, firmness, and integrity be however eminent, his office must and will be a centre of force, enchaining, by attractive influence, every other section or department. MONUMENT TO WASHINGTON.

The Intelligencer has given a plan for this, and, if you will allow room, I think I can suggest a better. In the extreme cast or north corner of the District of Coumbia, in a quiet, sightly place, erect a building to be called the WASHINGTON MONUMENT, thus :

Let each front be to the country a model of architecture in Dixo ts kind, viz. the east front, of the Oriental (Asiatic, Sara-Doug cenic) architecture; the south, Egyptian, (African;) the west, Gothic; the north, Grecian. Choose (and copy with Duk Delt scrupulous exactness) for these the most magnificent origi-nal of Delhi, Thebes, Athens, England, or West Europe. nal of Delhi, Thebes, Athens, England, or West Europe. The wide portal in the centre of each front admits to a cover-ed and glazed arcade, supported on a noble vista of columns 50 feet high, leading to the centre circular hall. These wings have four stories of rooms in double ranges on each side, one range opening on the arcade, and lighted thence, the other opening outwards, and lighted thence. These rooms (for students) have double sheet-iron floors, (with hot air between,) supported beneath by arched bars of iron span-ning from corner to corner of the room below. The centre has on the ground floor a circular chapel hall 100 feet in diameter, surrounded by 28 columns of fluted Doric, (the most ancient without pedestals,) one for each State and Territory. Call this the "Nation's Hall." Is it not best for the general good-for the prosperity of the States-the harmony and purity of Congress, disturbed and tempted by multitudes of projects to absorb the excess in the Treasury-and for the safety of the vast treasure itself-which, once paid into the vaults of the western and southwestern deposite banks, may be as difficult to evoke. as " spirits from the vasty deep," though our Glendower should call neverso loudly-would it not, on all these accounts, be best that Mr. Clay's land bill should pass? We speak not now to mere politicians, but to men of common sense, and right and honestintentions. To New Yorkers, in particular, is it not most desirable, when their Treasury is bankrupt, and taxation inevitable, if good faith is to be preserved, that a bill which would give them in hand, of arrears, one million and a half of dollars, and furnish them during its term, as a law with half a million per annum, should pass ?

Nor is it needful, in order to accomplish this result, that any proper and specific appropriations for defence should be neglected. We certainly hope and desire that an increase may be provided for in the rank and file of the Army and that the Engineer corps be augmented; that large appropriations be made for the Navy, so as to add to our squadrons on all foreign stations, and to keep one of considerable force always afloat and in activity on the home station, and also for the construction of steam vessels of war; and, finally, that as much money be voted for the fortifications built and building, as can be spent with advantage and without extravagance. Thus much we owe to our own respectability, to the past, and to the future. But when all this is provided for, such is the impulse of all business, that the accumulations in the Treasury will far outrun our wants, and it is, therefore, most desirable that one prolific source of supply, that from the public lands, should be diverted to the States.

A beautiful passage from a speech delivered by Mr. Edward Everett, in the House of Representatives in 1828, has been recently brought to recollection, and published as an illustration of the prophetic spirit, or rather of the foresight and sagacity, of its author. Walter Scott, in his Life of Napoleon, referring to the sanguinary and voracious spirit of the French Revolution, and to the successive fall of Egalité, Danton, Marat, Robespierre, and other leaders of that bloody movement, describes it as a monster like Saturn, devouring its own children. In 1828, when the combination of heterogeneous materials against Mr. Adams's administration was in the full tide of prospective triumph, and sending forth the loud shout of victory in anticipation, Mr. EVERETT, contemplating the character, principles, and objects of this new combination, foresaw the bitter animosities, dissensions, and proscriptions which could not fail to attend the triumph of a party so composed; and, in his reply to Mr. BELL, distinctly shadowed out the particular destiny which awaited that gentleman at the hands of the party of which he was one of the ablest and most distinguished champions. Mr. BELL was, at that day, the leader of the chase, amongst the most gallant and honorable of those who sounded the horn and came in at the death. Where is he now? He is the game! And those who, when the hunt was up, were following in his train, are now springing at his heels. Where, too, is CALHOUN, and Judge WHITE, HAVNE, HAMILTON, MCDUFFIE, TAZE-WELL, TYLER, FLOYD, and that whole host of able and honorable men, who, under the influence of mistaken opinions, built up the early fortunes of Gen. JACKSON, and made him what he is? Where are they, indeed! Look at the Globe, and at every pensioned press in the country-hunted, barked, and snarled at by every cur in the kennel of the party!

DEBATE IN THE SENATE

REMARKS OF MR. PRESTON. IN REPLY TO MR. WALL, On Mr. BENTON'S Resolutions, February 17.

Mr. PRESTON said that he could not permit the language of the Senator from New Jersey to pass without one word in reply; not for the purpose of defending his colleague, who was well able to support any proposition which he might make, but because, being denounced for language which, in his very heart, he (Mr. P.) approved, he could not permit that denunciation to go forth to the People without sharing in it. Sir, the gentleman speaks of a battle to be fought between liberty and power, and I say that battle has begun, when we cannot speak of this Administration in the plain and simple language of truth, without being arraigned as traitors to our country and our trust. A proper degree of courtesy in this body is not only becomin but necessary; and a degree of forbearance is perhaps de from his political opponents towards the President of the United States. But, sir, am I to be told that we can only allude to him in the humble language of the degraded Se-nators of Rome, speaking of their Emperor while his Prætorian guards surrounded the Capitol? Away with sucl prostration and debasement of spirit! Am I to be told when he came into office on principles of reform, and then "kept the word of promise to our ear, but broke it to our hope"—am I to be told that I must seal my lips, or be de-nounced for want of decorum ? Am I to be told, when he promised to prevent official influence from interfering with the freedom of elections, that I must not speak of his forfeit ed faith, lest I fall under the displeasure of his friends? An It to be told, when he came into power as a judicious tariff man, I myself advocating his principles, and laboring day and night in aid of his election—am I to be told, after pledges violated, promises broken, and principles set at piedges violated, promises broken, and principles set at naught, that I must not utter my honest sentiments, be-cause they would be distespectful to the constituted authori-ties ? Why, sir, to what pass have we come ? Are we to be first deceived, and then gagged and reduced to silence ? If nothing else remains to us, the liberty of speech remains, and it is our duty to cry aloud and spare not, when the fact is before us, undenied and undeniable, that these pledge have been made and have been violated. Sir, this Admin istration is drawing to a close; and if gentlemen can suc-ceed in silencing our complaints here—if they can reduce us to the condition of abject slaves, they will yet have one other task to accomplish: they must expunge the history of the country—they must destroy the President's written and recorded communications to Congress—they must erase from our memories the warm and solemn professions of his friends when fighting his political battles, before they can conceal the recorded fact that he gave pledges which he has violated, and made promises which he has not kept. If, sir the abuses of this Administration are not to be commented upon by us, thank God! the voice of history, "trumpettongued." will be raised against them.

In the House of Representatives of Kentucky, on the 20th ultimo, resolutions nominating General HARRISON as a preferred candidate for the Presidency, were passed by a vote of 54 to 41. They were introduced by Mr. WICK-LIFFE as a substitute for resolutions introduced by Mr. HARRIS, approving the course of the Executive of the United States in regard to our relations with France. The Legislature was expected to have adjourned on the 27th.

Among other acts which have passed during the session is the bill giving the sanction of the State to the Charleston (South Carolina) Railroad to the West.

On the 20th, Mr. JOYCE presented the petition of the citizens of Louisville relative to a branch of the United States Bank, recently chartered by Pennsylvania. A scene of no little violence followed. The petition was referred, by a vote of 60 to 33, to a select committee of twelve. A motion made by Mr. Davis, of Bourbon, to instruct the committee to report the petition unreasonable, was yet to be acted on.

The country people seem to have no more compassion on us than the landlords, and were the men who are constantly brawling about oppression and high prices, if they have any thing to sell, stickle for the last cent like real Shylocks. In spite of free trade, we would al-most recommend a strike against such enormous prices, were it hot for the grave inquiry of what we should do in the mean time, before the refractory country people should be brought to terms, a circumstance too little considered in strikes generally. But to be quite serious, these extremely high prices are sad indeed for the poor, whose means are in no small degree reduced by the weather, which prevents outdoor labor a great part of the time. Their wants call for a liberal relief from the overflowing abun-dance of the wealthy, with whom the expenses of going to market,

ance of the wealthy with whom the expenses of going to market, be they more or less, are of very little importance. The Merchants' Exchange Company have taken the lot of Mr. Benedict, on the corner of Wall and William streets, at 82,000 dollars. It is something like twenty-five feet on Wall by thirty-five on William. Mr. Benedict bought it for 55,000 dollars, we believe within a vear and with a good building on it : and it believe, within a year, and with a good building on it; and it was sold some two years ago for a little over 40,000 dollars.
