





Meredith Reinhardt had a Boston bulldog named Happy Boy. Florelle Burks, 90, of Royse City remembers the story that after Mr. Reinhardt's death in 1932, Happy was found lying on his grave. He was there day after day after day, grieving for the loss of his owner. She cannot remember how long this went on, only how very sad it was.

Ada Jo Phillips, 84, cousin to Bill Ellis, remembers the Reinhardts' beautiful Victorian mansion built in 1905 originally sat at the corner of East I-30 and East Old Greenville Road to the right of where the Bill Ellis home sets. The exact grounds are where a storage company is now located. The house had become rundown and in disrepair as Mr. and Mrs. Reinhardt aged. After Mrs. Reinhardt died in 1947, the house sat vacant for some time, then was torn down between 1948 and the early 1950s, as it was such poor condition that it could not have been put on the market to be sold.

According to Sheri Stodghill Fowler's new book Images of American-Royse City, Meredith Ephraim Reinhardt and Mary Sue Marvin were married on Oct. 25, 1895, in Royse City. The marriage produced three children, Mary Belle, Marvin and Mike.

According to the book entitled Rockwall County History published by the Rockwall County Historical Foundation in 1984, Meredith and Mary Sue instilled within their children a strong foundation of religion, education, civic service and neighborly hospitality.

Meredith farmed his land, while Mary Sue was known for her handwork, gardening and canning. She kept their cellar well stocked with canned vegetables from the garden, jellies, preserves, peaches, pears and pickled beets.

Ada Jo also remembers that Mary Belle loved animals and took in every stray that she found. She had pens in the back yard where she kept all her animals.

The Reinhardt family attended the First Methodist Church of Royse City, where Meredith was trustee and steward for almost 50 years. A picture of Mr. and Mrs. Reinhardt and their dog, Happy Boy, can be seen in the book on page 200.

Mary Belle was born in 1898, Marvin in 1902 and Mike in 1903. Marvin, the middle child, died at the age of 10 in 1913. Since he died so long ago, no one can remember the cause of his

Both Mary Belle and Mike completed school in Royse City and graduated from college. After completing law school in 1924,

Mike eventually served as a Rockwall County Judge for five years until his death in 1940.

Mary Belle graduated with a liberal arts degree from Kidd Key college in Sherman, Texas, graduating in 1920. She married well-known attorney Carl Miller and resided in Rockwall until her death.

Mike was a student at Southern Methodist University and Cumberland University Law School in Lebanon, Tenn. He received his law degree in 1924. Active in the First Methodist Church of Royse City, he was also an devoted member in the Masonic Lodge. He was elected Rockwall County judge in 1934. On Christmas Day of 1937 he married Virginia Anderson, and they had two children -- a boy and a girl.

Judge Mike Reinhardt, with support from Senators Tom Connally and Morris Sheppard, along with Congressman Sam Rayburn were in Washington, D.C., and had just obtained approval for a \$52,000 grant from the WPA (Works Progress Administration under President Franklin D. Roosevelt's administration) to fund a new courthouse for Rockwall. The first two courthouses had both burned.

Mike came down with pneumonia in the early morning hours of Jan. 20, 1940 while in Washington, D.C., and died at a hospital

In 1942, Virginia(Mike's wife) was elected county clerk of Rockwall until 1948, then became a teacher for the Rockwall Independent School District until she retired in 1981. Reinhardt Elementary School in Rockwall is named for Virginia. At the writing of the book Rockwall County History, both of Mike and Virginia's children still resided in Rockwall.

Meek and lowly heart ... Jacob

The accounts of Joseph's life of affliction includes his suffering under the hands of his brothers who hated him because of envy, being taken as a slave and sold to an Egyptian, and being imprisoned for many years. Even from his childhood years, Joseph had a meek and lowly heart toward his father Jacob.

Jacob was also a good example of walking with a meek and lowly heart under God in heaven. The son of Isaac and Rebekah, and Grandson of Abraham and Sarah, Jacob learned to walk with a meek and lowly heart from childhood. The accounts of Jacob's life starts at Genesis 25:20 and



continues through Genesis 49:33. In contrast, his twin brother Esau walked with hate and envy.

Rebekah played a spiritually significant role in Jacob's life. Some people may argue that Rebekah was evil because of her crafty methods of securing Jacob's birthright. But the scriptures reveal that her actions were according to God's will. Rebekah was a great example of a shrewd and crafty woman with a meek heart toward God.

The accounts of Jacob's life will reveal that he was also crafty when dealing with others who sought to deceptively defraud him. Moreover, he did so with a meek and lowly heart under God's will.

It helps, while studying Jacob's life, to notice Rebekah's faithfulness toward God.

While pregnant, Rebekah felt her twin sons struggle together. It says, "And the children struggled together within her; and she said, 'If it be so, why am I thus?' and she went to enquire of the Lord" (Genesis 25:22-

With a meek heart, Rebekah immediately went to the Lord God for understanding about the struggles between her children. Anytime we do not understand something that seems extremely important, let's not hesitate to turn to God in heaven for understanding.

The first account of Jacob's shrewdness is found in Genesis 25:29-34 where it tells of how he paid the price of a bowl of soup for his brother's

Esau was a fool to give away his whole birthright as the first-born son, for food. Jacob was prudent and wise to press for his brother's birthright in return for food. In the end, it was Jacob who passed on the genetic seed of our Lord Jesus through his son Judah (see also the genealogy of Jesus in Matthew 1:1-16).

Later, Isaac called his beloved son Esau to him to be bles According to Genesis 25:28, "Isaac loved Esau, because he d venison: but Rebekah loved Jacob."

In short, Rebekah arranged for Jacob to bring Isaac some tast while pretending to be Esau. This resulted in Isaac blessing his son Jacob first, giving him the birthright of a first-born son (see 27:1-40). Remember that Esau sold his anticipated birthright to some food.

After the blessings of Isaac, Esau plotted to murder Jacob after of mourning for Isaac's anticipated death.

Later, when Rebekah learned of Esau's plan to kill Jacob a father's death, she instructed Jacob to leave and go to her family named Laban (Genesis 27:41-46).

Naaman Forest knocks Lady Jackets from playoffs

The basketball season ended much sooner than expected for the Rockwall ISD's four varsity teams.

Only the Rockwall girls made the playoffs, and they lost their Bi-District game 63-60 to Garland Naaman Forest Monday night at Sachse.

This season was the first in nine years that the Lady Jackets haven't reached at least the Regional quarterfinals. But they did go down fighting.

The Rockwall-Heath girls finished their 8-19 season (1-11 in District 12-5A) with a 60-55 loss at Tyler Lee. The Lady Hawks' Katie Webster scored 26 points on 10-for-14 shooting.

The boys' season ended the night after the RHS girls' playoff loss, with host Rockwall trying in vain to snap a losing streak that reached 17 games and to tie RHHS, whose only victory in a 10-game stretch had been over the Yellowjackets. The Hawks (13-19, 2-10) took a 27-8 lead after one quarter, and RHS couldn't catch up in a 66-60 loss.

Tyler Zivney led RHHS with 17 points. Aaron Maxwell scored 23 in his last game for Rockwall (10-21, 0-12).

After the loss to Naaman Forest, Lady Jackets head coach Jill McDill said, "They shot very well (unofficially 24-for-50, 48 per cent). And we didn't play very good defense."

The Lady Rangers' key shooter was junior Kaitlyn Holly. At every key point in the game, she seemed to be hitting a 3-point shot.

With Rockwall leading 16-12 in the second quarter, Holly hit two treys for Naaman's first lead at 18-16. She made three more 3s in the third quarter, the last of which gave the Lady Rangers (19-14) an 11-point lead at 42-31. Game high scorer Sara Williamson (27 points) and Hannah Hughes (12, 9)
