## All residence searched in conjunction with federal investigation

Afternoon, June 7, no further information was available from authorities on the investigation that became apparent when federal agents searching at this time that can be released," said Public Information Officer Kathy Colvin of the U.S. Attorney's Office. ## Newly elected Rockwall city council members accept their oaths of office

With every seat occupied and additional visitors lining the walls all around the council chambers, the June 6 Rockwall City Council meeting involved a complete sampling of city government business, primarily the swearing-in of four members.

District Judge Brett Hall presided over the oaths of Mayor David Sweet and Council Members David White, Bennie Daniels and Michelle Smith, all elected in May.

As a result of discussions that occurred in the executive session that immediately preceded the regular meeting, council member Cliff Sevier made a motion to appoint Mark Russo as mayor pro tem, which was unanimously approved.

With some considerable discussion, the council approved a rate increase settlement with Oncor Electric Delivery Company for an amount considerably less than Oncor originally demanded.

The original application filed by Oncor sought a \$353 million rate increase. The city worked with the Steering Committee (a coalition of Texas cities), according to a memo submitted to the council from Joey Boyd, director of internal operations, to analyze the schedules and evidence offered by Oncor to support its request to increase rates.

The committee negotiated the amount down to \$136.7 million. The result would be a monthly billing impact to the average residential customer of a \$2.35 increase, as opposed to \$5 per month increase that the original amount would have created.

Council unanimously approved an ordinance authorizing the rate change.

The 2011 Toyota US Open Triathlon was approved to be scheduled for Oct. 2, with a proposal that included an improved route and better communication with area churches, both of which would improve the traffic scenarios for next year. The proposal also included waiving the rental fees at The Harbor, as the city did in 2010.

"The event organizers paid for additional police support and all other costs associated with the event," reported Brad Griggs, director of parks, recreation and right of way. Griggs related how the next year's event would be improved with some changes based on feedback, and expounded on the positive financial impact to the City of Rockwall, as it "contributed ap-

agents and operations." The OIG's primary purpose is to prevent fraud, waste, abuse or mismanagement of federal government funds.

On June 2, the FBI served a search warrant at the Rockwall homes of Dr. Roy and Dr. Louise Lamarre on Coastal Drive. The primary service is geriatric medicine.

Dr. Lamarre graduated from Laval University in Quebec in 1980 and received her license to practice medicine in the State of Alabama in 1985. Her agreement allows them to practice medicine in Texas, according to the American Medical Association's licensing explanations.

Dr. Lamarre moved to the Rockwall home in May of 2004, and also owns a property in Dallas.

Coordinator Mark White confirmed that FBI agents were at the home on June 2, as well as multiple other locations the same month. He would not provide any details "due to the timing," but in response to reports that boxes were being hauled away, he said federal agents that the agents were "probably carrying out an investigation."

White confirmed that agents were on site at the DeSoto medical office as well. Since then, no one has answered the phones at the office, and multiple calls through the automated system.

White said the Medistat staff had responded as of press time on the office manager's line with requests to respond to reports about the FBI/OIG raids on their home and office.

\$27,000 to our local economy."

A meeting was held regarding a business owner's request for a special use permit to allow a snow cone stand in a portable building on the property.

The building would be situated in the parking lot near the restaurant owner's approval.

The Zoning Commission was divided on the issue with a 3-3 vote. Vice-chair Connie Jackson, and referred it to council for approval. The dissenting votes were attributed to concerns about foot traffic between the proposed snow cone stand and the restaurant.

Members presented photos showing how a 40-foot wooden fence could be constructed to shield the snow cone stand from the street, and pay for six additional speed bumps in the parking lot, which contains a number of them.

Members in the Council Chambers expressed a wish to speak on the issue, but a call for comments was issued. With the additional information that the property owner's liability insurance would be affected by the snow cone stand's operation, the ordinance approving this use was passed unanimously.

The property matters was a show cause hearing in the matter of a property owner at 448 Nicole Drive. Councilman Cliff Sevier's issue was addressed at the April 28 council meeting, at which time he responded by pulling a permit to make some of the repairs in the dilapidated structure.

Some modest attempts were made at repairs, but nothing significant could be located. A certified letter was re-issued, and a public notice was posted in the newspaper of record in compliance with law.

Sevier did not appear to speak, and a motion was passed unanimously for demolition order again.

The minutes from the May 16 regular city council meeting were approved unanimously, as well as a resolution accepting the canvass returns from the May 14 General Municipal Election.



Under state law, the dollar amount of school taxes imposed on the residence homestead of a person 65 years of age or older or of the surviving spouse of such a person, if the surviving spouse was 55 years of age or older when the person died, may not be increased above the amount paid in the first year after the person turned 65, regardless of changes in tax rate or property value.

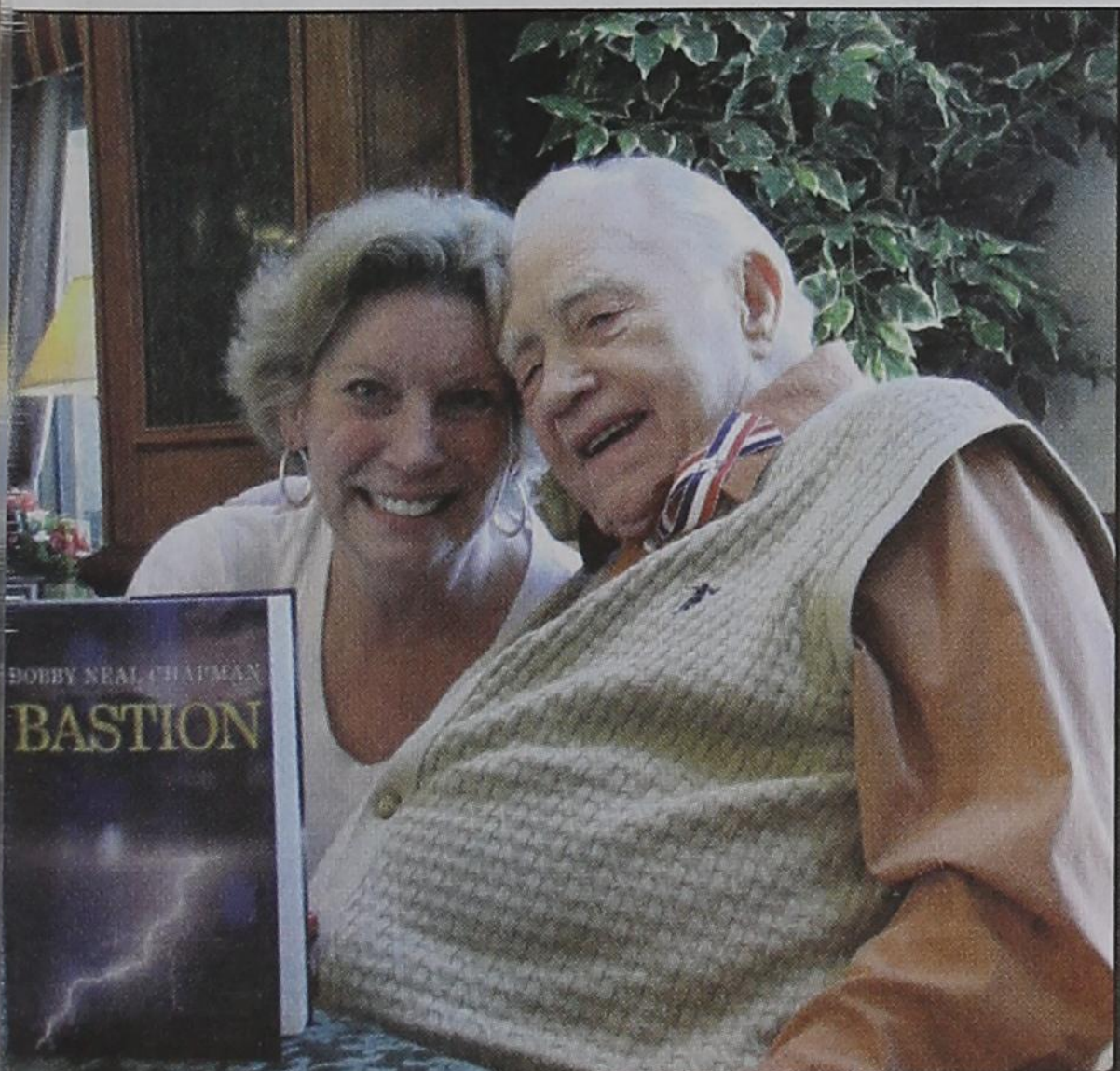

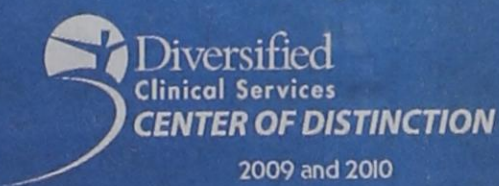

Harvey said, "Our backs were against the wall. I didn't feel we had a good effort (Thursday). We left made some baserunning errors and a costly error in the field."

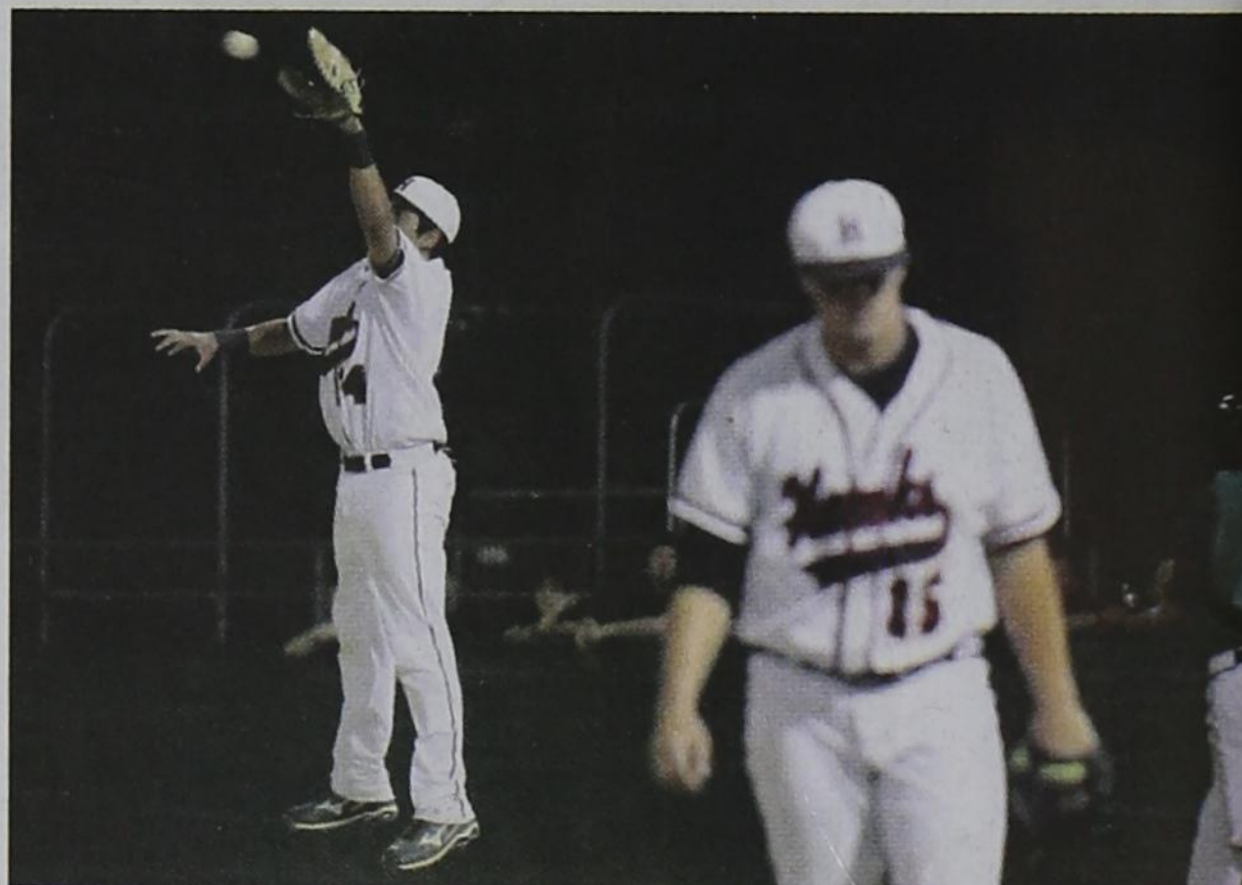
The Hawks were 0-for-8 with runners in scoring position in the first game, then 9-for-19 in the second. They could not maintain that pace for the deciding game.

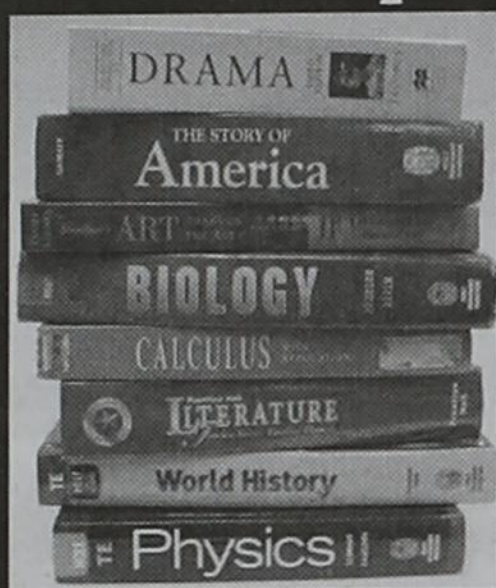

# Opinions Obama flouts war powers resolution

NATO announced that the Libyan intervention will be extended for another three months. So what President Obama said would be a matter of days, not weeks, will in fact last many months. It's safe to assume that Western powers will be meddling there a year from now.

One thing we know for sure, however, is that the U.S. intervention is doubly illegal. Obama had no legal authority to enter the war, and given that he entered it anyway, the 1973 War Powers Resolution required that on May 20 — 60 days after the intervention began — Obama either procure authorization from Congress or cease all operations.

He asked for a resolution, but Congress has not complied. In fact a bipartisan move is afoot to demand withdrawal from Libya. The Republican leadership blocked that resolution from a vote. So Obama is prosecuting a war without congressional approval beyond the 60-day limit. That's illegal.

The founders of this country were concerned about warmaking. Thus, the Constitution gives only the Congress the power to declare and appropriate money for war. But since 1942 no president has asked Congress for a declaration of war. (Blank-check "authorizations" don't count.) The War Powers Resolution was a half-hearted attempt to restore some measure of congressional authority over warmaking. But no president has accepted it, and members of Congress generally have been scared to resist a president.

So presidents have repeatedly gotten away with lawlessness. As Glenn

Greenwald notes, that does not make new violations lawful.

Under the War Powers Resolution a president can commit troops to combat on his own say-so only in "a national emergency created by attack upon the United States, its territories or possessions, or its armed forces." Thus the Libyan intervention is illegal.

What does the administration say? "[The] President had the constitutional authority to direct the use of force in Libya because he could reasonably determine that such use of force was in the national interest," a Justice Department Office of Legal Counsel memorandum states.

In other words, if a president judges a military operation in the national interest, he may on his own commit forces.

The only problem is that the War Powers Resolution forbids that.

What about the 60-day rule? According to the New York Times, "Administration officials offered no theory for why continuing the air war in Libya in the absence of Congressional authorization and beyond the deadline would be lawful."

The closest we got to a justification came from Jay Carney, the press secretary, who said that the commentary about the Resolution "could fill this room, and none of it would be conclusive." Even if that were true, the interests of the American people demand a presumption in favor of dispersed, rather than concentrated, power.

The Times quoted the Harvard Law professor Jack Goldsmith, who ran the Office of Legal Counsel in 2003 and 2004, on the unprecedented nature of Obama's action: "There may be facts of which we are unaware, but this

appears to be the first time that any president has violated the Resolution's requirement either to terminate the use of armed forces 60 days after the initiation of hostilities or get Congress's support."

Some of the president's allies argue that that the Resolution applies because deadly drone attacks (which have killed innocent civilians) and the U.S. supporting role for NATO don't constitute war. Secretary of State Hillary Clinton recently said, "Even today, the United States continues to fly 25 percent of all sorties. We continue to spend a majority of intelligence, surveillance and reconnaissance assets on Libya."

That looks like war.

Some may wonder why Obama didn't ask Congress for a resolution since he could surely have gotten it. Greenwald knows why: "The White House is simply choosing not to seek it because Obama wants to bolster the unrestrained power of the imperial presidency established by [the Bush administration]."

It would behoove Obama to heed his own words, spoken by him for president: "No more ignoring the law when it's inconvenient for not who we are.... We will again set an example for the world that is not subject to the whims of stubborn rulers."

We're waiting, Mr. President.

# Holding the President accountable on Libya

Last week, more than 70 days after President Obama sent our military to attack Libya without a congressional declaration of war, the House of Representatives finally voted on two resolutions attempting to rein in the president.

This debate was long overdue, as polls show Americans increasingly are frustrated by congressional inaction. According to a CNN poll last week, 55 percent of the American people believe that Congress, not the president, should have the final authority to decide whether the U.S. should continue its military mission in Libya. Yet for more than 70 days Congress has ignored its constitutional obligations and allowed the president to usurp its authority.

Finally, Congressman Dennis Kucinich was able to bring to the floor a resolution asserting that proper constitutional war power authority resides with Congress. His resolution simply stated that "Congress directs the President to remove the United States Armed Forces from Libya by not

later than the date that is 15 days after the date of the adoption of this concurrent resolution."

Opponents of the withdrawal resolution said the 15 day deadline was too abrupt. But as I pointed out during debate, the president attacked Libya abruptly - he didn't even bother to consult Congress - so why can't he order an end to military action just as abruptly? When members of Congress took an oath of office to defend the Constitution, we did not pledge to defend it only gradually, a little bit at a time. On the contrary, we must defend it vigorously and completely from the moment we take that oath. I was pleased that 87 Republicans were able to put the Constitution first and support this resolution.

House Speaker John Boehner offered his own resolution on the same day, which declared that Congress would not support the insertion of US ground troops into Libya. Although this unfortunately was far from adequate to satisfy our constitutional obligations, it certainly was a step in the right direction and I am pleased that it passed in the House. Just days before

Speaker Boehner's resolution, an amendment to the defense authorization act prohibited the president from using any funds in the bill to support troops into Libya. A separate amendment last week prohibiting appropriations to the Department of Homeland Security from being used to attack Libya came within just a handful of votes from passing. These votes demonstrate that members of Congress increasingly are recognizing that our foreign wars are deeply unpopular with their constituents, and the American people know it. They expect Congress to focus on fixing America's economic problems, rather than rubber-stamping another open-ended military intervention in Libya.

I believe these resolutions and amendments indicate that the president is in the right direction. I am confident we will see Congress ending our unconstitutional wars. The American people are tired of no less. The president's attack on Libya was unconstitutional and unlawful. This policy must be reversed.

Helping Hands Executive Director Margo Nielsen said she and both of the agencies' proposals to United Way were funded.

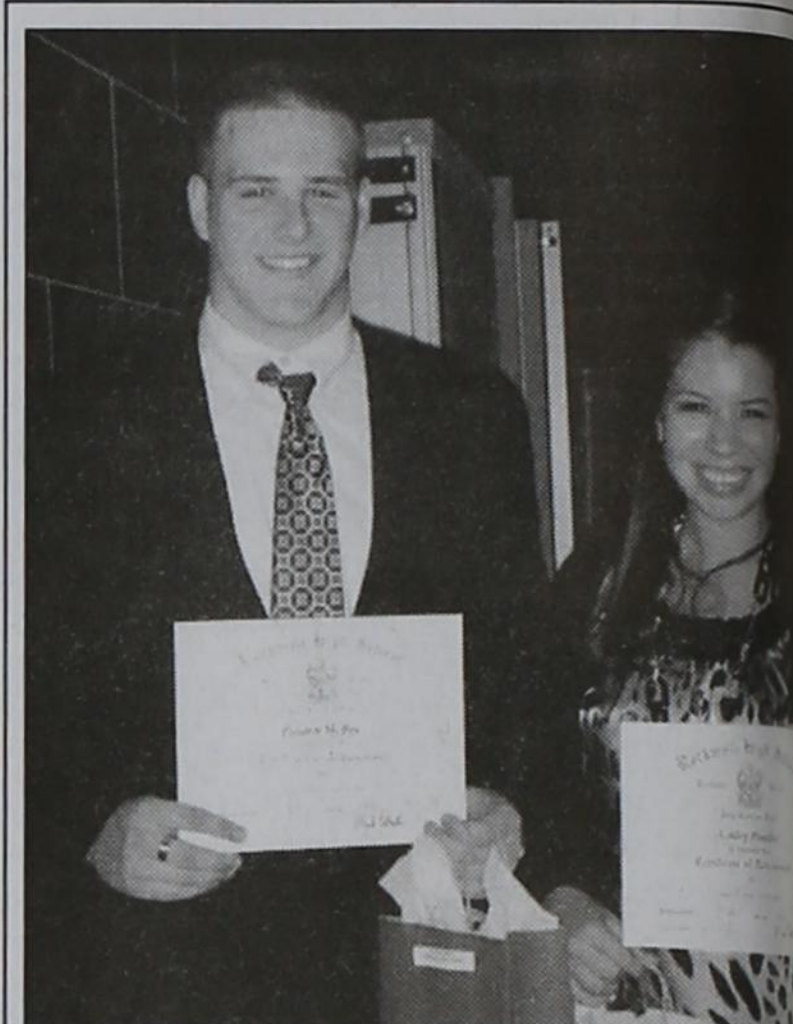
Because Helping Hands administrators were aware of the United Way funding change, Helping Hands already had started working to produce more income.

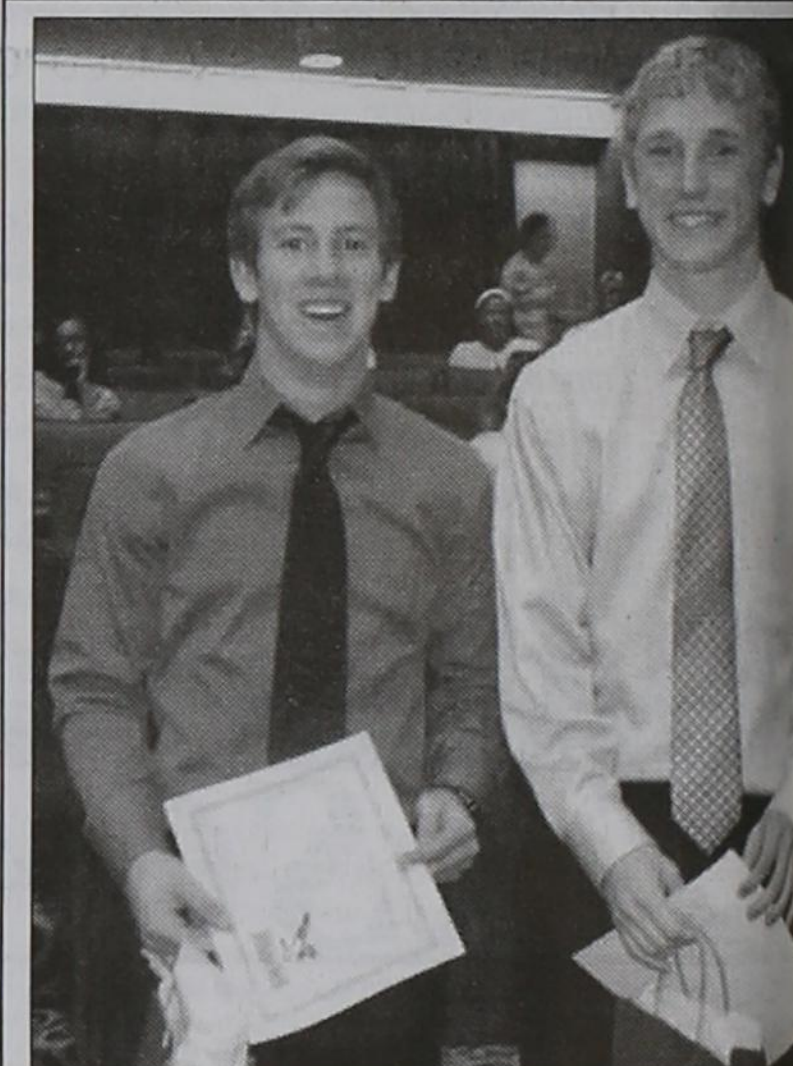
"We continue to count on our supporters for their generosity that allow Helping Hands to assist our residents in critical need, provide health care to the underserved," Nielsen said.

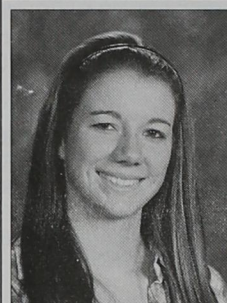

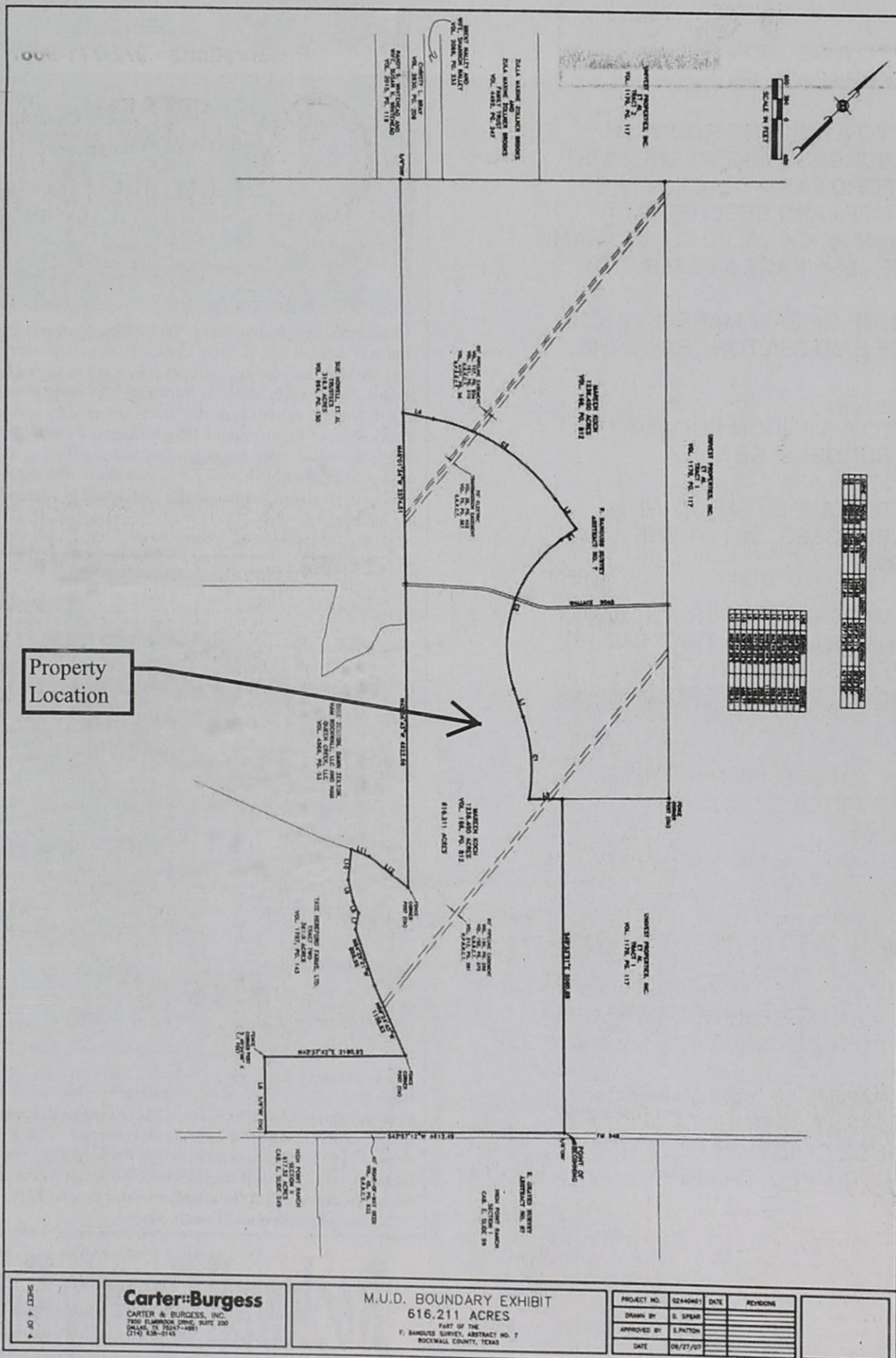

With the dishwasher supposedly fixed, Lanny handed me the side to turn on the water supply.

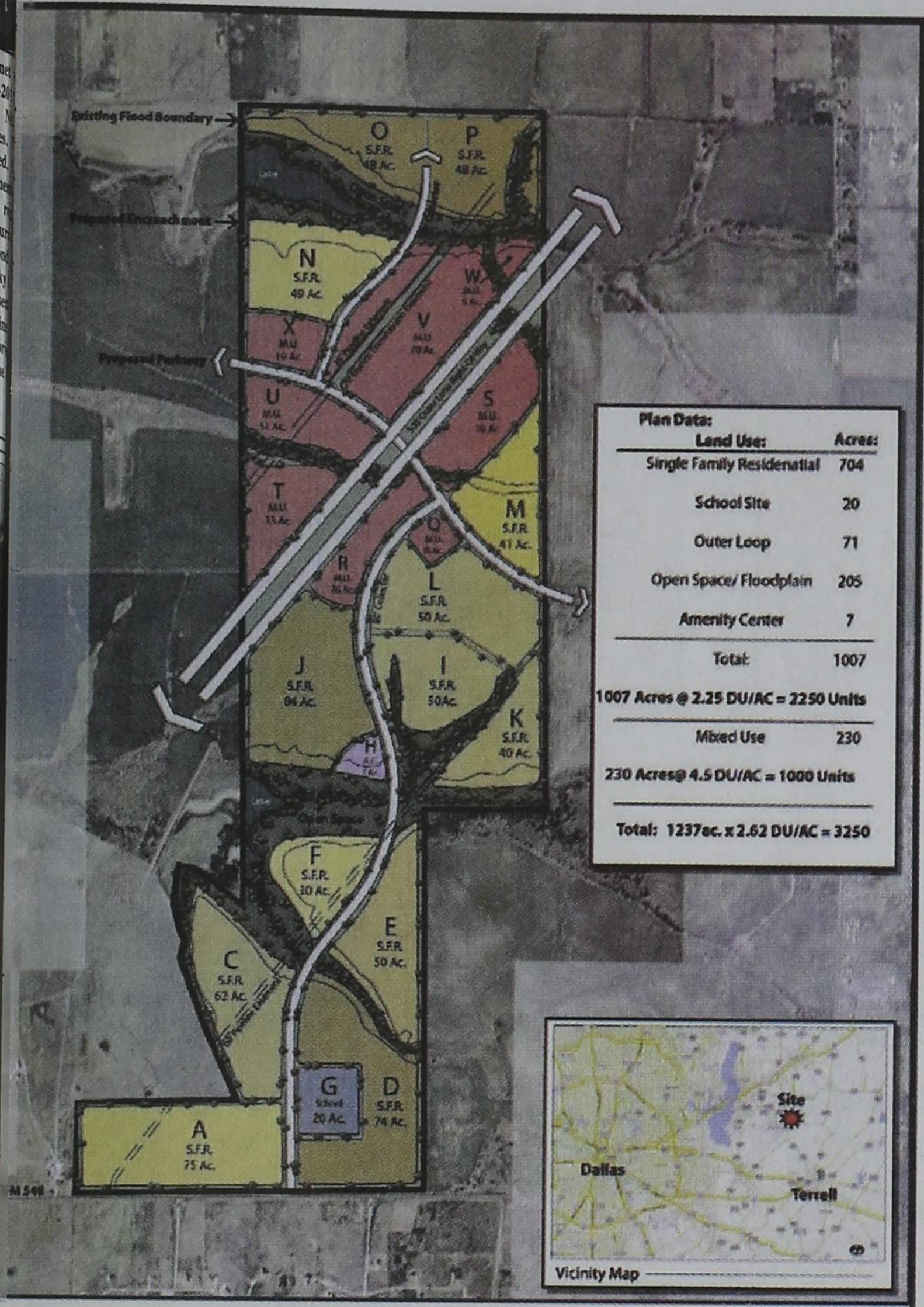

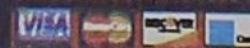

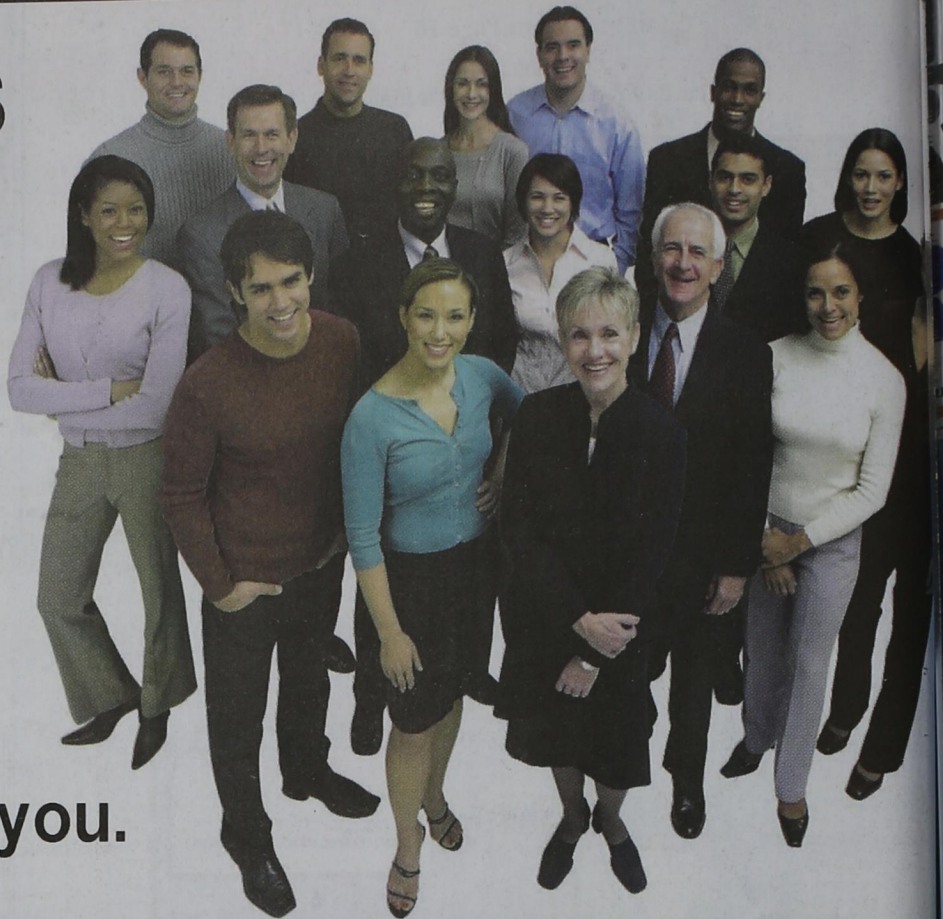
