

The RCHS cafeteria was the setting for the Top Dog Spectacular 2015 conducted on May 14. Three \$1,000 scholarships were presented to chosen students.



cording to a Rockwall Police news release, officers responded to jor accident involving several 18-wheelers and passenger vehicles yout 6:30 p.m. on Saturday, May 23. The accident unfolded in the bound lanes, but one of the 18-wheelers crossed through the concrete divider into eastbound lanes, causing further collisions. The eastbound lanes were shut down at Dalrock Road, according to the release. Westbound lanes initially were reduced to one lane. The identities of the drivers involved had not been released at the time of the news release.

The police department's Traffic Division is investigating the incident.

During Sunday morning church, most of us were probably reminded of something very special. Memorial Day was also the birthday of the church of God.

There's no doubt that many people remembered this important fact. But some of us were so caught up in the Memorial Day activities and the abundant blessings of rain, that we forgot about the birthday of the church.

This series of articles have been addressing the significance of what occurred on that day of Pentecost, as recorded in Acts 2:1-4, with a focus on speaking in tongues.

Let's learn more about what is happening while speaking in tongues. After the first people started speaking in tongues, they realized that something miraculous occurred -- everyone else in the Temple heard them speaking in their own languages. God allowed for this special miracle to occur so that it would get everyone's attention on that special birth day of the church. God sure knew how to jump start the Administration of Grace! At the same it's important to understand that this was a one-time occurance and was not promised to happen every time.

We can learn from what the other people said afterward, "we do hear them speak in our tongues the wonderful works of God."







The coach had advised the right-handed batter to try pulling the ball instead of hitting to right field.




