American Heart Month fundraiser draws big turnout in Royse City

Thursday, Feb. 5, a packed house enjoyed free food, entertainment, raffles, door prizes and a good time at the Well Coffee Lounge. Tickets purchased ahead of time or at the door were contributions to raise funds and awareness for the American Heart Fund.

February is American Heart Month.

The Royse City Chamber of Commerce and the downtown merchants sponsored the Go Red event, in which everyone was asked to wear red and t-shirts were sold that said "Love Your Heart."

The Chamber president, Vivian Brown, said she was impressed that such a large number of people came to support the American Heart Fund event.

The highpoint of the evening was when 11-year-old Kaden Bredeweg, the son of Jack and Alishia Bredeweg, was called to the stage to speak to the group. Wearing a T-shirt that said "Official Member of the Zipper Club" accented by a zipper depicting a zipper going down the middle of his chest partially unzipped, meant that Kaden was an open-heart survivor. As he stepped up to the microphone, the room fell totally silent, with all eyes on him.

"Hi, I'm Kaden Bredeweg. I was born on Christmas Eve in 2003. When my mom was pregnant with me, they found out that I had something wrong with my heart.

"After I was born, I spent weeks in the hospital while they were doing a lot of tests on me to see exactly what was wrong with my heart. They found six things. I had two holes between my atriums, which are the two chambers at the top of the heart. I had a hole between my ventricles which are the bottom two chambers of the heart. I also had a narrowing of my aorta and pulmonary vein and a big chunk missing out of my mitral valve. I had to go home from the hospital on a lot of medicines to help my heart work.

"When I was 9 months old, I had a heart catheterization so the doctors could see my heart from the inside and see exactly what they needed to do to fix it. After the doctors looked over the report, the heart surgeon at the children's hospital by my house told my mom and dad that we needed to go somewhere else for my surgery because he was not familiar or comfortable with all that I needed to be done







Kaden's softly spoken words brought to light for those in the audience, the need for more money for research. For such a little boy, he made a big impact.






bearing certificates of obligation not to exceed \$2,150,000. The loan would pay for "all or a portion" of the city's contractual obligations connected with construction and equipment of the new city hall, to include parking, landscaping, infrastructure, and site improvements. The loan would also fund construction and improvements of streets, roads, sidewalks, drainage, utility relocation, signalization, landscaping, lighting and signage." Furthermore, the loan would finance "legal, fiscal, engineering and other professional fees in connection with such projects.

The city intends to pay the loan back through the levy and collection of ad valorem taxes in the city. The city has not discussed and considered a city wide referendum vote on the loan and city hall construction.

All people and businesses affected by the city's loan application, city hall construction plans, and other actions, may monitor the Rockwall County News to determine whether city's procedures for publication of each required notice were in compliance with state law (Texas Gov. Code Section 2051.049, 2051.044 and 2051.048(c)).







Parasites

Politicians and lawyers pretend that they are important people doing important work. But often they're important because they are parasites. They feed off others, while creating no wealth of their own.

We all complain about businesses we don't like, but because business is voluntary, every merchant must offer us something we want in order to get our money.

But that's not true for politicians and their businessman cronies. They get to use government force to grab our money.

Those people who take instead of producing things make up "the parasite economy," says Cato Institute Vice President David Boaz. It's my favorite chapter in his new book, "The Libertarian Mind."

The parasite economy, says Boaz, thrives wherever "you use the law to get something you couldn't get voluntarily in the marketplace."

That includes much of the military-industrial complex, "green" businesses that prosper only because politicians award them subsidies banks that can borrow cheaply because they're labeled "too big to fail" and -- unfortunately -- me.

All of us are parasites if government granted us special deals. Some parasites (not me) lobbied for their deal. "You might use a tariff to prevent people from buying from your foreign competitors or get



the government to give you a subsidy," says Boaz. "You might get the government to pass a law that makes it difficult for your competitors to compete with

They start suggesting that maybe you need to make some campaign contributions maybe hire some lobbyists, and maybe we'll run an anti-trus investigation, and maybe we'll limit your supply of overseas engineers. And all of these things then drag these companies into Washington's lobbying culture." And as I mentioned, it's not just companies that get dragged in. I built a house on the edge of the ocean. 
