Those council members are Place 2 Council Member Steve Hatfield; Place 4 Council Member Jack Pullen; and Mayor Gary L. Moody.

City of Heath

On God's Word

Jesus teaches about spiritual fruit and love

We continue with the record of Jesus Christ's death and resurrection by looking at his walk with his disciples after they left the room. Jesus taught them many things about spiritual fruit and love as seen in John chapter 15. The record of Jesus' ministry while on earth reveals excellent examples for God's people to learn from. In the name of Jesus Christ we can serve God in our individual lives. Because of what Jesus Christ did for us out of love from his Daddy, we can now humbly let God direct our steps to the end that we are blessed abundantly above what we can ever imagine in every area of life. Let's start with John 15:1-8 where Jesus taught about abiding in him, "I am the true vine, and my Father is the husbandman. Every branch in me that bears not fruit he takes away, and every branch that bears fruit, he purges it, that it may bring forth more fruit. Now you are clean through the word which I have spoken unto you... Herein is my Father glorified, that you bear much fruit, so shall you be my disciples." To abide in the Lord Jesus Christ is directly related to bearing spiritual fruit. Galatians 5:22-23 gives a beautiful fruit list, "But the fruit of the spirit is love, joy, peace, longsuffering, gentleness, goodness, faith, meekness, temperance, against such there is no law." When we consider the context of verse 25, fruit is born from

walking in the spirit of God. If walking in the spirit results in spiritual fruit, and abiding in the Lord Jesus results in spiritual fruit, then abiding in the Lord Jesus is talking about walking in the spirit of God. Jesus Christ was preparing his disciples for the day when they would be filled with holy spirit and be able to bear true fruit. The scripture in John has been used to teach that unless people abide in the Lord Jesus, they will be cast into a lake of fire. There is no record of Jesus scaring God's people into bearing spiritual fruit. Here Jesus used a figure of speech to relay a message. He said that if we are not abiding in him, then we are compared to a branch that withers away. He was not teaching them that they themselves would be cast away forever into a burning lake, but that there lives would begin

This is so true. When we stop drinking, our bodies start to dry up. Likewise, when we stop letting God's word abide in us, and stop walking in the spirit, our lives start to wither, and we are compared to a branch on a vine that stops bearing fruit and is no longer useful.

This figure of speech was not meant to literally put God's people as branches that are cast away, but instead to emphasize the importance of walking in the spirit and letting God's word abide in our lives. When we are not walking in the spirit our lives and works start to wither, but when we are walking in the spirit our lives flourish and God's word begins to bear true fruit in our lives. According to John 15:7 we shall ask what we desire, and it absolutely shall be done for us to the end that all glory goes to God.





City: Stay informed, be prepared for severe weather

The City of Rockwall, in a news release issued last week, encouraged residents and businesses to be informed and prepared for severe weather, including pos-

In light of the tornado that touched down in Rockwall County on April 3 and questions that arose during and after that severe weather event, residents are urged to take note of the following information.

The City of Rockwall does not maintain any designated public storm shelters for use by the public. Storm shelters are generally no longer prevalent in this area of Texas, although they may have been at one time. This is mainly because residents who might attempt to drive to such a shelter may in fact be worse off by getting caught driving in their car on the way to the shelter when a funnel cloud approaches or a tornado hits. A car offers virtually no protection from a tornado, so residents are better off staying in their current location and sheltering in place, according to the release.

The City of Rockwall maintains numerous outdoor emergency warning sirens strategically placed throughout the city. The purpose of outdoor warning sirens is to warn residents who may be outdoors of an imminent severe weather event in the community. These sirens are not intended to warn residents who may be indoors at the time of the event, although in some cases residents may in fact hear the sirens while inside. When the sirens sound, residents who are outdoors should quickly move indoors and seek appropriate shelter.

Residents who are indoors when the sirens sound should remain indoors until safe conditions have been restored. Should the sirens sound in Rockwall, you are advised to go indoors and tune to your local radio or television news station for further weather-related information and instructions. In all cases, do not call 9-1-1 when the sirens sound unless you have a true emergency.

Residents and business owners are encouraged to purchase a NOAA weather radio. Such devices are the best means by which to receive vital information from the National Weather Service before and during a severe weather the event.

Residents who are unable to seek shelter indoors are encouraged to seek shelter in a low-lying area; however, take care not to place yourself in harm's way if flash flooding or hail is present or probable. Residents should not seek shelter under an overpass, as these can be extremely dangerous when high winds are present.





The City Council for the City of Rockwall, Texas, having conducted a show cause hearing for the purpose of reviewing the Notice to Demolish issued by the Building Official on December 30, 2011, pertaining to the structure(s) situated on the above described property, finds as follows:

- That proper notice of the show cause hearing was given to the owner(s) and each mortgagee and lienholder of said property informing them of the Building Official's determination as to the condition of the structure(s) and advising the same of their opportunity to comment at the hearing, all in accordance with the alternative notice procedure of §214.001(e) of the Texas Local Government Code.
- That based upon a review of the evidence provided at the hearing, and upon receiving the testimony of the Building Official and other interested parties, the structure(s) situated upon said property is dilapidated, substandard, or unfit for human habitation and a hazard to the public health, safety and welfare, the same being in violation of the standards set forth in the ordinances of the City of Rockwall, the specifics of which are attached hereto and made a part of this Order as if set out in full.
- That the cumulative effect of the violation of applicable standards and the continuing hazard to the public III. health, safety and welfare is such that in its entirety the structure(s) constitute a Public Nuisance that must be
- That during the course of the public hearing, the owner(s), mortgagee or lienholders, if any, have failed to adequately demonstrate the scope of any work that may be required to bring the structure(s) into compliance with the City's ordinances and the time it will take to reasonably perform the work.

Whereupon, the City Council ORDERS and DIRECTS the owner(s), mortgagees or lien holders, if any, to demolish or repair the said structure by July 16th, 2012, which in no event shall be more than ninety (90) days from the date of this Order. During the period of demolition or repair, the owner(s), mortgagees or lienholders, if any, shall vacate the structure(s) and secure the same against unauthorized entry.





The City Council for the City of Rockwall, Texas, having conducted a show cause hearing for the purpose of reviewing the Notice to Demolish issued by the Building Official on February 23, 2012, pertaining to the structure(s) situated on the above described property, finds as follows:

Whereupon, the City Council ORDERS and DIRECTS the owner(s), mortgagees or lien holders, if any, to demolish or repair the said structure by July 16th, 2012, which in no event shall be more than ninety (90) days from the date of this Order. During the period of demolition or repair, the owner(s), mortgagees or lienholders, if any, shall vacate the structure(s) and secure the same against unauthorized entry.

Should the owner(s), mortgagees or lienholders, if any, fail to comply with the terms of this Order, the Building Official shall demolish, or have demolished, said structure(s) and assess the expenses on, and file a lien against, the property in accordance with law.





School board upholds Moss in complaint hearing

The Rockwall ISD school board has extended the contract of Rockwall-Heath head football coach Mickey Moss and assistant coaches after hearing an appeal of a complaint from a group of parents. The RISD's statement read:

"The Board held two Level IV appeal hearings on Monday, April 9, 2012, to hear the appeals of two families. The Board voted to uphold the decisions of the Administration at Level III and is hopeful that the concerns presented

in the appeal are resolved. "The administration retained a third party investigator to conduct a review of the grievances and allegations, to assure the District conducted a neutral / unbiased review. In this process, the investigators gathered statements from parties deemed relevant to the allegations.

Additionally, the employees submitted written responses to the allegations which were considered by the investigators. The employees vehemently

denied the allegations. The independent investigators found that no District employee engaged in conduct constituting abuse or neglect, as defined by state and federal law.

Additionally, the independent investigators did not believe the evidence supported allegations of retaliation, bullying, harassment, or discrimination. The Board found the administration's actions to address the allegations were appropriate and in compliance with state and federal law.

The Board renewed the employees' contracts and did not find evidence to support the parents' requested relief for termination of the employees, based on the investigation findings."

Two families of RHHS football players filed the original complaint. RISD then hired the law firm of Gant & Hicks to conduct an investigation that grew to eight families making 27 allegations.

Moss denied the allegations in a 15-page statement to the school board.



All four Rockwall ISD gymnastics teams will be represented at next month's State Championships, with both the Rockwall girls and boys going as Region 1 champions.



"Throughout the argument of the Government, in a variety of forms, runs the fundamental error already mentioned — a failure to appraise correctly the force of the term "income" as used in the Sixteenth Amendment, or at least to give practical effect to it." EISNER v. MACOMBER (252 U.S. 189, March 8, 1920)

"The Act of 1916 taxes gains derived from capital invested in corporate stocks, that is, shares of corporate gains or profits. It does not tax dividends per se but merely uses them to indicate the form in which such gains shall be taxed and to mark the time when the tax shall be collected. And, in the case of stock dividends, it uses the stock issued to measure the amount of the gains." EISNER v. MACOMBER (252 U.S. 189, March 8, 1920).*




