Delegate Attends F.B. Dedication

Bailey County Farm Bureau played a part in the June 13 dedication activities for the new Texas Farm Bureau building in Waco. An unusual feature of the event was the contribution of soil samples from 210 counties with organized Farm Bureaus. The samples were placed around a symbolic pecan tree planted on the grounds of the new state headquarters. The local sample was taken to Waco by county Farm Bureau President, Lewis Pat Vinson and wife, June, of Muleshoe.

Another important dedication activity was the burial of the time capsule which included the names of Bailey County Farm Bureau members as well as the names of members in all other counties of Texas. The signatures of all county presidents who participated in the ceremony were also placed in the capsule.

Dedication of the new \$2.7 million building at 7420 Fish Pond Road was the highlight of the June 10-16 Farm Bureau Week in Texas. On hand to assist with the activities were a number of state and national agricultural and governmental leaders. Governor Dolph Briscoe was the main speaker at the dedication ceremonies. He was introduced by Texas Agriculture Commissioner John C. White, Congressman W.R. (Bob) Poage welcomed the assemblage to Central Texas.

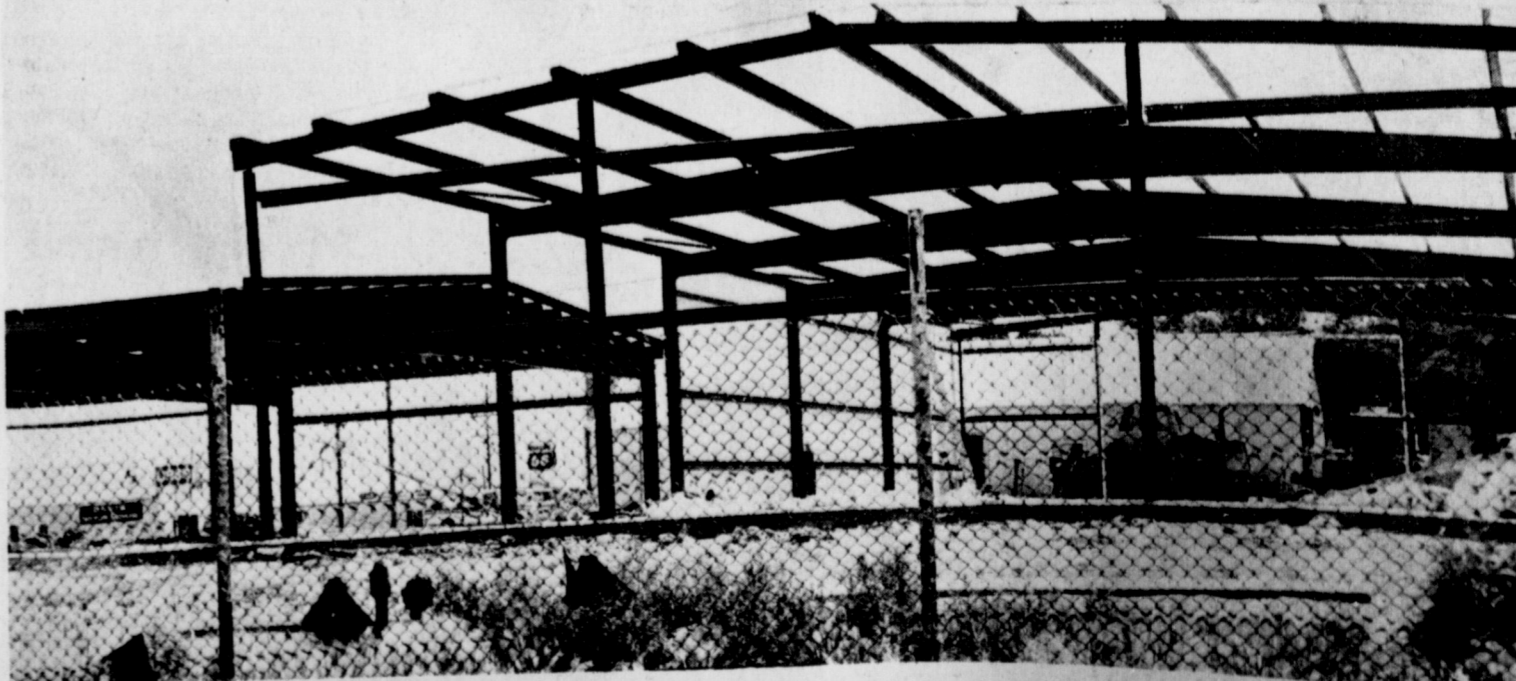
The participants who have the most points in each event will be eligible to attend the District Playday to be held in Post on Monday, June 25.

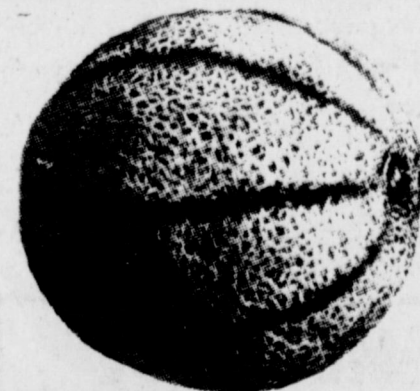

He was presented with a \$5,000 research contract as a part of a continuing program funded by Triticale Foods that is underway at Texas Tech. Dr. Yang also announced the dates of the world's first International Symposium on Triticale which will be held at the KO KO Convention Center in Lubbock on September 18 and 19th. The Symposium will be the most complete of its kind ever held in this area featuring over 25 scientists and industry specialists from all over the U.S. and 10 foreign countries.
Dr. Tom Longnecker, Director of High Plains Research Foundation, Halfway, followed Dr. Yang on the program. He traced the history of Triticale research in this area and documented the impact of the results this research has had on the economy of the area, as evidenced by the estimated yields of the triticale fields viewed by those making the tours of grower's plots in Bailey County and at the Research Foundation. Dr. Longnecker accepted a \$5,000.00 research grant from Triticale Foods to cover the 1973-74 cultural practice research program at the Foundation.

A wide array of items prepared from Triticale flour, mix and rolled triticale, were prepared and displayed by growers' wives. Several hundred guests who toured the new plant facilities at 101 E. Ave. B sampled these baked goods.
The morning program concluded with a report on market contracts that have just been completed for triticale food products, including pancake mix, which was originally served for the first time in Muleshoe. Other items that will be manufactured and distributed through Triticale Sales Corporation of Denver, Colorado, shortly to many areas of the U.S., by the Fleming Company include all purpose master mix made from triticale and cotton seed flour, and Tritikrax and Tritiflour for breakfast cereals. The Corporation also announced plans to manufacture and distribute a full line of snack products processed by an extruding method sometime late this year.
Details of the Corporations 1973 growers' contracts were discussed and the basic allocation set at 125,000 acres. "However," Douglas Bales concluded, "added acreage may be necessary if pending contracts are completed by October."

Marijuana, Death Among Major Bills Signed by Briscoe

AUSTIN, Tex. (AP) — Gov. Dolph Briscoe went on a bill-signing spree Thursday, putting his signature on legislation easing marijuana punishments but restoring the death penalty.

Drawing from a fistful of felt-tipped pens served up by wife Janey, he also signed the new penal code, a competitive car insurance rating bill and ethics, lobby control, campaign finance and open records laws sought by Speaker Price Daniel Jr.

He signed the death penalty bill, however, with a ballpoint pen which a young deputy sheriff was using when he was gunned down in San Antonio Feb. 2.

Rep. Frank Lombardino, D-San Antonio, an policeman who co-sponsored the measure,

said Jerry Walker, the deputy, was taking notes on a case when he was shot to death.

The bill, which took effect with Briscoe's signature, allows execution for certain categories of murder, including killing peace officers and firemen in line of duty and murder for hire.

Nobody has been executed in Texas since 1964, and the U.S. Supreme Court struck down the state's death penalty law last year because it allowed juries too much latitude in deciding whether a convict lived or died. The drug bill, which takes effect Aug. 28, reduces possession of four ounces or less of marijuana from a felony, carrying a possible life sentence, to a misdemeanor.

Possession of two ounces or less could send a person to jail for six months and subject him to a \$1,000 fine. Two to four ounces would carry a maximum penalty of a year in jail and a \$2,000 fine. Possession of greater amounts would be a penitentiary offense, but a trial judge could reduce the crime to a misdemeanor at his own discretion. Also provided is the

right of persons now serving prison sentences for having small amounts of marijuana to petition for resentencing under the new law.

Briscoe called the new marijuana penalties "more realistic" than the old ones which had been considered the toughest in the nation.

The penal code sets out new definitions of crimes and provides punishments more in line with the seriousness of each of them. One major change is in the definition of insanity as a defense in criminal cases. In place of the old knowledge of right or wrong rule, a defense attorney must prove only that his client was unable to obey the law because of a mental illness or defect.

Also taking effect New Year's Day are the conflict of interest or "ethics law and a lobby control act, both part of Daniel's "reform" package.

The chief provision in the ethics law is a requirement that state officials, including judges and agency heads, report annually on their financial holdings and debts. The intent is to reveal potential conflicts be-

tween their public duties and their private interests.

"How many years of your life does this represent?" Briscoe asked the House sponsor of the ethics bill, Rep. Jim Nugent, D-Kerrville.

"Twelve years," replied Nugent, who has sponsored conflict of interest bills almost from the day he became a legislator in 1961.

Daniel's lobby control bill requires lobbyists to account for the funds they spend to influence legislation, including disclosure of where the money comes from as well as how it is spent.

The campaign finance bill, which takes effect immediately, requires political committees to make periodic reports, showing where their money comes from. Such committees have been used in the past to give anonymity to campaign contributors. The bill also requires candidates, both winners and losers, to report annually on their post-election contributions and spending until they wipe out their deficits or spend their surpluses.

Under the open records bill, both state and local government offices must make their documents available for public inspection on demand. Several types of information will remain confidential, however, including criminal investigation reports and papers that might give an advantage to a potential bidder. The bill took effect with Briscoe's signature.

Briscoe had endorsed the competitive car insurance rate bill as a sure-fire means of reducing premiums.

Starting Sept. 1, insurance companies can cut their rates below the uniform prices set each year by the State Board of Insurance, but only with the board's permission.

Rogues' Gallery

Arrested on a charge of gambling, Greg was tried and found not guilty. Later he learned that the police were including his photograph in a public "rogues' gallery," open to inspection by victims of crime.

Greg hastened back into court, this time as a plaintiff. He demanded that the police remove his picture from the gallery, even though they might still consider him a suspicious character.

And the court ordered the police to do just that. Citing Greg's right of privacy, the court said: "A visitor (to the gallery) might conclude that all the pictures were of criminals. This is not a pleasant thought for one conscious of his innocence."



Most courts agree, frowning on undue publicity given to a person who has been cleared of a criminal charge. Nonetheless, privacy like all legal rights - has its limits.

Another complaint was filed by a man who had been acquitted of receiving stolen property. He wanted the police to remove his photograph and fingerprints from their private files.

But this time, the court said no. The court said keeping good records is a key to effective police work, adding: "An accurate identification system may be an assistance not only in finding the guilty criminal but in clearing an innocent suspect."

A different aspect of the problem arose in a homicide case, when the defendant objected to evidence that some years earlier he had been convicted of manslaughter. He said he had already paid his debt to society, and was therefore entitled - under the privacy doctrine - to keep his past a closed book.

But the court ruled that his past could be reopened, because a second offense is more serious than a first offense.

"One who has been convicted of crime (forfeits) whatever right of privacy he may have possessed," said the court, "to the extent that the protection of society requires such forfeiture."

Dear editor:
According to an article I read in a newspaper an insurance salesman dropped in my front yard while he was trying to out-run my dog to his car, many manufacturing plants around the world are experimenting with numerous variations of the 4-day work week.

Under the 4-day week, a person works four 10-hour days a week, has the other 3 days off. Some firms are going even further, having their employees work three 12-hour days a week, and some are toying with the idea of every other week, or in some rare cases every other month.

This is a step in the right direction, but what I'm waiting for is a job you have to work at only every other year.
In regard to the 4-day work week, some government employees already have been put on such a schedule, but now some smart-alec has come along with the argument that you could get the same amount of work done and save money to boot by dropping 2 out of every 6 workers and have the remaining 4 work 6 days a week.

This is striking at the very heart of the economic system, the government, and possibly the Constitution itself.

You may think 4 people can do the work of 6, but that's because you don't understand government. You don't understand the theory of full employment. Why do you think 7 men were used to burglarize the Watergate when 2 could have done the job just as well? You trying to increase unemployment?

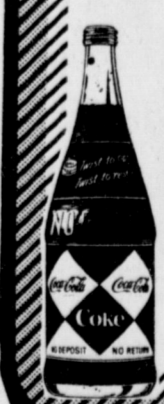
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
