FM 276. The remainder of the by-pass will be constructed in sections. The section from FM 552 south to Quail Run Road is expected to be ready in about four weeks. Todd said even as the sections of road are completed, they will not be open for use, since the by-pass is not being built as one continuous road. "Right now, it doesn't go anywhere," he said.

Moving southward, a bridge will be built over the creek that feeds into Phelps Lake, but construction has not yet begun. In the coming weeks, bids will be accepted to build the section between FM 1141 and SH 66. Work on the section between SH66 south to I-30 began on July 11. Initial work has begun on the last section between FM 276 and the final connection to SH 205.

Todd said the City has not yet received the necessary permits to work on the railroad crossing just south of Airport Road. As soon as the permits are issued, work will begin on the crossing. He said the City anticipates having all work on the by-pass completed by the end of December 2008. Construction on the railroad crossing and some clean-up work may extend beyond that date, but the road is expected to be open to traffic by then.





More power outages hit Rockwall

With searing hot days and construction taking place all across Rockwall County, power outages are becoming a way of life. The latest date with darkness occurred Tuesday morning.

An underground electric cable failed at the intersection of Goliad and Ridge Road. At 9:33 a.m., approximately 2,000 customers lost power, according to Cindy Tayem of Oncor Electricity Delivery. By 10:04 a.m., electricity was returned to 80 % of customers and at 11:12 a.m., all electric service was restored. Oncor rerouted service from other lines to get power back to its customers.

Tayem said cables and other electricity supply parts could fail for any number of reasons that cannot be predicted. She said as soon as Oncor is aware of an outage, they make every effort to reroute power so customers are not in the dark or suffering in the heat for too long.

RISD hosts area elementary students at R.A.C.E.



Environmentalists' hold on Congress

Let's face it. The average individual American has little or no clout with Congress and can be safely ignored. But it's a different story with groups such as Environmental Defense Fund, Sierra Club and The Nature Conservancy. When they speak, Congress listens. Unlike the average American, they are well organized, loaded with cash and well positioned to be a disobedient congressman's worse nightmare. Their political and economic success has been a near disaster for our nation.

For several decades, environmentalists have managed to get Congress to keep most of our oil resources off-limits to exploration and drilling. They've managed to have the Congress enact onerous regulations that have made refinery construction impossible. Congress and the environmentalists aren't through with us. If you're bothered by skyrocketing food and energy prices, wait until Congress reintroduces its environmentalist-inspired Climate Security Act, so-called "Cap and Trade." Cap and Trade is deceptively peddled as a free-market solution to the yet-to-be-settled issue of manmade climate change. Under its provisions, companies would be able to emit greenhouse gases only if they had a government allowance. The Congressional Budget Office estimates that a 15 percent cut in emissions would raise the annual average household's energy costs by \$1,300. Since energy is an input to everything we use, we can expect everything to become more costly, resulting in a reduction in economic growth.

There's a hateful side to Cap and Trade that's revealed by asking the question: How will it be decided who received how much allowance to emit greenhouse gases? Congress could sell the allowances and/or give them away to favorite constituents. You can bet the rent money that a new army of lobbyists, with special pleadings, will descend on Washington to lobby Congress. And you can be sure that campaign contributions and favoritism will play an important role in the decision of who received what amount of allowances.

Much worse than that is the massive control government would have over our economy and our lives. Congress might decide that since tobacco use is unhealthy, it might not issue allowances to tobacco companies. While many Americans might applaud that, how many would like Congress to refuse to issue allowances to companies that produce foods that some people deem unhealthy such as French fries, sodas, canned soups and potato chips. Congress might deny, or threaten to deny, allowances to companies that in their opinion didn't hire enough women and minorities. The possibilities for control over our lives would be endless and could include nuisance-type edicts such a requiring us to buy a permit to barbeque in our backyard.

The thirst to wield massive control over our economy helps explain the near religious belief in manmade global warming and the attacks on scientists and others who offer contradictory evidence.

Anna Schultz aims to add state amateur title

Anna Schultz of Rockwall has won golf tournaments on the national, state and local levels, but one title has eluded her.

She will be trying next week to add the Women's Texas Golf Association State Amateur Championship to an impressive resume that includes membership in the U.S. Amateur Golf Hall of Fame.

Schultz is one of three Rockwall residents, along with Dr. Jewell Malick and Hyun-ju Bridges, who will be competing at Dallas Athletic Club Monday through Friday in the 87th WTGA State Amateur.

"I'd like to win it. I've won the USGA Women's Senior tournament and the Southern Seniors and the other state amateur tournament, but the best I've done in this tournament is the semifinals." Schultz won the United States Golf Association's national se-

nior event last September over Robyn Duckett, needing 20 holes to break a tie. The Rockwall resident also has won the last two Women's Southern Golf Association titles. Her Women's Texas State Partnership championship came in 2003.

And that's not even to mention her six Dallas Women's Golf Association championships or four City of Dallas women's titles.

She and Malick, an obstetrician/gynecologist, are frequent playing partners at Eastern Hills Country Club in Garland.

Malick has reached the WTGA State Amateur championship flight, and could do so again this year. Golf Digest named her one

of the nation's top 100 golfer doctors in 2006, and this year she won an Executive Women's Golf Association regional to qualify for the national tournament in September.

The State Amateur tournament begins with qualifying play Monday, July 28. That will divide golfers into flights for match-play rounds culminating in the championship round Friday, Aug. 1.







McDonough tapped for Merit Scholarship

Steven J. McDonough was named winner of a college-sponsored Merit Scholarship award, according to a press release issued earlier this month by the National Merit Scholarship Corp.

McDonough, who is home-schooled, received the National Merit Rice University Scholarship.

His probable career field will be chemistry and physics, according to the NMSC press release.

Officials of each sponsor college selected their winners from among finalists in the National Merit Scholarship Program who will attend their institution. Each college-sponsored award provides between \$500 and \$2,000 annually for up to four years of undergraduate study at the institution financing the scholarship.

This year 194 colleges and universities sponsored approximately 4,700 Merit Scholarship awards.

This school year's competition for National Merit Scholarships began with more than 1.4 million high school-aged juniors took the 2006 PSAT/NMSQT, which served as an initial screen of program entrants. In September, some 16,000 semifinalists were named. To become a finalist, a student was required to meet additional requirements, including the submission of a detailed scholarship application; be endorsed and recommended by a high school official; and earn SAT scores that confirmed the qualifying test performance. Finalists also were required to have outstanding academic records.

The NMSC is a nonprofit corporation that for the past 53 years has awarded more than \$898 million to 259,000 young men and women planning to seek higher education.
