and diarrhea. Anyone experiencing these symptoms should contact their health provider. There is no vaccine available at this time, but other treatments for flu may be available.

It is important that parents of young children, pregnant women, persons with chronic diseases or compromised immune systems pay close attention to any related changes to their health, and follow these CDC guidelines to help limit their exposure:

* Cover nose and mouth with a tissue when sneezing or cough-

* Wash hands often with soap and water or with an alcoholbased hand cleaner.

* Avoid touching eyes, nose or mouth. Germs are easily spread that way.

* Try to avoid close contact with sick people

* If illness occurs, the CDC recommends that staying home from work or school and limit contact with others to keep from infecting them.

Water line project gets under way

The Lakeside Village water line project, which involves the construction of an 8-inch water line, additional fire hydrants and the relation of water meters, got under way this week.

students.

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


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Rockwall HS brothers create Intern tutorial, chat site to aide freshmen

Andy and Tony Wickham are students-intelligent, dedicated, and ambitious. The twin brothers have established a reputation at Rockwall High School as the veritable brainiacs of their freshman class. "[The Wickhams] are fun, good-and smart," said RHS Pre-AP English teacher Desmion Grosshuesch. But the boys have taken their talents beyond the classroom and into cyberspace.

On top of their own academic workload, the boys make time to run an Internet tutorial website for their classmates, which they launched last October with the help of friend and classmate Eugene Kim. "Homework Help," as the website is called, hosts an array of features, including study guides, notes and a flashcard generator, all of which the boys designed themselves.

The Wickhams first delved into web design in establishing another site meant to host an online game they created. They were able to create both their websites using webs.com, a host that allows users to set-up their own web addresses for free. These tech-whizzes made short work of setting-up "Homework Help."

"[It] was easy," Tony joked.

Since the fall, "Homework has developed Help" membership of nearly 70 freshmen, and around test time it draws many more. Students seek help mainly in Pre-AP biology and Pre-AP geometry.

A popular feature among users is a chat room function, where RHS ninth-graders can get oneon-one help.

"The chat-room is the most useful because you can ask anything," said Tony.

Students also take advantage of the CRAMMIN' Study Resources, which provide access to online quizzes.

"By testing them," said Andy, "I believe their brains are actively engaged, which helps instill the information."

Though they've put their gaming website on hold, the Wickhams make time to maintain "Homework Help," clocking in anywhere from two to twelve hours each week. The boys say the website is an efficient way to help their classmates learn.

"There were large masses of pleading students needing help," Tony said. "And it seemed like the best way to get a large amount of info across to a large public."

The boys plan to continue their site as they go into tenth grade and beyond. They hope they can eventually make it functional for all high-schoolers.



"There are numbers of good programs we have wished for over the years which would enrich our students, but which we simply could not afford," said Hancock. "The foundation will give us a chance to fund many of these worthwhile programs and projects."

"The idea of the foundation comes from other districts throughout the country that have begun a similar organization in recent years," said Jo Nell Mellody. "It is estimated that over4,000 public school districts have established education foundations."

Some of the primary proposals already being discussed for foundation sponsorship include plans to help finance "innovative and creative teaching grants to pay incidental costs of teacherinitiated classroom projects" and the development of a new academic recognition program, Mellody said.

"The Royse City Board of Trustees is excited about the educational possibilities that the foundation will open for our students," said Don Palmer, board president. "We anticipate that local corporations and residents will begin to consider the foundation along with other

groups to which they donate. The foundation intends to create an ongoing program and will publicly announce the results of its fundraising efforts each year."

Judas Iscariot kills himself ...

About the time that Jesus was transferred to Pontius Pilate, Judas Iscariot began to realize Jesus would soon face condemnation. The record found in Matthew 27:3-10 does not provide much detail for the chronology related to Jesus' trials. We do know it occurred sometime after Jesus' transfer to Roman authority. The above scripture includes general information and was likely not meant to fit between verses 2 and 11 chronologically. A study of this subject with other scripture reveals this to be true.

According to Matthew 27:3-5, Judas was the disciple who earlier betrayed Jesus. He left during their last meal, revealed their location and plans to the Jewish leaders and led them to Jesus. He then received a payment of 30 silver pieces from the chief priests and elders. After he saw that Jesus was condemned, Judas repented of his action and returned the payment to the chief priests and elders. He told them that he sinned by betraying the "innocent blood" (Matthew 27:4).

The chief priests and elders let him know that his sin wasn't their business. Next Judas threw down the silver pieces in the temple and left. In verse 5, the reference to hanging himself is a figure of speech that is interpreted in Acts 1:13-20. The Greek word translated 'hanged himself' in the King James Version is apanchomai from the Greek word apancho. This word allegedly meant "to strangle" or "to choke," and figuratively meant to choke with anger or grief. Judas was probably choked with overwhelming grief over his actions. The records show that all 12 disciples were together even up to the point that Jesus ascended into heaven. In Luke 24:33-36 and John 20:19-24 we find the 12 apostles together, without Thomas, after God raised Jesus from the dead. Eight days later, Jesus reappeared when all 12 apostles were present (John 20:26-29).



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According to Acts 1:2-4, Jesus was once again present with his "chosen ones" just prior to his ascension. If Judas was not present with them, there is no doubt that Jesus would have arranged to replace him. There is no record of any one of his "chosen ones" being missing at this time.

After Jesus ascended, the apostles stayed in an upper room. It was during this time that Peter stood up and announced the need to replace Judas Iscariot with another apostle. The record reveals that Judas left the others and killed himself by somehow causing a sword to plunge into his stomach area (Acts 1:13-20)

Not unlike Peter, Judas made a wrong decision. Instead of denying that he knew Jesus, Judas betrayed him into the hands of those who sought to kill him. Judas also grieved greatly just as Peter did. The difference was that Judas was so overwhelmed that he was spiritually driven to commit suicide.

According to Acts 1:17, he was numbered with the others and obtained part of the ministry. Peter and the others obtained the full ministry after holy spirit was poured out on the day of Pentecost (Acts 2:4). Many people after them also obtained the same ministry.

Judas did not obtain the full measure of the ministry because he died before the day of Pentecost came. He could not benefit from what would become available during the spiritual administration of the grace of God which began at the time recorded in Acts 2:1-4.

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In the late 1930s and 1940s, Shaw, along with J.E. (Lighting) Bridges, Sam Huse and Wade (Cut) McCoulskey, built the first modern fire truck for the City of Rockwall from the wrecked chassis of a 1939 car. They put together the frame and body, added a water tank and pump and mounted the fire equipment in his garage.

Later, the men purchased a 1942 open top chassis from Ford Motor Company, again building a pump truck to suit the city's needs. Shaw later used a 1949 Dodge Power Wagon Panel van to build the City's first ambu-

Upon his retirement, he was made a lifetime honorary firefighter for the Rockwall Volunteer Fire Department.

Paul Craig Merritt Sr.

Merritt was born in Garland on May 22, 1939. After graduating from Garland High School in 1957, he farmed in the Rowlett area until 1984. He later owned Wylie Glass until 1998, then went to work for Rockwall County as the Road and Bridge Administrator until his retirement in 2008

Merritt and his wife, Louise, have six children.

Merritt joined the Rockwall Volunteer Fire Department on July 12, 1965. He was a firefighter from 1965 to 1978, Second Assistant Chief from 1978 to 1984, First Assistant Chief from 1984 to 1985, Chief from 1985 to 1992 and Safety Office from 1992 to 2008

During this time, he was involved in establishing one of the first radio systems, using CB radios, between dispatch and the fire trucks. Merritt served on committees over the years that helped purchase trucks, pagers, new radio systems, the department's first self-contained breathing apparatus and extrication/rescue equipment.

Merritt also served on the committee that was instrumental in building the Benny Gracy Memorial Fire Station.

Merritt retired in 2008 with 43 years of service. Three of his sons, Brett, Craig and Ron, served in the department, as well as a grandson. Upon his retirement, he was made a lifetime honorary firefighter for

the Rockwall Volunteer Fire Department. During his tenure, he was named Firefighter of the Year by the City of Rockwall and received the Rotary Club Firefighter of the Year Award.

Gloria Williams Pool

In other business, the Council unanimously approved amending the 2008-2009 FY Budget to make mandatory safety improvements to the Gloria Williams Pool in the South Side neighborhood.

Brad Griggs, Parks and Recreation Director, explained that a new federal law passed in December 2008, the Virginia Graham Baker Act, requires the installation of anti-entrapment drain covers in pools and spas. The improvements are meant to prevent a swimmer from being sucked to the bottom of the pool and trapped on the drain by the force of the moving water.

The federal Act was passed after the City's budget was in place, necessitating the Council's vote to authorize general reserve funds for the mandatory up-

Griggs said, although the Williams and Harry Myers Park pools were both built around 1960, the larger Myers pool was constructed with some of the now-required equipment and has had some other upgrades over the years that are in line with the new federal guidelines. He said the City was able to make other necessary safety improvements to bring the Myers pool into compliance for about \$400.

The Gloria Williams pool will need substantial work, costing approximately \$22,000. Griggs said the pool bottom, pool walls and decking will need to be removed to access the piping and drain systems to make the safety upgrades. The City will need to build a sump, which is a space between the bottom of the pipe and the grate drain, widen the grate drain and increase the size of the piping to reduce the speed of water going between the return line and the bottom of the

Griggs also said that due to buckling and sinking of the pool deck, which create a tripping hazard, the deck would be repaired after it is torn out for the safety improvements. He said the City had the plan inspected by an engineer, who concurred

that the modifications would bring the Gloria Williams pool into federal compliance.

Pool Use vs. Cost

Council Member Matthew Scott questioned Griggs on the use of the Williams pool versus the cost to the City to make the expensive repairs on a pool "that doesn't get much use." Griggs said in the summer of 2008, 391 people paid 50 cents each to use the pool, resulting in \$192 revenue for the City. He said it costs the City approximately \$9,000 to operate the pool, including employing three paid staff mem-

Harry Myers Park had just fewer than 10,000 visitors last summer, resulting in approximately \$12,000 in revenue. Griggs said operational costs at the Myers pool were approximately \$35,000.

Council member Glen Farris said, "Based on the fact that we are subsidizing the citizens to swim in the pools, I think we have a responsibility to go ahead and ensure that they are safe."

Council member Nielson, who motioned to accept the budget amendment, said, "I can't imagine anything more horrifying that a child from our community drowning in one of our pools by being sucked down to the drain. That's just unimaginable to me."

"This is an important issue. This is a neighborhood that doesn't have many amenities and the little park and pool are the heart of the neighborhood. When you say not many children use it, 391 times last year children did use the pool. That's a lot for a neighborhood that's only seven blocks long and five blocks wide," she said.

Mayor Pro Tem Cliff Sevier added, "To the people on the South Side, this pool is just as important as the pool at Harry Myers Park. To destroy the pool would cost a lot, but we would never have anything there again for the people of the South Side area."

At the vote, Scott agreed with the Council to approve funding the pool upgrades, but with an eye on the coming budget season and concern for fiscal responsibility.

Fire Station Updates

Roger Hamm from Speed Fab Crete addressed the Council with his monthly update on the construction of Fire Stations #3 and #4. The continuing rainy spring weather has once again wreaked havoc with the construction schedule, pushing the completion date further back to July 20.

The steel erection at Station #3 is almost complete, with backfill done in all areas. The exterior rock wainscoting has been installed and roofing will begin

At Station #4, steel erection and decking are complete, roofing will continue, floor topping will be poured and caulking on the wall panel joints will begin soon. Crews have begun electrical work in the apparatus bay and interior framing is set to start.

The schedule for the coming month includes shingling the roof, beginning interior framing, continuing with the fire sprinkler piping and ductwork, installing exterior doors and windows and pouring transformer and generator pads.



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

10 Years Ago May 4, 1999



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Book Review

'Redwall' by Brian Jacques

Over the years some wonderful fantasy books have come from the pens or computers of new and wellknown authors. In addition, some of these books have made it to the big screen. Many times, readers go to the movies to see how the written words were interpreted as they watch the story unfold. There are times that the adaptation follows the original story and other times the story's content has been altered or changed.

Fantasy and science fiction have a common thread - make believe tales. The genre of fantasy involves stories that have characters and

events that do not exist in real life. A few ingredients we find in this genre are magic, wizards and mythological characters. The story may begin as a realistic one, but soon evolves into a strange tale that could never really happen.

On the other hand, science fiction stories incorporate science and technology and involve the future on the printed page. The writers try to create a world and life quite different from planet Earth. There are many new fantasy authors whose books have made it into school and public libraries. Christopher Paolini (The Inheritance Cycle) and Rick Riordan (The Percy Jackson Series) are very familiar names to readers of fantasy. However, if we look on the shelves, we will still see the works of J.R.R. Tolkein, Jules Verne, C.S. Lewis and Philip

British author Brian Jacques has been writing for many years and his "Redwall" series has stood the test of time. The adventures and challenges of the characters are set in Medieval times. The first book's setting is Redwall Abby and Mossflower Wood. The protagonists are the mice, moles, shrews, squirrels and their friends. The antagonists are the rats, weasels, stoats, foxes and their allies. Throughout the series the theme of good versus evil is evident.

I imagine most readers are not particularly fond of mice, but Brian Jacques makes us fond of Matthias, a young mouse who shows us that size does not always matter. This vibrant and charming character shows us that courage and determination can help us do the impossible.

The key to bringing peace to Redwall Abbey is recovering the lost sword of Martin the Warrior. The legendary sword will help the animals combat the evil rat, Cluny the Scourge, and his band of followers.

Matthias reminds us of Don Quixote, who was on a quest while dreaming the impossible dream. Unlike Don Quixote, Matthias is not chasing windmills. Matthias's mission is believable since he is determined to keep his friends and family out of harm's way.

He promises to find the weapon and defeat the enemy (Cluny and his band of brothers). The hope of recovering the famous sword brings the peace-loving inhabitants of Redwall to join forces with Matthias in his

As the story unfolds, we forget that the compelling and fascinating characters are not humans. Such is the case with the strong badger named Constance and Silent Sam whose knowledge of the forest is an asset. This book and the others in the series have all the excitement and elements of an action packed fantasy adventure. The series consists of twenty books.

In 2010 there will be another book added to the Redwall Series - "The Sable Queen." "Redwall" is not just for older children, but the books could definitely spark interest in the series for adults. In 2007 Brian Jacques and artist Christopher Denise transformed three of the "Redwall" books into picture books. A graphic novel was also published based on "Redwall."

Our world and lives are constantly changing and at times we find ourselves feeling the pressures and challenges that face us each day. It is great if we can relax and curl up with a good book. "Redwall" might be a book that will help you unwind and envision what is happening in the theater of your mind.

I would recommend this series for ages 10 and up (this includes adults). It is shelved in the juvenile fiction section at the Rockwall County Library.

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

Sales tax payments sh local economy in flux

The economy may be struggling, but information provided recently by the Texas Comptroller's office indicates that spending has remained fairly constant in Rockwall County.

According to the comptroller's Monthly Sales Tax Allocation Comparison reports issued last month, spending across Rockwall County appeared to be holding steady during the month of March. Rockwall County's total payments for the period were \$1,024,737, compared to \$1,003,405 at the same point a year ago. That reflects an increase of 2.12 percent.

Year-to-date payments in 2009 have totaled slightly more than \$5.06 million, compared to slightly more than \$4.93 million paid to this point a year ago. The year-to-date increase stands at 2.61 percent.

The cities of Rockwall and Fate posted increases, according to the report, while Royse City,

McLendon-Chisholm Heath, and Mobile City showed drops in their payments.

An overview of payments made by the comptroller's office this period to Rockwall County municipalities is as follows:

• Rockwall -- \$889,508 paid this period, compared to \$869,783 one year ago, for an increase of 2.26 percent. Payments to date in 2009 are \$4,390,487, compared to \$4,275,394 one year ago, for an increase of 2.69 percent.

• Royse City -- \$72,662 paid this period, compared to \$74,658 one year ago, for a decrease of 2.67 percent. Payments to date in 2009 are \$349,690, compared to \$327,973 in 2008, for an increase of 6.62 percent.

• Fate -- \$22,826 paid this period, compared to \$12,360 one year ago, for an increase of 84.66 percent. Payments to date in 2009 are \$83,294, compared to \$70,174 in 2008, for an increase of 18.69 percent.

Heath baseball, softball and track all on due to UIL response to influenza outbreaks m

All dressed up and no place to

Well, that's not exactly the situation for the Rockwall-Heath baseball, softball and track teams that have had their seasons put in neutral by the UIL, which suspended all high school sports until at least May 11, in response to the outbreak of don't-call-itthe-swine-flu.

But then, it's not that far off either.

"It is unfortunate that we have to have this interruption in our season," said Heath baseball coach Greg Harvey, whose redhot squad had run off a schoolrecord 14 wins a row en route to securing a first-ever playoff berth before the UIL took the bats of their hands as effectively as a high inside fastball. "Since there is absolutely nothing we can do to change it, we're using it as a positive for our team."

Perhaps the silverest of linings that can be found in the unexpected break in action, Harvey said, is that his team, which stands second in District 10-4A with an 11-2 record and is 21-7 for the year, will have a chance to get completely healthy.

"This time off will allow a couple

of our key guys to get healthy," Harvey said. "Drew Benefield is using this time to heal his injured hamstring and Drew VerHagen is able to continue throwing his bullpen sessions and simulated games. There is a chance that both of these guys will be ready to roll by the time the playoffs get here. (And) James Baune is getting some needed rest for his injured back."

Benefield, normally the Hawks' catcher, has hit just .233 in only 30 at bats due to off-season surgery, but has made the most of his appearances on the mound since getting back into the lineup.

The senior has fashioned a 2-0 record, including a sparkling two-hitter in an 11-0 win against Rockwall that handed the Jackets (12-1, 24-3) their only district loss.

VerHagen, meanwhile, has not thrown all year in an actual game, choosing instead to slowly work his lively arm - he has been clocked in the low 90s on the radar gun - back from an injury that occurred last season.

The 6-4 senior has been

playing first and acting as the DH for the Hawks, hitting .318 and driving in 18 runs. Baune, another senior, has proven to be the ace of the staff, putting up a 7-1 record with a 1.16 ERA. For the rest of the Hawks, it's business not quite as usual, as Harvey and his staff work to maintain the momentum of the current winning streak.

"Right now, we are keeping the practices short and crisp," said Harvey. "We are having a couple of intersquad scrimmages each week to maintain some of the competitive edge. These players know where we are at and they realize that this break in action will help our team. I don't have any doubt that when we are able to resume, we will hit the ground running and pick up right where we left off: playing good baseball."

The Hawks are scheduled to travel to Highland Park (8-5, 20-11) in their district finale when the season does resume.

For the Heath softball team, which won its last five district games in a row to wind up 12-2 and in second place in 10-4A (25-8 overall) behind Rockwall (13-1, 23-8-1), the Lady Hawks are also on a roll, winning 11 of their last 12 games on the way to earning their third straight playoff berth.

Initially scheduled to play McKinney in a best-of-three series in the opening round of the playoffs starting on May 1, the Lady Hawks are just waiting for the post season to get underway when they will face the Lady

Lions May 14 at Heath.

The second game will be played at McKinney on May 15 with a third game, if necessary, to be played at Plano East May 16. All three games will start at 7 p.m.

The Lady Hawks are led by pitcher Chelsey Eddy, who is 20-6 with an ERA of just 1.05. The senior righthander ended the regular season by throwing 26 consecutive shutout innings, including back-to-back perfect games, and has registered 244 strikeout this year to push her career total to over 800.

Offensively, the Lady Hawks are topped Kaeleigh Lutz and her eyepopping .494 average, followed closely by shortstops Sarah Austin June 5-6. Deimling's .487.

The track team, meanwhile, not only had its season suspended, but it looked like the UIL was going to eliminate the regional round of meets and simply take the top four qualifiers from the district meets and seed them directly into an expanded state meet.

A state-wide protest, however, prompted the UIL to reverse course and reinstate the regional meets, including the one Heath, which qualified five individuals and two relay teams from the girls team as well as two individuals from the boys squad, will attend at the University of North Texas May 12-13.

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

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
