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PUBLIC NOTICE

Brief Explanatory Statements of Proposed Constitutional Amendments Special Election November 3, 2009

PROPOSITION 1

HJR 132 would amend the constitution to authorize the legislature to allow a municipality or a county to issue bonds and notes to finance the purchase of buffer areas or open spaces adjacent to military installations. The buffer areas would be used to prevent encroachment or to construct roadways utilities, or other infrastructure to protect or promote the mission of the military installation. The municipality or county may pledge increases in ad valorem tax revenues for repayment of the bonds or notes.

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the financing, including through tax increment financing, of the acquisition by municipalities and counties of buffer areas or open spaces adjacent to a military installation for the prevention of encroachment or for the construction of roadways, utilities, or other infrastructure to protect or promote the mission of the military installation."

PROPOSITION 2

HJR 36 would amend the constitution to authorize the legislature to provide for the taxation of a residence homestead solely on the basis of the property's value as a residence homestead, regardless of whether the property may have a higher value if it were used for other purposes.

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for the ad valorem taxation of a residence homestead solely on the basis of the property's value as a residence homestead."

PROPOSITION 3

HJR 36 would amend the constitution to require the legislature to provide for the administration and enforcement of uniform standards and procedures for appraisal of property for ad valorem tax purposes.

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment providing for uniform standards and procedures for the appraisal of property for ad valorem tax purposes."

PROPOSITION 4

HJR 14 would amend the constitution to establish the national research university fund to provide a source of funding that will enable emerging research universities in this state to develop into major research universities. The amendment would require the legislature to dedicate state revenue to the fund and to transfer the balance of the existing higher education fund to the national research university fund. This amendment would further require the legislature to establish the criteria by which a state university may become eligible to receive and use distributions from the fund.

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment establishing the national research university fund to enable emerging research universities in this state to achieve national prominence as major research universities and transferring the balance of the higher education fund to the national research university fund."

PROPOSITION 5

HJR 36 would amend the constitution to authorize the legislature to allow for a single appraisal review board for two or more adjoining appraisal entities that elect to provide for consolidated reviews of tax appraisals.

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to authorize a single board of equalization for two or more adjoining appraisal entities that elect to provide for consolidated equalizations."

PROPOSITION 6

HJR 116 would amend the constitu-

tion to authorize the Veterans' Land Board to issue general obligation bonds, subject to certain constitutional limits, for the purpose of selling land and providing home or land mortgage loans to veterans of the state.

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the Veterans' Land Board to issue general obligation bonds in amounts equal to or less than amounts previously authorized."

PROPOSITION 7

HJR 127 would amend the constitution to allow an officer or enlisted member of the Texas State Guard or other state militia or military force to hold other civil offices.

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to allow an officer or enlisted member of the Texas State Guard or other state militia or military force to hold other civil offices."

PROPOSITION 8

HJR 7 would amend the constitution to authorize the state to contribute money, property, and other resources for the establishment, maintenance, and operation of veterans' hospitals in this state.

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the state to contribute money, property, and other resources for the establishment, maintenance, and operation of veterans hospitals in this state."

PROPOSITION 9

HJR 102 would define what is a state-owned public beach. The public, individually and collectively, would have an unrestricted right to use and a right of ingress to and egress from a public beach. The amendment would authorize the legislature to enact laws to protect these rights.

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to protect the right of the public, individually and collectively, to access and use

the public beaches bordering the seaward shore of the Gulf of Mexico."

PROPOSITION 10

HJR 85 would amend the constitution to authorize the legislature to provide that members of the governing board of an emergency services district may serve terms not to exceed four years.

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to provide that elected members of the governing boards of emergency services districts may serve terms not to exceed four years."

PROPOSITION 11

HJR 14 would amend the constitution to provide that the taking of private property for public use ("eminent domain") is authorized only if it is for the ownership, use, and enjoyment of the property by the State, its political subdivisions, the public at large, or by entities granted the power of eminent domain, or for the removal of urban blight. The amendment would prohibit the taking of private property for transfer to a private entity for the purpose of economic development or to increase tax revenues. The amendment would also limit the legislature's authority to grant the power of eminent domain in the future unless it is approved by a two-thirds vote of all the members elected to each house.

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to prohibit the taking, damaging, or destroying of private property for public use unless the action is for the ownership, use, and enjoyment of the property by the State, a political subdivision of the State, the public at large, or entities granted the power of eminent domain under law or for the elimination of urban blight on a particular parcel of property, but not for certain economic development or enhancement of tax revenue purposes, and to limit the legislature's authority to grant the power of eminent domain to an entity."

Royse City Bulldogs toughen it out with Frisco Wakeland

Wolverines swamp Bulldogs 45-6

ROYSE CITY – Unlike their opening-game loss that came down to a two-point conversion that came up just short, the Royse City Bulldogs were simply overpowered by Frisco Wakeland in their second game of the season, falling 45-6 to the Wolverines.

For Royse City, which dropped to 0-2, it was the Bulldogs' third straight loss going back to last year. The Wolverines, who slipped by RC last year 31-24, improved to 2-0.

Led by quarterback Tyler Kirkindoll, who shredded the Bulldogs' secondary for 431 passing yards, the Wolverines struck early and often, as they jumped out to a 31-0 lead at the half.

The margin quickly increased to 38-0 when Joey Swanner returned the third quarter kickoff 76 yards for a touchdown.

Heath Hawks wait a little extra to get initial win of the year 26-10 over Arlington Seguin Cougars

Delayed once by the weather and again by a sputtering offense, the Rockwall-Heath Hawks finally broke out in the second half on the way to a 26-10 win over Arlington Seguin Sept. 11 at Wilkerson-Sanders Stadium.

The win evens the Hawks' record at 1-1 while Seguin remains winless at 0-2. The game was delayed for 30 minutes due to lightning in the area.

With the score 7-0 at the half thanks to sophomore Dorian Lawry's flying, two-yard dive into the end zone with 9:45 left in the second quarter, Seguin tied the game at 7-7 when Dorsey Griffin hit Martice McNeil for a 10-yard score midway through the third quarter.

That, however, was the first and last real offensive threat by the Cougars, other than an 18-yard field goal by 270-pound defensive end Jack Hays later in the third quarter.

Heath, meanwhile, quickly broke the 7-7 tie for good when Kevin Rodgers hit Cameron Wilson for a 67-yard, catch-and-run touchdown just 90 seconds later.

On a third-and-five from the Hawks' 33, Wilson gathered in Rodgers' pass near the sideline at the Seguin 40, shook loose from a couple defenders and outraced the rest of the defense to the end zone to give the Heath a 14-7 advantage.

After Hay's field goal cut the score to 14-10, the Hawks defense limited the Cougars to just 23 total yards the last quarter and a half. Overall, the Heath defenders yielded only 200 yards total, with the Cougars able to amass only a dismal 17 yards on the ground on 28 rushing plays.

The Heath offense, meanwhile, tacked on two more touchdowns in the fourth period, including another two-yard run, this one by Jesse Irokwe on the first snap of the final quarter.

That touchdown was set up by a 48-yard pass from Rodgers to Amaris Fields for a first down at the Seguin 16.

Irokwe closed out the scoring with his second TD, a nine-yard run — actually more of a stroll — through a huge hole in the middle of the Cougars' defense with 3:17 to play.

The senior running back ended the game with 95 yards on 13 carries to give him 187 for the year along with four scores. Lawry topped all rushers with 96 yards on 17 carries.

Rodgers wound up 12-of-20 for 232 yards with no interceptions, to give him 450 passing yards for the season.

Unlike the Hawks' stunning opening game loss to Sherman, Heath did a much better job of kick coverage, choosing to pooch kick to control the Cougars' run backs. The rest of the Hawk's kicking game wasn't as good, though, as they missed a field goal and failed to convert their final two extra points.

On the defensive side, senior David Tanner, who led the Hawks with 11 sacks last year, recorded his first two of this season against the Cougars, and finished with nine total tackles. Justin Powers, who is averaging 10.5 stops a game, had a game-high 13 tackles and caused a fumble. Brian Foster and Andrew Sorrell added 10 stops each.

Heath next takes on Hillcrest, a team they beat twice last year, Sept. 15 on the road.

Rain flooded the field at Temple's Central Texas Christian School Saturday, canceling Heritage Christian School's football game against Bulverde Bracken Christian School.

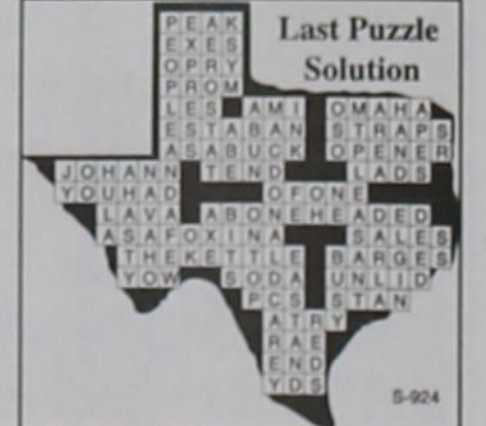

Lightning delayed Friday night's Rockwall-Allen game, but it was the Eagles were struck hardest.

The delay of an hour and four minutes might have postponed the inevitable. The defending state 5A Division I champions outnumbered, out-hit and outplayed the Yellowjackets in their first loss, 38-10. Despite the weather, 1,000 fans filled Eagle Stadium as nearly packed for Homecoming.

It appeared early that RHS could play with the Eagles. Allen received the opening kickoff, Rockwall appeared to win on a third-down incomplete pass. Instead, the Eagles were offside on the play, then gave up a 51-yard pass and seven.

Two plays later, RHS received a reprieve, recovering a fumble in the end zone. Allen had turned the ball over three times in a loss to 4A Longview, so the Jackets had hope.

Rockwall then drove 46 yards in 10 plays, but a fourth-down attempt went incomplete, giving the Eagles the ball at their 34-yard line.

From that point, the Jackets didn't stop Allen until he missed a 38-yard field goal attempt in the fourth quarter. The score was 38-10. The Eagles did not have a chance to score.

"They're good, and we've got work to do," said RHS head coach Scott Smith.

Allen took a 7-0 lead with three minutes, 13 seconds left in the first quarter. At the end of a nine-play drive, Jonathan Williams ran 1 yard for the first of his three touchdowns.

In the second quarter, an almost identical drive ended with Williams' 22-yard touchdown.

The Jackets still were having some success moving the ball. They went up 14 plays and more than five minutes of the second quarter on the way to Josh Broach's 1-yard run to his eighth touchdown.

Unfazed, the Eagles flew downfield, and Williams scored on a 3-yard run to make the score 21-7 at halftime.

Allen had rolled up 324 yards of offense, and RHS had 206.

"When it was 21-7 at halftime, we felt like if we got back on a good drive we could get back in it," Smith said.

An intentional grounding penalty stalled that opening drive. The Jackets punted, and six plays later Allen scored on quarterback Brown's 1-yard run.

Rockwall punted again, and a personal foul penalty put the Eagles at its 17 yard line. On third down, Brown passed 14 yards to Jonathan Lee, and the lead was up to 35-7.

Any chance the Jackets might have had to get back in the game disappeared on their next drive. As Rockwall had improved its week's victory over Royse City, it was having success with quarterback Adam Dingwell throwing to receivers in vertical seams in the defense.

When Will Beasley ran a similar route with four minutes remaining in the third quarter, an Eagles defender hit him hard, causing the pass to fall incomplete.

Smith said, "We didn't finish drives. Then when we went out for the count we couldn't do what we wanted to do."

The Jackets stayed exclusively on the ground for their final drive. It also ended, at Allen's 19, but Travis Shinn kicked a 38-yard field goal for the game's final score.

Allen rediscovered its running backs in the game. The Eagles ran 17 yards in its first two games came mostly from Brown. Williams broke through for 105 yards in 15 carries, and Owens added nine tries.

The Eagles also concentrated on stopping Broach. He gained 116 yards in 17 carries, but Del Myles broke loose in his first extended playing time this season with 12 carries for 116 yards.

"Del's been really working hard. Josh did a great job locking him," Smith said.

He added that Beasley, the team's leading receiver, would have made a difference despite taking some big hits. Smith said the only injury concern could be junior linebacker Hagen Jones.

The Jackets don't have a game scheduled this week. They begin preparing for their first District 10-4A this season on Friday, Sept. 25.

Smith said, "Coming out for this game, we thought we'd compete. Your three non-district games don't count. You learn from them. You expect to win, but you expect setbacks. If we were to win, we'd still have work to do."
