Heath residents question City, Fulton School on proposed water tower move

Several residents of Heath's Hillview Drive took Mayor John Ratcliffe up on his offer to express their concerns on a proposed land swap between their neighbor, the Fulton School, and the city. The land in question will likely be the future site of a water tower.

The city currently owns property on the Fulton School grounds where a water storage tank is located.

According to city manager Ed Thatcher, for the past several years, the school has been talking to city officials about options for moving the proposed water tower site away from the middle of their property.

Tuesday night, council members were asked to consider a land swap for property on the edge of the campus but right behind the back yard of resident Tina Winnett. The move would make a difference of a couple hundred yards.

According to Thatcher, the city currently uses the school's driveway to access its storage facility, which is now too small.

"For a number of years the city has known that when we grew to a certain point, we would need a water tower just behind the Fulton School," Thatcher said.

Both the school and now the residents have expressed their desire to the council that the tower "be anywhere but here."

According to several Hillview Drive residents, the residents didn't find out about the idea to put a water tower in their neighborhood until last week.

"How is it that the Fulton School has been working on having the tower moved for several years when we didn't even know about it?" Winnett said.

After hearing about the plans for a water tower, the residents brought their concerns to Thatcher, who held an information meeting for them last Thursday.

City of Fate holds tax rate steady in new budget

Winnett and several of her neighbors challenged the city council on the perception of impropriety and on their feelings of mistrust of the city. Current council member Karen Lewis also serves on the Fulton School board.

"We've been kind of stepped on and shoved aside," Hillview resident Bill Canon said. "Our homes are not like most of the other homes in Heath. Our homes are maybe \$100,000 or \$150,000 homes right in the middle of a prime location near where the city and some developers have talked about a large retail development."

The residents are concerned that the nearness of the tower would reduce the value of their property and their quality of life as traffic on their cul-de-sac would increase and the presence of the water tower would cause other disruptions to their lives.

"We're talking about a low-orbit moon as bright as it will be," resident Mark Elam said. "I would hope the city would not allow a private entity to trump the welfare, property values and quality of life of an entire street full of residents."

The Hillview residents also expressed concerns about the conduct of the Fulton School, complaining that the school has purchased several properties on their street in the last year and that those properties have been poorly cared for.

Former Fulton School board member George Hargrave also expressed that the three properties the school purchased should never have been purchased and have either recently been sold or are in the process of being sold. He also commented that the school had been talking to the city about moving the water storage facility since about 2004 or 2005.

Ratcliffe defended both the council and the school.

"The Fulton Academy may have been your very best friend," Ratcliffe said. "If not for Fulton continually coming in and proposing that the tower be put anywhere else, the tower would probably be well under way."

Ratcliffe also assured residents that council members, "take their ethical obligations seriously," citing that "in small towns you're going to find the same people and families on school boards and on city councils and other positions."

"We follow the advice of the city attorney and recuse ourselves from discussions as appropriate."

Members of the City of Fate city council had no takers among the public for comments on its proposed property tax at its Monday night public hearing.

The tax rate will remain at 21 cents, the same as last year. Average property value in the city is \$176, 252, an increase of a little more than \$500 from last year. The total taxable value of property in the city is about \$439 million.

"We're pleased to be able to hold our tax rate at .2144 due to the addition of \$42 million to our tax roll," Mikel said.

The additional value is from increased housing development, Mikel said.

The city council will hold a second public hearing on the tax rate along with a hearing on the proposed 2009-2010 budget on Tuesday.

The meeting will be held at 7 p.m. at the Fate community center, 104 South W. E. Crawford.

According to Thatcher, the city needs about a 1.5 million-gallon capacity tower, similar in size to the City of Rockwall tower near farm-to-market roads 549 and 276. The current Heath water tower has a .5 million-gallon capacity.

For now, the conversation is theoretical, Ratcliffe said. There are no drawings and no plans for building a water tower and there will be no plans drawn until the city chooses a location.

According to Thatcher, city staffers have not given the council a recommendation on the land swap.

"Right now the city is listening to what all sides are saying," Thatcher said. "We know we need a water tower. We probably need to decide by the first of the year where we're going to put it. We don't have an option not to do it."

Discussion of the purchase or sale of property is held in executive session. After about a half-hour session, the council reconvened the public meeting and took no action on the proposed land swap.

Even though the city rate will remain the same, the average resident of Heath may pay more in taxes because of property value increases, a trend Heath residents should be accustomed to after several years of growth.

Members of the Heath city council opened the floor for public comment in a hearing Tuesday night on the proposed tax rate of about 34 cents per \$100 of property valuation. According to city manager Ed Thatcher, the rate has remained steady for the past 18 years.

The city had grown accustomed to sharp increases in property values each year over the past several years, with two consecutive years of 15 percent increases three years ago and a 6 percent increase last year. This year's property value increase was only 1.5 percent, which Thatcher attributed to several properties the city annexed last December.

"It was a tough year for many cities with building stops and interest rates dropping," Thatcher said. "It gets harder every year, but we're happy to be able to keep the tax rate the same this year."

In Heath, the average taxable value of a residence has risen by about \$5,500 from \$378,747 last year to \$384,294 this year. The increase in value will bring an average \$19 increase to the tax bills of residents.

No residents brought comments on the proposed tax rate. The council is expected to vote on the rate and hold a public hearing on the proposed 2009-2010 city budget on Sept. 15.



The week of Sept. 17-23 has been proclaimed Constitution Week by Bill Cecil, mayor of the City of Rockwall.

Sept. 17 begins the national celebration of the observance. The tradition of celebrating the U.S. Constitution began many years ago thanks to the Daughters of the American Revolution. In 1955, the group petitioned Congress to set aside the week annually to be dedicated for the observance of Constitution Week. The resolution was eventually adopted and signed into law on Aug. 2, 1956, by President Dwight D. Eisenhower.

The focus of the observance is to emphasize citizens' responsibilities for protecting and defending the Constitution, preserving it for posterity; inform the people that the document is the basis of the nation's heritage and foundation for its way of life; and encourage the study of historical events leading to the framing of the Constitution in September 1787.

"Constitution Week is the perfect opportunity to read and study this great document, which is the safeguard of our American liberties," said DAR president Linda Gist Calvin. "We encourage all citizens across the country to take time this week to reflect on our heritage of freedom."

DAR has served the nation for 119 years. In 1928, the group began work on a building as a memorial to the Constitution. John Russell Pope, architect of the Jefferson Memorial, was commissioned to design the performing arts center, known as DAR Constitution Hall. Today, DAR Constitution Hall is the only structure erected in tribute to the Constitution of the United States of America.

Alec would often get overwhelmed and stressed by the pressure of competition, and his disorder would manifest itself in anger or tears.

> "The worst thing was other parents not understanding why my child was not participating like the other kids," Michelle said.

> Kevin and Michelle initially heard about the Angel League through Alec's teacher in the Rockwall PPCD. Another parent in the PPCD were also involved in the Angel League and strongly recommended it. The Lawsons were hooked after the first practice.

"It was such a relief, not having to worry about making certain [Alec's] doing the right thing at the right time ... There's no competition at all involved, which is exactly what he needed," Kevin said. "[Angel League] gave us the chance for our kid to have fun, for us to celebrate how our kid really is."

On God's Word

A tribute to Mary the Magdalene

The night after God raised Jesus from the dead must have been intense for Mary of Magdala and the other Mary. According to Matthew's account, they came to see the sepulchre during the time of sunset on the weekly sabbath as the first day of the week drew near (Matthew 28:1). They arrived in time to experience an earthquake, witness an angel descend from heaven, roll the stone from the opening of the grave and sit down on the stone. While on their way to the disciples, the women were confronted by our Lord Jesus for the first time after his resurrection.

John shared the story of how Mary the Magdalene returned to the sepulchre early that morning while it was still dark. She noticed that the stone was moved away and immediately dashed over to the disciples as she did the evening before. By this time Mary was convinced that somebody stole Jesus' body. Just the night before, she left the sepulcher with reverence and great joy. She embraced the feet of our Lord Jesus and even talked with him. We don't know exactly why she changed, but it is possible the disciples' unbelief influenced her through the night. Yet with a this, she still returned to the grave by herself (John 20:1-18).

What a sweet and believing heart she must have had. Yes...she was probably influenced to think that Jesus' body was stolen. But she still returned alone to the grave early in the morning. I could be wrong about this, but there is only one record in the Gospels of women traveling alone during the night hours. Also, God did not leave her confused. He gave her an opportunity to talk with Jesus again.

Later in the morning at sunrise, the same Mary returned to the sepulchre with the other women in order to prepare Jesus' body. The records of this event are in the Gospels of Mark and Luke. They may have been unsatisfied with the preparation work done by Joseph, while watching him work on Jesus' body, and decided to return for some follow-up prep work.

They arrived to find the stone rolled away and Jesus missing from the grave. After encountering the angels, they became afraid and perplexed. Based on what we've learned about Mary's night, we can safely conclude that she was not afraid in the same way as the others. But considering all her activity through the night, and the unbelieving influences from the others, it does make sense that she could have been quite startled with the other women.

It touched my heart to see that Mary of Magdala was listed first in all four Gospels (Matthew 28:1; Mark 16:1; Luke 24:10 and John 20:1). God exalted Mary in the scriptures as being a key figure and example of believing and trust among the women, and also among all the disciples. Although she may have wavered at times, and grew weary as the night time hours advanced, she did not give up.






