The case remains open and under investigation by the police department's Criminal Investigation Division.

THE HOW AND WHY OF THE DECLARATION OF INDEPENDENCE

A five part series to explain our celebration of the Fourth of July

In this Article I have included some additional details of the hardships our forefathers endured up to the acceptance by vote of our Declaration of Independence as a follow up to article published

The start of the uprising of the people coming from the 13 British Colonies who broke-away from England, was caused by what we now know as "The Boston Tea Party".

That title was not given until a half-century later. The night of December 16, 1773, dozens of colonists boarded three ships in Boston Harbor and hurled 342 crates of tea overboard in an act of political protest of the tax break given to the East India Company by England.

King George III changed the tax to save the Tea Company from Financial ruin which would create a shortage of tea for England. Also the saving of the company took away local American British Colony business. Other "Boston Tea Party" raids were also carried out by other English Colonies.

The Mecklenburg Declaration of Independence from North Carolina was written and presented to the Continental Congress in 1775 prior to the one signed July 4th 1776. North Carolina was ready to split off from English rule, but later joined with the other 12 colonies in

approving the signing of the current Declaration of Independence.

All the people knew that everyone would be involved in war with England's military which at that time was the greatest in the world. Their individual freedom was worth the cost of many lives and hardships to form a God given country for future generations.

He also was the first Governor of the commonwealth of Massachusetts (under British rule) and was still Governor (under American authority) when he died.

Patriot Samuel Adams organized the Boston's Sons of Liberty, and he played a key role from 1765 until the end of the War of Independence. He believed the Patriot opposition was a British plot to destroy constitutional liberty.

Another well-known Patriot was Benjamin Franklin and is the only founding father to have signed all four of the key documents establishing the U.S.: the Declaration of Independence (1776), the Treaty of Alliance with France (1778), the Treaty of Paris establishing

peace with Great Britain (1783); and the U.S. Constitution (17 In addition to what most people know about him, in 175






