Rockwall ISD construction creates new facilities, increased space

Two of the most anticipated construction projects about to get underway in Rockwall are the new aquatics/wellness center and renovations to Wilkerson-Sanders Stadium. The aquatics center will bring a much-needed swimming pool to the school district, and the stadium will be brought into the new century with modern conveniences and additional seating.

The double-duty aquatics/wellness center will be located near the former Utley Freshman Center, according to Sheri Fowler, Public Relations Director for RISD. The wellness center will be equipped mainly with weights and other exercise equipment. Both the pool and wellness center will be available for public use.

A complete overhaul of the home side of Wilkerson-Sanders Stadium will begin after the 2008 football season. When complete, the stadium will have a new scoreboard, two larger, updated concessions stands, expanded and renovated restrooms, a spirit shop, and a two level press box with office space. The press box will also feature a community seating area for guests or VIPs to watch events. Fowler said it is "an area designed to build community unity."

Seating at the stadium has become an issue with more fans attending events as the local population has increased. The new design includes a total of 6,800 seats on the home side, including traditional bench seating and chair seating in some areas. It has not been decided exactly how the chairs will be designated, but will include some

reserved seating and season ticket holders preferred seating.

A key feature of the stadium renovation will be the addition of locker rooms under the grandstands. Teams currently have to leave the stadium and cross the parking lot to reach the locker rooms located inside Utley. All facilities will now be located within the stadium and will have separate areas for visitors and the home team.


Renovations will not only take place on the home side of the stadium. The concession stands and restrooms on the visitor's side will also be remodeled and modernized.

Fowler said the RISD Athletics Office has temporarily moved, in preparation for the renovations, from the stadium to 1191 Townsend, on the north side of Utley across from the RISD maintenance office. The Athletics Office phone number will remain the same, 469-698-

The \$62.5 million bond program approved in February 2006, along with \$11.5 million in remaining unissued bonds from the 2001 program, will address the elementary education, technology and infrastructure needs of the district. Ten school buses have been added to the district's fleet since 2006, with nine more expected in August purchased through this bond. Two new elementary schools, Celia Hays and Sharon Shannon, opened their doors in the fall of 2007.

Technology improvements, including new audio-visual equipment


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



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indicated they would contract with Rockwall County if the beds were available. Eavenson said, "We are well-placed in the Metroplex. When we have more beds, they want to contract with us."

Last year, the county commissioners purchased the 3.2-acre tract of land adjacent to the current justice center, at the corner of Townsend Drive and Boydstun Street with an eye on future expansion. Any addition is expected to be a stand-alone building, attached to the current facility by a walkway. Eavenson said a stand-alone structure would cost less to build than an addition to the existing building. He said it would also be a cost saving measure to have the building built next door instead of elsewhere in the county, so officials don't have to run a second facility.

Under this proposal, the jail expansion would be funded by a group of investors, rather than the usual bonds or certificates of obligation that are paid back by taxpayers. The F.C. Cuny Corp. of Heath would arrange the financing. The sheriff said, "The County won't spend a dime" with this particular financing package. The existing justice center was built with certificates of obligation.

Eavenson said he and his administrators conducted an informal study to compare six months of operating expenses with contract inmates, and six months without contract inmates. He said the cost difference showed a projected net income from contract beds that could easily provide an approximate 50% return, 50% being a "conservative" estimate." The cost of new personnel to staff the addition was figured into the profit. "The bottom line is, if we can break even and pay for the facility and the tax payers don't have to, that's an incredible benefit," Eavenson said. "It is a profitable venture and is good for the county."

The current jail, built in the late 1980s, has 241 beds, 221 of which are for general jail population. The other 20 are designated as special use beds, such as detox beds or cells for violent offenders. The jail is considered at capacity with 200 occupied beds.

Rockwall County has an agreement with Limestone County to hold any overflow inmates, usually about 15 to 20, when its jail reaches capacity. Between July 18 and 27, 2008, Rockwall County spent \$29,444 to house inmates in Limestone County. That amount includes housing, medical costs, and other expenses required to house

The increase in jail population can also be attributed to the hiring of two full time warrant officers to serve the more than 1,000 outstanding warrants in the county. Before the officers were hired, no one on the sheriff's staff was assigned to serve warrants. Eavenson said offenders were usually found if they were detained for other offenses and it was discovered they had an outstanding warrant. The sheriff said the need for more beds wouldn't go away. "As the population grows, the need for beds will grow."

Publisher's Note: Last week we incorrectly published a Rockwall County budget and tax rate information advertisement and express our sincere pology to the County Treasurer and Rockwall County officials for the error. The advertisement was a copy of the 2007 document and was only sent to us as an example. We regret any inconvenience or misunderstandings this error may have caused our readers or county officials.

Eavenson took office as the Rockwall County Sheriff in 2001. The jail had been empty for a year when administrators conducted a seven-month evaluation to determine if it was secure. The jail reopened on August 1, 2001 with an average daily population of 100-110 in-

The razor wire fence surrounding the property was added in 2003. Eavenson said the fence was required for several reasons: 1. Basic security. There are four solid metal doors on the justice center and if any one fails, the fence can keep an inmate contained until they are caught. 2. Contraband has been found on the property that someone had tried to get into the building. The fence helps keep certain elements out, and inmates in. 3. If there was a need for a temporary jail evacuation, inmates could be contained for a short time until they could be moved somewhere safe.

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

Coble said his team was able to call on their former school theater departments and other contacts for equipment. They borrowed tripods, lighting equipment, boom mikes and all that they needed to complete their film. "You call who you know for what you need and we got lucky," he said.

Each member of the team was able to do each job during filming. Coble said they rotated jobs so everyone could have hands-on experience at each task. "It was good because if you don't know what you want to do, you got a taste of everything in filmmaking that week."

More than 60 people showed up to audition for the four roles in the film. He said they advertised for actors with local talent agencies and on the Internet. The film crew, although based in Dallas, was made up of students from around the country, including Florida, Oklahoma, and three from Houston. Coble, age 20, is a junior radio-television-film major at the University of North

Texas in Denton.

On-line voting took place from July 31 to August 6. The winning film from each of the three categories will face off in another on-line vote to determine an overall contest winner. Voting will take place August 21-27 at www.fresh-films.com. The overall winning team will receive Mac laptop computers, Samsung phones and a trip to Los Angeles, where their film will be shown at the AFI Festival in Hollywood.

Coble is no stranger to making award-winning films. He participated in and won a 48hour film contest at the Dark Horse Film Fest in Denton. Filmmakers had just two days to come up with a theme, script,

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
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

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
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On God's Word

Believing Unto Righteousness...Romans 4:1-25

God made it so wonderfully easy for anyone to be made righteous in His eyes. He loved us so much that He called His first-born son to give his life as the perfect and final sacrifice for all of mankind. And now, all people who believe with their hearts that God raised Jesus Christ from the dead absolutely shall be cleansed by the blood of the Lamb (see also Romans 10:9-10).

Let's shine more light on believing and righteousness. God gave more details about believing with the heart unto righteousness in Romans 4:1-25.

"For what says the scripture how Abraham believed and it was counted unto him for righteousness" (Romans 4:3). The context of this chapter is about obtaining the promise by believing versus by works. Abraham was not under the law of God. He believed God for the birth of His son Isaac. His believing was accounted unto him for righteousness.

"For the promise that he should be heir of the world was not to Abraham, or to his seed, by the law, but through the righteousness of faith" (4:13). The promise from God was not by the law. It had nothing to do with any commandments. That was because God had not laid down His commandments yet. It had everything to do with Abraham believing God's promise.

"And being not weak in faith, he considered not his own body now dead, when he was about an hundred years old, neither yet the deadness of Sarah's womb. He staggered not at the promise of God through unbelief, but was strong in faith giving glory to God" (4:19-20). He was not weak in believing and did not consider the circumstances around him. He did not stagger at God's promise by not believing. Instead, he stood solid in believing, giving God the glory.

"And being fully persuaded that what God had promised He was able also to perform. And therefore it was imputed unto him for righteousness" (4:21-22). Abraham was fully persuaded, and had no doubt that God was able to perform what He promised. His believing was imputed unto him for righteousness. God then finished with the following good news, "Now it was not written for his sake alone, that it was imputed to him. But for us also, to whom it shall be imputed if we believe on Him that raised up Jesus from the dead" (4:23-24). God could not have put it any more clearly.

It is imputed unto anyone for righteousness when they believe with their hearts that God raised Jesus Christ from the dead. According to Romans 10:9-10, with the heart we believe that God raised Jesus from the dead, unto righteousness.

The first record of people being made righteous can be found in Acts 2:4 when they were filled with holy spirit. What was available then is still available now. That is because God's word does not change.

What a fantastic message for all people! It is for righteousness when they believe with their Jesus from the dead. It is righteousness in the God's holy spirit.

A nation of thieves

another. Browning explains that certain kinds of equality have been a cherished value in America. Equality under the law and, within reason, equality of opportunity is consistent with a free society. Equality of results is an anathema to a free society and within it lie the seeds of tyranny.

Browning entertains a discussion about when inequalities are just or unjust. For example, college graduates earn income higher than high-school dropouts. Some people prefer to work many hours and earn more than others who prefer to work fewer. Students who spend 25 or more hours a week on classroom preparation earn higher grades than students who spend five hours.

Most would agree that these inequalities are just. There are other sources of inequalities that are unjust, such as: when incomes result from fraud, corruption, stealing, exploitation, oppression and the like. Such sources of inequality play an insignificant role in producing income inequality in America. Most economists agree that income is closely related to productivity.

Much of the justification for the welfare state is to reduce income inequality by making income transfers to the poor. Browning provides some statistics that might help us to evaluate the sincerity and truthfulness of this claim. In 2005, total federal, state and local government expenditures on 85 welfare programs were \$620 billion.

That's larger than national defense (\$495 billion) or public education (\$472 billion). The 2005 official poverty count was 37 million persons. That means welfare expenditures per poor person were \$16,750, or \$67,000 for a poor family of four.

Those figures understate poverty expenditures because poor people are recipients of non-welfare programs such as Social Security, Medicare, private charity and uncompensated medical care. The question that naturally arises is if we're spending enough to lift everyone out of poverty, why is there still poverty? The obvious answer is poor people are not receiving all the money being spent in their name. Non-poor people are getting the bulk of it.

Browning's concluding chapter tells us what the welfare state costs us. He acknowledges the non-economic costs such as infringements on liberty and strains on the political process, but focuses on the quantitative economic costs. The disincentive effects of Social Security have reduced the GDP by 10 percent, the federal income tax (as opposed to a proportional tax) by 9 percent and past deficits by 3.5 percent for a total of 22.5 percent.

He guesses that welfare programs have reduced GDP by 2.5 percent. The overall effect of redistributionist policies has created incentives that have reduced GDP by a total of 25 percent. Without those, our GDP would be close to \$18 trillion instead of \$14 trillion.

So what's Browning's solution? First, he reminds us of the biblical admonition "Thou shalt not steal." Government income redistribution programs produce the same result as theft. In fact, that's what a thief does; he redistributes income.

The difference between government and thievery is mostly a matter of legality. Browning's solution is captured in the title of his last chapter, "Just Say No," where he proposes, "The federal government shall not adopt any policies that transfer income (resources) from some Americans to other Americans." He agrees with James Madison, the father of our Constitution, who said, "I cannot undertake to lay my finger on that article of the Constitution which granted a right to Congress of expending, on objects of benevolence, the money of their constituents."

Approved in January by the RISD school board, the stand-alone addition just beyond the leftfield fence of the baseball field was designed by SHW Group and is being built at a cost of \$5.9 million by Pogue Construction as part of Phase II of Rockwall Heath's multiple additions.


