

"We've budgeted \$6 million for the new city hall, but at what time will we be secure in that amount? It could be more. Maybe \$7 million," Councilman Joe Burger said, directing his comments to Kovacs.

"If we can get the land soon and the infrastructure done soon, I think we'll be OK as to the \$6 million," Kovacs said. "The architects and contractors are working together. We could build all but one wing of the city hall, then come back later at another time and ad on the other wing. We need to at least get started and show the citizens where their money

Burger asked Kovacs how much Fate is already in debt for the city hall. Burger said he wanted to know how much they would lose if they

"If Fate withdraws from building the city hall today, we owe half a million dollars in architecture and attorney's fees," Kovacs said.

Michael Drayovitch Jr., a citizen in the audience, after hearing several comments about Fate's city attorney, said, "The city doesn't have an attorney. They have a law firm."

Drayovitch questioned how much per hour the attorneys made while working for Fate, at which time Brenda McDonald, one of the city's attorneys, spoke up to clarify Drayovitch's point.

"Fate pays their attorneys \$140 an hour, much less that other attorneys in such positions make," she said.

McDonald's statement seemed to satisfy Drayovitch's concern.

During the Citizen Comments portion of the Fate City Council Barbara Beckham meeting, addressed the council. She asked if it were possible to pass some type of resolution or ordinance stating that as Fate's citizens reached the age of 65, their taxes would be frozen. She noted that many towns have this measure in place, and it would good if the council consider approving this ordinance for the

citizens of Fate. "We are looking at that to a find out all the ins and outs and will contact the citizens as to the decision when it is made," Mayor

Loren Megyesi said. Under action items, Resolution No R-803 passed unanimously, 7-0, approving a FDC project to build a restroom at the Robert Smith Family Park at a cost of \$70,000, according to the city

Also Resolution No R-807 was passed, appointing John Stacy, former Fate council member, as a member of the Fate Development Corporation. Stacy also serves on the Charter Review Committee and the Planning and Zoning Commission. He filled the vacancy left by Brooks Williams.

"After the Executive Session, the council voted unanimously to pass the resolution for the Boys and Girls Club," Kovacs said.

The Economic Development Incentive Agreement between the Fate Development Corporation and the Boys and Girls Club of Rockwall states that the agreement is to "develop a sports and entertainment complex."

Born Dec. 7, 1935, in Oklahoma City, Okla., to William and Olga Elizabeth (Swanda) Svejkovsky, he was the middle of three boys and grew up on the family farm in Oklahoma City where he helped



work the farmland. As a boy, he loved to hunt and fish and was active in 4-H, once entering his calf in the American Royal. He loved to bird hunt, which he enjoyed doing with close friends and relatives. He traveled to Argentina twice with his son, Blake, and nephew, David, for dove hunting. His ingenuity and engineering capabilities found him most often in his machine shop at home, designing and making parts for things on his lathes and milling machine. He loved sharing his knowledge and shop equipment with family, friends and neighbors.

He graduated from Yukon High School in 1953 and graduated from Oklahoma University in 1958, earning a degree in mechanical engineering. He obtained a master's degree from OU in 1968. Upon graduation from Senior ROTC at OU as a 2nd lieutenant, he was assigned to the 4982 USAR Control Group (Reinf) Oklahoma in June 1958. He received his basic training in the U.S. Army Ordnance School, Aberdeen Proving Ground, Md., as a 2nd lieutenant.

He worked at Tinker AFB, Midwest City, Okla., as a mechanical engineer where he met his wife-to-be, Karen Sue Fitzgerald. They married Oct. 21, 1961, when his reserve unit was called to active duty to Fort Chaffee, Ark., during the Berlin Crisis. There he rose in rank to 1st lieutenant. The couple began their life together in nearby Lavaca, Ark. Upon discharge from active duty, he returned to his work at Tinker AFB and the couple lived on the family farm in Oklahoma City. He remained in the Army Reserve and rose in rank to captain.

In 1964, he and his family moved to Clear Lake City where he began his career with NASA. The family moved to Friendswood in 1977. He retired from NASA in 1983 and was hired by Lockheed, contractor to NASA, and was with them for 10 years before his final retirement in 1994. The couple purchased a farm in Leon County in 1971 and retired there in 1994. They moved to Rockwall in 2006 to be closer to their children and four grandchildren.

He was an engineer who held 28 patents. Among these are a drive mechanism for a linear motion conveyor and others relating to that. He was an inventor on the DeBakey/NASA heart pump (Rotary Blood Pump Ventricular Assist Device) patent, which was awarded Commercial Invention of the Year in 2002; related to that he was inducted into the Space Technology Hall of Fame. In 1990, he was awarded Lockheed's highest engineering award, the Robert E. Gross Award for Technical Excellence/Scientist of the Year, for his accomplishments in designing, developing and testing the innovative and practical mechanical systems both for space flight applications and for medical research.

Survivors include his wife, Sue; his son, Paul Blake, and his wife, Lisa, and their daughter, Morgan; his daughter, Karen, and her husband, Bruce, her daughter, Katie, son, Grant, and their youngest son, Reid; his nephews, David Svejkovsky, Scott Fitzgerald and Billy Fitzgerald; his nieces, Janet Dorrell, Kathy Phillips, Kathy Taylor and Janet Pastarello; and many great-nieces and great-nephews.

# A Problem Bigger than Ferguson

by Ben Carson

The international spotlight has recently been shining on Ferguson, Mo., after an 18-year-old black man was fatally shot by a white police officer. There was massive national and international media coverage, much of it engendered by the tantalizing thought that here was a clearcut case of racism leading to police brutality and indicative of the evil inherent in American society. Violent demonstrations and riots ensued, with massive property damage and many outside agitators descending onthetown, supposedly to guarantee justice as defined by mobmentality.

Perhaps it would be useful to examine the tragedy with the facts on the table rather than through the lenses of hypersensitized emotions stimulated by those attempting to exploit the situation.

Michael Brown was 6-foot-4 and 290 pounds. He had marijuana in his system and was purportedly involved in a strong-arm robbery prior to the shooting. He and a companion were walking in the middle of the street and obstructing traffic and therefore were admonished by a police officer to move to the sidewalk. Brown, who may have been pharmacologically impaired, became

belligerent, and the ensuing struggle produced facial trauma and an orbital fracture of the police officer's face. The officer, who may have been dazed by a blow to the cranium severe enough to produce a fracture, attempted to apprehend the assailant, and shots were fired, six of which struck the suspect, resulting in a fatality.

Regardless of one's position on the political spectrum, we can all agree that this was a horrible tragedy and needless discarding of a precious life. How could this have been avoided? Two obvious answers: The officer could have ignored his duty and backed off when it became apparent that his instructions would not be followed, thereby avoiding a confrontation, or Brown could have complied with the officer's instructions, according to his civic duties.

If police officers generally adopted the first solution, chaos would reign supreme in all of our streets. If the populace generally adopted the second solution, there would be even fewer incidents of police violence. Last year, 100 black males were killed by police in the United States. In the same year, 5,000 blacks were killed by other blacks, the vast majority being males. Could it be that we are erroneously

being manipulated into making this incident a racial issue, when, in fact, it is a component of a much larger social issue?

Why are there so many young black men in the streets of America with defiant attitudes that frequently lead to incarceration or death?



Reciever Jake Fisher, who gained 325 yards on 23 receptions last year, will be a go-to for Hoy. Also returning to the Hawk offense is Texas A&M commit Trevor Elbert, and running back Rico Henderson, who rushed for 531 yards last year. Other major contributors on the offense include lineman J.J. Nwigwe and receivers Grant Buckholt, Dean Cline, Mark Bielski, and Davonte Richardson.

Safety DeShon Elliott, a Texas Longhorn commit, David Richardson, Wyatt Leath, Lawrence Johnson and Omar Shalabi will lead the defense.

Heath opened summer practices on Monday, August 11 at 6:30 a.m., and hosted a scrimmage with Naaman Forest last Friday at the RHHS Turf Field.

"It's hard to tell with just 24 plays," Moss said following Friday's scrimmage. "We saw several positives from the offense, especially from the first string, which the fans will be seeing most often. Jordan (Hoy) looked good, and Rico (Henderson) had several big carries. We do, however, have several things to work on with the defense."

The Hawks will kick off their regular season at home on August 29 against Sulphur Springs, 7:30 at Wilkerson-Sanders Stadium.



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
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
