Council members asked if the HOA or a majority of residents were on board with the request. Hummingbird said HOA members are definitely behind the request. He explained the discussion to lower the speed limit was brought up by residents to the HOA two years ago, but staffing changes within the HOA over that time caused the issue to become lost in the shuffle.

Without a stable representative to advocate for residents with the city, Hummingbird said he and other residents are taking matters in their own hands to make the request.

The council voted 7-0 to draft an ordinance making the speed change. It will follow the usual path through the council for adoption.

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

Fire Station Updates

The council heard its monthly construction update on the two new city fire stations from Roger Hamm of Speed Fab Crete. Hamm said that although crews are approximately four weeks behind schedule, two weeks of which were due to bad weather, adjustments have been made to the schedule and the end date has not been changed.

Completed work at both sites includes the installation of grade beams which will hold the floor, electrical primary and secondary conduits and irrigation sleeves.

Work completed at fire station #3 includes the removal of the construction entrance, setting the blue top in preparation for a concrete pour, the installation of conduit to the power pole and the start of wall panel erection.

Hamm said crews have hauled in more fill to even out low spots at fire station #4 and are currently blue topping the site.

Projected work at both sites will see the installation of phone lines, finish grading, the completion of wall panel installation at #3 with #4 following in approximately two weeks, and the first steel roof beams. Hamm said the steel has been delivered to his yard in Fort Worth and "is ready when we are."

Hamm said his crews had a small surprise at fire station #3 when they hit a phone line while doing dirt work for the approach to the site. The line was only buried about a foot in the ground, making it easily dug up during construction.

He said AT&T responded and dug the line an additional two feet into the ground and construction was able to continue without further concerns. 17-171-178 Has non

In other business, the council unanimously voted to approve alterations to the city's contract with Chandler's Landing Marina to allow the sale of alcohol.

Joel Weiner of the Marina said the original contract forbid the sale of alcohol because, at the time it was drafted, Rockwall County was dry. Now that the sale of beer and wine are allowed, Weiner said, it was time to update the contract.

The city must still draft an ordinance outlining the contract changes and Weiner must also make an application to the Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission for a liquor license before he can stock his

Youth Volunteer Program

The council spent an hour discussing the pros and cons of allowing adolescents as young as 10 years old to volunteer at the Rockwall Animal Services and Adoption Center when accompanied by a parent.

Rockwall veterinarian Dr. Michael Sealock presented the dangers and possible health risks of working with animals with an unknown history.

After considerable discussion on both sides of the issue, the council voted to continue working with staff to further investigate the parameters of the program and work towards a compromise.

He also said the city has received a significant number of complaint s from residents near the Emerald Bay neighborhood about scooters on their walking trails. Pedestrians have reported feeling "in danger" due the scooters on the trails.

Council member Glen Farris suggested Austin give his presentation to the Rockwall Youth Advisory Council, which is a group of youth that works in a similar fashion as the city council. Farris works with the group and he said, "It would be an appropriate area for the YAC to look at this. It's good for you and good for them."

Austin's mother, Kathleen Cory, said the idea to bring the issue before the city council stemmed from an assignment in Jan Shewmaker's SAGE class at Nebbie Williams Elementary School.

Council members all agreed the issue warrants further investigation and will continue studying any possible changes.

Mayor Bill Cecil said, "I do want to congratulate this young man. You came to us tonight with information we didn't have, you covered everything that needed to be covered. You had your subject and you had it nailed. You presented all the relevant facts and you did it in a very respectful and professional manner. Great job and we will continue to review this."


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

The free sports competition will involve testing youths in a variety of skills, including basketball (scoring as many points as possible by making baskets from designated shooting areas); soccer (dribbling and shooting accurately in the fastest time possible); tennis (serving a low-compression ball and continuing to hit the ball against a wall and above the net as many times as possible in a 30-second time period); and track and field (performing two fundamental events – a 50-meter sprint and a standing long jump).







The TV ratings for February have been tabulated, and in the world of cable news there is weeping on the left. Fox News Channel, which is generally tougher on the president, hammered the two networks that most favor President Obama — CNN and MSNBC. In fact, Fox News was the third-highest rated prime-time cable network in America, behind USA and TNT. CNN was 15th; MSNBC, a dismal 23rd.

Also, unique visitors to the Obama-loving website Daily Kos have declined a whopping 73 percent since last fall — a disaster. What's going on?

It all has to do with fear. While Obama retains a high approval rating, many Americans are flat-out scared about the economy. The recession is bringing massive pain to America, and responsible citizens want the truth about public policy, not partisan cheerleading.

Thus, many news consumers do not trust news operations and websites that have a vested interest in seeing Obama succeed in the White House. One look at NBC News, for example, and you know the company line is to help Obama, not report the unvarnished truth.

Spinning the economy does not help people whose jobs may be in jeopardy. They need solid information about what is actually happening in order to make difficult decisions on personal spending and, perhaps, seeking new employment in a more secure industry. Self-protection dictates they secure the most reliable sources of information available.

On the other side, Obama bashing doesn't do the folks much good, either. Why waste time on attacks when information is what the folks need? I think it's fair to say that this brutal economic downturn took most Americans by surprise. It certainly shocked me. Even though I'm a journalist, I had no idea that mortgage companies were gaming the system by bundling risky loans and selling them to dunces at Lehman Brothers. I was clueless. In hindsight, I should have been more skeptical of the housing bubble.


The point is that concentrating on ideology instead of accumulating information can lead to a distorted view of reality. Many among the media these days are in business to promote a political philosophy rather than to protect the folks by exposing dangerous situations. Ideology has corrupted the watchdog press that our Founders envisioned.

Left to fend for themselves, the folks are gravitating toward news agencies that seemingly tell it like it is. Committed left-wing newspapers are folding in Seattle, Minneapolis and, perhaps, San Francisco. The New York Times had to borrow money from a Mexican guy at 14 percent interest, and far-left TV news operations are sinking fast.

President Obama still has wide support, but not fanatical support. Most of the folks simply want the truth, even though, these days, the truth can be hard to handle.

"In 1996, the department of Housing and Urban Development gave Fannie and Freddie an explicit target: 12 percent of their mortgage financing had to go to borrowers with incomes less than 60 percent of their area's median income," reports Anna J. Schwartz at the National Bureau of Economic Research. "That number was increased to 20 percent in 2000 and 22 percent in 2005. The 2008 goal was to be 28 percent. Between 2000 and 2005, Freddie and Fannie met those goals every year.'

Everything went according to plan, in other words, except that our collective nest eggs in the market dropped by \$10 trillion over the past 17 months and the politicians are handing out trillions that they're borrowing from China or pilfering from our kids and grandchildren.

As Hayek explained, central plans go haywire with unforeseen and unintended consequences because everything isn't knowable to the central planners. In other words, they don't know what they're doing. 
