# 2009 Appraisal Notices

The Rockwall Central Appraisal District (RCAD) mailed Appraisal Value Notices on May 15, 2009. Most property throughout Rockwall County went down by 1/2 percent to 1 or 2 percent. Approximately 65% of the property in the county went down in value, approximately 25% stayed the same and approximately 10% increased in value mainly due to new construction, add-on and renovations. Approximately 15,000 appraisal notices were sent to property owners that met the required criteria: new owners, all personal property, all owners that have a agent, all property that went up more than \$1,000 (market or assessed), all owners that possibly could qualify for a homestead exemption but has not applied. Also, all residents that resided in the City of McLendon Chisholm will receive a notice because the City is looking at levying a tax rate for 2009.

If you do not receive a notice the chief appraiser encourages you to go to the district web site www.rockwallcad.com to see what your 2009 value is proposed. You can pull up your information by owner name, street address or property id number.

The appraisal district's job is to appraise all property in the County at fair market value and the assessment date is January 1st, 2009. Property owners who feel that their appraised values are higher than their property would sell for should contact the appraisal district at 841 Justin Road in Rockwall or call 972-771-2034 and discuss how the value was determined.

If, after an informal meeting with the RCAD staff, and agreement is not reached a property owner may file a written protest. The deadline to request a hearing before the Appraisal Review Board (ARB) is Monday June 15, 2009. If for some reason a property owner is unable to meet informally with a RCAD Appraiser, the Chief Appraiser recommends filing a written protest before the deadline to preserve their appeal rights.

The appraisal Review Board (ARB) is an administrative review arm of the property tax system, and the ARB is an independent board with responsibility to resolve disputes between property owners and appraisal district. The ARB is a separate entity from the appraisal office.

A property owner has the right to appeal ARB decisions through district court or binding arbitration.

If the property owners through district court files an appeal within no more than 45 days after receiving the Order Determining Protest, that is the way you file under the judicial system. But if a property owner seeks binding arbitration of an ARB order determining real property you must meet the following criteria (1) the appraised or market value, as applicable, of the property as determined by the order is \$1 million or less (2) a appeal does not involve any matter in dispute other than the determination of the appraised or market value of the property. Property owner must file this within 45 days of receiving the notice of determination from the ARB and include a \$500 deposit. If the arbitrators value decision is closer to the value the property owner claims to be correct, then \$450 of the \$500 deposit is returned to the property owner, and the Appraisal District pays the arbitrators fee. The Comptroller will retain \$50 to cover administrative costs.

Most protest and ARB actions concern market value. The Tax Code defines market value is the price at which a property would transfer for cash or its equivalent under prevailing market conditions if:

(a) exposed for sale in the open market with a reasonable time for the seller to find a

(b) both the seller and purchaser know of all the uses and purposes to which the property is adapted and for which it is capable of being used and of the enforceable

restriction on its use. (c) both the seller and purchaser seek to maximize their gains and neither is in a position to take advantage of the other.

If you ask yourself should I protest consider these facts: (1) Is the proposed value of your property too high? (Fair Market Value).

(2) Is your property valued unequally compared with other property in the area?

after Bailey Frierson sacrificed her to third base.

"When you get a double to lead off an inning, that kind of breaks your momentum," Acosta said.

The momentum never went back to Rockwall after the Lady Pirates seized it with their big third inning.

Spieker led off with a single and Brown walked Jordan Hartsell. Poteet's next four batters all hit the ball on the ground,

but the Lady Jackets got just two outs on those grounders.

First, Baker's bunt eluded third baseman Ashton Atwell to load the bases. Carly Taylor then hit a grounder back to the mound, but it went off Brown's glove for a game-tying hit.

The next two batters forced runners at home, but a wild pitch and MacKenzie Middlebrook's single pushed the score to 4-2. Middlebrook went to second base on the throw home, and

scored on Jessi Black's two-run single.

During the inning, Acosta removed freshman Atwell and Brown, who finished her senior season with a 14-7 record that included three playoff wins.

Atwell had committed the error that led to Poteet's runs Friday night.

"Errors are going to happen, especially for infielders who have so many opportunities to be part of the game," Acosta said. "We have tons of confidence in Ashton. I wish she could see the potential we see in her. I think she'll do that. I know she'll mature."

Laycee Holcomb restored order, getting the final out in the third inning and retiring the first seven batters she faced. Meanwhile, the Lady Jackets had a chance to get back in the game against Poteet's 25-game winner, Bradie Baker. They loaded the bases with two out in the fourth inning, but Baker retired Shelby Frierson on a ground

Harmon led off the fifth with a single. That was Rockwall's 25th – and last – hit in the three games against Baker. With the big lead, she mixed pitches to keep RHS batters off balance and put out the last nine of them. The Lady Pirates broke through against Holcomb in the sixth for their final three runs, one of which was unearned.

Poteet will move on to play District 15-4A rival Forney (35-6) in the regional final despite losing the first game of the series against Rockwall. In that game,

Brown held the Lady Pirates to five hits. The Lady Jackets' 10 hits included Shelby Frierson's double and three singles, and Lemons drove in two runs.

On Friday, Holcomb (13-6) took a tough loss. RHS out-hit Poteet 8-7, but Baker left eight Lady Jackets stranded, including the bases loaded in the third inning. Farfan's double was Rockwall's only extra-base



# Hawks face Texarkana following two-game sweep of Highland Pal

Baune shuts down Dragons 17-10, 5-1

If you want to know anything about the Rockwall-Heath baseball team's offense, a five-pitch sequence against Highland Park ace Crayton Bare (9-4) May 22 will tell you all you need to know about the surging Hawks.

After Drew VerHagen launched his second 400-foot plus homerun in as many nights to tie the score 1-1 in the bottom of the second inning, John Branum ripped the next pitch into the right center gap for a double.

Three pitches later, Drew Baxter hammered a 2-0 fastball well over the wall and the trees above it in right field for a two-run homer to give Heath a sudden and all but insurmountable 3-1 advantage.

If you want to know anything about the grit of the Hawks' ace James Baune (8-2), just look at the string of six zeros on the scoreboard after he allowed the Scots to score that run in the top of the first.

And if you want to know anything about Heath's defense, count up the errors they have made in six playoff games: one. One.

Add it together and you have a team on an incredible roll, including a 17-10 and 5-1 sweep of their best-of-three series with Highland Park in the 4A Region II quarterfinals May 21-22 at Scotland Yard.

Winners of 19 of their last 20 games, the Hawks (27-8) will now face Texas High School (25-6) in another best-of-three series next weekend in the semifinals with only eight teams remaining in the quest for a 4A state championship. Texarkana swept 15-4A champion Mesquite Poteet (24-6) to earn their date with the Hawks..

The Scots, meanwhile, ended their season 23-14.

"We're just doing what we've been doing," said Heath coach Greg Harvey.

What the Hawks have been doing is winning, including a schoolrecord 16-game winning streak that began on March 24 - when the Hawks were a so-so 7-7 - with a 10-0 win over Royse City and finally ended with a 1-0 loss to Frisco Centennial May 15.

That loss was made moot, though, as it was sandwiched between 15-0 and 11-1 thrashings of the Titans in the Bi-District round.

The Hawks also thrashed the Scots in the series opener, pounding out 13 hits while taking advantage of a mind-boggling seven Highland Park errors.

"We've got guys that are just hitting the ball really well," Harvey said. "They are seeing the ball really well and striking the ball really well. We've got some guys who are just one fire."

And no one is probably more on fire than VerHagen. The 6-4 senior has left the yard three games in a row, with each one seemingly traveling higher and further than the one that preceded it.

VerHagen finished the Highland Park series 2-for-6 with five RBI.

As a team, the Hawks' power numbers are way up compared to the regular season. After hitting just a dozen homers in the first 29 games of the year, Heath has launched eight dingers in their six playoff games, including seven by the Drews: VerHagen (3), Benefield (3) and Baxter (1).

And no one is more focused on the mound than Baune, who took the loss in the Hawks streak-ending defeat, despite a great individual

In fact, for Harvey, one word covered it all to describe the 6-1 junior's performance in the series clincher against Highland Park.

"Masterful," said Harvey. "That game was James Baune at his best. He took charge of that game from the first pitch to the last. He made a couple of mistakes, but not enough to hurt us."

Baune finished with a six-hitter, struck out three and walked one and hit one while throwing just 91 pitches.

Bare, meanwhile, held the Hawks to just five hits while striking out three and walking three and also hit a batter.

Those pitching numbers were in sharp contrast to the slugfest the

opener turned out be. Heath's starter, Benefield, struggled to locate his pitches and fell

Hernandez, who went 2-for-5 with two RBI at the plate, then closed out the game by striking out two of the three Highland Park hitters he faced in the bottom of the seventh to get the save and make a winner out of the undefeated Benefield (4-0).


The win gave the Hawks a rare season sweep against the Scots. "It's great to beat them four times in one year," said Harvey. "I
