Sheriff Harold Eavenson brought a statistics-heavy presentation on the Rockwall County Jail's activities, indicating the strain on staff supported by staffing that is already over-extended according to state requirements.

"We process 8,000 inmates per year," Eavenson said, adding that "the optimum number [of corrections officers] is 73, and we are now doing it with 60."

With regard to patrol units, he reported that the department is "slightly below accepted standards for our size population."

Other departments reported similar circumstances, emphasizing that any further reductions would certainly result in reduced services and, in some



cases, failure to meet regulatory standards.

The court agreed the goal was "to minimize impact on services provided to community as little as possible." Meetings and workshops were scheduled to continue through the week, with some departments bringing back more information to assist in the decision-making process.

On another fiscal-related item, the court received a briefing on Rockwall County's annual financial audit report from Pattillo, Brown & Hill L.L.P., CPAs. Presenter John Manning reported a positive outcome of the audit, including complementary comments on the county staff involved.

"All in all, it went very well," said Manning, who said the audit concluded that the county "did not have any material weaknesses."

The court directed that the audit report, in its entirety, be made available for public review on its website as soon as possible.

In other matters, the court approved a number of actions already addressed in previous workshops. One action involved an order to authorize repairs to the Law Enforcement Facility's firing range with funds that would be available through the current fiscal year's contingency funds. This motion also authorized refinancing the bonds to reduce the interest rate.

The court also moved to approve support of the City of Terrell in its efforts to secure grant funding to repair a dam, to replace the roof at the county jail with insurance funds already in-hand, and to authorize funds for elevator inspections required by the state at county facilities.

An interlocal agreement with the City of McLendon-Chisholm was approved that allows for continued regulation by the county of subdivisions. The agreement will be renewed on an annual basis, establishing a unified set of regulations that the county will continue to enforce. The matter was scheduled to go before the McLendon-Chisholm council for approval, as well.

The Court then adjourned to convene in executive session regarding a personnel matter in which staff requested that a district attorney part-time position be converted to a full-time position. After reconvening in the regular meeting, additional discussion followed, but the motion was defeated three to two. The court noted that it was unusual to make a mid-year adjustment of this nature, and expected it to be addressed, instead, during regular budget discussions for next year.

The court discussed rising unemployment costs, incidental to a request to transfer additional funds in the amount of \$8,000 to cover the expense. The total amount thus far for 2011 exceeds \$70,000. Staff reported that yet another transfer would probably be necessary later in the year, as the trend continues.

Finally, the court received financial reports and updates, and approved the payment of regular invoices, payroll, and claims totaling about \$18,000, unpaid claims more than \$325,000.

The court emphasized that all documents related to the budget preparation would be made available online, in the interest of openness and transparency.

Rockwall EMS wrapped up the week's festivities with its annual barbecue, where employees shared their tables with their families, community leaders and volunteers. Attendees included some of the 120plus local police, fire and sheriff's department volunteers who serve the community side-by-side the Rockwall EMS. Members of the First Responders Organization, as well as top city and county officials, attended as well.



The highlight of the event was the naming of Rockwall EMS Paramedic of the Year Jason Piecek. The honor is bestowed by a peer election to distinguish one paramedic for exceptional service.

The dinner also served as an occasion to recognize citizens for lifesaving efforts. This year, the spotlight was on a group of participating bikers in the Heart of Heath event that saved a man's life by performing CPR when they realized he was having a heart attack. Citizens honored were Greg Mead, Erik Kosar, Brian CdeBaca, Greg Gunderson, Billy Self and Scott English.

Founded in 1996, Rockwall EMS has been answering 911 and EMS calls for service county-wide since 1997. They serve alongside the firefighters and police officers in five different cities whose emergency services are also supplemented by a total of more than 120 volunteers.

"We like to recognize all the police and volunteer fire departments, all the people that are first responders," said paramedic supervisor Mitch Ownby, explaining how the event has grown from the point of just intending to recognize the Paramedics alone. "Working together like that on 24 hour shifts — it's like your second family."

Robbery, kidnapping accusation recanted in Royse City event

Attempts to contact Royse City Police Chief Carl Alsabrook Monday proved unsuccessful, but in a voicemail left in response to a Rockwall County News reporter's inquiries, Alsabrook indicated that no such crimes occurred.

"The incident never occurred and there are no charges pending for a false report at this time," the police chief said in his message. "There is no story."

A RCN attempt to review the police report on the incident, at least a portion of which should be available for public scrutiny under Texas open records laws, also were unsuccessful. The newspaper was refused access to the report.

Amy Parks students deliver patriotic showcase

Greeted by a flag-lined drive and a vintage Army Jeep, guests for the Amy Parks Elementary School 12th Annual USO Dinner Dance Show at Cain Middle School on May 12-13 knew they were in for something special.

Once inside the building, helpful students dressed in red polo shirts and blue aprons escorted visitors to their tables. The cafeteria was transformed into a classic USO canteen with stars and stripes, white bunting, streamers and flags. The tables were draped in black linens topped with candles and glittering stars.

Amy Parks' choir director, Jan Stonestreet, educates her students about a specific conflict in U.S. history and teaches them about the music of that particular moment in time. This year the concentration was on Desert Storm. Using the music of the era, Stonestreet crafts a program designed to recognize veterans of the Armed Forces with a special evening of entertainment designed especially for them.

The Starlight Singers opened the evening with the song "Be Our Guest" from the musical "Beauty and the Beast. "Once everyone was finished with their meal, patrons were urged to dance to the tunes from the era of Desert Storm. Between songs, emcee Chris Childs conducted a trivia contest about the conflict between the

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United States and Iraq.

Next, USO representative Mike Wilburn spoke to the audience about the United Service Organization and its work. He mentioned that the USO has more than 25, 000 volunteers in 11 countries and 23 states and has been in existence for 70 years. The group was developed during World War II to boost the spirits of servicemen and women. Wilburn praised Stonestreet for instilling patriotism in her students by educating them as to the sacrifices of our country's veterans. During Wilburn's presentation, choristers were backstage changing from their waiters' uniforms to their performance outfits. The curtains parted to reveal 31 young girls in shimmering red dresses and 34 boys in tuxedos. They began with the theme song from the television show "Cheers-Where Everybody Knows Your Name" and segued into "Save the Best for Last," sung by Mackenzie Iles and Asher Cannon. After the duet, Nathan Childs sang "I Cross My Heart."

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

Suffer with the suffering members...1Corinthians 12:14-27 by Tim Burnett

Last week we looked at 1Corinthians 12:14-27 and learned about the one body of Christ. In God's eyes, each individual member of the body of Christ is uniquely important. He expects all the members to show honor for each member and see every member as being beautiful. All people in the body of Christ have the full measure of holy spirit, with the capacity to manifest holy spirit in all nine ways list in 1Corinthians 12:7-10.

According to verse 25 there should be no schism in the body of Christ, and the members should have the same care for each other. When one member suffers, all the members will suffer with it. If one member is honored, then all the members will rejoice with it.

There are many examples in today's life that can be applied to the above scripture. I would like to apply it to an alternative scenario, that involves government officials in a country of free people like the united States of America. Within the body of Christ there may be people who serve in government positions whether elected or appointed.

Christians in government positions may lose track of their underlying responsibilities and authorities. Soon they make decisions and pass laws that are unconstitutional and against the law of the land. More often than not, they do it for what seems to be good causes. Among the masses of people in Texas and the united States there are many who stand firmly against government officials who break the law of the land. In the end, the government officials start to feel as if they are being attacked and persecuted.

In this area there are members of the body of Christ who serve in government positions and others who serve to question, scrutinize and even squash unlawful legislation and enforcement practices. In the end, Christian government officials are seen to be suffering. What typically happens is the church will act on God's word and help them endure their suffering, while at the same time rally around the officials' unlawful decisions. This is not necessarily the best option.



You see, the suffering government officials often bring the themselves because of their own unlawful actions or legislati . is possible for the other members to suffer with the suffering at the same time not condone their actions or decisions,

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In all areas of life, the members of the body of Christ ca or hazardous decisions that result in others standing against seeking to punish them. Yes, this can happen to Christians tempting to make mistakes when given the power of State and ment. With good intentions, they believe a good cause is serve power of the State to legislate and enforce rules for areas that n even be against God's will in general. While there are many p the codes that regulate underlying constitutional rights, there; Christians who stand and speak out against the same regulation and F

This puts the body of Christ in an interesting situation. Chr. ernment positions can become targets of heavy scrutiny, law + Fist B criminal prosecution. They become the suffering party. Yet sn is not a conflict when applying 1Corinthians 12:14-27. 

Debate continues on government spendi

The great debate in Austin over budgets and how much will be spent on all of the worthy things is rapidly drawing to a close. Unfortunately in Washington the debate continues and the probability of a quick settlement on how our nation will spend its dollars is close to zero. In this debate, the differences center on how big our government should be and how much the government should be involved with our daily lives.

We have just started the budget debate here in Rockwall County as the first draft budget has been prepared by the county judge and presented to the Commissioners Court. This first draft is a balanced budget with no deficit spending and no need for new taxes. Now the court will examine the budget, hear the opposition for cuts in recommended spending from special interests, and decide on a final budget that will be used to manage the county for the next fiscal year.

Rockwall County is in good fiscal condition. Over the past 15 years our county revenues have grown between 10 percent and 15 percent per year, which has allowed us to build a reserve fund of about \$20 million to be used for emergencies and special needs. Unfortunately, however, that continuous rapid growth has stopped and the forecast now is for our county, on a personal property basis, to grow no more than 1 percent per year for the next five years with a possible increase to 2 percent in the fifth year. Since 83 percent of the county funding comes from this personal property tax, clearly the county budget is going to be impacted.

Over the past 12 years, the county budget has grown each year, on almost a straight line basis, from about \$7 million to \$31 million. This year, the initial analysis of the county "needs" showed a budget requirement of slightly over \$31 million. However, our projected revenue is \$29.77

interest groups, to balance the budget, or do we handle it like they have done for years in Washington, D.C., by simply raising taxes or going into debt and pulling from our reserve fund to balance the yearly expenditures?

Sure, pulling from the reserve fund would work for a year since we "only have a \$1.3 million deficit," but what happens in the next year and then the next year and then the next year when revenues are flat and the county budget continues to want to grow. How far do you take tax increases to operate the county, or how far do you continue into deficit spending before you simply run out of money and citizen trust?

As the county judge, one of my mandated requirements, by state statute, is to prepare the county budget and then present it to the court for approval. When I started gathering the data to prepare the budget and saw that our projected costs exceeded our projected revenue, I quickly made the decision that we would have a balanced budget; we would not go down the path of spending more than we make with the idea that over time we could recover the money when "times got better." My choice is the path away from higher taxes and deficit spending merely to operate the county while it does its daily business. Debt and taxes must be reserved for improving the infrastructure of the county so our citizens can have such things as better and more roads, more programs to help bring more economic growth, and a continued secure and friendly environment.

There will be strong objections to parts of the recommended budget where dollars have been reduced. Some of the departments within the county that are mandated by state statute are being asked to make minimal reductions in their budget. Our only non-statute department, which has a strong volunteer citizens group, is being asked to reduce its budget by 21 percent. I am sure there will be increasing pressure on the court members citizens.

Your input to the upcoming budget discussions is important. It is squarely on the five individuals who control the county purse Commissioners Court members. Let them know your views.

These upcoming discussions and decisions will set the tote direction of the county as we go forward into the years wherea growth is flat to rising 1 percent per year. How we are structured in that sixth year when things start their vigorous growth again. Which do you prefer, a vibrant county that has paid its way.0 loaded with debt and higher taxes with little room for continued That's the big decision.
