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Rockwall County residents released from Ebola monitoring

According to a notice dated Oct. 16 from the Rockwall County Center of Emergency Management, five Rockwall County residents were being monitored for the Ebola virus.

The Texas Department of State Health Services does not release information as to the identity or address of these individuals to local officials. All five were under monitoring protocols by the Texas Department of State Health Services and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

All five resided in Rockwall County. Local and county officials were not notified of the specific city in which each resides; however, one is a health care worker that works at Presbyterian Dallas and is said to be low risk, and four others were on a commercial flight this week with a

Representatives from Rockwall County, city officials, Rockwall ISD and Royse City ISD are working together to monitor the situation, educate, and protect the safety of our healthcare workers, first responders, students, and residents.

Additional information is being provided by the Royse City ISD regarding a healthcare worker living in Collin County within the Royse City School District who is being monitored by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC). This individual is not among the five individuals noted above living in Rockwall County.

In a release dated Oct. 20, a sixth "low risk" individual began being monitored for the Ebola virus.

According to the release, the best protection from the virus is to practice careful hygiene. For example, wash hands with soap and water or an alcohol-based hand sanitizer and avoid contact with blood and bodily fluids.

According to the CDC's website, Ebola, previously known as Ebola hemorrhagic fever, is a rare and deadly disease caused by infection with one of the Ebola virus strains. Ebola can cause disease in humans and nonhuman primates (monkeys, gorillas and chimpanzees).

Ebola viruses are found in several African countries. Ebola was first discovered in 1976 near the Ebola River in what is now the Democratic Republic of the Congo. Since then, outbreaks have appeared sporadically in Africa.

The natural reservoir host of Ebola virus remains unknown. However, on the basis of evidence and the nature of similar viruses, researchers believe that the virus is animal-borne and that bats are the most likely reservoir.

CDC is implementing enhanced entry screening at five U.S. airports that receive more than 94 percent of travelers from Guinea, Liberia and Sierra Leone.

On Sept. 30, CDC confirmed the first travel-associated case of Ebola diagnosed in the United States. The patient died on Oct. 8.

On Oct. 10, a healthcare worker at Texas Presbyterian Hospital in Dallas who provided care for the index patient reported a low-grade fever and was referred for testing. The healthcare worker tested positive for Ebola, according to preliminary tests by the Texas Department of State Health Services' laboratory. The healthcare worker was isolated after the initial report of a fever and remains so now. CDC confirms that the healthcare worker is positive for Ebola.

Healthcare providers caring for Ebola patients and the family and friends in close contact with Ebola patients are at the highest risk of getting sick because they may come in contact with the blood or body fluids of sick patients. People also can become sick with Ebola after coming in contact with infected wildlife.

the way the fireworks were stored was dangerous and the is just a metal shell, with no restrooms. It was voiced by her council members that no other businesses would want to

build close to the firework stores, thus they were holding back the growth of the city in that particular area of town. The issue of out-of-towners coming to purchase their fireworks in Fate caused the Department of Public Safety extra concern, as once people purchased the fireworks and left the store, they are engaged in transportation fireworks, which is illegal. It is also illegal to shoot fireworks in the City of Fate, which many people did.

In a recent interview with Rex Nelson, owner of Nelson's Fireworks, Nelson said the conflict began about July or August of 2013. He said he was never given any reason at all as to why the Fate City Council wanted to shut him down. He originally was told that he would have to completely tear down the structure, remove the concrete slab and create a dirt/grass foundation. Through ongoing negotiations with the new mayor and city council, they now have agreed to give him and Alamo until Jan. 31 to paint the buildings white, completely covering the signage on the buildings and establish signage that will be in compliance with the city sign code.

"All I want is to be treated fairly, like any other business in Fate. I've said all along. I haven't asked for any special privileges -- just fairness," Nelson said. "I've tried to work with both mayors and both city councils, but it has been a real struggle.

"The city now says the sign ordinance allows for the sign to be painted on the outside of the building and only cover 10 percent of the wall space. The city is talking about raising the sign space to 30 percent of the outside wall. I should know soon. It will take the painters 10-12 manhours just to paint over the existing signs leaving the whole building white, ready for the signage to be painted," Nelson said.

Following the mayor, council and city manager reports, Mayor Lorne Megyesi and most of the council members thanked Coursey and her financial team for all the hard work they had done to win the Excellence in Financial Reporting Awards.

They also praised Chief Brian Griffeth, director of the Department of Public Safety, for organizing and carrying out the Halloween Bash for

Almost gone, but not forgotten: World War II veteral

This weekend, I spent a sad but joyous time with some very special men, several of whom I may never see again.

For 23 years, the veterans, their families and friends have meet at Camp Fannin in Tyler, Texas, to celebrate and remember a time when the world was at war. Camp Fannin was a training center for soldiers on their way overseas to fight in many countries they had never even heard of. I have attended 17 of 18 years. My attendance is in honor of my mother's 19-year-old brother, who was killed at the Battle of the Bulge in 1945.

Although almost all of the physical camp is now gone (with only barracks slabs, a smoke stack and a few underground bunkers left), a most touching memorial has been built by the loved ones, friends and people who care enough to not let these veterans be forgotten.

When I first started attending the reunions, the event lasted five days and there were between 350 and 400 minimum in attendance, coming in from all over the United States to share, reminisce and laugh through their tears and pain.

This year this reunion only lasted Friday night and Saturday. There was no entertainment, no dancing and the memorabilia has shrunk drastically, as those who attended, brought their flags, photos, uniforms, etc., with them to be put on display for everyone to see. Those veterans were no longer there and neither was their memorabilia.

But the saddest observation was that there were only three veterans who stayed at the hotel and shared their stories with us. There were a few more who came to the Saturday celebration and observance at the monument, where we listened to a speaker and a bugler who opened the program by playing "Reveille" (the bugle song by which the soldiers were awakened in the military) and closed by playing "Taps" (a musical piece played in the military, which meant lights out). "Taps" is played at the end of military funerals -- a most fitting song for whe

Don't let them be forgotten.





Another quiet protestor, who asked to not be named, explained that he did not agree with the NSM platform, but respected their right to speak and assemble freely. She died Nov. 5.


Born June 24, 1929, in Lincoln, Neb., to Harry V. and Mabel (Livgren) Carlson, she was a loving



PAWS program grooms Scott Elementary students for successories

Wylee Ricker was instructed to go to the office at Anita Scott Elementary School on a recent Tuesday morning, but the first grade student wasn't in trouble.

Instead, she was caught doing something good, and the office visit was an opportunity for Wylee to be showered with praise and rewards.

"Keep making good choices," school receptionist Elia Salinas told Wylee after presenting her a certificate, pencil, sticker and coupon for a fast-food kids meal.

Scenes like this are repeated several times each school day at the Royse City elementary school.

The presentations are part of a new school program -- "PAWS Guidelines for Success." The program focuses on teaching the young students appropriate behavior in common areas -- hallways, restrooms, playground and cafeteria.

PAWS is an acronym for the guidelines for success -- Positive attitude;

PAWS is geared toward praising students more often than correcting, as well as celebrating students through incentives when they are observed following the guidelines for success.

Dianna Bright, assistant principal, said there are several types of positive reinforcement to help students develop the guidelines -- or

habits -- for success.

Act responsibly; Wise choices; and Stay focused.

Students who are seen following a guideline for success will be praised and handed a PAWS ticket by a teacher. The student will take the ticket to the office and receive a certificate, sticker, pencil and other rewards. A PAWS-itive phone call will also be made to the child's parents.

The student will place the sticker on the 100 Club Board. When the board is filled with 100 stickers, there will be a drawing for various prizes. After a student receives four tickets, they will receive an I Earned My PAWS T-shirt.

Bright said highlights of the program for her are seeing the smiles of students when they get a PAWS ticket, followed by praise and rewards.

She also enjoys making the telephone call to parents. Some parents, however, are not so excited about hearing from her -- at first. They are relieved when they find out why their child's assistant principal made the telephone call.

"'Dr. Bright, what did he do?" she said some alarmed pare

"'No, it's positive. Your child got a PAWS ticket," Bright tells the parents. "I just want them to know how proud we are." Some parents have cried when they learned of their

accomplishment and some who know about the program have re-

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

to the Senate. He was opposed by two non-profit anti-Communist groups that were attacking Johnson's liberal agenda. In retaliation, Johnson inserted language into the IRS code that prohibited nonprofits, including churches, from endorsing or opposing candidates for political office. This allowed using the power of the IRS to silence his opposition.

The most reliable truth comes from the pulpit in our church or place of worship. Churches acquire tax exemption by filing as a non-profit organization. This allows the donor to file their donation as tax exempt and the organization to have additional operational funds.

Hitler realized the importance of first influencing the youth, and In 1954, Senator Lyndon B. Johnson was on the ballot for re-election silencing the church. This led to World War 2 in which Germany, Italy and Japan banded together to control the world. Throughout history there have been leaders trying to control all the people, making them the earthly god of the people.

> Our forefathers understood this and realized that by using the only reliable history book, the Bible, and following its instructions, including prayer, they could for the first time create a country with individual freedom of choice and religion. 

After defeating Hillcrest last week in the first round of the 2014 UIL Volleyball Playoffs, Rockwall-Heath downed the McKinney Lady Lions 3-1 Friday, November 7 in the Area round at Naaman Forest High School.

The Hawks, ranked No. 3 in the state 5A polls by the Texas Girls Coaches Association, took the first two sets 25-12 and 25-22, but McKinney (18-12) took the third game 26-24. The Lions forced pressure on Heath in game four, but the Hawks pulled out the 27-25 victory to advance to the Regional Quarterfinals.

The last time the Lady Hawks (37-6) lost a set was September 9 against Rowlett. Heath had a streak of 15 straight matches without dropping a single game.

Also for the Hawks, Grace Howell had 18 assists, seven digs and one ace, Brooke Birleson had 14 digs and 14 assists, Alex Nolan had three kills and two blocks, Kristin Pruitt tallied five kills and a dig, and Lorin McNeil had two kills, two blocks and a dig.

Jackets continue historic season, claim 11-6A Title

The Yellowjackets made history Friday night at Wilkerson-Sanders Memorial Stadium as they overcame a rough first half to defeat the Garland Owls 63-33 for the undisputed 11-6A District Championship. Rockwall (10-0, 7-0) ended their regular season 10-0 for the first time since 1981.

Chris Warren and Xavier Castille each scored four touchdowns. Warren rushed for 212 yards on 29 carries; Chris has now surpassed the 2,000-yards rushing mark on the season with 2,091. Castille caught five passes for 145 and two touchdowns and had three carries for 82 yards and two more scores.

Garland (7-3, 5-2) took advantage of early Jacket blunders, converting two fumbles into touchdowns, and after a one-yard scoring run by Warren, the Owls held a 14-7 lead at the end of the first quarter. Rockwall struggled to stop big runs by running back Markeith Miller, who put up 271 yards rushing on 35 carries and three touchdowns on the night.

Both teams traded scoring drives in the second. Xavier Castille hauled in a 62-yard touchdown reception and had a 63-yard scoring run and Warren added a one-yard run. With thirty seconds remaining in the half, Rockwall led 28-27, but a fumble scooped up by Garland's Olajide Oloruntimilehin for a touchdown left the Jackets trailing 33-28 at the half.
