

Questions about city's density raised by Heath City Council

Citizens and councilmembers alike raised questions about the density of the City of Heath during the Heath City Council meeting on Oct. 12.

An application for a zoning change for nine lots situated on 5.329 acres from agricultural to planned development was filed by Robert Whittle for Whittle Development Inc.

The addition, Heath Golf & Yacht Club Estates Lakes Addition, according to the application, would be adjacent to the Heath Golf & Yacht Club planned development district.

The Planning and Zoning Commission conducted a public hearing at their meeting when the zoning change was brought to them and it was voted unanimously to be approved.

Council Member Rich Krause voiced his concern about how the density of the nine lots had been doubled compared to that of the rest of the HGYC development.

"If we want to change the density of our community, we need to do that through the comprehensive plan and revise it, which means we need to revise our traffic studies, all of our infrastructure studies, because it's changing the dynamics and the planning of our city," Krause said. "And we're doing it repeatedly one development at a time rather than doing it comprehensively."

Council Member Barry Brooks argued that while the lots were not in line with the one-acre lots density guideline the city has implemented, there are other areas within the HGYC project that are also not exactly on par with that guideline, but that these developments do not necessarily have any real noticeable to the overall density of the development.

Council also engaged in discussion about the inclusion of the acreage in the original development.

"This is something we contemplated all along, if they would have gone through the process four months ago, amending their PD to include this I think we all would have approved it because we were all advised

that this would be coming in later," Mayor Lorne Liechty said. With Council Member Julie Zurek absent, a motion was made to approve the zoning change, but came to a tied vote at 3-3.

Upon recommendation by the city attorney, the council decided to table the item until the Nov. 26 meeting.

Whittle was not present at the meeting.

In other business, the council, upon suggestion from the Planning & Zoning Commission, the council unanimously denied the request for a conditional use permit to build an accessory building. Reasons for the denial were the pitch of the proposed roof, the size of the building and it not being of like design, which is against current city ordinances.

Council also approve the authorization to award a construction contract for the Buffalo Creek trail repair project to A&M Construction, after the job had been re-bid.

George Hargrave, who has served as the City of Heath representative on the Rockwall Central Appraisal District Board of Directors, also was

Hargrave has served as the city's representative on the board since 2007 and is currently vice chairman of the board of directors.

The next scheduled Heath City Council meeting is scheduled for Nov.

It was announced that Chief Financial Officer Jimmy Butler is resigning as of January and David Carter, the CFO for the Greenville Independent School District, will take his position.

Jo Nell Mellody gave an update on the Education Foundation, which is a non-profit organization that raises money, which provides innovative grants for the school district. Teachers write a grant explaining their ideas of equipment or other materials they think will help their students learn and progress at a better pace. Then they submit their grant idea to the Foundation and the Foundation selects those they have enough money for and award them to the teachers.

Mellody noted that 38 grants were submitted for a "total ask of \$115,904.10" and 18 grants totaling \$51,904.17 were awarded. She said the Foundation Partners Dinner and Art Auction and the annual campaign have raised \$85,31,5 leaving only \$14,685 to reach their goal of \$100,000. The Foundation still has until the end of December to reach the goal for 2013.

Royse City watering plan cut to 2 days per month

Approval at the Nov. 12 Royse City Council meeting of implementing the North Texas Municipal Water District's seasonal Stage 3 watering plan passed 5-1.

Councilman James Branch voted no with no explanation or comments of his vote.

Effective Nov. 15 and until March 31, landscape watering is allowed only two days a month. Citizens with even addresses can water the first and third Tuesdays, while those with odd addresses can water the second and fourth Thursdays of each month.

Two new employees were announced at the meeting. They were Lyndsey Weaver, who will be the new animal control officer, and Jacob Wetzel fills the position of court administrator.

The girls plan to write thank-you notes to all donors and deliver them in coming days. They already are making plans to repeat their efforts next year.


Parents of the girls are Joe and Stefanie Gentile and Robert and Millie Duffy. All three girls are students at Amy Parks Heath Elementary.

Veterans honor veterans at school ceremonies

Veterans Day is far more than a holiday for the Tri-County Veterans Honor Guard. For them it is a day when veterans honor veterans.

Davis, Scott and Caddo Mills elementary schools had asked the TCVHG to return and give a program Nov. 11. The guard has been giving Veterans Day programs at schools since 2008. Davis was the first school to host a program six years ago.

At 7 a.m. the TCVHG arrived at Davis Elementary. Part of the veterans met the buses as they arrived, shaking hands with each student as they exited the buses, while the other group of veterans met those students being dropped off by automobiles at the other end of the building. The students and parents were delighted to see the veterans in their uniforms. Wide-eyed students shaking hands with the veterans brought big smiles to the students' faces.

Once all the students arrived, their teachers gathered them in front of the school for a flag raising. The TCVHG gathered around the flagpole and gave the military salute while all others gave the civilian salute -hand over their hearts -- as was instructed by Commander Gene Allen. After the flag was raised, everyone said the Pledge of Allegiance.

Allen explained to the students what being free really means and spoke about respecting the flag. He read a poem, presented as if the United States flag was actually speaking the words. Breakfast was served to the veterans after the program.

Then the veterans divided up and part went to Scott Elementary while the other went to Caddo Mills.



After he completed his presentation, the Tri-County Veterans Color Guard retired the colors.



On God's Word

Rightly Dividing God's word ... Baptism of water? or holy spirit?

Debates over baptism have raged since the beginning of the Christian churches.

To this day, churches have different baptismal practices. Churches have even split over issues of baptism methodology. Some people claim it must involve complete submersion in water. Others believe it's just as effective to sprinkle water. There are differences in opinion over whether infants should be baptized.

So far, there has not been much dispute over whether to use spring water, salt water, lake water, tap water, distilled water, etc.

The one commonality among the various churches is the accepted use of water baptism, with some divisions over its spiritual importance. Some will insist the baptism of water is necessary toward the receiving on the Holy Ghost. Others see it as a symbolic expression of commitment.

By rightly dividing God's word, people can see exactly what is God's opinion about the baptism of water? Setting aside personal

opinions and beliefs, let's allow God's word to speak for itself on this subject.

During the Gospels period of time, God raised up a prophet named John the son of Zacharias (Luke 3:2). John was born with holy spirit already in him (Luke 1:41). It said in Luke 1:80, "And the child grew, and waxed strong in spirit ..."

John was not only raised by his parents, Elizabeth and Zacharias, but he was also taught directly by the spirit of God from his earliest years. It's extremely important to notice that neither John, nor his mother, was baptized with water when they were filled with holy spirit during the initial meeting with Mary.

Luke 3:3 explained John's baptism as follows, "And he came into all the country about Jordan, preaching the baptism of repentance for the remission of sins."

Later, while people questioned whether John was the Messiah from God, John said, "I indeed baptize you with water; but one mightier than I comes, the latchet of whose shoes I am not worthy to unloose: he shall baptize you with the Holy Ghost and with fire ..." (Luke 3:15-16).

The word "remission" was translated from the ancient Greek word aphesis. According to The New Thayer's Greek-English Lexicon, the word aphesis meant "to be released, as from bondage, imprisonment, etc.; forgiveness and pardon of sins; letting them go as if they had not been committed; remission of their penalty" (p. 88a).

The phrase "baptism of repentance" referred to something that results from mental repentance. John knew that the baptism of liquid
