Texas Night Out tonight across Rockwall County

Neighborhoods throughout Rockwall are invited to join communities across the state tonight, Tuesday, Oct. 13 for the 2nd Annual Texas Night Out crime and drug prevention event. Texas Night Out is designed to heighten crime and drug prevention awareness; generate support for and participation in local anti-crime efforts; strengthen neighborhood spirit and police-community relationships; and send a message to criminals to let them know neighborhoods are organizing and fighting back, according to a news release.

Many neighborhoods will use the opportunity to host special events: block parties, swimming parties, cookouts, and flashlight walks and youth activities.

Texas Night Out 2009 also can be used to recertify a neighborhood as a Neighborhood Crime Watch participant.

Sidelining the event will be a food drive to help support Rockwall County Helping Hands Food Pantry.

Texas Night Out, originally observed as National Night Out, is sponsored by the National Association of Town Watch and co-sponsored locally by the Rockwall Police Department. The Texas event was bumped from August to October because of the extreme heat

routinely experienced by most Texas cities in August.

Texas Night Out is supported in part by Target, the national corporate sponsor for National Night Out.

Last year's local event was honored with a National Night Out Award.

Semifinalists Named in National Achievement Scholarship Program

Two students from the Rockwall/Rowlett area have been named to the list of the 46th annual National Achievement Scholarship Program by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation (NMSC). Rockwall-Heath High School student Agar B. Woda and Rowlett School student Breanna N. Reed, were among more than 1,600 American high school students designated Semifinalists in the competition.

These scholastically talented young men and women now have an opportunity to continue in the competition to receive one of approximately 800 Achievement Scholarship awards, worth some \$2.6 million, to be offered next spring.

The National Achievement Scholarship Program, conducted by NMSC, is a privately financed academic competition that operates without government assistance. It was initiated in 1964 to recognize

academically promising black students throughout the nation and to provide scholarships to a substantial number of the most outstanding program participants. To date, more than 29,500 young men and women have received Achievement Scholarship awards worth \$94 million.

Approximately 1,300 Semifinalists are expected to fulfill additional requirements and advance to the Finalist level in the 2010 program. All Achievement Scholar awardees will be selected from the Finalist group on the basis of their abilities, accomplishments, and potential for success in rigorous college studies.

More than 160,000 high school juniors from all parts of the United States requested consideration in the 2010 Program when they took the 2008 Preliminary SAT/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test. To advance to the Finalist level in the competition, Semifinalists must present a record of high academic performance throughout high school, be endorsed and recommended by the high school principal, write an essay, and earn SAT scores that confirm the psat/nmsqt performance.

Young women between the ages of 13 and 18 who have never been married are eligible to compete in the event, which leads to the Miss Teen Texas International Pageant set for March 26-28 in San Antonio.

Local contestants will compete in personal interview, fitness wear, "fun fashion" wear and evening gown, according to a news release issued this week. There is no talent or swimsuit competition. No previous pageant experience is required.

The young woman crowned Miss Teen Rockwall County will become an ambassador for the area and compete at the Miss Teen Texas International Pageant. The recipient of the Texas title will receive a scholarship and prize package valued at more than \$15,000, as well as the opportunity to represent the state at the 2010 Miss Teen International Pageant in Chicago in July.

Low cost pet clinic scheduled for Nov. 7 in Rockwall

Rockwall Animal Services is hosting a low cost shot and microchip clinic from 2 p.m. to 5 p.m., Saturday, Nov. 7, at the office of Dr. J. David Loftis, DVM, located at 2001 S. Goliad.

All dogs must be on a leash and all cats must be in a carrier. One-

year rabies shots will be \$8 or \$24 for three-year rabies shots. All other basic shots will be \$8 each. All dogs and cats in the city limits are required to be vaccinated against rabies at either one one-year or three-year intervals, depending on the type of vaccine used.

In addition to shots, microchipping for dogs and cats, an advanced pet identification and retrieval system, will be available. The fee is \$20, which includes the chip and the procedure to administer it. The service will be available on Nov. 7 while supplies last.

City of Rockwall animal registrations will also be available at the clinic. For each spayed or neutered dog or cat the registration fee will be \$5 for a one-year registration and \$15 for a three-year registration. For dogs or cats not spayed or neutered the fee will be \$20 for a one-year registration or \$30 for a three-year registration. Pet owners outside the Rockwall City Limits are also welcome to request shots for their pets. Ensuring pets are vaccinated will help keep the Rockwall community safe.

Jackets whip R.L. Turner 49-7

Rockwall had a break in its difficult football schedule last week, but hardly took the week off.

With their leading rusher watching from the bench, and the starters taking the rest of the night off after the first play of the fourth quarter, the Yellowjackets routed Carrollton R.L. Turner 49-7 at Standridge Stadium in Carrollton.

Senior Del Myles, starting in place of the injured Josh Broach, ran for 220 yards and four touchdowns, to help RHS improve its record to 4-2 overall and 2-1 in District 10-4A. Turner dropped to 0-6, 0-3 with its 13th consecutive loss.

Rockwall took control of the game early, going 49 yards in eight plays to Myles' 5-yard run on its first possession. The lead stretched to 14-0 after one quarter, 28-0 at halftime, 42-0 after three quarters and 49-0 when Myles broke loose for a 75-yard run 12 seconds into the fourth quarter.

Myles proved that he is not just any backup, but good enough to share a starting role with Broach. He has gained at least 100 yards in three games, and has a total of 481 yards this season.

Broach, a junior, was in uniform, but didn't play. He has gained 728 yards and scored 13 times, had suffered a back injury against Rockwall-Heath six days earlier.

Head coach Scott Smith said, "Josh probably could have played. We're being very cautious."

The Jackets also want him ready to play in Thursday's 7:30 p.m. game at Wilkerson-Sanders Stadium against Richardson Pearce.

Smith and most of his staff spent Friday night at Highland Park scouting Pearce against the Scots. HP's 51-44 victory over the Mustangs and Carrollton Newman Smith's surprising 28-14 win over Rockwall-Heath left the Jackets and those three other teams tied for second place in 10-4A, a game behind Highland Park.

With a loss already to R-HHS (and to 5A power Allen in a non-district game), Rockwall most likely could afford no more than two losses against Pearce, Newman Smith and Highland Park to finish among the four teams advancing to the playoffs from the district.

Against Turner, it was Myles' night to shine. He created two instant, one-play scoring drives by running 65 yards in the second quarter and 75 in the fourth for touchdowns. Myles scored once in each quarter, with a 5-yard run in the third set up by Adam Dingwell's 35-yard pass to Scott Loy.

"Del's a good back," Smith said. "It's been fun to watch him grow up from a freshman, sophomore, junior, senior."

Rockwall's other touchdowns came on Dingwell's 1-yard run and 35-yard pass to Will Beasley, and Spencer Edwards' 27-yard interception return on the first play of the second half.

Edwards' interception highlighted the Jackets' best defensive effort this season. Rockwall took the ball away four times and held the Lions to 297 total yards and seven points. RHS had allowed at least 26 points in each of its first four games, including 55 to Rockwall-Heath.

Part of the improvement resulted from instituting a four-man line, with Robert Hinton at tackle alongside Walter Garrett.

The line paid dividends after Rockwall's first touchdown when left end Jarrett Spencer recovered a fumble at Turner's 24 yard line. The Jackets used eight plays to get into the end zone, with Beasley running for a first down on fourth and one to set up Adam Dingwell's 1-yard touchdown run.

"We felt like we needed to go with a four-man line. We're working toward being more multiple on defense. We have more D-linemen than linebackers. We have a lot of injuries at linebacker," Smith said shortly after senior linebacker Jeff Wells passed by on crutches.

After Myles' final touchdown, the fourth quarter was Rockwall's younger players' time to shine. They included a number of sophomores up from the junior varsity.

Smith said, "That was fun. They did a good job. Zach Farrow looked good intercepting a pass and running it back. John Burgos had a big hit, and Barrett Duncan."

Sophomore running back Baylor Black had his first opportunity to carry the ball for the varsity. After losing four yards on his first attempt, he bounced back to pick up eight on his final two carries.

Offensive lineman Payden McBee limped off the field at halftime, but head coach Scott Smith said he expects McBee to be able to play.
History: Last year, the Jackets

and Pearce became district rivals again, and the Mustangs won 51-35 in Richardson. RHS took a 14-0 lead, but Pearce roared back behind Josh Gold's five touchdowns. The final two came after the Jackets had battled back to trail just 37-35. Gold and the other key offensive players from that game are back. For Rockwall, Broach ran for two TDs, and Adam Dingwell threw for two - including one to Will Beasley, who had 107 receiving yards. No. 13 Lady Jackets win 2 of 3 volleyball matches

 Rockwall's volleyball team returned to winning ways Friday with a 25-13, 25-20, 23-25, 25-17 victory at Carrollton R.L. Turner.
 RHS had won convincingly in a Friday, Oct. 2, battle for playoff position against Rockwall-Heath, but a disheartening second-game loss led to a sweep by Highland Park Tuesday, Oct. 6.
 Those results meant that the Lady Jackets are 6-3 in District 10-4A, once again tied with R-H for third place behind undefeated Richardson Pearce and HP (7-2).
 The Texas Girls Coaches Association recognized the caliber of competition Rockwall faces by ranking the Lady Jackets 13th in the Oct. 5 state 4A

poll. Rockwall has only one returning player, Maggie Brindock, from last year's area champions. "This is a great accomplishment from the girls to get this type of recognition from that poll," said head coach Damon Wilson.
 The Lady Jackets have won four of their last five matches.
 RHS held the Lady Hawks to fewer than 20 points in all three games of Rockwall's sweep at home. The scores were 25-16, 25-19 and 25-13. Brindock had 15 kills, and Ashton Atwell added nine, for the Lady Jackets.
 "We had a great match against Heath," Wilson said.
 The match was a joint effort between the RISD's two high schools to raise money and awareness for breast cancer research. The teams wore pink

warm-up shirts in honor of the "Dig for the Cure" event.
 At Highland Park, the Lady Jackets lost the first game 25-15, close to no avail in a 25-23 second game and fell behind early in a game. The loss was RHS' second to the Lady Scots this season. The Lady Jackets were playing without setter Loren Kelly, with freshman Floyd being elevated to play in her first varsity match.
 Wilson said, "Highland Park is a very good team, and we were just not the level of play it takes to beat them at home."
 With five matches remaining, Rockwall will play at home against Carrollton on Tuesday at 6:30 p.m.

Wilson picks up for Turner in RCA's 58-21 win

 It was Charlie Wilson's Game.
 The Rockwall Christian Academy senior scored four touchdowns as the Warriors won their TAPPS District 2-IV football opener Friday night 58-21 over McKinney Christian.
 After quarterback Stephan Turner ran for two touchdowns and threw for four (including two to Wilson) in the first half, Wilson took over as a triple threat in the second half. He ran for a touchdown, caught a pass for another and played some quarterback for RCA (2-4 overall, 1-0 in the district).
 McKinney Christian fell to 2-4, 0-1. The victory was a big one for Rockwall Christian, because it almost guaranteed a playoff berth in the five-team district. Because RCA has a tiebreaker over McKinney, the Mustangs would have to win one game more than the Warriors to take one of the four playoff berths. Three of last year's four state semifinalists, including Rockwall Christian, were from 2-IV.
 Friday's contest at McKinney North High School seemed to be over early. The Warriors jumped to a 21-0 lead in the first quarter, and had it up to 40-0 just before halftime as they scored touchdowns on their first six possessions.
 The defense was just as dominant.
 RCA head coach Caleb Palmer said, "McKinney is not (2008 state finalists) Canyon Creek or Legacy, but we were nervous coming in. They scored 77 points last week. Their quarterback is definitely a good athlete. We got a lot of pressure on number 5 (quarterback Thomas LeBlanc) and tackled really well."
 The Warriors sacked LeBlanc five times - twice by Sherman Peoples, who also recovered a fumble and led the team with 14 tackles.
 Palmer said, "For two weeks in practice, they hit hard and tackled. I was pretty upset after our game (44-41 loss) against Home School. I didn't think we tackled very well. We played soft."
 However, a play that didn't even count gave the Mustangs hope that they could come back.
 They were driving deep into RCA territory with just seconds to play in the first half. Turner stepped in to intercept a pass from LeBlanc at the Warriors' 9 yard line, and cutting from the left sideline over to the right, took the ball 83 yards to the MCA 8. Then he didn't get up for some time after being shaken up on the tackle.

As he lay on the ground out of bounds, the play was called back because RCA was offside.
 That gave McKinney an extra play, and Alex Farley kicked a 37-yard field goal to end the half at 40-3. When the teams came back after halftime, Rockwall Christian was down to 15 able-bodied players, with just four reserves, on the sideline. Turner did not play in the second half. Elvis Below, Shelby Sharpless and Daniel Rorie also were shaken up during the game.
 However, after taking the kickoff the Mustangs fumbled on their third play. RCA made one of its five recoveries of McKinney fumbles, and drove 48 yards in four plays to Peoples' 9-yard touchdown run and a 46-3 lead.
 The Mustangs did have the upper hand after that, outscoring the Warriors 18-12. That was far too little, too late.
 RCA had taken charge early. Rorie recovered MCA's game-opening inside kick at midfield, and six plays later Turner threw a 4-yard touchdown pass to Aaron Eastin. Turner's 36-yard TD pass to Wilson and 36-yard option run for another score, both in the last two minutes of the first quarter, gave the Warriors their 21-0 lead.
 In the second quarter, Peoples' block broke Turner loose for a 24-yard touchdown run, and Turner threw scoring passes of 32 yards to Kasey Weadon and 17 to Wilson.
 After Peoples' third-quarter touchdown, Wilson scored twice more on a 24-yard run and a 49-yard pass play from Eastin.
 For the game, Wilson caught four passes for 128 yards and carried six times for 82 more. On defense, he made 11 tackles.
 Palmer said, "We ran some plays in the second half to get the ball in Charlie's hands."
 Wilson said, "We ran some quick passing plays to get me more involved in the passing game. Me and Stephan are real close. When we didn't play him in the second half, I knew it was up to me."
 Turner's one half of play netted 167 yards passing and 126 rushing, plus two interceptions nullified by penalties.
 Overall, it was a sloppy game. Between the two teams, the last seven conversions were missed. They combined for 22 penalties. Shawn Harned made an interception that did count.
 Before the varsity game, McKinney Christian defeated RCA's middle school team 14-8.

HCA's Pettit paces Eagles in 52-48 victory

Austin Pettit accounted for five touchdowns, including the game winner with just over a minute to play, to lead Heritage Christian Academy to a 52-48 victory over Arlington Fellowship Academy Friday night.
 "It was exciting. Austin had a good game," said Eagles head coach Robert Huckabee. "He played well on defense. We moved him around on offense. We got him in the backfield to throw a few passes, and he made some good runs."
 After Pettit's 11-yard pass to Asa Burke and Aaron Mateer's 2-point conversion kick gave HCA its 4-point lead, Fellowship drove in to the Eagles' 5 yard line.
 "They used their last timeout and ran a play to about our 15 or 20 yard line. They had to hurry up when they ran their last play. They made a hand-off, and the runner bounced outside but we were able to tackle him," Huckabee said.

 A 4-yard rushing touchdown by Burke and Pettit's 56-yard pass to Mateer stretched the lead to 22-6, but the Mustangs came back on Collins' 27-yard pass to Jacob Johnson to pull within 22-14 at halftime.
 Fellowship took the upper hand in the third quarter, scoring three touchdowns to go ahead 36-22 before the Eagles rebounded to tie the game 36-36 entering the final 12 minutes. Pettit ran for both HCA touchdowns, from 1 and 15 yards out.
 In the fourth quarter, Collins' 2-yard run put the Mustangs ahead before Eric Bradley's 3-yard run and Mateer's kick put the Eagles ahead again 44-42. Collins threw 26 yards to Kevin Holden for a 48-44 lead that set up

Trojans take 28-14 win over Hawks

LTON – Just when it looked like Rockwall-Heath had finally gotten its sputtering offense going against Newman Smith Trojans, another special team breakdown put the Hawks right back in a hole they got out of, in a District 10-4A game at Standridge Stadium last Friday.

More Dorian Lawry cruised 32 untouched yards into the endzone to tie the score at 14-14 early in the game, it seemed like just a matter of letting the defense continue shutting down the Trojans' offense. The offense, which other than a five-minute span in the first quarter, had come up empty on its last five possessions. The defense never got a chance to make it six in a row.

During the game, the Hawks use in an effort to limit long return opportunities – Smith's Terrell Wilson gathered the ball in at his own 23 near the left sideline and simply took off for the other sideline. A couple of blockers he turned the corner and 77 yards later found the endzone. A missed PAT left the Trojans, who went 0-10 in their initial varsity campaign five years ago and have never won more than three games, would add another TD and a two-point conversion later in the fourth period to finish off the 28-14 victory.

The defending 10-4A champion, now sits at 2-1 in district, 4-2 overall, and in a four-way-tie for second place with Richardson Pearce (2-1, 4-2) and Rockwall (2-1, 4-2). Highland Park is in first at 3-0, 5-1. The game started out it looked the Hawks would pick up where they left off in last week's 55-38 pound-for-pound victory.

The Trojans moved quickly from its own 20 to the Trojans' 18 before quarterback Kevin Rodgers was intercepted by Heath's Terrell Wilson. The Trojans drove 76 yards in nine plays, with Aldo Quiroga connecting with Al Lasker for a 10-yard TD and a receiving touchdown. The Trojans receiver Anthony Davis then fumbled the ensuing kickoff and the Trojans need just three plays to go with Quiroga taking it in from the four and suddenly it was 14-0 Smith with 4:25 remaining in the opening quarter.

The Trojans really got on the scoreboard in the second quarter after Drew Baxter picked off a Quiroga pass, leading to a six-play drive capped by Rodgers' 22-yard weaving run to the end zone with 8:36 to go in the first half. The Trojans inside the Heath 25 twice in the third quarter but a Quiroga fumble on one of the drives and three interceptions on the Hawk 19 on the other produced zero points.

Meanwhile, Heath had just a three-and-out in the third period before going 81 yards, with Lawry covering the endzone on a perfectly blocked sweep, his 11th TD of the season. The Trojans' kickoff return for a score, the Hawks had another three-and-out, eventually punting from their own 16.

The Trojans got just a 30-yard punt, the Trojans covered 53 yards in six plays with Randall Joyner powering in from the endzone with 5:51 remaining.

The Trojans on the Hawks were called for being offside on the PAT, Smith decided to go for two, with Joyner again called, plowing over from the one-and-half yard line to set what would be the final score.

In the final possession, the Hawks managed to get to the Smith 19 before a penalty and a sack set up a fourth-down conversion. Rodgers was intercepted again with only 2:35 to go.

The Trojans, who finished with a game-high 166 yards on 19 carries, then busted off a 52-yard run from his own 20 with its final first down and allow the Trojans to run out the clock.

The Trojans finished with 72 yards on 11 carries, well below his 116 yards per game average. The Trojans completed 15 of 28 attempts for 185 yards, but surrendered his third and fourth interceptions of the season.

The Trojans who came into the game averaging over 30 yards a catch on 17 receptions, finished with just four catches for 45 yards total, all in the first half.

The Trojans will host winless Royce City (0-3, 0-6) for homecoming Friday.
