Mockwall-Heath High School student Agar B. Woda and Rowlett School student Breanna N. Reed, were among more than 1,600 American high school students designated Semifinalists in the an opportunity to continue in the competition to receive one of approximately 800 Achievement Scholarship awards, worth some \$2.6

million, to be offered next spring. The National Achievement Scholarship Program, conducted by NMSC, is a privately financed academic competition that operates without government assistance. It was initiated in 1964 to recognize

These scholastically talented young men and women now have academically promising black students throughout the nation and to provide scholarships to a substantial number of the most outstanding program participants. To date, more than 29,500 young men and women have received Achievement Scholarship awards worth \$94

Approximately 1,300 Semifinalists are expected to fulfill additional requirements and advance to the Finalist level in the 2010 program. All Achievement Scholar awardees will be selected from the Finalist group on the basis of their abilities, accomplishments, and potential for success in rigorous college studies.

More than 160,000 high school juniors from all parts of the United States requested consideration in the 2010 Program when they took the 2008 Preliminary SAT/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test. To advance to the Finalist level in the competition, Semifinalists must present a record of high academic performance throughout high school, be endorsed and recommended by the high school principal, write an essay, and earn SAT scores that confirm the psat/nmsqt performance.

other basic shots will be \$8 each. All dogs and cats in the city limits are required to be vaccinated against rabies at either one one-year or three-year intervals, depending on the type of vaccine used.

In addition to shots, microchipping for dogs and cats, an advanced pet identification and retrieval system, will be available. The fee is \$20, which includes the chip and the procedure to administer it. The service will be available on Nov. 7 while supplies last.

City of Rockwall animal registrations will also be available at the clinic. For each spayed or neutered dog or cat the registration fee will be \$5 for a one-year registration and \$15 for a three- year registration. For dogs or cats not spayed or neutered the fee will be \$20 for a one-year registration or \$30 for a three-year registration. Pet owners outside the Rockwall City Limits are also welcome to request shots for their pets. Ensuring pets are vaccinated will help keep the Rockwall community safe.

Rockwall had a break in its difficult football schedule last week, but hardly took the week off.

With their leading rusher watching from the bench, and the starters taking the rest of the night off after the first play of the fourth quarter, the Yellowjackets routed Carrollton R.L. Turner 49-7 at Standridge Stadium in Carrollton.

Senior Del Myles, starting in place of the injured Josh Broach, ran for 220 yards and four touchdowns, to help RHS improve its record to 4-2 overall and 2-1 in District 10-4A. Turner dropped to 0-6, 0-3 with its 13th consecutive loss.

Rockwall took control of the game early, going 49 yards in eight plays to Myles' 5-yard run on its first possession. The lead stretched to 14-0 after one quarter, 28-0 at halftime, 42-0 after three quarters and 49-0 when Myles broke loose for a 75-yard run 12 seconds into the fourth quarter.

Myles proved that he is not just any backup, but good enough to share a starting role with Broach. He has gained at least 100 yards in three games, and has a total of 481 yards this season.

Broach, a junior, was in uniform, but didn't play. He has gained 728 yards and scored 13 times, had suffered a back injury against Rockwall-Heath six days earlier.

Head coach Scott Smith said, "Josh probably could have played. We're being very cautious."

The Jackets also want him ready to play in Thursday's 7:30 p.m. game at Wilkerson-Sanders Stadium against Richardson Pearce.

Smith and most of his staff spent Friday night at Highland Park scouting Pearce against the Scots. HP's 51-44 victory over the Mustangs and Carrollton Newman Smith's surprising 28-14 win over Rockwall-Heath left the Jackets and those three other teams tied for second place in 10-4A, a game behind Highland Park

With a loss already to R-HHS (and to 5A power Allen in a nondistrict game), Rockwall most likely could afford no more than two losses against Pearce, Newman Smith and Highland Park to finish among the four teams advancing to the playoffs from the district.

Against Turner, it was Myles' night to shine. He created two instant, one-play scoring drives by running 65 yards in the second quarter and 75 in the fourth for touchdowns. Myles scored once in each quarter, with a 5-yard run in the third set up by Adam Dingwell's 35-yard pass to Scott Loy.

"Del's a good back," Smith said. "It's been fun to watch him grow up from a freshman, sophomore, junior, senior."

Rockwall's other touchdowns came on Dingwell's 1-yard run and 35-yard pass to Will Beasley, and Spencer Edwards' 27-yard interception return on the first play of the second half.

Edwards' interception highlighted the Jackets' best defensive effort this season. Rockwall took the ball away four times and held the Lions to 297 total yards and seven points. RHS had allowed at least 26 points in each of its first four games, including 55 to Rockwall-Heath.

Part of the improvement resulted from instituting a four-man line. with Robert Hinton at tackle alongside Walter Garrett.

The line paid dividends after Rockwall's first touchdown when left end Jarrett Spencer recovered a fumble at Turner's 24 yard line. The Jackets used eight plays to get into the end zone, with Beasley running for a first down on fourth and one to set up Adam Dingwell's 1-yard touchdown run.

"We felt like we needed to go with a four-man line. We're working toward being more multiple on defense. We have more D-linemen than linebackers. We have a lot of injuries at linebacker," Smith said shortly after senior linebacker Jeff Wells passed by on crutches."

After Myles' final touchdown, the fourth quarter was Rockwall's younger players' time to shine. They included a number of sopho-

mores up from the junior varsity. Smith said, "That was fun. They did a good job. Zach Farrow looked good intercepting a pass and running it back. John Burgos

had a big hit, and Barrett Duncan." Sophomore running back Baylor Black had his first opportunity

to carry the ball for the varsity. After losing four yards on his first attempt, he bounced back to pick up eight on his final two carries.

Wilson picks up for Turner in RCA's 58-21

It was Charlie Wilson's Game.

The Rockwall Christian Academy senior scored four touchdowns as the Warriors won their TAPPS District 2-IV football opener Friday night 58-21 over McKinney Christian.

After quarterback Stephan Turner ran for two touchdowns and threw for four (including two to Wilson) in the first half, Wilson took over as a triple threat in the second half. He ran for a touchdown, caught a pass for another and played some quarterback for RCA (2-4 overall, 1-0 in the district).

McKinney Christian fell to 2-4, 0-1. The victory was a big one for Rockwall Christian, because it almost guaranteed a playoff berth in the five-team district. Because RCA has a tiebreaker over McKinney, the Mustangs would have to win one game more than the Warriors to take one of the four playoff berths. Three of last year's four state semifinalists, including Rockwall Christian, were from 2-IV.

Friday's contest at McKinney North High School seemed to be over early. The Warriors jumped to a 21-0 lead in the first quarter, and had it up to 40-0 just before halftime as they scored touchdowns on their first six posses-

The defense was just as dominant.

RCA head coach Caleb Palmer said, "McKinney is not (2008 state finalists) Canyon Creek or Legacy, but we were nervous coming in. They scored 77 points last week. Their quarterback is definitely a good athlete. We got a lot of pressure on number 5 (quarterback Thomas LeBlanc) and tackled times for 82 more. On defense, he made 11 tackles. really well."

The Warriors sacked LeBlanc five times – twice by Sherman Peoples, who also recovered a fumble and led the team with 14 tackles.

Palmer said, "For two weeks in practice, they hit hard and tackled. I was pretty upset after our game (44-41 loss) against Home School. I didn't think we tackled very well. We played soft."

However, a play that didn't even count gave the Mustangs hope that they could come back.

They were driving deep into RCA territory with just seconds to play in the first half. Turner stepped in to intercept a pass from LeBlanc at the Warriors' 9 yard line, and cutting from the left sideline over to the right, took the ball 83 yards to the MCA 8. Then he didn't get up for some time after being shaken up on the tackle.

As he lay on the ground out of bounds, the play was called back because RCA was offside.

That gave McKinney an extra play, and Alex Farley kicked a 37-yard field goal to end the half at 40-3. When the teams came back after halftime, Rockwall Christian was down to 15 able-bodied players, with just four reserves, on the sideline. Turner did not play in the second half. Elvis Below, Shelby Sharpless and Daniel Rorie also were shaken up during the game.

However, after taking the kickoff the Mustangs fumbled on their third play. RCA made one of its five recoveries of McKinney fumbles, and drove 48 yards in four plays to Peoples' 9-yard touchdown run and a 46-3 lead.

The Mustangs did have the upper hand after that, outscoring the Warriors 18-12. That was far too little, too late.

RCA had taken charge early. Rorie recovered MCA's game-opening onside kick at midfield, and six plays later Turner threw a 4-yard touchdown pass to Aaron Eastin. Turner's 36-yard TD pass to Wilson and 36-yard option run for another score, both in the last two minutes of the first quarter, gave the Warriors their 21-0 lead.

In the second quarter, Peoples' block broke Turner loose for a 24-yard touchdown run, and Turner threw scoring passes of 32 yards to Kasey Weadon and 17 to Wilson.

After Peoples' third-quarter touchdown, Wilson scored twice more on a 24-yard run and a 49-yard pass play from Eastin.

Bally Bead plans Nov. 20 workshop

Bally Bead, located at 2304 Ridge Road in Rockwall, will offer a Precious Metal Clay Workshop from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Nov. 20.

Workshop participants will explore the various methods of imprinting textures onto Precious Metal Clay, or PMC, and learn how to carve, fire and finish the material. Working with simple tools, participants will experiment with pinched, rolled and hollow forms and learn finishing techniques.

Each participant will complete two pair of earrings and a pendant. Instructor will be Merlene Walker, a native Texan who is certified to teach PMC.

PMC is a clay body that contains particles of pure silver, water and a binder. The clay is hardened by firing the object in an electric kiln or by butane torch. The fired piece becomes a solid silver object that can be soldered, burnished and treated similarly to manufactured metal.

Applications of PMC include setting synthetic stones in the clay prior to firing; formation of hollow beads; texturing; and the mixing of PMC with other clay bodies and refiring with hard enamels. PMC allows for speed and spontaneity.

Cost for the class is \$100; materials and tools cost \$30 and \$20 respectively. Half of the total cost is due at registration.
