

#Maribeth McCreary jumps into ife following cancer diagnosis

Listening to Maribeth McCreary talk about her trainer, Robert Selders Jr., it's apparent that not only did he put her back together physically after her ordeal with cancer, he put her back together emotionally, as well.

A resident of Rockwall since 1979, Maribeth raised her two sons with the help of her husband, Lyn. She was working as an accounts manager in a doctor's office in Garland in 2003 when her gynecologist discovered a lump during her physical examination.

Since Maribeth had no family history of breast cancer, she had skipped her annual mammogram the past year. Her doctor immediately scheduled her for a mammogram, which did not show any signs of cancer. Her doctor did not agree with the technician's diagnosis and asked Maribeth to return in three weeks for a follow-up visit.

By the time she returned just 21 days later, the lump had doubled in size. Her subsequent biopsy showed the presence of cancerous cells. The next step was a lumpectomy, but the surgeon was unable to get clear margins and advised her to have a mastectomy.

At this point, Maribeth confided in her Sunday school class whose members directed her to talk to two breast cancer survivors about their experience. Both women referred her to Presbyterian Dallas where Maribeth underwent a mastectomy. She elected to have reconstructive surgery at the same time.

Since Maribeth chose not to have implants, the doctor planned to perform a tummy tuck and use the excess tissue to fill the breast cavity. Unfortunately, the blood vessels in her stomach region were too small to properly support the transfer. Instead, her surgeon bisected her abdominal muscles and curved one side to replace her missing breast.

One day she stopped to get a meal at a sandwich shop in downtown Garlanc and picked up a pamphlet for CrossFit Gym. After reading the brochure she made an appointment for a free consultation with a trainer.

She made that appointment for a consultation one year ago this May and has never looked back.

Robert created modified workouts that fit Maribeth's physical condition Since she was missing her abdominal muscles on half of her body, she hac problems with balance. She also had issues regulating her breathing, so any exercise was difficult. In addition, she had neck and shoulder pain from a cau accident years before.

"One of my goals was to get my energy back," Maribeth said. "That's a big thing for survivors. Cancer takes away your energy, and it gets you down."

Robert had just completed a course in integrated movement with Dr. Evar Osar in Chicago, Ill., when he and Maribeth met.

"The science of integrated movement addresses the effects of pain on the central nervous system. Maribeth's muscles were shutting down, due to the pain she was experiencing," said Robert. "My goal was to get her more stable When she first came into the gym, just the effort of taking a step caused her ankle to shake. We needed to calm her nervous system."

Maribeth credits Robert's pre-workout massages as a key to her healing. "I had had problems with my neck and shoulder for 23 years. After three months of working with Robert, my neck is pain-free," she said. In addition she is sleeping seven hours a night and is relaxed, rested and healing.

Another benefit is that she's lost 17 of the pounds that she gained during

For six years, Maribeth suffered the side effects of the drug, which included severe bone and joint pain, weeklong headaches and sleeplessness. Finally, her oncologist took her off the regimen, but advised it might take up to a year for the drug to leave her body completely. The doctor instructed her to exercise, eat a balanced diet and get plenty of rest in order for her body to heal and fight the cancer.

However, during her ordeal with Tamoxafin, Maribeth had been unable to exercise or get an adequate amount of sleep. She had also had a hard time eating properly and had gained 30 pounds. She was becoming disheartened and wondered if she would ever feel good again.

Robert also advocates the gym's Paleolithic or Caveman Diet, which encourages a returning to the basics of: high-quality meat, seafood, in-seasor vegetables, good sources of fat and limited fruit for 30 days to reset a person's metabolism. Foods are then re-introduced, one at a time to determine the impact dairy, grains and sugar has on the body.

Robert also discourages people from weighing themselves, instead telling them to go by how they feel and how they look without their clothes on. He feels those two criteria are much better indications of a person's health than a number on a scale.

Maribeth is certainly a fan of Robert's.







Maribeth has come a long way in her fight against cancer. She feels great and is strong and confident and ready to take on the world. She not only survived cancer, she triumphed over it.


"I could not have gone through this ordeal without the love and support of my husband, Lyn, my family and my church family," Maribeth said. "They

At the completion of the program, each student volunteer will receive a certificate to document service hours provided.



On God's Word

The church dynamics...1Corinthians 12:11-13 Part 14 by Timothy W. Burnett

"But all these work that one and the selfsame spirit, dividing to every man severally as he wills. For as the body is one, and has many members and all the members of that one body being many are one body, so also is Christ. For by one spirit are we all baptized into one body, whether we be Jew or Gentile, whether we be bond or free. And have all been made to drink into one spirit." (1Corinthians 12:11-13).

According to verse 11, all nine manifestations work that one and the same spirit of God. It is commonly believed that the manifestation of the spirit is divided among different believers so that they are only able to work certain ones according to God's will. The word "dividing" in the verse is a little misleading, and is better translated "distributing." All nine are distributed to


every believer immediately when filled with the spirit of God.

Based on this information, we know that when the first people were filled with holy spirit as recorded in Acts 2:4, every one of them were given the capacity to manifest it in all nine ways. As we read through Acts, we can see all nine being worked in various situations.

The next two verses emphasize that although we are many members , we are in truth part of the one body of Christ. We were all baptized with the same spirit of God. Not one person in the world is excluded from this baptism as long as it is believed from the heart that God raised Jesus from the dead (see also Romans 10:9-10).

It's interesting to note that God recognizes only two categories of people in the world. They are Jew and Gentile. The word Jew probably referred to all people who were genetically of the line of Israel. The word Gentile referred to all other nations of people. Within these categories are they who are bound as slaves or servants, and they who are free. People who are enslaved can be baptized with holy spirit, just as people who are free.



The game was equally close, and equally scoreless. The defense was so dominant that neither team scored with any of its first four shots in the shootout. That even went into overtime, after RHS' Shelby Soldat and Frisco Wakeland's Sydney Kingston finally found the net in the shootout.

That put the game into sudden death, when the game would end after any round when one team scored and the other didn't.

In the first sudden-death round, the Lady Jackets' Savannah Warnick and her Wakeland counterpart both scored. Then came Bertrand's turn. She beat

the Lady Wolverines' goalie with a low shot, but the ball rolled into that goalpost and bounced back toward the field. Wakeland's Katey Carmichael then

took her turn. She shot the ball past Bekah Barton, the District 10-4A Defensive Player of the Year, and into the right

side of the net. Carmichael's teammates swarmed her as Barton lay prone on the artificial turf.

The Lady Wolverines were headed to Georgetown for the State Championships with what went down as a 1-0 victory. The Lady Jackets were headed back to Rockwall, with the best season in their history ended.

That's what happens with sudden death

No one died, but as the beaten-up Lady Jackets hobbled off many of them seemed to have a case of the sniffles.

In this team game, every RHS player seemed to be thinking, "If I had done this instead of that, we would have won."

Rockwall did plenty that could have won the game as it was. Wakeland had a territorial advantage for most of the day. It was playing a team without first-team All-District midfielder Kendall Smith, whose season ended with a knee injury, and with All-District performers Shelby Soldat, Allie Wentzel and Kayla Smith's legs swathed in tape. Soldat left the game

twice, apparently the Lady Jacket most affected by the 90-degree heat.

Unofficially, Barton had seven saves before the shootout began. Then she stopped four shots all by herself without 10-4A's best defense playing in front of her.

RHS had come into the weekend remembering how last year's team reached the Regional semifinals for the first time, but lost 3-0 to eventual state champion Richardson Pearce at Standridge Stadium.

That sour memory was their motivation in the semifinal game against Whitehouse Friday, April 8. That game, too, was scoreless at halftime.

Said Lady Jackets head coach Melissa Garcia, "That was one of our goals this year. We were talking all year about getting back to this stadium and this game.

"At halftime, we realized this could be slipping away. As a team, we showed a lot of heart and stepped up."

Twelve minutes later, sophomore Kendyl Pirkey, who had spent most of

the soccer season playing JV basketball, picked up the ball to the left of the Lady Wildcats' goalie, and shot it past her for a 1-0 lead.

That advantage lasted just 8 minutes, until Whitehouse scored to tie the game 1-1. Less than 2 minutes later, Rockwall took a lead it wouldn't lose again. Wentzel sent a corner kick across the goal mouth to Bethany Schomin on the left side. As the goalie moved toward Schomin, she headed the ball back into the right corner of the net.

Garcia said, "Scoring as quick as we did was important, but we realized it was not over."

Perhaps not then, but when Soldat scored on an assist from Warnick in the 69th minute, RHS was ahead 3-1. That turned out to be the final score.

"We had so much heart," Garcia gushed. "It makes me proud the way they support each other.

"Jacket Fight never dies."

Jacket Fight didn't die Saturday either. It just had the sniffles.



RC faces Friday showdown in race for playoffs bid


Time could be running out for the Royse City baseball team's playoff hopes. Or the Bulldogs could make up for lost time by winning Friday at Denison.


