Zoning districts up for discussion by McLendon-Chisholm P&Z

In preparation for the Tuesday, Sept. 15 workshop on land use with the city planning and zoning commission, McLendon-Chisholm mayor Mike Donegan last week asked fellow city council members to consider the broader vision already articulated by community leaders for the development of the city.

In August, planning and zoning chairman Troy Reich brought the council his committee's recommendation that the mile-long stretch along St. Hwy 205 between Klutts and Berry Creek, currently zoned

as a general business district, be rezoned as a downtown district. Torn between residents who do not want a downtown district literally in their front yards and those who see a need to plan for the future, newer council members called for time to study the issue.

Donegan asked council members to review the city's comprehensive land-use table, which holds to a vision of a community focused on large-lot residences of 1.5 acres or bigger.

"This gives guidance to people who want to develop and is a game-

plan for city planning," Donegan said. It is also the city's "first line of defense as for how we want our city to develop," Donegan said.

Using the example of a tattoo parlor, a kind of business described

as unwanted in the city's comprehensive plane, Donegan said that without the plan, there is no way for a city to stand up to litigation from someone who would want a permit for such a business.

Donegan asked that the council look at the plan and determine if "everybody is on board with the vision we currently have?"

Mayor pro-tem Steve Hatfield pointed out long-standing concerns of the community, including a desire to create a buffer between the city and development encroaching from its neighbors, Forney, Terrell and Rockwall and the nature of development within the city, whether it be business or high-density residential.

Hatfield repeated a call of now is the time to make the decisions saying, "When times are slow, it's a good time to sharpen your

"There is a need to consider whether one, is what we have adequate and two, respond to the planning and zoning committee request," Hatfield said.

City manager Dave Butler pointed out that the land-use plan is a dynamic document that changes with the city and its leaders. It is a "game-plan" for city policy and not an ordinance.

"We need to make sure we do school ourselves and that we not just move toward change as something to do, but move in that direction for the right reasons," council member Jess Lovell said.

McLendon-Chisholm approves new property tax rate, 09-10 budget

In its regular meeting Tuesday night, the McLendon-Chisholm city council approved its 2009-2010 budget and new tax rate without further discussion or public commentary.

The new property tax rate of \$.0975 percent per \$100 in valuation will return the city to running a balanced budget and begin replacement of depleted reserves after a year of drawing down the \$113,905 account.

In the past, the city's primary income has come from permit fees and franchise fees which are fees paid for use of city right-of-ways. In the coming fiscal year, the city expects to ad \$163,460 to its revenue budget with the property tax.

According to city manager Dave Butler, last year's deficits were primarily caused by "drastic drops in revenue from permits that would have come from developers who are now, like many of us, waiting for the economy to re-load."

With the new revenue, city leaders plan to return \$39,382 to its reserve fund and keep the budget in the black while also holding staff salaries steady and saving on other legal professional services.

With an average property value of \$274,00, the average city tax bill will be \$264.

Two fatalities reported on Rockwall County roads

Two North Texas residents died on Rockwall County roads in September. The first accident, on Sept. 2, occurred on SH 205 just south of FM 549. The second accident occurred on Saturday, Sept. 12, at the intersection of SH 276 and Wild Rose Lane, near the

Meadowcreek Estates subdivision. Details have not been released concerning the Sept. 2, which resulted in the death of a motorcyclist. The accident is still under investigation by the Rockwall County Sheriff's Office.

On Sept. 12, a Garland woman was killed in a two-car accident on SH 276 at 9:08 p.m. Road conditions at the time of the accident were wet and slick due to several days of continuous rain.

According to the Rockwall Police Department, an eastbound Mitsubishi Lancer with three passengers apparently crossed the cen-

ter line, striking a westbound Saturn and killing the 21-year old

The lone occupant of the Saturn, Kassi Denson of Garland, was pronounced dead at the scene by Rockwall County Justice of the Peace Larry Holloway. That Saturday was also Denson's 21st

The driver and passengers in the Lancer were all injured and transported by Rockwall EMS to Presbyterian Hospital of Rockwall. Names of the three were not released pending further investiga-

Responding to the accident was Rockwall Police Department Officer Donny Breyspraak. The follow-up investigation is being conducted by Paul Sturgeon, accident reconstructionist.

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

Jesus teaches disciples on the way to Emmaus

Sometime during the first day of the week after the women arrived to the sepulcher at sunrise, Jesus joined two of his disciples as they walked to a village called Emmaus. The record of this event is found in Luke 24:13-33. Starting with verses 13-24, "And behold two of them went that same day to a village called Emmaus, which was from Jerusalem about three score furlongs. And they talked together of all these things which had happened. And it came to pass, that while they communed and reasoned, Jesus himself drew near and went with them. But their eyes were holden that they should not know him. And he said unto them, 'What manner of communication are these that you have one to another as you walk and are sad?' And one of them whose name was Cleopas said, 'Are you only a stranger in Jerusalem, and have not known the things which are come to pass there in these days?' And he said unto them, 'What things?' And they said to him, 'Concerning Jesus of Nazareth, who was a prophet mighty in deed and word before God and all the people. And how the chief priests and our rulers delivered him to be condemned to death and have crucified him. But we trusted that it had been he who should have redeemed Israel. And besides all this, today is the third day since these things were done. And certain women also of our company made us astonished, who were early at the sepulcher. And when they did not find his body, they came, saying that they had also seen a vision of angels, who said that he was alive. And certain of them who were with us went to the sepulcher and found it even as the women had said, but him they did not see."

As we continue to grow in God's word and in fellowship with God, there will be times when we will not recognize the truth because we have believed something different. Cleopas and his friend were two out of many disciples who did not believe Jesus was alive. This is probably the biggest reason they did not recognize him.

Continuing with verses 25-33, "Then he said to them, 'O fools, and slow of heart to believe all that the prophets have spoken. Ought not Christ to have suffered these things and to enter into his glory?' And beginning at Moses and all the prophets, he expounded unto them in all the scriptures the things concerning himself. They drew near to the village where they were going, and he made as if he would have gone further. But they constrained him, saying, 'Abide with us. For it is close to evening and the day is far spent.' And he went in to tarry with them. And it came to pass as he sat at meat with them, he took bread and blessed it and broke it and gave it to them. And their eyes were opened, and they knew him, and he vanished out of their sight.' And they said to each other, 'Did not our heart burn within us while he talked with us by the way and while he opened to us the scriptures?"

The first thing Jesus addressed in his reply was their believing. He reproved them for not believing the earlier prophets who spoke of him. The prophets would include John who baptized with water and prepared many to follow Jesus.

After his loving reproof, Jesus began to teach out of the scriptures from Moses and all the prophets. He opened up the scriptures and helped them to see how they spoke of himself. So also can we patiently and lovingly help others see the beautiful red thread of our Lord Jesus as it strings throughout the scriptures from Genesis 3:15 through Revelation 21:21.

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
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

With the massive increases in federal spending, inflation is one of the risks that awaits us. To protect us from the political demagoguery that will accompany that inflation, let's now decide what is and what is not inflation. One price or several prices rising is not inflation. Increases in money supply are what constitute inflation, and a general rise in prices is the symptom. As the late Nobel Laureate Professor Milton Friedman said, "(I)nflation is always and everywhere a monetary phenomenon, in the sense that it cannot occur without a more rapid increase in the quantity of money than in output."

Thinking of inflation as rising prices permits politicians to deceive de Scooter Libby convicted of a felony while the press us and escape culpability. They shift the blame saying that inflation is caused by greedy businessmen, rapacious unions or Arab sheiks. Instead, it is increases in the money supply that cause inflation, and who is in charge of the money supply? It's the government operating through the Federal Reserve Bank and the U.S. Treasury.

Our nation has avoided the devastating hyperinflations that have plagued other nations. The world's highest inflation rate was in Hungary after World War II, where prices doubled every 15 hours. The world's second highest inflation rate is today's Zimbabwe, where last year prices doubled every 25 hours, a rate of 89 sextillion percent. That's 89 followed by 23 zeros. Our highest rate of inflation occurred during the Revolutionary War, when the Continental Congress churned out paper Continentals to pay bills. The monthly inflation rate reached a peak of 47 percent in November 1779. This painful

experience with inflation, and collapse of the Continental dollar, is what prompted the delegates to the Constitutional Convention to include the gold and silver clause into the United States Constitution so that the individual states could not issue bills of credit. The U.S. Constitution's Article I, Section 8 permits Congress: "To coin Money, regulate the Value thereof, and of foreign Coin, and fix the Standard of Weights and Measures."

The founders of our nation feared paper currency because it gave government the means to steal from its citizens. When inflation is unanticipated, as it so often is, there's a redistribution of wealth from creditors to debtors. If you lend me \$100, and over the term of the loan prices double, I pay you back with dollars worth only half of the purchasing power they had when I borrowed the money. Since inflation redistributes (steals) wealth from creditors to debtors, we can identify inflation's primary beneficiary by asking: Who is the nation's largest debtor? If you said, "It's the U.S. government," go to the head of the class.


Inflation is just one effect of massive increases in spending. Some might argue that future generations of Americans will pay for today's massive budget deficits. But is there really a federal budget deficit? The short answer is yes, but only in an accounting sense -but not in any meaningful economic sense. Let's look at it. Our GDP this year will be about \$14 trillion. If 2009 federal expenditures are \$3.9 trillion and tax receipts are \$2.1 trillion, that means there is an accounting deficit of \$1.8 trillion. Is it the Tooth Fairy, Santa or the Easter Bunny who makes up the difference between expenditures and revenue? Is it a youngster who is born in 2020 or 2030 who makes up the difference? No. If government spends \$3.9 trillion of our \$14 trillion GDP this year, of necessity it has to force us to spend privately \$3.9 trillion less this year. One method to force us to spend less privately is through taxation. Another way is to enter the bond market and drive up the interest rates, which put a squeeze on private investment in homes and businesses. Then there is inflation, which is a sneaky form of taxation.

Profligate spending burdens future generations by making them recipients of a smaller amount of capital and hence less wealth.

When Lyndon Johnson proposed Medicare in the 1960s, he knew exactly what he was doing. He had seen what his mentor Franklin Roosevelt had done to the American people with Social Security, a socialistic program whose ideological roots stretched back to 19thcentury German socialists.

For more than 100 years, Americans had lived a way of life in which they kept everything they earned and decided what to do with their own money - save, invest, spend, donate, et cetera. The thought that government should take care of people or force people to care for others was anathema to our ancestors.

There was neither income taxation nor coercive redistribution of wealth. Our American ancestors wanted no part of the socialism that was sweeping the rest of the world. They placed their faith in themselves, freedom, free markets, and God. The result was not only the wealthiest society in history but also the most charitable. It also produced the finest health-care system in the world - one without any government involvement.

Along came Franklin Roosevelt, who understood that if he could just get Americans dependent on socialism, they would never be able to wean themselves off it. His actions were much like those of a heroin dealer - get the customer dependent on the heroin and he'll be a nice and docile supplicant forever.

Johnson knew that Medicare would do the same thing. Judging from the deep-seated fear of today's senior citizens that their Medicare coverage might be tampered with, who can argue that Johnson was

Fourth Argument Against Socialism

A fourth argument against socialism is that it turns into a war in which everyone is doing his best to get into everyone else's pocketbook, while doing everything he can to protect his own pocketbook from being plundered.

As Frédéric Bastiat put it so well, under socialism the government becomes a great fiction by which everyone is trying to live at the expense of everyone else. How can a society survive when everyone is warring against everyone else?

There is only one real solution to all this. It requires people to regain their faith in themselves, in freedom, in free markets, and God. It requires that they reject socialism and uproot the faith they have placed in the state and in coercion. It requires a repeal, not a reform, of all socialist programs, including Medicare.

It could be an interesting matchup when Rockwall-Heath and Hillcrest, two of the top ten 4A defensive teams in yards allowed in the Metroplex, meet at Franklin Field tonight in both team's final non-district action.

Fresh from a 26-10 win over Arlington Seguin, Heath (1-1) which is ranked eighth, allowing 216 yards per game, could have the upper hand, however, when it comes to offense against the Panthers (0-2), who are ranked sixth, yielding an average of just 184 yards of total offense.

The Hawks, who are ranked 12th in yards gained per game with 430, are averaging 28 points a game while Hillcrest is scoring at just a 10.5 points-a-game clip, having found the endzone just three times in their two losses.

Heath, meanwhile, has two runners, senior Jesse Irokwe and sophomore Dorian Lawry, who are averaging 93.5 and 79.5 yards, respectively.







Rockwall Police to boost vehicle theft prevention

The Rockwall Police Department and the Texas Automobile Burglary & Theft Prevention Authority will team up to offer free VIN etching on the window glass of vehicles from 8 a.m. to 2 p.m. Saturday at 24-Hour Fitness in Rockwall.

VIN etching, according to a news release issued by the police department, is the process of acid stenciling a vehicle's 17-number identification number onto window glass. The stencil is relatively

small and does not hamper the view through the window in any way or detract from the look of the vehicle.

Samples of the etching will be available for viewing on site.

By having the VIN etched in a vehicle's window, law enforcement officials hope to reduce auto theft in and around the Rockwall area. Many thieves will steal a vehicle and change its identity by removing the VIN plate on the dashboard and replacing it with a different


one before selling the stolen vehicle to an unsuspecting buyer. By having the identification number

placed on parts of a vehicle, thieves who might war identity will be deterred knowing they will also have all the window glass in addition to the dashboard VI

Also, law enforcement will have an easier time identifying a VIN-etched vehicle since the identific: readily available on multiple parts of the car.

VIN etching qualifies insurance consumers for a L discount, which can result in a 2 percent to 10 perc the comprehensive portion of an insurance premit who have the VIN etched on their vehicle's class form to provide to their insurance company notifying the process has been completed.
