

Rockwall City Council considers change to restaurant bar hours

A request by the management of a local restaurant to amend local alcohol ordinances to allow late night hours was held over for further investigation by the Rockwall city council at its first meeting of the new year.

Mark Nguyen of Agave Restaurant, located in the Harbor, brought the request to change the hours a restaurant with a bar can be open from the current closing time of midnight to a proposed 2 a.m. on Friday and Saturday nights. He said Rockwall restaurants with bars are losing late night revenue when they have to close their doors at midnight, usually with a full house. Nguyen said those patrons are crossing Lake Ray Hubbard into Garland, Rowlett, Mesquite and other local cities that allow for a 2 a.m. closing time for their establishments.

"There's a safety issue because at midnight they have to cross the lake to go to other bars. They aren't going home," Nguyen said.

RCN offers special fund raising campaign for county schools

A special subscription campaign has been announced by Rockwall County News publisher Wesley W. Burnett, offering all Rockwall County schools a fund-raising opportunity for the remainder of the school year.

The campaign includes Rockwall ISD, Royse City ISD, Heritage Christian Academy, Rockwall Christian Academy and The Fulton School.

"We're pledging 50 percent of new subscriber payments collected by any participating county school or its designated organization," Burnett emphasized. The special campaign offers new subscribers a two-year mailed subscription for only \$30. "Each participating school will earn \$15 for each new subscriber," Burnett added.

Schools or school organizations interested in participating should contact Rockwall County News subscription coordinator Sandy Webber at 972-722-3099.

"This is a great way to assist our school programs and provide a valuable benefit to new subscribers," Burnett said.

Robert LaCroix, City of Rockwall Director of Planning, said the Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission (TABC) defines "late night" as 2 a.m., although special exemptions are allowed under certain circumstances. He also said that within those parameters, the city council can define late night hours to meet the city's needs.

Councilperson Margo Nielsen addressed the issue of public safety during the discussion, asking Assistant Police Chief Kirk Riggs if late night calls in the Harbor district could go up with a 2 a.m. closing time. He said it is hard to address whether the police department would receive more calls if the hours were extended on the weekend, but added that it is a possibility.

Nielsen said she "has a problem with extending the hours so people can drink more and drive. It just doesn't have a good flavor to it. I'll have to think more on it."

Nguyen reminded the council that the restaurant business in the Harbor district tends to have seasonal highs and lows. "We have seasonal traffic. In the winter we have less dining. If we're open two more hours at night, we could benefit from those sales."

Cecil asked if the 2 a.m. closing time would affect the TABC food-to-alcohol sales ratio requirements. LaCroix said the restaurants with bars would have to reapply to TABC for a new late night liquor license, but the 50-50 food-to-alcohol ratio would still be in place.

Nguyen said that after his restaurant's kitchen closes at 10 p.m. to dining room meals, it still cooks "bar food" until midnight. He said even with a 2 a.m. closing time, those snack-type of foods would continue to be sold, therefore still meeting the food sales require-

Councilperson Glen Farris asked Nguyen if he knew how many of his patrons were from Rockwall versus cities across the lake. Nguyen said he didn't have any data to show where guests were coming from, but he estimated 80% were from Rockwall. Farris also asked if Nguyen knew who his competitors were and which area cities allow a 2 a.m. closing time. Rockwall City Manager Julie Couch said staff could research surrounding city ordinances to see who allows a 2 a.m. closing time and other issues involved in that allowance.

Farris then made a motion asking city staff to do that research, create a sample ordinance for Rockwall and look into the dollars involved in a later closing time. He also asked if staff could talk to other restaurants in Rockwall for their thoughts on the issue. Couch


Blood Drive set for January 17

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
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

In other business, Roger Hamm of Speed Fab Crete gave an update on the construction of the city's two new fire stations. He said a total of 122 piers for both stations have been poured, fire hydrants have been set, water lines installed and water samples taken. The under-floor drains have been placed at Station #3, with storm sewer pipes recently installed at that location.

The January construction schedule includes the installation of under-floor drains at Station #4 and grade beams at both stations. Hamm said crews hope to have phone and power conduits and pre-liminary work on the floating floors at both locations done by the end of the month.

Hamm said construction is approximately two weeks belt schedule, due to the holidays and recent bad weather, but crews I work to catch up to meet the June 2009 completion date.

The city council also approved a resolution establishing a seen member Main Street Advisory Board. Rockwall was recent named a Main Street City by the Texas Historical Commission. I local board will work with state advisors on a plan of action to vitalize the historical downtown area. 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
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
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Sheriff to address American Legio

appointed time. That time came while Simeon sat patiently. He was given revelation that he would not die until he saw the Messiah. God led him by the spirit into the temple and eventually showed him the child.

Next he took the child in his arms and began to prophesy as recorded in verses 29-35. What an up-lifting moment for Joseph and Mary. They watched and listened as a prophet of God spoke of the child as "A light to lighten the Gentiles [Isaiah 42:6], and the glory of God's people Israel." He prophesied that the child was set for the fall and rising again of many in Israel that the deepest thoughts of many might be revealed. Moreover, Mary's whole heart would be pierced also. No Teaching economics

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Many professors, mostly on the liberal side of the political spectrum, nong the thousands who went through my classes, who can say, Professor Williams used his class to proselytize students."

While acceptable at most universities, it is nothing less than academic shonesty to do so. Like others I have my own values and opinions, ich as those expressed in some of my nationally syndicated columns, it they never become a part of classroom discussion.

Learning how to think straight, as opposed to what values and pinions to hold, is the crucial part of education. Part of that learning to be able to understand the distinction between subjective atements, for which there are no commonly accepted standards of oof, and positive statements for which there are.

For example, the statement "Scientists cannot spit the atom" is a ositive statement because if there's any disagreement, there are facts which we can appeal to settle the disagreement. Just visit Stanford's near accelerator and watch them do it. By contrast, the statement scientists should not spit the atom" is a subjective statement.

There are no facts to which we can appeal to settle any disagreement. isagreement can go on forever. A fairly good proxy for whether a atement is subjective is the presence of words such as should and ight. This lesson is closed by telling students that it is not being iggested that they purge their vocabulary of subjective terms such should and ought because they are excellent tools to trick others into oing what you want them to do. However, in the process of tricking hers, one need not trick himself.

A related lesson is dealing with terms such as better and best and orse. This lesson might be approached by my asking students which the best system for resource allocation: capitalist, socialist or ommunist? After several fall for my bait, I tell them that the correct

response is to tell me it's a nonsense question. It is akin to asking their physics professor: Which is the best state: a liquid, gaseous, solid or the their classrooms to proselytize students. I have taught economics plasma state? However, if the physics professor were asked: Which is r the past 40 years and challenge anyone to find even one student, the cheapest state to nail a nail into a board? He could answer the question and probably say that it is the solid state. Going back to the question about capitalism versus socialism and communism, asking which system maximizes personal liberty and societal wealth, the answer would be capitalism, at least here on Earth.

> Another pitfall to straight thinking is sometimes called the cause and effect fallacy. That fallacy is made when a person sees event B coming on the heels of event A and then says A caused B. There may no causal relationship at all. Such is the case when the rooster crows and shortly thereafter the sun rises.

> That is easy to see but many historians assert that the 1929 stock market crash caused the 1930s Great Depression. Little is further from the truth. Instead, it was caused by inept fiscal, monetary and regulatory policies of the Hoover and Roosevelt administrations.

> There are a number of other pitfalls to straight thinking that I lecture on as introductory material before we begin to explore economic theory. I tell students that if they hear me say something subjective, without my having prefaced it with "in my opinion," they are to raise their hand and tell me that they took my class to learn economics and not to be indoctrinated with my values.

> Personally, I want students to share my values that personal liberty, along with free markets, is morally superior to other forms of human organization. The most effective means to accomplish that goal is to give them the tools to be tough, rigorous, hard-minded thinkers and they will probably reach the same conclusions as I have.

The Bailout State

Ours is the Age of the Bailout. Bailing out failing companies is not new, but today the scale is unprecedented and the opposition is scant. The government today is committed to more than \$7 trillion in various forms of stock purchases, loans, and guarantees. The Treasury secretary has been given awesome discretionary power to buy bad securities or shares in banks. The Federal Reserve now lends money to investment banks, not just commercial banks. It is also now buying securities that have no market value.

The idea that in a market-oriented society there are profits and losses seems passé, at least if you run a large enough company. And most people seem to accept this.

Maybe we ought to think about what we are getting ourselves into. Do we really want to live in a country where people assume that business failures will be imposed on the taxpayers? Such an assumption would influence behavior in the worst possible way, leading to recklessness, waste, and falling living standards.

Then, to minimize abuses, the government will be called on to regulate our economic activity even more than it already does. By logic the Bailout State leads to the comprehensive regulatory state. If we are going to catch you when you fall, politicians will say, we are going to restrict what you do in order to reduce the chance of your falling. Once the discipline of profit-and-loss disappears, the discipline of government will take its place. It won't be pretty.

Which brings us to the recent bailout of automakers. Did we really want a Car Czar in the United States? The idea should be revolting. From the television and newspaper reporting, you'd think General Motors and Chrysler together equal "the U.S. auto industry." Every day we heard debate over whether the government should save this industry. You had to remind yourself that there are thriving car makers in the United States today.


They have foreign names — Honda, Toyota, Nissan, Hyundai, Volkswagen, and more — but they build cars in America and are profitable. They aren't asking for handouts. As a matter of fact, the subsidies to the Big Three could have been regarded as aggressive protectionism detrimental to the foreign-owned competitors. Whenever governments in other countries do such things, American competitors scream bloody murder. Would someone have brought a complaint against the U.S. government to the World Trade Organization?

No one expects a high level of economic thinking from the general public, and unfortunately its ignorance is encouraged by commentators in the mass media. In the public discussion of the proposed auto bailout, it was rarely asked what economic activity we'd have to do without had the Big Three gotten the billions they sought. If you ask the average person about this, he is likely to ask in return, "What do you mean?" Like it or not, we live in a world of scarcity. A quantity of steel used to make a car cannot be used to make a washing machine. The same is true of labor and all industrial inputs. A firm is an arrangement of scarce inputs directed toward making a particular product. There are always many other ways we might use those resources.


How do we decide how they are used? In a market economy, consumers register their preferences through the price system by what and how much they buy — and what they don't buy. Profit-seeking entrepreneurs rearrange the resources, to the extent possible, in order to satisfy consumers' most intense preferences first.

When a company is failing, it's a signal that consumers want its

resources used by someone more competent or in some other way. But when government steps in and "saves" the company, it is telling us to shut up and be happy with how things are. Bailouts are the government's way of violating consumer sovereignty and wasting scarce resources. Lady Bulldogs stretch streak to 6 games, take consolation title

Royse City has emerged from a crowded pack in the District 10-4A girls' basketball standings to show it poses the greatest threat to division-leading Rockwall.

The Lady Bulldogs did that the hard way Tuesday. They went on the road, overcame a 22-10 first-quarter deficit and battled back after losing a late lead for a 76-73 overtime victory at Highland Park.

RC, HP and Carrollton Newman Smith had been tied for second place with 3-1 district records, a game behind Rockwall. But the Lady Bulldogs' head-to-head victory, coupled with RHS' 74-35 dismantling of Newman Smith, left them as the only team within a game of the Lady

"It was crazy, but it was a good game," said Lady Bulldogs head coach Dallas Bookout. "It was what you expect when you're playing

Royse City kept alive an impressive winning streak - stretching it to six games, with only one at home. That came about after RC (19-4 overall) lost their opening game in the Dallas ISD Coca-Cola Tournament to West Mesquite.

Bookout said, "We didn't do well in that game. We said then that our only goal was to go 4-1 and win the consolation bracket."

That's exactly what the Lady Bulldogs did, rolling over Dallas Bryan Adams, Fort Worth Brewer, South Grand Prairie and Odessa.

Bookout said, "On the last day, we were the only 4A team still playing in the tournament." The consolation final was no contest. RC defeated 5A Odessa 49-23, with Kellie Wyrick scoring 18 points.

The story of the tournament was Lady Bulldogs guard Raven Alexander, who made the all-tournament team after scoring 68 points on Dec. 30 alone. She poured in a career-high 43 in an 87-59 rout of Brewer and 25 to lead a come-from-behind 59-50 victory over South

"She was unbelievable," Bookout said. "She made five 3-pointers, and we made nine 3s as a time. When we shoot the ball like that, we're hard to beat."

At Highland Park, Alexander again was Royse City's leading scorer (22 points), but she and the Lady Bulldogs got off to a terrible start.

The Lady Scots (15-7 overall) scored the first six points, all on fast breaks. Wyrick and Taylor Howard brought RC back within a point at 11-10 midway through the first quarter, but HP went on an 11-0 run to lead 22-10 after eight minutes. Alexander didn't score in the quarter.

Bookout said, "They did a great job pushing the ball. We were a little lazy, and we weren't ready for that. Usually we're the team doing that. But they win the state cross country ever year for a reason; they can

That comeback began in the second quarter, when Royse City's press bothered Highland Park. By outscoring the Lady Scots 15-2 in the last 3 ½ minutes, RC turned a 32-21 deficit into a 36-35 halftime lead. Alexander scored seven of those points.

The Lady Bulldogs really seemed to take control in the third quarter, stretching the lead to 47-38 before Highland Park tied the game with a 9-0 run.

After that, the largest lead was HP's 57-52 advantage with 4:23 remaining in the fourth quarter. Again, Royce City battled back. Alexander scored nine points to give the Lady Bulldogs a 65-63 lead with 14.3 seconds to play, but Emily Boone sent the game into overtime by making two foul shots with 7.2 remaining.

Highland Park went ahead 73-69 with 2:17 to play in overtime, but RC scored the final seven points. Taylor Howard made her fourth steal of the game and fed Tayler Young for the basket that put Royse City ahead to stay 75-73 with 1:29 remaining. Wyrick added a foul shot.

HP still had chances to tie the game, but the Lady Bulldogs' defense prevented scoring leader Stephanie Dekkers, who made five 3-pointers, from getting a chance to try another.

Royse City had plenty of contributors. Young scored 6 of her 16 points





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in overtime, and also made four steals unofficially. Wyrick pulled down 16 rebounds and blocked five shots. Howard had five assists. Bookout also pointed out Ariel Freese, who scored 11 points and had five rebounds.

"She had a real rough game against Rockwall-Heath (a 47-41 victory Saturday), and we were pretty hard on her. She was one of the ones who went out because she was sick. She came back and was getting aggres-


The record shows that the Rockwall boys won one basketball game and lost the other during the past week, but even the victory wasn't satisfying.



Despite shooting just 33 percent from the field and turning the ball over 25 times, Walker sees some improvement in the Lady Hawks.

Pearce could have sympathized with the Jackets. The same thing had happened to the Mustangs 3 ½ weeks earlier when North Dallas was a no-show for a game in the Carrollton-Farmers Branch Tournament.

The Bulldogs haven't won a game even when they have played, but that's not an excuse for causing opponents and their fans a wasted trip. "I hope something is done about it," Simmons said.

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
