M-C bond for new city hall increases to over \$2M

The City of McLendon-Chisholm met, Tue. Feb. 10, 2015 in the city hall building.

The council approved the minutes for the meeting held Tue. Jan. 27. Highlighting the Jan. 20 meeting was a report by City Financial Advisor Boyd London about the bonds for building a new home for the city council.

London explained that the "original bond amount increased to 2.125 million due to City Hall Bids coming in higher than anticipated."

Raymond James was engaged to sell the bonds, which "sold in the amount of \$2,090,000 at 2.88%." Raymond James Financial is a Florida

> London clarified that the city's AA-rating made the fixed interest rate low enough to allow for quick sale of the bonds.

> Mayor pro-tem Steve Hatfield moved to adopt the ordinance authorizing the issuance and sale of City of McLendon-Chisholm, Texas Combination Tax and Limited Surplus Revenue Certificates of Obligation, Series 2014, and levying an annual ad valorem tax to provide for the security and payment of the certificates.

The ordinance passed 4-1, with council member Gary Lovell casting the opposing vote.

There are no records indicating that the city published legal notices related to the ordinance and the sale of bonds.







Romans 6:3 says, "Know ye not, that so many of us as were baptized into Jesus christ were baptized into his death?"







The selection was made by a National Board that is chaired by the U.S. Department of Homeland Security's Federal Emergency Management Agency and consists of representatives from American Red Cross; Catholic Charities, USA; National Council of the Churches of Christ in the USA; The Jewish Federations of North America, The Salvation Army; and, United Way Worldwide. The Local Board was charged to distribute funds appropriated by Congress to help expand the capacity of food and shelter programs in high-need areas around the country.

A Local Board made up of Rockwall Ministerial Alliance, Red Cross, United Way, Catholic Charities, Rockwall Indigent Health Care, Salvation Army, et al., will determine how the funds awarded to Rockwall County are to be distributed among the emergency food and shelter programs run by local service agencies in the area. The Local Board is responsible for recommending agencies to receive these funds and any additional funds made available under this phase of the program.

Under the terms of the grant from the National Board, local agencies chosen to receive funds must: 1) be private voluntary non-profits or units of government, 2) be eligible to receive Federal funds, 3) have an accounting system, 4) practice nondiscrimination, 5) have demonstrated the capability to deliver emergency food and/or shelter programs, and leduty to his Maker in 6) if they are a private voluntary organization, have a voluntary board. Qualifying agencies expected to be defici are urged to apply.

Rockwall County Local Board 8332-00 has distributed Emergency Food and Shelter funds previously with the Rockwall County Committee on Aging participating. This agency was responsible for providing Emergency Food Boxes to 170 families in September.

Public or private voluntary agencies interested in applying for Emergency Food and Shelter Program funds must contact Local Board chair Mark Irons at 3375 Ridge Road, Rockwall Texas, 7503 for an application. The deadline for applications to be received is March 18, 2015.






