### **Blackland-Northeast Gateway Toll Road** issue resurfaces before Royse City Council

The first item on the agenda for the Royse City Council meeting Tuesday, Oct. 28, was that of the new employee, Dallas Cline, to the Royse City Police Department.

He and his wife of 10 years, Teresa, have three children.

During the citizens' participation portion of the council meeting, the topic of the controversial Blacklands-Northeast Gateway Toll Road opposition resurfaced. The citizens' participation portion of the meeting is designed to limit participants who have signed up to three minutes to speak on a subject not listed on the agenda; however, no action or discussion may be taken on the items.

According to the Open Meetings Act, "The act allows the public to observe the open portion of a meeting. However, the attorney general has concluded that the Act does not give members of the public a right to speak on items considered in an open meeting. Such right only exists if a specified state law requires a public hearing on an item or if state law requires public comment to be allowed on an issue."

At the Oct. 14 meeting, Bryan Slaton, the local grassroots coordinator and spokesperson for the coalition of the proposed Gateway Toll road, signed up to speak but because he does not live within the city limits he was not allowed to speak. Mayor Jerrell Baley, the presiding officer of the council, chose to allow only Royse City residents to speak. Thus, the toll road matter was not addressed.

This week, however, Baley was absent and Mayor Pro Tem Janet Nichol, allowed Slaton to address the council, along with citizens Keith Clinard of Royse City, Linda Knight and Sandra Ritzmann, both of Wylie, and Rede Beitman of Plano. The proposed Northeast Gateway Toll Road, if built, will affect far more cities

that just Royse City. Slaton began by telling the council, "The toll road is not dead. There has been much speculation in the media that because so many protests had been held and nine cities have now passed a resolution against the building of the road, with Caddo Mills in the process of passing the resolution, that the issue is dead. Fate, Josephine, Lavon, Nevada, Rockwall, Sacshe, Wylie, Princeton and Rowlett all have voted no to the issue, with more still to vote.

"We aren't against roads and progress, but are against toll roads," Slaton said. "The toll road has been put on a 10 Plan of Consideration, but it can be brought back up at any time, so it is not over, nor is it dead. Both candidates running for Texas governor, Wendy Davis and Gregg Abbott, are against the toll road."

The others who spoke after Slaton reinforced their fears and grievances against eliminate domain and all the land, water, air and in general, free space, the toll road will eliminate.

After the citizens' participation had ended, Councilman Tom Crowley asked if there wasn't something in the Code of Conduct section of the Royse City Charter that says that only citizens of the city of Royse City can speak before the council. Jason Day, attorney for Royse City, hopefully will have an answer at the next meeting.

Carl Alsabrook, city manager, announced the construction of Wal-Mart is scheduled for Dec. 12.



### **Nebbie Williams and** Boys, Girls Club praised

During the regular city council meeting on Monday night, Mayor David Sweet read proclamations declaring November 3, 2014 as Nebbie Williams Elementary School Recognition Day and Boys & Girls Club of Rockwall County Recognition Day

In the proclamation, Sweet praised Nebbie Williams for STAAR results, with 94 percent reaching the "met standard" level and 37 percent achieving "advanced" rating.

Nebbie was also commended for raising more than \$28,000 during its annual Walk-a-Thon which took place on Friday, October 24th. Students walked, ran, and cha-cha-ed around the school in celebration for all of their hard work fundraising. The money raised will benefit Nebbie and Nebbie students throughout the school year.

Nebbie Williams was also praised by the council for its active role in volunteer programs and clubs, as well as its running club, which meets weekly to run and train for local 5K races. The club now has 85 active members.

The B&G Club was commended on its ability to engage youth from nine different Rockwall ISD schools, and a growing membership that includes a daily attendance that has doubled since 2011.

According to the proclamation, since 2011, total membership has grown from approximately 300 youth to over 780, with average daily attendance increasing from 70 youth per day to over 150 per day during the school year.

In the proclamation, the organization was reported to have 95 percent of its members attend at least three times per week, with 75 percent attending at least twice each week. The club's youth participate in Drug & Alcohol Prevention programs, and leadership programs.

Mayor Sweet also proclaimed November 2014 as November in the city of Rockwall to encourage all male to take the time to participate in prevention screenings for the sake of their individual health and for the well-being of Rockwall families.

According to the proclamation, one in two men will be diagnosed with cancer in their lifetime, with 1 in 7 men being diagnosed with prostate cancer in his lifetime; prostate cancer is the second most common cancer among men in the United States and testicular cancer is the most common cancer in American males between the ages of 15 and 35.



## McCarron addresses DAR's national defense lune

Dr. Bill McCarron served as speaker at the Rock Wall Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution's Nov. 1 National Defense Luncheon.

McCarron, a Rockwall resident, spoke to the chapter regarding the country's national defense during the Vietnam War. His speech, Vietnam at 50, touched on multiple topics, including the war's 1965 beginning; language barriers; technical knowledge vs. agricultural knowledge; strategic objectives; and books, movies and songs recalling the war.

A retired Air Force lieutenant colonel who was awarded a Bronze Star for his service during the Vietnam War, McCarron earned his doctorate from the University of New Mexico and taught at the Air Force Academy for 12 years. He later served as a professor at Texas A&M-Commerce for 21 years prior to his retirement in 2008.

McCarron recently published a book, "Civilizing the Texas Frontier," which chronicles the lives of Mr. and Mrs. James Lowry Smith, early settlers of Amarillo. The book is tied to the numerous evolving civilizing elements of the Texas frontier, including the West Texas roots of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

He previously has published a monograph on the Vietnam War and a collection of short stories.

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





20, Congress declares November 11, 1921 a legal Federal holiday to honor all those who participated in the war. The ceremony was conducted with great success.

Congress adopts a resolution in 1926, directing the President to issue an annual proclamation calling on the observance of Armistice Day. Throughout the 1920s and 1930s, most states established November 11 as a legal holiday and at the Federal level, an annual proclamation was issued by the President.

Congress in 1928, passes legislation on May 13 making November 11 a legal Federal holiday, Armistice Day. The United States has no 'actual' national holiday because the states retain the right to designate their own holidays. The Federal government can in fact only designate holidays for Federal employees and for the District of Columbia. But in practice the states almost always follow the Federal lead in designation of holidays.

World War II and the Korean War create millions of additional war veterans in addition to those of the First World War already honored by Armistice Day.

On June 1, 1954 President Eisenhower signed legislation changing the name of the legal holiday from Armistice Day to Veteran's Day. In 1968, Congress passes the Monday Holiday Law, which established the fourth Monday in October as the new date for the

observance of Veteran's Day. The law took effect in 1971. Legislation passed in 1975, to return the Federal observance of Veteran's Day to November 11, based on popular support throughout the nation. Since the change to the fourth Monday in October, 46

states had either continued to commemorate November 11 or had reverted back to the original date based on popular sentiment. The law took effect in 1978. Veterans Day is not to be confused with Memorial Day,-a common misunderstanding, according to the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs. Memorial Day (the fourth Monday in May) honors American service members who died in service for their country or as a result of injuries incurred during battle, while Veterans Day pays tribute to all American veterans-living or deadbut especially gives thanks to living veterans who served their country honorably during war or peacetime. United States Senate Resolution 143, which was passed on Aug. 4, 2001, designated the week of Nov. 11 through Nov. 17, 2001, as "National Veterans Awareness Week." The resolution calls for educational efforts directed at elementary and secondary school students concerning the contributions and sacrifices

There are approximately 23.2 million military veterans in the United States.

As of 2008, 2.9 million veterans received compensation for service-connected disabilities. Texas has approximately 1.7 million Veterans. too much for them and it was time for the law to step in. The result was the Uniform Time Act of 1966. Beginning in 1967, the act mandated standard time within the established time zones and provided for advanced time: clocks would be advanced one hour beginning at 2:00 a.m. on the last Sunday in April and turned back one hour at 2:00 a.m. on the last Sunday in October. States were allowed to exempt themselves from DST as long as the entire state did so. If a state chose to observe DST, the time changes were required to begin and end on the established dates. In 1967 Arizona and Michigan became the first states to exempt themselves from DST. Michigan decided to follow the crowd in 1972 and observe DST. In 1972 the act was amended allowing those states split between time zones to exempt either the entire state or that part of the state lying within a different time zone. The newly created Department of Transportation was given power to enforce the law. As of 2014 the following states and territories are not observing DST: Arizona, Hawaii, American

Samoa, Puerto Rico, and the Virgin Islands.

The federal law that established "daylight time" in the United States does not require any area to observe daylight saving time. But By 1962 the transportation industry decided the inconsistency was if a state chooses to observe DST, it must follow the starting and ending dates set by the law. From 1986 to 2006 this was the first Sunday in April to the last Sunday in October, but starting in 2007, it is observed from the second Sunday in March to the first Sunday in November, adding about a month to daylight saving time.

According to a survey done by Rasmussen Reports from 2013 found that only 37% think DST is worth the hassle. That's down from 45% in 2012. Forty-five percent of those surveyed don't think the clock-changing ritual is worth it, but 19% are not sure.

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



After the break, Rockwall reclaimed the lead off two runs by Warren and entered the fourth quarter up 43-41 score. Pecora nailed a 22-yard field goal attempt, but following a Raider scoring drive, Rockwall found themselves down 46-47 with 6:47 remaining in the contest.

Castille caught a 51-yard pass from Jones and completed a twopoint conversion to take the lead, and following a fumble recovery by Veasley, Warren put Rockwall up by 14 with a one-yard run with 3:54 remaining.

Tyler Lee (4-5, 3-3), who was fighting for one of the two final playoff spots, added one more scoring drive with a 12-yard touchdown pass, but Rockwall held on to clinch the 61-54 victory. Tyler Lee now has to defeat Naaman Forest on Thursday and hope for a Rowlett win over 1-7
