Rockwall Breakfast Rotary Club's Dallas Race Week continues with more than 50 competing yachts

The 2011 Dallas Race Week began on Father's Day and has continued through the week with festivities pivoting around The Harbor. More than 50 yachts launch out onto Lake Ray Hubbard, sailing within close view of The Harbor between 7:15 p.m. and 7:45 p.m. daily.

The annual fundraising event raises money for programs addressing poverty, hunger, illiteracy and health care affecting our community," said Rockwall Rotary's communications coordinator Trenton Cornehl.

"We believe our motto Sail into Service represents the value placed on teamwork by sailors and community servants throughout history," he said.

Top sailors from around the area, including world champions, national champions, Olympic sailors and regional champions are racing intensely to win the final prize.

Dallas Race Week has an event history going back to 1982, always bridging the week of Summer Solstice in June and held on Lake Ray Hubbard. Over the years, it has evolved into a charity event to benefit the Rockwall Breakfast Rotary Club.

The weeklong event will culminate in an assembly on Friday night after the race ends at around 8 p.m. or 8:30 p.m. Guests will have the benefit of

refreshments from Rockwall's own malt shop, while a live band plays blues music in the amphitheater. Sailboat dealers will be on site with new yachts to test sail, and the Hilton and other Harbor tenants will have partnered in the event to make the most of its many amenities.

At around 9 p.m., the Rotary Club will hold the iPad2 drawing, and announce the community grants made possible by this fundraiser and other efforts throughout the year.

A significant portion of proceeds from Dallas Race Week will be given to local charities.

Historically, the raffle ticket sales have been a highly successful part of the fundraising effort, accounting for more than half of the money raised in the event. Dallas Race Week chair Bill Bricker reported ticket sales are better than ever this year.

"We had to order another set of raffle tickets," he said.

Aside from the two iPad2s donated by the Park Place developer, other raffle prizes include a room at the Hilton and other gift certificates. Tickets will be available for sale at the finale event at a booth next to the stage.

Police pursue leads in Rockwall bank robbery

The Rockwall Police Department continued to investigate a bank robbery that occurred June 14 at the Community Bank in the 200 block of East Kaufman Street.

Shortly after 11 a.m., a young man entered the Community Bank and presented a teller with a note demanding money, according to police reports. The man fled the bank with an undetermined amount of money.

The suspect may have fled the scene in a silver pickup truck that was seen parked near the location. He did not display any weapons, and no one was injured.

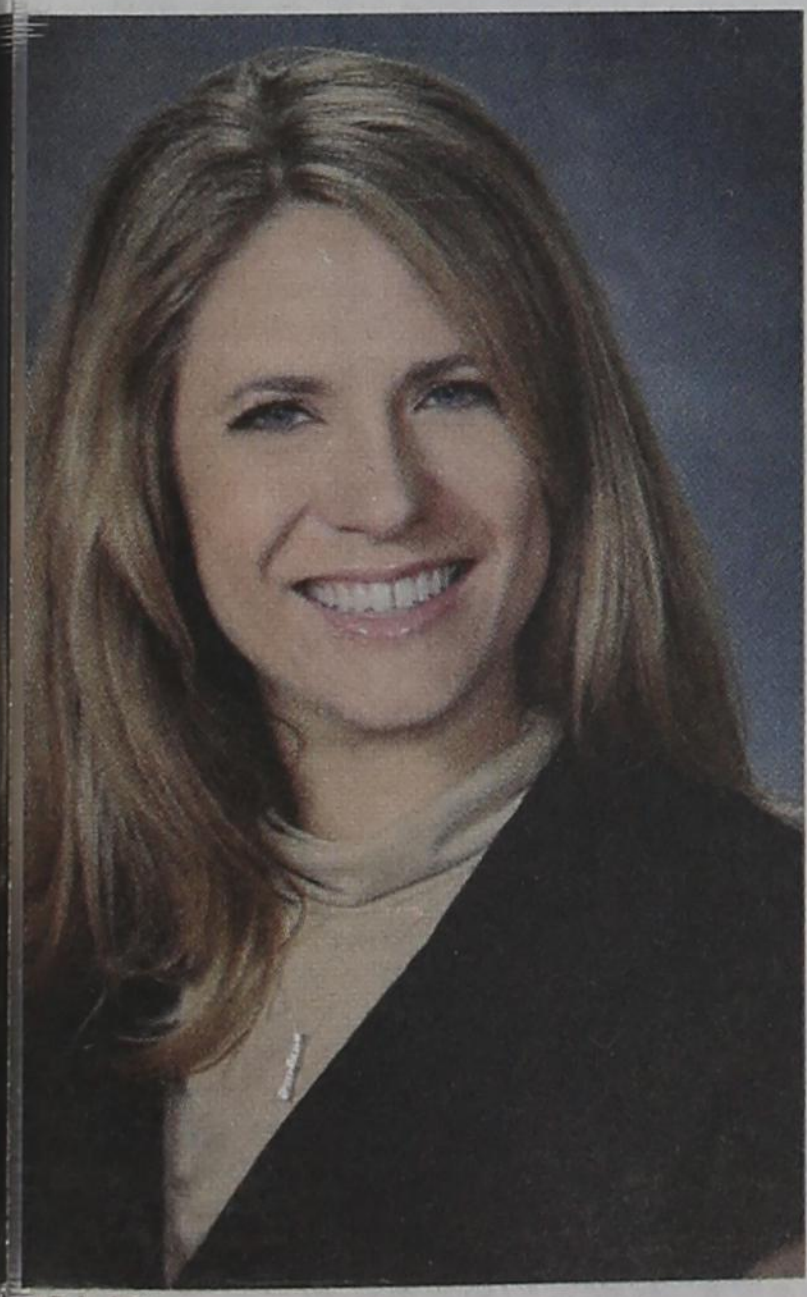
The suspect, described as a Hispanic or light-skinned black man with a thin build and short hair, wearing large-gauge earrings with clear stones.

According to Rockwall Police Sgt. Jeff Welch, investigators are pursuing a number of developments in the case.

"The head detective is following up on some promising leads," Welch said on Tuesday.

Rockwall Police officials indicated this is the first bank robbery for the city in 2011. A week ago, Rockwall Police released a photo of the suspect from video captured by security cameras during the robbery.

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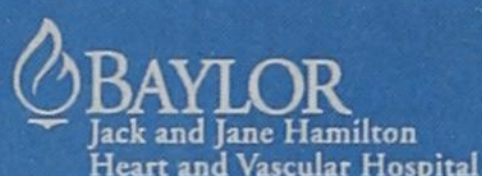
“When my heart suddenly stopped at the finish line, Baylor brought me back to life.”

Trainers from Baylor SportsCare were stationed at the finish line and were able to act quickly and restart his heart using an automated external defibrillator. “Baylor literally saved my life,” he says. As a preventative measure, Matt had an internal cardiac defibrillator implanted at Baylor Jack and Jane Hamilton Heart and Vascular Hospital. The device monitors his heart and will shock it back into normal rhythm if an abnormality is detected. “Luckily it hasn’t had to trigger yet, but if it does, I know I’m protected.” Matt has resumed running, lifting weights and playing with his two young children. “I’m living life to the fullest. Thanks to Baylor, I can.”

The final public hearing, involving a request for a Special Use Ordinance to allow the expansion of an existing mini-warehouse facility on Rockwall Road, was continued to the July 5 meeting.

Among action items, council considered an ordinance that would allow a super-majority for approval. A public hearing was duly announced and held at the previous council meeting to consider a Special Use Ordinance allowing a snow cone stand at 2002 South Goliad. No one came to speak against the ordinance at that time, but the city later received a letter from the shopping center owners, objecting to the temporary ordinance. Council passed the ordinance 4 to 2.

The consent agenda was approved, and one other major item was discussed before council. Raymond Turco of Turco & Associates made a presentation on the results of the 2011 Citizen Survey. The survey results revealed several ironies, such as the difference in ratings for individual city services.

“People who didn't use the services had a higher opinion of the services,” reported Turco.

Landing at the bottom of the satisfaction survey were cable services, citizen communication efforts, and neighborhood street lighting. However, 83 percent of participants were satisfied with road improvements. Overall, he reported that the survey showed increasing satisfaction with the quality of life in Rockwall, with traffic and transportation improvements a necessary area of emphasis.

“Over all the things that have happened, locally...nationally,” as he summarized the survey. “The positive ratings have stayed high and the city should be applauded for this.”

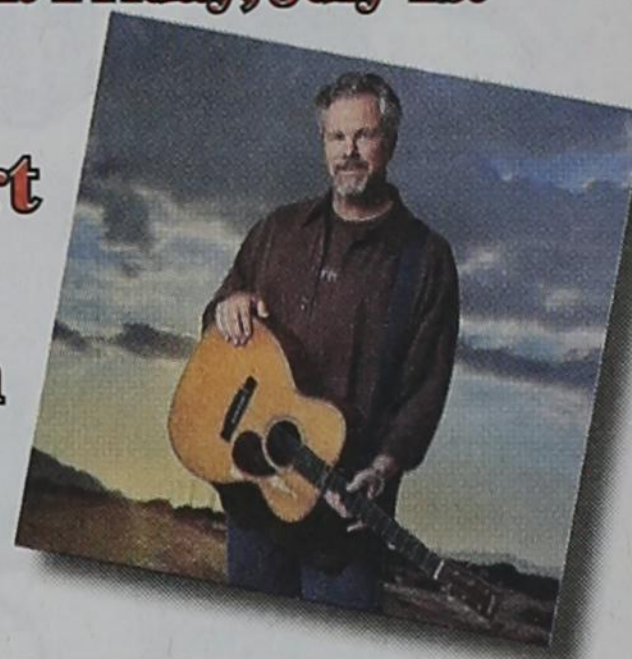

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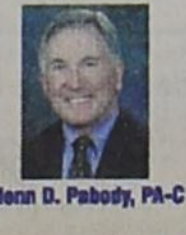


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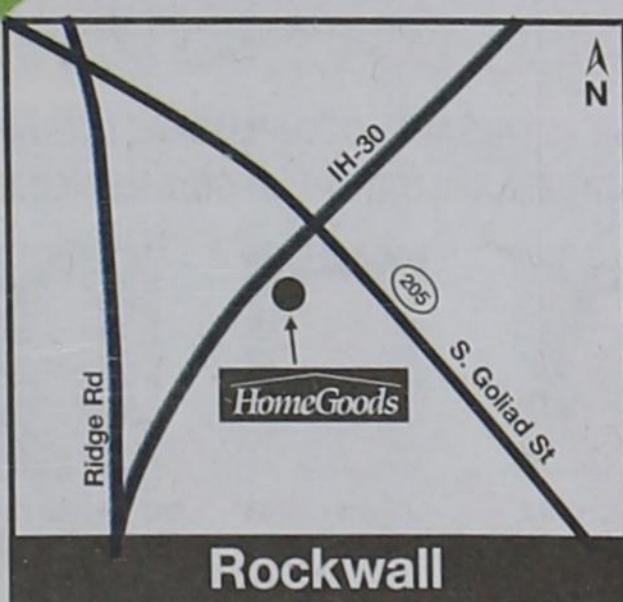

Grand Canyon trip more than vacation for Roysse City student

MiKindzi Shanks, a first-year American Sign Language student and ASL president at Roysse City High School, will go to the Grand Canyon July 3 through Aug. 6. She will accompany 15 other deaf students.

MiKindzi is one of two hearing participants scheduled to attend Hear the World Sound Academy sponsored by Phonak Hearing Aid Co. She is the only student from Roysse City chosen to participate.

MiKindzi began her interest in ASL when her cousin, Lucas Hunt, 4, of Roysse City was diagnosed with Noonan Syndrome. Noonan Syndrome is considered to be a type of dwarfism that causes many other problems, such as a webbing of the neck and congenital heart defects. It also causes learning problems, which include a significant speech delay. Because of the speech delays, he was taught to sign.

"He signs faster than me now," MiKindzi said. Her teacher, Laurie Kobe, nominated MiKindzi for the trip to the Grand Canyon. Kobe is in her second year of teaching ASL in Roysse City. In fact, she piloted the

program in Roysse City.

Kobe is hard of hearing and her grandfather taught her to sign as deaf. While attending college, she realized there was a real need not only for the deaf community, but for the hearing community as well. Seven years in the Greenville Independent School District doing

Kobe said the reason for the trip is to research sound and the ment and collect data with a sound scientist in order to help hearing people.

"The application process is a lengthy one," she said. "About 100 people applied for the trip, so it is very competitive."

MiKindzi wrote four essays to qualify and was chosen. Approximately a week before the planning stage began, she received the news she would be going on the trip after all.

About the application process, MiKindzi says, "I think a big kids who apply is they don't really have a deaf community where they have never really experienced it. It's kind of overcoming the barrier other people who are deaf. They are trying to emerge and understand to be deaf and for other people to be deaf."

Twice a month, the participants converse via Skype, a computer program that allows free video chatting online. They strategize and plan their trip. The trip will not be over once she gets home. MiKindzi has a positive attitude. She will work 80 service hours preparing a program in order to educate the hearing and what that means. She plans on going to all the schools in order to rally awareness.

People who are hard of hearing generally choose hearing aids or cochlear implants. Cochlear implants are usually placed if a person is profoundly deaf. "A person who has an implant will never hear again without the implant," Kobe explained. She went on to say "The wire inserted into the cochlea, for purposes, ruins it. 'The magnet seen on the outside of the scalp is not a cochlear implant. Whether they are better or worse than a hearing aid is based. A cochlear implant is not a cure nor a miracle ear and it's not know it's only another form of amplification."

Kobe suggested people who are deaf should embrace it and be proud of it. The Well in downtown on Main Street offers deaf chat the last Friday of the month. The next chat will be at 6:30 p.m. June 24.

MiKindzi's desire is to study medicine, chiropractic in particular. She wants to understand what the deaf community is like and how to help them. She wants to bridge the gap between the deaf and hearing communities and understand being deaf.

Enforcement of the Transportation Code

separate messages I posted to Governor Rick Perry. They important issues that have been taken lightly over the license and registration of automobiles. The Transportation Code is enforced over the years. The name of the Title itself clearly reveal that the scope of the Code is limited to entities that use the roads and highways of Transportation as "Operators" of "motor vehicles" that with the State. These entities are not authorized to use the ways for Transportation without applying for an Operators License, which is required to carry the Operators License, which is required to show the license when ordered to do so by the "operator" was changed during the early 1960s to the term "operator" began to treat all people who were driving if they were required to have a State issued "drivers license" was changed, NOT by amendment, but through the Code. The Construction Code does NOT change the original and scope of the original terms in the Code. So, to this day, "operator" legally means "Operator." Texas are choosing to NOT have a "drivers license." so courageous as to rescind not only their "drivers license" but also the registration of their automobiles. The State Code enforcers are

faced with the troublesome decision of what to do with people who choose to be free, by not applying for State license and registration. It appears the enforcers are trained to use the power of custodial arrest by stopping the traveling public, and ordering them to not drive under threat of arrest and imprisonment, until they get their drivers licenses. They are impounding people's automobiles until they are registered. People have to pay lots of money to defend them selves and get their cars back. In essence, it can be said that even in America and Texas, there has been a heavy price to pay for liberty. This is absolutely wrong and contrary to the basic principles of liberty and limited government power that our country was established upon. The legislature understood the basic right to travel. There is no statute that requires the traveling public to apply for a State issued "drivers license" in order to drive their cars. And the scope of the Transportation Code is not all encompassing to include all automobiles moving on the roads and highways of Texas (including the Registration requirement and the traffic codes). It is limited in scope to Transportation. Please read in full, the two separate messages I sent to Governor Rick Perry (see below). Sincerely, Tim Burnett

The drivers license:

Please issue a directive to the Department of Public Safety to cease and desist all attempts to enforce non-existent statutes!

- The traveling public is not required to carry a State issued drivers license in order to drive their automobiles.

Transportation Code Sec. 521.001. DEFINITIONS. (a) In this chapter:

- "Driver license" means an authorization issued by the department for the operation of a motor vehicle. The term includes:
 - a temporary license or instruction permit; and
 - an occupational license.

Sec. 521.021. LICENSE REQUIRED. A person, other than a person expressly exempted under this chapter, may not operate a motor vehicle on a highway in this state unless the person holds a driver license issued under this chapter.

The term "operate" fits with the term "Operator." The term "driver" license replaced the term "operator" license during the early 1960s. The Construction Code was used to make this change, and does not change the original meaning and intent. The "Operator" was and still is any Transportation company under the scope of the U.S. Transportation Code that "operates" a fleet of motor vehicles that use the roads and highways of Texas for the purpose of Transportation.

Notice in the definitions that the term "drivers license" includes either a "temporary license or instruction permit" or an "occupational license." This fits with the next chapter related to Commercial.

There is no statute requiring the traveling public to be issued a "drivers" license by the State in order to "drive" their automobiles.

Therefore, DPS Troopers and all other law enforcement officials lack any authority from the people to force the traveling public into applying for a "drivers license," through the use of custodial arrest and threats of imprisonment and trial. All officials who attempt to force the traveling public into getting a drivers license commit "official oppression."

Registration of automobiles:

The traveling public is free to NOT register their automobiles with the State. Only Transportation carriers and other Transportation for-hire companies that are required to apply for an "Operators License" are required to

Register their fleets of "motor vehicles" with the State

The term "Transportation" as used in the Title of the Code, is not defined in the Texas Code. It is defined in Black's Law Dictionary. The scope of the Code is established under the U.S. Transportation Code.

No place in the Statutes or Black's Law Dictionary, remotely suggests that the traveling public (we the people) fall under the scope of the Transportation Code. This would include the Registration requirement found in Transportation Code Chapter 502.002.

Sec. 502.002. REGISTRATION REQUIRED; GENERAL RULE. (a) The owner of a motor vehicle, trailer, or semitrailer shall apply for the registration of the vehicle for:

As the Governor, you are the controller of the government. Therefore, you are authorized and have a duty to direct the Department of Public Safety to limit enforcement of the Transportation Code only to those entities that fall under the scope of the U.S. Transportation Code. That being Transportation Carriers and other Transportation for-hire companies that use the roads and highways of Texas for the purpose of Transportation as Operators of fleets of motor vehicles.

The traveling public is at liberty to travel freely in automobiles that are not registered with the State. Any time a DPS Trooper or other law enforcement official sees an automobile traveling along a road or highway without license plates and registration sticker, they must allow that automobile to continue traveling without using the power of custodial arrest and attempting to generate a citation and eventual complaint. They have no authority to enforce the Transportation Code upon entities that do not fall under its scope.

End of messages to Representative Laubenberg and Governor Perry.

All sheriffs, constables, other code enforcement officers, judges and government attorneys are strongly urged to study the State Constitution and Statutes in order to determine whether they are following the law and enforcing the Statutes rightly.

Look for the Statute that requires anyone to apply for a "drivers license." Go to the definitions and read the meaning of "drivers license." The Codes speak clearly for themselves.

Study the meaning of the term "Transportation" used in the Title. This will help to understand its limited scope and enforcement power. Black's Law Dictionary is available in most libraries and county buildings. Look up the word "carrier" in Black's.

If the Transportation Code is limited in scope to "Transportation," then all travelers who are not using the roads and highways for "transportation" are not under the enforcement scope of the Code if they have not applied for an "Operators License" (aka, drivers license) and/or have not registered their automobiles with the State. These travelers are in fact at liberty to travel, regulated only by common law, not statutory rules and regulations.

It is so very important to understand the limited scope of the Transportation Code, and to distinguish between entities who are under its scope, and they who are free from its scope.

In closing, law enforcers have all encompassing authority to intervene where travelers and/or transportation carriers, busses, taxis and motorcycles are clearly driving dangerously. One example is swerving in and out of lanes while attempting to drive excessively faster than others in busy traffic.

They have authority and an obligation to handle and investigate accidents. These examples do not require statutes. They simply fall under common sense or Common Law.

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20 teams set for Rockwall State Qualifying Tournament

Top high school football players will be coming to Rockwall Saturday for the 1-30 7-on-7 State Qualifying Tournament.

The event is so big, with 20 teams, that it has spilled over to Garland. By the time it's over, you could see 9 of the 64 teams (14 per cent) that will compete in the Division I state tournament July 15 and 16 at Texas A&M University in College Station.

Seven teams - Rockwall, Tyler Lee, Dallas Jesuit, Arlington, Arlington Lamar, Plano West and Fort Worth Paschal - already have qualified for the state tournament. The other 13 will be competing to reach the final game for one of two qualifying spots in the state event.

At Rockwall-Heath High School in Pool D will be Garland Naaman Forest, Southlake Carroll, North Mesquite and Jesuit.

Pool E, consisting of teams that all have qualified, will be at Homer B. Johnson Stadium in Garland. Arlington, Arlington Lamar, Fort Worth Paschal and Plano West will be keeping ready without tipping their hand to possible state-tournament opponents.

The semifinals are scheduled for 2:30 p.m. on the RHS turf field, with the final game set to follow.

Cummings in "Wiley" and Lawson and "Respite" were Fleet.



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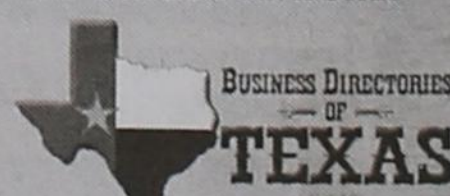
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Cindy Paris is new COO of Texas Health Rockwall
