As a newspaper publisher and as a woman, Jane Gorden Bounds opened doors and forged new paths that many follow to this day. Although she did not push for change by being loud or demanding, her professional manner, quest for excellence and expectations of equality earned her the respect of her peers and set the standard by which many in Rockwall County still set their sights.

She died Feb. 12, 2012.

Services were conducted on Thursday, Feb. 16, in the M.L. Jones Chapel at First Baptist Church in Rockwall. Officiate was the Rev. Mark Irons. Private burial followed. The Rest Haven Funeral Home-Rockwall Chapel was in charge of arrangements.

Heath sets elections, plans for water use

The Feb. 7 meeting of the Heath City Council was again observed by a local Boy Scout working on his citizenship badge. Jacob Hogue, a freshman at Rockwall Heath High School, is a member of Troup #314.

"We'll try to keep it civil," Mayor John Ratcliffe said lightheartedly amidst applause for the young man.

The consent agenda included three items pertaining to two elections that have been called and are set for May 12. Consent agenda items typically do not warrant any discussion unless it is requested by council or citizens. There was no discussion on these items and all were approved unanimously by the full council as all were in attendance.

The first resolution calls for a general election for the purpose of electing a Mayor and two council members. Last week Ratcliffe announced that he is not seeking re-election after serving four terms.

Feb. 4 was the first day open to file for a place on the ballot. Mayor Pro-Tem Lorne Liechty has announced his intentions to seek the office.

The same resolution also states that council Places 3 and 5 will be included in the May 12 election. Place 3 is held by council member Julie Zurek, who has filed for re-election. Place 5 is held by Liechty, who will not run for re-election and instead campaign for mayor. Heath citizens John Curtis, a member of the Park Board, and Brian Berry, a member of the Special Events Board, have filed as candidates for Place 5.

The last day to file for a place on the ballot is March 5.

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

ockwall council tackles bond issues, animal euthanasia plan

ockwall City Council voted Feb. 6 to place a \$52 million bond which includes a much discussed \$12 million athletic complex, ay 12 General Election ballot. A standing-room only crowd was on ffer overwhelming support for the facility, despite the reservations il member Michelle Smith.

said she is concerned about putting the additional tax burden on luring a time of economic hardship.

aders, we have to make tough choices. I'm not opposed to ball m opposed to this complex," she said.

said she has suggested that instead of spending millions of dollars ipletely new facility, the city first look at renovating and expanding public baseball complex, Tuttle Field. Supporters of the bond have d a new state-of-the-art facility could draw teams and tournaments ockwall area, possibly generating tens of thousands, if not millions, s in revenue from rental fees, hotel use, meals, and entertainment

said she would like to see if those dollars materialize before asking s to foot the bill for a complex of the magnitude being discussed. also suggested instead of placing the financial burden solely on the s of city of Rockwall citizens, the council seek a joint venture with County and the other four cities within the county to help pay for

are the citizens of the city of Rockwall having to bear the burden for plex when the people of the county are going to be benefitting from plex?" Smith asked.

Supporters of the proposed complex were many and very vocal throughout the proceedings. Many were parents of former and current ball players who said they looked to outlying cities for sports teams to play on because of a lack of adequate facilities within Rockwall. They also gave the council a long list of surrounding cities that have up-to-date sports facilities and estimated revenue generated from tournaments.

"We have a beautiful Harbor, a beautiful courthouse, football stadium and aquatics center," said Rockwall resident Jeff McMurtrey. "We need a beautiful sports facility for our kids. We need it on the ballot so people can

Rockwall Baseball Association president Jami Werth said, although there is never a good time to spend this kind of money, especially with the economy in such bad shape, she views a new athletic complex "as an investment."

"For the cost of one Starbuck's latte a week, our kids can benefit from a nice park," Werth said. "I am willing to spend \$250 a year on my children and your children." In addition to the athletic complex, the bond package includes three

additional projects: \$4.9M for Heritage Park; \$19M for street and road improvements; and \$10.2M for downtown improvements. The council passed the resolution to place the bond package on the May 12

ballot by a vote of 6-1, with Smith voting against the proposition. **Animal Euthanasia**

In a unanimous 7-0 vote, the council decided to postpone any action on the proposed animal euthanasia policy at Rockwall Animal Services.

Supporters of animal rights continue to express concern over wording of the proposal and question the suggested 90 percent live outcome requirement, in addition to other details of the plan.

Council member Margo Nielsen made a motion for the postponement which gives the council a longer time to discuss the details with the community and to have a workshop or meeting with council members and city staff to fine-tune the plan.

The motion passed 7-0 and will be discussed again at the March 5 city council meeting.

Comprehensive Plan

The council unanimously approved appointing a citizens committee to assist with review of the city's Comprehensive Plan. The suggested seven member group will work with staff to review the plan, which has been on the books for 12 years, and bring its report to council within 30 days.

Council members may appoint a member to the committee or they can appoint themselves.

Council members approved spending \$131,000 to build a 27-space parking lot on Storrs Street to help with the lack of adequate parking on the downtown square. The money will come from the city's reserve fund.

The parking lot will be built on land the city currently owns on Storrs Street, just south of City Hall. City vehicles that currently park at The Center on Washington Street will be relocated to other parking spots, freeing up an additional 16 spaces for shoppers' convenience.

The parking lot is needed as downtown improvements are bringing more shoppers to the area and with the Department of Motor Vehicles moving downtown, more and more cars are vying for the limited spaces each day, according to council ember Cliff Sevier.

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

On God's Word

Know The Love of God

According to God's word, His love casts out fear (1John 4:18). God wants us to experientially know His love (1John 3:16). This can be understood more perfectly by studying God's love toward Jesus Christ. During the time of the Gospels God loved His son, and He was faithful toward His son. God's integrity is directly related to His love. In John 3:35 the prophet John declared how the Father loves the son. According to John 8:29 Jesus emphasized that God was with him. The problem rests in the translation. In Gospel Light, author George Lamsa explained that the translators included the Aramaic words due to uncertainty of meaning. He also revealed the more accurate meaning. The word Eli meant "my God." The word Lamana was pronounced Lmna, and was a declaration of "for this purpose." The root of "sabachthani" was shbk and meant to spare, leave, reserve or keep. Based on this research, Jesus' words are better translated, "My God, my God, for this purpose was I spared!" Jesus Christ knew the purpose of his crucifixion and death. During the most difficult and excruciating time of his life, Jesus Christ sucked in one of his last breaths of air and loudly gave a cry of victory. God did not leave His son alone. Jesus knew this better than anybody else. In John 16:32 Jesus said, "...yet I am not alone, because the Father is with me." Just as God never left His first-born son alone, so also will He never leave His beloved children alone. There is no fear in God's love. But the perfect love of God casts out fear.

Jesus was extremely anxious over what he was about to experience. Just prior to being arrested, Jesus prayed fervently three times asking his Father God to let the cup pass by him. In other words he was asking to not have to experience the persecution and death.

After pouring his heart out to God, Jesus meekly said, "not my will be done, but your will be done." Jesus wanted to let God's purpose be accomplished. Jesus knew that his suffering and death would be directly related to God's love. Jesus spoke the truth earlier when he said, "For God so loved the world that He gave His only begotten son, that whoever believes on shall not perish but have everlasting life" (John 3:16).

Boan gets 50 years and \$100,000 fine for cocaine possession

A Rockwall County jury convicted a Georgia man Feb. 7 for possession intent to deliver cocaine/over 400 grams, according to a news release from district attorney's office.

The jury deliberated for less than an hour to determine punishment for Jo Lee Boan, 44. 





ARE TOOTH IMPLANTS APPROPRIATE FOR CHILDREN?

CUSTOMER NOTICE INCORPORATED AREAS OF THE MID-TEX DIVISION

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On January 31, 2012, Atmos Energy Corporation, Mid-Tex Division ("Atmos" or "the Company"), filed a Statement of Intent with each City served by the Mid-Tex Division (hereafter "Affected Cities") with the exception of the City of Dallas. The Company's Statement of Intent proposes to increase its gas rates and implement a new schedule of rates and riders applicable to all customers within the Affected Cities. The proposed effective date of the requested rate changes is March 6, 2012. If approved, the proposed changes will affect approximately 1,194,420 residential, 100,461 commercial, and 705 industrial & transportation customers.

If approved, the proposed rates will increase the Company's annual revenues by \$49,080,069 or 4.36%, including gas costs, or 11.94% excluding gas cost. The proposed change in rates constitutes a "major change" as that term is defined by Section 104.101 of the Texas Utilities Code. In addition to the rate changes, other proposed tariff changes include revision of the Company's residential and commercial rate schedules (Rates R and C), as well as its Rider WNA and Rider GCR to change the current billing rate basis from Mcf to Ccf. The Company further proposes to revise the Rider GCR to: (1) remove the 2009 interest rate reference, (2) clarify that the calculation of (b) Pipeline Cost is inclusive of interest, and (3) update the Upstream Pipeline Charge Allocation (Factor D). Atmos also proposes to modify its Rider WNA to update the heat load and base load factors. The Company further seeks to implement a new Rate Review Mechanism ("RRM") tariff, as well as a new conservation and energy efficiency tariff ("Rider CEE"). In addition, the Company seeks to recover all of its rate case expenses and all city rate case expenses as allowed by law. The exact amount will not be known until the case is completed.

Based on the proposed rate design, the average monthly bill for each customer class within the Affected Cities will change by the amount and percent shown in the table below:





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Fulton's 1st playoff win ever leads to bigger challeng

If there's no place like home, The Fulton School could be on the road to big things in this season's TAPPS 1A boys' basketball playoffs.

The Falcons would play the first game at their adopted home at the Forney Sports Center since Jan. 27 if Saturday's Area playoff game against Fredericksburg Heritage goes on as tentatively scheduled at 4 p.m.

County government responsibilities: Part 1

One of the requirements the state mandates is that the commissioners ourt of a county shall provide "safe and suitable jails for the county." The il must be located at the county seat and the operation of the jail is the sponsibility of the sheriff.

We have a jail in our county. It has the capacity for 243 inmates of which separate housing wing is available for 48 females. This facility provides I of the jail space for the entire county. No city need have a jail of their wn and there is no charge to the cities for inmates placed in the county jail; owever, there is a \$75 booking fee for inmates brought in by officers from eath, Rockwall and Royse City.

This year the annual county budget for operating the jail is \$5,388,996 f which almost \$4.2 million is personnel costs. Seventy jailers and support aff work in the facility and it is, of course, operated 24 hours a day, 365 Three meals a day are fed to the inmates and while they are in the jail, their

ledical needs are addressed. The county spends about half a million dollars ach year on medical care for the prisoners and surprisingly, only about half is amount is spent on food for the inmates. Standards and method of operation of jails in Texas are established by the

ommission on Texas Jail Standards and this organization closely monitors

le operations of the jails to insure consistency and compliance. Our county jail, on average, has about 180-190 inmates at any one point time. Several years ago the trend in crime was upwards and an evaluation as started on possible future expansion of the jail facility. However, that pward trend stopped and across the state, in fact, the trend was reversed. tudies are still being conducted here in the county to insure needed capacity available if once again the rate increases.

Fortunately, or maybe unfortunately depending on how you view the issue f spending county taxpayer dollars for housing prisoners, only about 24 ercent of the inmates in our jail are from Rockwall County. While highway 30 going through Rockwall County is a big economic plus, it also brings ssociated crime, especially drug related cases of both use and transport of legal drugs through the county.

So how does someone end up in jail and what's the process once they are

If people are arrested in Rockwall County they are brought to the jail by ie arresting police person. They may be arrested for anything from public intoxication at The Harbor to murder; they all end up at the jail.

First they are booked by one of the jail detention officers. This is where the personal data on the individual is obtained and where they go through an initial evaluation as to their physical condition and where they should be placed in a cell, e.g. in an isolation cell, with other prisoners in a 24-person module, etc. Next it's to a shower and a change of their clothes for jail supplied underwear and orange jumpsuits. Then they are placed in a jail cell.

This cell is where they will spend their time until released. They eat in their cell, they sleep in their cell, they go to the bathroom and use the shower in their cell and they get very bored in their cell with essentially nothing to do. Three times a week they are allowed to go to an outside exercise area for one hour. The remainder of the time is spent in the cell.

The morning after one is arrested, one of the county justices of the peace or a magistrate will go to the jail and set bond for the inmate. This gives the individual the ability to bond out of jail until they go to court on their arrest charge. This means they have the opportunity to deposit a sum of money with the county that will guarantee their appearance at court on the prescribed date. If they show up when required, the money is returned; if not, the money is forfeited and the individual is arrested again and back to jail usually with no opportunity to bond out again.

After the JP sets the bond for the person arrested, the individual either pays the bond or they remain in jail until they go to court and their case is addressed. Time in jail at this point can range from several weeks to months depending on the case and the work load in the courts.

Eventually the individual appears before a judge and either a trial is held to determine guilt or a plea is entered by the defendant where he or she admits guilt. If a trial is held and the person is found not guilty, they are immediately released. If they plea or if they are found guilty, then they are sentenced by the judge. This can range from probation with no more jail time to a jail sentence with a specific length of time. Depending upon the length of the sentence and the offense for which the person was found guilty, they will spend their jail time in the county jail, the state jail facility or the state penitentiary. None of them a place where you want to go for an extended vacation.

Jails -- a necessary evil in a civilized society. Do all you can to make sure you don't end up as a guest in our necessary facility here in Rockwall


