Ralph Hall honored with unveiling of sculpture, 'The Congressman'

A sunny day greeted the family, friends, coworkers and admirers who gathered at 2 p.m. at the Rockwall County Courthouse, Sunday, May 3, to honor long-time Congressman Ralph Hall.

Several hundred people gathered to celebrate the unveiling of a bronze statue of Hall, located in the lobby of the Rockwall County courthouse.

Robert Summers of Glen Rose, a nationally known artist, created the sculpture, dubbed "The Congressman."

The celebration marked Hall's 92nd birthday. As Hall walked from the courthouse, toward the podium to speak, the crowd burst into song of "Happy Birthday," led by the Rockwall-Heath High School Jazz Band.

As Hall began to speak, he slowly looked over the many who had gathered for the occasion. He commented that they all are his friends. He thanked them for letting him serve the country and the people he loved. Tears could be seen in the eyes of many in the audience.

Master of ceremonies for the celebration was Rockwall businessman Dwayne Cain. Cain and Sharon Satterwhite, his executive assistant, began planning this celebration more than 2 years ago.

Scout Troop #421, represented by Cade Whitson, Jack Stelmar and Sean Clements, presented the posting of the colors.

The pastor of Hall's church, the First United Methodist Church of Rockwall, Dr. Joe Pool, gave the prayer.

State Representative Bryan Hughes read a letter from President George W. Bush.

Presenting the governor's recognition was Dee Duncan representing the Texas Governor's Office from the Office of State-Federal Relations, Washington, D.C.

County Judge David Sweet presented Hall with the County Commissioner's declaration of "Congressman Ralph M. Hall Day."

The keynote speaker was to have been former Congressman Kent Hance, but after he was detained, Cain stepped in for him.

Remarks and memories were shared by Captain Gene Cernan, a former astronaut who was pilot of Gemini 9, Lunar Module Pilot of Apollo 10, and Commander of Apollo 17; Congressman Joe Barton; Congressman Eddie Bernice Johnson; and former Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes. A State Legislature Resolution was given by State Representative Dan Flynn and a letter from the U. S. senior senator from Texas, John Cornyn, was presented by former staffer of Congressman Hall, Aaricka Oliver.

Rick Avery, county relations officer for the Texas Association of Counties, presented Hall with a picture.

Although Hall is officially a former congressman, in the hearts of many across Rockwall County, the State of Texas and even the nation, he always will be known as "The Congressman." One of the many reasons for this distinction is that Hall, who represented Texas' 4th District in the United States House of Representatives, was the oldest member of Congress when he was serving his 17th term at the age of 91. Hall spent 34 years serving the citizens of Texas and the nation.

On God's Word

God did not give the spirit of fear ...

The May 3, 2015 military operation that occurred in Garland, Texas brings out a topic of spiritual significance for the lives of Christians and all people in communities -- fear and security.

The combination of the shock & awe effect of a shoot-out involving mysterious domestic enemies, and the peaceful security from the protectors, can bring the anticipated response of freezing-up, mistaken judgement, making imprudent decisions, losing sight of truth and reality, and unwillingness to find and see the truth.

It becomes more difficult to recognize, consider and investigate a possible relationship between the "protectors" and the "enemies," even after it is revealed that the enemies were being monitored in advance by the protectors. Such considerations become forbidden in the society.

They do not think to question why the protectors destroyed important evidence. What kind of communications existed between the enemies and protectors prior to the shooting? Is there a private relationship between the proclaimed enemy and the protectors, sharing a mutual cause?

Because of the the security forces' readiness and quick response, people are put at ease, and lose the desire to question.

Jesus taught about the enemy, "the adversary comes not but to steal, kill, and destroy" (John 10:10). They roar like the lion (1 Peter 5:8). In contrast, "God has not given the spirit of fear [timidness], but of power, of love, and of a sound mind." (2 Timothy 1:7).

Street conditions topic at Roysse City Council meeting

The City Council of Roysse City once again heard citizens' complaints about the condition of the city's streets at the council's most recent meeting.

On Tuesday, April 28, during the Citizens' Participation period of the council meeting, two speakers signed up to speak. Ted Capehart told the council he had counted 216 patched places in the pavement on Josephine, Peterson, Wood, Live Oak, Walnut and Church streets and County Line Road. He said some of the places were as wide as 50 feet by 6 feet and were where the street had been dug up to repair water and sewer lines. Some of the places were patches over patches, where the same place had been dug up several times.

Capehart said he has experience in writing grants and would help the city research on the grants available to help get engineering studies done on the streets of the Heritage District.

The Heritage District is the portion of Roysse City that is bounded north to slightly beyond County Line Road, on the east by Josephine Street, Serrells Road and Barton Street, on the south by East and West Old Greenville Road and on the west by South and North Houston Street. Most of this area was the original Roysse City and many of the homes are a rich part of the city's history. Over the years, the streets have deteriorated, many faster than the city could repair them.

Al Moine, the second speaker, said she was speaking on behalf of her mother-in-law, David Jones, who could not be present because of a prior commitment. She read his statement to the council.

According to his words, Jones bought his home at 113 West County Line Road located in the Heritage District 16 years ago and since then this area of town has been "put on the back burner." He, too, asked the council to consider the streets of the Heritage District for repair.

At the meeting, City Manager Carl Alsbrook said, "No streets have been designated for reconstruction. The council has talked about the condition of several of the roads but no decisions have been made as to which will receive the attention."

He said that when Janet Nichols becomes mayor of Roysse City after the May general election (although Roysse City will not have an election because there is no opposition for city or school board seats), she might contact a workshop for the council members to discuss the situation.

"Any major repair of Roysse City's streets -- well, we'll have to borrow money," he said. "But for right now, we're just in the planning stages. Nothing is being decided at this point."

Potholes are a weakening of the asphalt surface, usually resulting in a pothole in the road.

Total reconstruction means that water and sewage lines, curbs and gutters are replaced then a new concrete street is poured. This is the most permanent and most-desired solution, but is also expensive, especially considering that almost every street in the Heritage District is in bad shape.

Members of the City Council of Roysse City were present for the meeting.

The next council meeting will be at 7 p.m. Tuesday, May 12, at the Polk and Courts Building, 100 W. Main Street.

Of the 30 students who qualified to compete, 28 presented speeches on the listed topic: bully-free zone. They represented 14 school districts in 10 ESC areas.

There were 96 competitors at the regional level, and each of the 30 regional winners will receive a \$50 check for advancing to the state competition. Winners represented the Granbury, Texas City, Dripping Springs, Lindale, Lake Travis, Amarillo and Groesbeck school districts, as well as Roscoe Collegiate Charter.

Dusek, as overall winner and top contestant in the 12th grade contest, won \$1,000, according to a news release from the TAPT.
