# Resolution unclear on reason for city manager's termination

The Rockwall City Council voted 5-2 at the November 21 meeting to pass a resolution approving the termination of City Manager JulieCouch's contract, but the resolution still did not specify the reasons.

According to Rockwall's City Charter, Article IV, Section 04.01.03, the city manager "may be removed by resolution at the discretion of the council by a majority vote of its members. Upon passage of that resolution stating the intention to remove the city manager and the reasons therefor, a copy of which will be immediately furnished to him/her, the Council may suspend him/her from duty."

Attorney Pete Eckert, who represents the City of Rockwall, said this type of provision is common -- that the language was standard, but that there were many ways to interpret it.

Resolution No. 113, as adopted at the Nov. 21 council meeting, only said that "the city council has determined that it is in the best interest of the city to exercise its option to terminate the city manager agreement."

"We had two attorneys that worked on that, who said that it fulfilled the legal requirements the city was under, in terms of the charter," said Mayor David Sweet

David Sweet.

Sweet was not at liberty, he said, to discuss any further details.

When asked why the resolution did not state the reasons for terminating Couch's contract, Eckert insisted it was legally sufficient. Eckert would not release any of the details behind the council's decision, which he described as a consensus that it was in the best interest of the city to move forward.

"What they passed meets the spirit of what the charter says," said Eckert, who would not confirm whether the reason was a culmination of events or a decision made in response to recent internal issues. Eckert explained that council is always evaluating the people that work for them, month to month

"It's a process, with every situation like this, it kind of evolves over time ... they took a look at it, and it was best for the city to move on."

During the meeting, Council Members Margo Neilsen and Bennie Daniels expressed objections to this conclusion.

"It seems to me the city has been going in the right direction for some time," said Nielsen, who detailed many of the city's recent successes. "I won't be supporting the motion tonight because I cannot fathom the direction we should take."

Eckert explained the need for limiting any commentary by council on the subject. "The resolution speaks to the requirements of the charter, and rests on its own," said Eckert. "Council speaks through that resolution."



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
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### On God's Word

Filled with the Holy Ghost and Receive the Holy Ghost...

Let's dive into different verses about receiving the Holy Ghost and being filled with the Holy Ghost, starting with the first time people accomplished both.

"And they were all filled with the Holy Ghost, and began to speak with other tongues as the spirit gave them utterance" (Acts 2:4).

Prior to the Acts 2:1-4 event all the disciples were staying in an upper room in Jerusalem (Acts 1:12-14) after Jesus gave them last minute instructions and ascended up into heaven.

Please note the grammar between Acts 1:26 through Acts 2:4. The use of the word "they" throughout indicates that all of the disciples were filled with the Holy Ghost, saw the vision of fiery cloven tongues upon each of them, and began

It's important to understand the chronology of events in Acts 2:4. They were first filled with the Holy Ghost, and started speaking in tongues. The vision of

fiery cloven tongues was simply God's green light to start speaking in tongues. After that vision, there is no record of God giving visions to people. Instead, they went out and helped others to start speaking in tongues.

There are some records of the apostles helping others to start speaking in tongues, and the term "receive the Holy Ghost" is used in the context of speaking in tongues. Likewise, there are other verses that refer to being baptized in the name of Jesus Christ in the context of being filled with the Holy Ghost.

The fact that the two are used separately and distinctly in the various records should tell us that they are not the same thing. Being filled with the Holy Ghost is not the same as receiving the Holy Ghost.

The first verse that refers to is Acts 2:38, "Then Peter said unto them, 'Repent, and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins, and ye shall receive the gift of the Holy Ghost."

At first glance it would appear that being baptized results in the spiritual experience of receiving the gift. But a study of the earliest known text reveals a different picture. The words "ye shall" were not in the earlier text. By removing the words "ye shall" the same Acts 2:4 chronology can be seen, "Repent, and be

In the Acts chapter 8 record, the word receive is translated from two ent earlier known words. To "receive" the word was the Greek word de which meant to mentally receive information favorably. Whereas, to "re the Holy Ghost was the Greek word lambano, which meant to lay hol



# War with Iran Would Be Madness

President Obama's refusal to rule out military action against Iran - and GOP contender Mitt Romney's recent threat of war against Iran - should appall anyone who believes, with the free-market liberal Ludwig von Mises, that "not war, but peace, is the father of all things."

If the U.S. government or its client state Israel were to attack Iran, all hell would break loose. Thousands of Iranians would die. That country's infrastructure would be destroyed, bringing even more death, disease, and misery. And the democratic Iranian Green Movement, which is against foreign intervention, would be destroyed. Iran's government would retaliate by closing down the Strait of Hormuz, through which much oil passes, and launching attacks against American ground and naval forces in the region.

In short, disaster would follow a U.S. attack or an Israeli attack - which would be seen, quite rationally, as a U.S.-backed operation.

What would prompt the military assault? The powers that be, in maneuvers reminiscent of the buildup to the Iraq war, are trying to frighten the world into believing that Iran is building a nuclear weapon. Recent headlines in the stenographic news media would have us believe that the International Atomic Energy Agency has confirmed that the Iranians are working apace to build a bomb. We are left with the suggestion that once they succeed, a nuclear attack will promptly follow.

This makes little sense. Why would Iran launch a nuclear attack that would mean certain oblivion for itself? The U.S. government can destroy the world with its nukes, and Israel, a nuclear power since the 1960s, has a couple of hundred warheads ready to go. Unlike Iran, Israel does not submit to IAEA inspections.

If Iran were developing a nuclear weapon, it would clearly be in order to deter the sort of regime change that occurred in Iraq and Libya. The difference between how the U.S. government treated those countries and how it treats North Korea, which has a nuclear weapon, is hard to miss.

But here's the bigger problem for those ginning up war fever: There is no evidence Iran is developing a nuclear weapon! Iran is being threatened because it can't prove it's not doing so.

Two U.S. National Intelligence Estimates, one in 2007 and one in 2011, judged that Iran shut down its nuclear weapons program in 2003. (NIEs represent the judgment of America's dozen-and-a-half intelligence agencies.)

But what about the most recent IAEA report? According to the Washington

Intelligence provided to U.N. nuclear officials shows that Iran's government has mastered the critical steps needed to build a nuclear weapon, receiving assistance from foreign scientists to overcome key technical hurdles, according to Western diplomats and nuclear experts briefed on the findings.

Yet if one digs below the surface, one finds that the IAEA certified that Iran has not diverted nuclear materials from peaceful to military purposes. (Uranium appropriate for medical or power-generating purposes is unsuitable for making bombs.) While the report darkly alludes to "undeclared nuclear materials," it provides no evidence that they exist.

Many experts have ridiculed the politicized report as essentially recycling old dubious allegations. Flynt Leverett and Hillary Mann Leverett, two Middle East authorities on President George W. Bush's National Security

The report ... does not in any way demonstrate that Iran is "developing a nuclear weapon". Rather, it once again affirms, as the IAEA has for decades, Iran's "non-diversion" of nuclear material. In other words, even if the Islamic Republic wanted to build nuclear weapons (and Tehran continues to deny, at the highest levels of authority, that it wishes to do so) it does not have the weapons-grade material essential to the task.... [The] report [focused] on unsubstantiated intelligence reports, provided almost entirely by the United States, Israel, and other Western governments.... In fact, no one has ever produced a shred of evidence that Iran has ever actually tried to build a nuclear weapon or taken a decision to do so."

The Obama administration says it prefers sanctions and diplomacy, but as long as Iran is required to prove a negative, the chance of war is real. The American military opposes it - Iran would make Iraq look like a schoolyard yet Obama, Romney, and other prominent political figures rattle their sabers. This is sheer madness.

# Rockwall County's new courthouse what it has allowed the county to do

On Nov. 11 the county dedicated our new courthouse. I stated during: remarks at the ceremony, "The difficult process to obtain this much ne courthouse for Rockwall County comes to an end. Whether one believe process was rightly or wrongly conceived, the reality is the decision made and today we stand before the result of that decision."

And I also commented to the citizens of our county, saying, "You watched your county grow from a rural farming county of 6,000 in to 25,000 in 1990, 43,000 in 2000 and almost 80,000 people last year county is expected to grow to 250,000 by 2035. Our needs and our wa doing things cause us to focus on our future. Your patience, considerasuggestions, and involvement as we plan and implement changes, such a building of this new courthouse, and as we convert from that rural far county to an urban county located next to a major Metroplex is needed appreciated."

Let me give you some specific examples of what we can now do a result of this new courthouse.

When the courthouse was first designed, it was to have three floured. Must They were to contain the judicial courtrooms and the associated func of the district attorney, district clerk and the county clerk. But the que was asked about expansion space as the County continued to grow? experience of neighboring Collin County where they had recently fin a new courthouse, to have to then turn around a few short years after i opened and build an expansion wing to handle the new courtrooms, wa something Rockwall County wanted to duplicate. Thus the decision, i opinion, was correctly made to add an additional floor to the courthouse used for expansion of new courtrooms as they were needed.

Early this year the Commissioners Court addressed the issue of pla temporary county offices in this empty space until it was needed for courtrooms. As the forecast for growth did not call for a new courtroor five to eight years, this seems to be a good decision too.

Thus with this decision made, the task became one of realigning of and facilities to reduce costs, make it easier for the citizens to do bus with the county (and the state) and provide better office space than four some of the older buildings.

Several iterations of possible move of offices and facilities to retain

developed. A good plan has been developed. Thirteen departments that were not originally scheduled to be loc in the new courthouse will now be placed in that facility. Our two exists JPs and constables, as well as the two new JPs and constables we must to the county rolls on Jan. 1, 2013, because of a state mandate, now their offices on the third floor of the courthouse. Additionally, our Indi Health Care office, the treasurer for the county and our Human Resou Department will also be located on this floor. The movement of these functions will happen in early February of next year.

Also to be located in the new courthouse will be our new Veterans Sei Officer, Les Cooks, an experienced officer who previously held this pos

We have 5,800 veterans now in our county. While there is a requirement that a Veterans Service Officer must be added to the cour roll once the population reaches 200,000, the Commissioners Court n the decision to add this function immediately so our veterans will have necessary assistance they might need in dealing with the U.S. and S Department of Veterans Affairs. This new office will be located on the fo floor of the courthouse and will open on Dec. 7 of this year.

Finally, in an area left vacant on the second floor, the auditor's offic the county will be located. This move too will happen in the early Febru

Other moves are also planned. Our tax assessor's office will be move the first floor of the Historic Courthouse. This will happen in early Febru Our Agriculture Extension office will be moved to our existing Government Services Building located on Whitmore Street. This will happen in Janu and when completed this building will house the Ag Extension office, Juvenile Probation Department, our maintenance group and storage space many of our county records.

The Health Coordinators Office will move to the Historic Courtho early next year. The Elections Office will remain in its current facility on Square in Rockwall and the Commissioners Court will remain in the Hist

We are also moving the State Drivers License Office, currently locate the Brookshire Shopping Center, to better facilities. Rather than stayin the current county-leased space, this function, along with the office for se state highway troopers, will be moved to the county building located at Fannin St., the old JP 1 location. This will happen by Dec. 31 of this ) (While the County has no responsibility for the operation of this function do provide office space so this facility is available to our citizens.)


When all of these moves are completed by February, the remain county facilities will be: new courthouse, Historic Courthouse, library, old library building on RT 66 that houses the Adult Probation Departm Government Services Building on Whitmore Street, Road and Bridge fac on RT 551 and Elections Office on the Rockwall Square.

We are able to cancel two leases for space where we currently have cou facilities and to put up for sale the County Annex as well as the Government Center on Ridge Road (old Cameron Building.) We will reduce our le costs by \$48,000 per year and our operating costs for the four locations \$132,000. We will receive dollars from selling the two buildings and we provide better facilities, more convenient facilities for our citizens, and will save money.

We could not have done this without the new courthouse.

As I said on Nov. 11, this new courthouse is like Rockwall County; impressive, it is bold and it looks to the future. I hope that each of you quickly see it like this also.

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

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
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
