Rockwall County Library Book Review

'Baltimore,' or, 'The **Steadfast Tin Soldier** and the Vampire'

What is the deal with the recent trend of making vampires lovable and misunderstood? I cringe whenever a new vampire movie, television show or book is created that describes these creatures as sympathetic or misunderstood. I prefer my vampires dirty and despicable as well as deathly afraid of sunlight and running water. Thankfully, the creative team behind "Baltimore" has stuck to the original mythos and kept the vampire scourge solely in the realm of evil.

"Baltimore," or, "The Steadfast Tin Soldier and the Vampire," is actually three stories within a story. The tale is told in flashback by three different characters, who are summoned to a mysterious inn by the elusive Lord Baltimore, the titular hero. Each character is identified by his respective trade; one is a business man, the other is a scarred doctor and the third is a grizzled sailor.

All of the men have two things in common; the first is their shared connection to Lord Baltimore, whom each character has met through his travels. The second connection is that each man has come face to face with supreme evil, albeit in different guises. This presents a unique angle for the overall story, allowing the creative narrative to drive multiple plot points towards a spectacular conclusion.

The stories within the story serve to flesh out the necessary motives and personalities of each character, which has the effect of humanizing the three men as well as providing crucial background history in an appropriate manner. Once the multiple back-stories are concluded, the real story begins.

"Baltimore" is a cautionary tale of evil; at once the reader is presented a ringside seat to view the macabre. The mood of the book is





H-Hands offers physicals, shots for students

The Health Center of Helping Hands is offering school and sports physicals, as well as immunizations needed for students to go back to school.

Physicals are available for all children, regardless of insurance or financial status, at a cost of \$25.

Immunizations are available for children who are uninsured, on Medicaid or whose families cannot afford insurance co-pays. Restrictions on who can receive the shots are set by federal rules through the Vaccine for Children Program that supplies the vaccines to the center.

Shots range in cost from \$14.85 for one to \$35 for five or more. Students going into the seventh grade will need to have a meningococcal vaccine and a second dose of chickenpox vaccine if it has not already been received. Also, if it's been five or more years since your seventh grade student had a tetanus booster, the new tetanus/ diptheria/pertussis vaccine is required.

The Health Center is located in the Reeves Service Center, 102 S. First St., Suite B, on the lower level. For more details or to make an appointment, call 972-772-8194.


