Rockwall ISD trustees to meet March 17

The Rockwall Independent School District Board of Trustees will meet in regular session at 6:30 p.m. March 17 in the RISD Administration/ Education Center, Room 600.

Following the session's opening, the trustees are scheduled to go into executive session to deliberate about personnel issues. They are scheduled to reconvene in open session at 7:30 p.m.

Agenda items include informational reports and items on the consent agenda, which include personnel issues, investment and financial reports, budget amendments, consideration of a pro shop lease at the RISD Aquatics Center, consideration of a Texas Education Agency waiver, consideration of acceptance of donations to the school district, and consideration of approval of construction delivery method for upcoming RISD projects.

Trustees also will hear reports on the ROCK Summer Program; the Access Improvement Project by the City of Heath regarding property adjacent to Amy Parks-Heath Elementary; the Healthy, Hungry-free Kids Act of 2010 and required meal price changes; the Rockwall ISD emergency exercise; and the superintendent's report.

The board also will consider approval of renewal of employment contracts for principals, teachers, counselors, librarians, nurses and other personnel, as well as personnel not covered under Chapter 21 of the Texas Education Agency.

Fate City Council outlines election plans

The March 3 Fate City Council meeting took place in the Williamsburg Amenity Center because of preparations at the Fate Community Center for the March 4 Primary Election.

The swearing-in of new council member Christy Schell, appointed to Place 1 on Feb 26, had to be postponed as Schell was unable to be present because of a conflict with her job.

In a March 6 interview, City Manager Rod Hogan said there was nothing in Schell's personnel file to substantiate any of the accusations made against her at the last meeting.

All three Public Hearing/Action Items on the agenda for rezoning certain properties were passed.

Action Item #7A Ordinance No. O-1316 pertained to "adding fence regulations and establishing procedures for application, construction, enlargement, alteration, and maintenance of both commercial and residential fences." Owners must have a permit to put up a new fence, and it must be maintained in a proper manner and not allowed to deteriorate. This item was tabled until the first week in April to make some adjustments on the ordinance.

The Fate city election will be conducted at the Fate Community Center at 104 South W.E. Crawford on May 10. The candidates are as follows:

Mayor: Bill Broderick, Lorne Megyesi Place 1: (Special Election) Nikki Robinson

Place 2: Steve Skipworth, Lance Megyesi

Place 3: (Special Election) Jim Thornhill, Jon Thatcher

Place 4: Sheri Garber, Joe Burger

Place 6: Michelle Butler, Steve Herrmann

Places 1 and Place 3 are identified as Special Election because these two positions are unexpired one-year terms. The councilpersons for these positions resigned in mid-year.

All terms are for two 2 years. Place 5 had a newly elected position, thus no need to be placed on the ballot.

McLendon-Chisholm VFD receives new fire engin

McLendon-Chisholm Volunteer Fire Department recently received a new fire truck with the help of a \$200,000 grant through Texas A&M Forest Service, from the state agency.

"This is the first fire engine we've had that was specifically for the department since 1974," said J.T. Williams, McLendoncover areas in the county that don't have adequate water supply, so receiving funds to get this truck can help us get a head start on fires before additional support arrives."

The cost-share grant was

administered through the TFS Rural Volunteer Fire Department Assistance Program. The program assists VFDs like McLendon-Chisholm to secure equipment according to a recent news release and training to enhance their emergency response capabilities.

The McLendon-Chisholm VFD award is among the \$12.8 million passed through TFS to Texas volunteer fire departments each Chisholm VFD fire chief. "We year. These grants are important because VFDs respond to 90 percent of wildfires in Texas. They do it with little to no money and staff made up primarily of

The Rural VFD Assistance Program was created during the 77th Texas Legislature. Largely due to the many programs that assist fire departments, the state agency has received seven national awards from the USDA Forest Service for extensive work in assisting underserved communities.

so-called Orange Revolution. This, too, was done by our diplomats and intelligence community, whose agents agitated demonstrators in the streets and liberally distributed American dollars to them. This resulted in a free election, which resulted in subsequent free elections, until the most recent of those produced a president who — as an ex-communist — was more drawn to Russia than to the U.S. or Europe.

When the Ukraine government needed cash and Russia offered it a better deal than the European Union, our imperial diplomats and lawless intelligence gurus were embarrassed. So, the U.S. fomented another revolution in the streets of Kiev. One of our diplomats, Victoria Nuland, acknowledged as much in a tapped and taped (complete with expletives) and eventually viral cellphone conversation. Then, Viktor Yanukovich, the popularly and lawfully elected Ukraine president, was toppled and fled to Moscow. The new unelected Ukraine president has received American recognition and help. Earlier this week, the U.S. offered him \$1 billion in immediate cash.

Enter Vladimir Putin

He is the popularly elected president of Russia who has designs on reconstituting the old Soviet Union. Putin is also an ex-KGB agent; he is a torturer, a murderer, a tyrant and a monster. He often has lamented the demise of the former Soviet Union. Ukraine was a part of that union until the evil empire dissolved in 1991. It was the most economically productive part of that union. Today it enjoys a mostly free market and is highly entrepreneurial, though partly a welfare state. Roughly two-thirds of Ukraine identifies with Europe and one-third with Russia.

After Yanukovich showed up at Putin's doorstep in Moscow, Putin flexed his muscles by sending 16,000 Russian troops, in uniforms without insignias and wearing black masks (you cannot make this up), over the border to occupy Crimea, a province of Ukraine, which had been part of Russia and the Soviet Union until 1954.

Putin's invasion is profoundly unlawful, as it constitutes the introduction of military troops into a sovereign territory without governmental invitation or consent, and the absence of identifying insignia puts this invasion outside the protections of the Geneva Conventions and the rules of war. Hence the Russian troops are legally fair game for Ukrainian troops and civilian militias. But don't expect that to happen. Russia has two times the number of tanks as Ukraine, 10 times the troops and 12 times the air power.

As well, don't expect the Russians to leave. Most residents of

Crimea are Russian speaking and actually welcome their invaders (again, you cannot make this up). And Putin's track record in foreign incursions shows a pattern of retaining conquered territories. When he invaded Georgia in 2008, he kept two provinces, which are still occupied with more than 40,000 idle and costly Russian troops.

The U.S. and Europe are in no position to resist the Russian invasion, nor should they. Europe receives roughly 30 percent of its oil, natural gas and coal from Russia. If the U.S. tightens the economic screws on Russia, American banks will suffer, and the Russian oligarchs and Russian people will suffer, but no group will suffer as much as Europeans who have grown dependent on Russian fuel. And Putin is unmoved by personal embarrassment or human suffering.

The stated purpose of the Russian invasion is to protect predominantly ethnic Russians in Crimea from the mob-induced fate of Yanukovich. At first blush, this seems nonsense. But consider the view from Moscow of the American-induced expulsion of the popularly elected and Russian-oriented Ukraine president. And then consider this: What would the U.S. do if the Chinese had fomented a revolution in Mexico and installed a Chinese-friendly government there that solicited Chinese loans and invited the Chinese to help govern? Would the U.S. protect English-speaking American-friendly folks along the Texas-Mexico border?

And how is anyone in the U.S. harmed by Putin's lawlessness? Should the United Sates government roam the world seeking monsters to slay, or should it learn from its recent grave mistakes? Nearly two centuries ago, President John Quincy Adams warned his successors against the foreign policies that would be manifest in the Bush/Obama years. "Americans should not go abroad to slay dragons that they do not understand in the name of spreading democracy."

But the government is an old dog that cannot learn new tricks.



"In all cases reported, the customer only wants to be contacted via email or text message. And, in one case, the property address provided was a foreclosed home.

BBB of Fort Worth and Tarrant County warns businesses, especially those in the roofing community, to be on the lookout for fake customers looking to make a quick buck and offers this tips to help businesses avoid falling victim to this new scheme:

- · Beware of customers who only want to do business via electronic formats
- · Beware of customers who are unwilling to sign a contract but are willing to send money
- Never send money via wire transfer or prepaid card
- Report suspicious business transactions to the BBB

The events scheduled for the city are included in citizens' water statements each month, the city's newsletter online, newspapers magazines. According to Royse City CFO Joe Stegal, the cost to run monthly advertisements in the magazine is approximately \$10,200 a year, which is also taken out of the Hotel/Motel Fund.

In comparison, the city has spent an estimated \$8,000 to \$12,000 per year for notices.

The only way the effectiveness of Hardin's plan can be measured is to see if more people are coming to Royse City for the events conducted throughout the year, Alsabrook said. Crowley moved to table the idea of the consultant until more

information could be obtained. The item was tabled.

Alsabrook discussed business item F4 with the council. The issue was that of proceeding with the "Welcome Sign(s)" for Royse City. He said the sign could run from \$10,000 on up.

"We can get prices for I-30 and HI 66," he said.

"I would like to see the really big signs that say 'Welcome to Royse City,' Nichols said. "We need really good quality signs that can withstand this hard, shifting dirt."

Alsabrook told the council that if they wanted him to check into it, he would try to get prices for the council to review. The council voted unanimously to proceed forward on the sign issue.

The reappointment of the Zoning Board of Adjustment members passed unanimously Members include Robert McMillan, Jennifer Satterfield, and Scott Erby. The alternate is Doug Bostick.

"Do we have any idea of what we are going to do with this house?" Councilman James Branch asked during the discussion session at the end of the meeting. He was referring to the house on Houston Street referred to as the Royse home or sometimes as the Weatherford home, as the Weatherfords were the last family to have lived here. It is the responsibility of the contractor to pay the appropriate rate or higher on the construction project or be subject to penalty as set forth in section 2258.023 of the Texas General Government Code.

The Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) and Rockwall County will conduct a P Meeting on Thursday, April 10, 2014 for the proposed improvements to Farm-to-Market (FM in Rockwall County, Texas. The project limits extend from State Highway (SH) 205 to SH 6

The purpose of the Public Meeting is to present proposed roadway improvements within this mile long section of FM 552. The Public Meeting will be an "open house" format and will be on Thursday, April 10, 2014 at Williams Middle School, 625 E. FM 552, Rockwall, Texas 7 from 5 p.m. to 7 p.m. TxDOT staff and its consulting engineers will be available in an infi setting to answer questions during the meeting.

The proposed project is needed to address an expected increase in traffic, to conform to planning efforts, and to provide safer geometric and operating conditions. Upon completion 552 would accommodate two 11 to 12 foot wide inside lanes and one 14-foot-wide outside s use lane in each direction, an 18-foot-wide median with 1-foot to 2-foot curb offsets, a 6-foot 10-foot-wide sidewalk with minimum of 9-foot offset from face of curb. Dedicated left and turn lanes are provided along FM 552 at major intersections with SH 205, John King Blvd 1141, and FM 3549. At various cross streets, a 10-foot-wide left-turn bay would be provided i median. The horizontal and vertical alignment has been improved to satisfy a 40 mile-per-(mph) design for an urban arterial facility along FM 552. Major cross street connection de speeds vary between 40 mph and 45 mph. Drainage improvements include replacing the exis side ditches with a curb and gutter section. Approximately 52 acres of additional right-of-(ROW) and easements would be needed to accommodate the proposed roadway and drainimprovements. One residential property displacement would be required. No commercial property displacements or relocations would be required.

The maps and drawings reflecting the project's location and geometric design will be displayed the Public Meeting. 


