### **Blacklands Corridor** public input session rescheduled for Sept. 22

The Sept. 4 public meeting about the Blacklands Corridor/Northeast Gateway Feasibility Study in Lavon, cut short because the crowd exceeded building occupancy restrictions, has been rescheduled for 6:30 p.m. Sept. 22 at 1201 T.L. Townsend Drive, Rockwall, according to a City of Rockwall news release.

The North Central Texas Council of Governments is recommending a combination of strategies to help meet local and regional transportation needs in the area between Greenville and Garland, according to the news release. New and widened arterials, bicycle and pedestrian improvements, I-30 bottleneck improvements and a new freeway/tollway are among the recommended strategies.

Texas Turnpike Corp., a private firm, has begun work to develop the potential tollway. Representatives from the corporation will be at the meeting to answer questions and describe what residents can expect from a state-mandated environmental assessment that will begin this fall, according to the release.

To determine a project location, the corporation must complete an environmental and public involvement process under the supervision of the Texas Department of Transportation.

Beginning a new chapter, she said she is ready for "on-the-road adventures" and looks forward to a new motor home and traveling across the country with her husband.

plans, but could not be present at the Aug. 26 meeting. Alsabrook said he would try to get it set up soon for her to come and inform the council and city staff as to what the plans are for this upcoming year.

The first item on the agenda Sept. 9 was Potter.

The Royse City Boys & Girls Club had its grand opening on June 1, 2013, and closed its doors at the end of the 2013-2014 school year.

Potter began by saying that they had recently held several teen summits, with about 30 kids attending the last one. In these summits, the teens got the opportunity to share what they would be interested in doing the club, such as gaming devices, movie night, tips on how to handle their money,

Shortly into her opening comments, she said the Boys and Girls Club had run into a deficit this last year. She said they had a low number of kids coming to the club and that didn't bring in enough money to pay the basic expenses, so when school was out, they had to close.

Crowley, visibly concerned, said, "What rubbed me the wrong way was that you came to us, the council, for support, but we had to learn about your closing the club from the newspaper."

"I just didn't think it was a council matter," Potter said.

"I still think it would have been prudent if you had of let us know. It's not fair to the citizens of Royse City," Crowley said.

Potter went on in her defense to say, "The building where the club met, a free-standing gymnasium at Ruth Cherry Intermediate School, was very hot as the air-conditioning was not working well at all."

"I think we could have gotten a letter about the club closing in Royse City for the summer," Crowley said. "That's all I want is courtesy and keeping us informed. I do want your Teen Club to succeed."

Potter said that kids from Royse City who wanted to continue attending the Boys & Girls Club over the summer were allowed to attend the club in Rockwall.

"Yea, but they had to travel to Rockwall to attend," an audience member said.

Potter said the club is rebranding and redirecting programming focus to meet the needs of those who need the most and are zeroing in on the teenagers. Once the club for Royse City is organized specifically for the teenagers, it will simply be called The Club, differentiating it from the Boys and Girls Club, which has been for young people of all ages,

### **Royse City ISD trustees** hear crisis plan update

During the Royse City School Board meeting of Sept. 8, Lloyd Blaine gave a PowerPoint presentation for the board and those in attendance. Blaine is the coordinator of the Royse City School District Safety and Security Department.

Blain said the safety of the students in Royse City's schools is his top priority and all the campuses are covered by RCISD's own police department as well as three school resource officers (SROs). Of the officers, one is from Fate and the other two are from Royse City. A SRO is a sworn law enforcement officer responsible for providing security and crime prevention in the schools.

Blaine said it is important for parents as well as everyone in the community to know that every campus has an emergency plan. All school administrators, school resource officers and the each school's crisis team have been trained on how to respond to and handle a crisis in all types of emergencies.

Emergencies such as the tornado that swept through Royse City on April 3, 2012, a fire or "shooter on the campus" fall under the realm of a severe, immediate crisis.

Training for each school campus includes a fire drill once a month for every month that has more than 10 days, a severe weather drill each semester, a lockdown drill at the beginning of each semester and a reverse evacuation once a semester. An example of a reverse evacuation is that the students might be outside for some type of sports event, thus the students would have to come inside the building and know where to go for the safest protection.

In the area of communications, all schools are equipped with a radio system. Every school has an emergency district radio, which will be used for communications with the district or the SRO. District phones, cell phones and emails are ways the administrators can contact the central office.

All campuses have cameras placed at the strategic places throughout the schools. District and building administrators have constant access to the cameras, as do the school resource officers and the police department (in their cars and department smart phones.).

Visitors to the schools are screened through the Hall Pass Visitor System. A special feature of the registry is that it tags sex offenders and other special circumstances such as a parent or other adult who possibly through a court order is not allowed to see or take a particular student or students.

In order to enter the building, all visitors must show their IDs such as a driver's license at the front door system, where the camera will photograph their IDs.

Once visitors are cleared, they may enter the building but must leave their drivers license at the front desk and must wear a name tag. When they are ready to leave the building, they must leave the tag with the front desk and retrieve their license.

Blaine said that some of the students spend more time at school than at home, especially if they are involved in extracurricular activities. He says that if the kids feel safe, they will be more open

Most people in Royse City are familiar with the IRIS (Immediate Response Information System). When there is a weather or any other type of emergency, the system will automatically call the numbers on file and warn citizens of the impending emergency. Blaine asks that parents please not call the schools, they will be notified.

Also, if the school should go into lockdown for an emergency such as a "shooter on the campus," he asks the parents to not come to the school. All students will be safely protected until the emergency is over and the campus cleared. If parents rush to the school, they might only make the situation worse by getting in the way of first responders, law enforcement, the fire department or any other personnel assisting with the situation. Public notification will be given when the crisis is over.

Besides the IRIS, parents and citizens will be able to find information on Twitter and Facebook should there be an emergency. Blaine said that once the PowerPoint presentation is finalized, it will be put on the safety website.

Blaine said the district is making every update and instillation possible to keep the district's schools safe.

#### On God's Word

#### The love of God ... 1Corinthians chapter 13

"The Lord is my shepherd; I shall not want. He makes me to lie down in green pastures. He leads me beside the still waters. He restores my soul. He leads me in the paths of righteousness for His name's sake. Yea, though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I will fear no evil; for you are with me. Your rod and your staff comfort me. You prepare a table before me in the presence of my enemies. You anoint my head with oil. My cup runs over. Surely goodness and mercy shall follow me all the days of my life; and I will dwell in the house of the Lord for ever" (Psalms 23).

King David spoke of something that had hope for, and things that he was able to tap into during his life. While those words offer encourage and comfort and hope, when we consider what is available during the administration of the grace of God, it is seen that we have something even greater than what King David had; that is Christ in us which is our hope of glory.

The Epistles provide great instruction for living with the authority of Jesus Christ.

King David could not walk with this power and authority, but he did walk by the spirit of God and succeeded in doing God's will, with a humble and meek heart for God.

Now God's beloved saints and born-again children can learn from and apply His instructions in the Epistles and Acts.

1Corinthians chapters 12-14 provide basic information and instructions for all members of the body of Christ unto living the more than abundant life spoken of by Jesus Christ (John 10:10).

Paul finished 1Cor. Chapter 12 with, "But covet earnestly the best gifts; and yet show I unto you a more excellent way." In The Companion Bible (KJV) E.W. Bullinger explained that the word "excellent" meant "according to excellence."

Paul is about to show the readers a way that is according to excellence.

"Though I speak with tongues of men and of angels, and have not charity, I am beome as sounding brass, or a tinkling cymbal" (1Cor. 13:1).

The word "charity" did not have the same meaning as is commonly used today. It was translated from the ancient Greek word agape, which meant the love from God.

The rest of chapter 13 distinguishes the love of God from all the spiritual matters discussed in chapter 12, including the manifestation of holy spirit.

It continues, "And though I have prophecy, and understand all mysteries and all knowledge; and though I have all faith, so that I





ar Powers Resolution (WPR), the president can deploy

U.S. forces anywhere outside the U.S. for 180 days upon his written notifications of congressional leaders. He does not need a declaration of war to deploy forces for 180 days, yet he cannot deploy forces beyond that without express authorization from Congress.

Obama used the WPR as the legal basis for his air invasion of Libya in 2010. That resulted in the destruction of the government there, which the U.S. had supported with \$1 billion annually since 2005 (we literally destroyed armaments that we had paid for), the death of Col. Gadhafi, whom President George W. Bush and British Prime Minister Tony Blair called a friend in the war on terror, the instability of the nation, the death of our ambassador, and the seizure by mobs of U.S. government-owned real estate. The president declined to use the WPR authority last year when he sought -- and did not receive -- express congressional authority to use military force to degrade the

The WPR is a two-edged sword. Though the courts have never reviewed it, it is certainly unconstitutional, as the courts have consistently ruled that one branch of government cannot give away its principal constitutional powers to another. Congress surely cannot give its war-making power to the president any more than it can give it to the courts. So, the political question with respect to war remains: Who will take the heat for fighting a war against ISIS -- the president via the WPR or Congress via the Constitution?

Yet, beyond the political question is the more profound question of who will enforce the Constitution. In addition to Madison's fears about foreign wars leading to domestic tyranny, there are profoundly practical reasons why war is a decision for Congress alone.

Here is where it gets dicey and inside the Beltway. Republicans want war because they see ISIS as a dreaded enemy and can use its televised barbarity to rally voters to their candidates. Democrats want war because they can use it to show the voters that they, too, can be muscular against terrorists. Yet, Republican leadership in the House is reluctant to permit the House to debate and vote on a resolution

authorizing hostilities, because they can't agree on how to instruct the president to end the war.

But war often has surprise endings and unexpected human, geopolitical and financial consequences. A debate in Congress will air them. It will assure that the government considers all rational alternatives to war and that the nation is not pushed into a costly and bloody venture with its eyes shut. A congressional debate will compel a written national objective tied to American freedom. A prudent debate will also assure that there will be an end to hostilities determined by congressional consensus and not presidential fiat.

What should Congress do? It should declare once and for all that we will stay out of this ancient Muslim civil war of Shia versus Sunni. We have been on both sides of it. Each side is barbarous. In the 1980s, we helped the Sunni. Now we are helping the Shia. Last year, Obama offered to help ISIS by degrading its adversaries; now, he wants to degrade ISIS. We have slaughtered innocents and squandered fortunes in an effort to achieve temporary military victories that neither enhance our freedom nor fortify our safety. We will only have peace when we come home -- when we cease military intervention in an area of the world not suited for democracy and in which we are essentially despised.

I suspect most Americans have had enough of war, and they understand that if the political class ignores Madison's warnings, it will do so at its peril.

# ational POW/MIA Day observed locally

cognition Day is observed across the nation for those Prisoners of War (POW) and Mission in Action (MIA).

Last week, during the Rockwall County Commissioners Court, Judge Jerry Hogan read a proclamation regarding National POW and MIA Recognition Day.

As Judge Hogan read the words and for some time afterward, my mind flooded with so many memories of my grandmother, with whom my younger brother and I lived with for some time as children. On a particularly rough day, she would open the old black, paper-coated truck in her backroom closet and take out her firstborn's combat boots, his uniform and other personal items of his. She would cry, hold them to her heart and smell them, trying to get back a part of him that she would never experience again.

Grandmother lost her firstborn son, Hayward, at the age of 19 during World War II at the Battle of the Bulge, and three years later, was his body returned to Coffeeville, Texas, for a proper burial.

She had four brothers who also went to war. Billy Joe saw no front-line combat, but was forever emotionally damaged from what stirring of our memories.

he experienced.

Vestal and J.W. were captured and each became prisoners of war in separate camps, where they each were held for several years, severely physically and emotionally tortured beyond the mind's understanding, and eventually returned home, never to be the same again. Vestal spent the last years of life, thinking he was still a prisoner of war, losing touch with reality, until his death.

The fourth of the brothers, Frank, age 18, was on a huge oil freighter headed for Africa, loaded with oil for the war efforts. His ship disappeared and to this day, not a shred of the ship, cargo or men aboard has ever been found. The government related to families of the men aboard that they think the ship was torpedoed by Japanese subs that were reported to have been in the area at the time.


Grandmother lived with the heartbreaking hope that one day Frank would simply walk up onto her country porch, an tell her that he had been captured by the enemy and put in a

concentration camp or had lost all memory of his past. She spoke of this hope so often, and had such a faraway look in her eyes, as they filled with haunting tears. That day never came. Grandmother died in 1985. Up until 2003, no evidence of any further information of the ship was ever divulged.


So out of my five uncles, one was forever scared, two were POWs, one was and still is listed as MIA, and the final one was KIA (Killed in Action). These were a part of the memories that filled my mind after Judge Hogan read the proclamation.

Most of us don't need a special day to remember our veterans, whatever their status might be. But on this day set aside for special recognition, let us all take a few moments to remember and pay tribute, not only to the veterans, but to their families and friends who suffered so much, and still do to this day.

# Jackets roll past Horn in home opener, remain undefeat

Senior running back Chris Warren rushed 28 times for 179 yards and quarterback Will Reed took to the air for 239 as Rockwall defeated former district foe Mesquite Horn 26-14 Friday at Wilkerson-Sanders Stadium.

The Yellowjackets avenged a 48-32 loss in 2013 to the Jaguars and ended their non-district schedule with a 3-0 record. Rockwall is now tied with Highland Park at 9th in Class 6A area rankings.

Rockwall never trailed in the contest, but struggled at times to move the ball and extend drives. Horn — where Jackets' Rodney Webb coached before moving to Rockwall last season — tied the score two times, but was shut out in the final quarter for the Yellowjacket win.

The Jaguars threatened to take the lead on the first drive of the game, but Caleb Broach blocked a 23-yard field goal attempt to give Rockwall the ball — Broach added a second blocked field goal in the fourth quarter, along with a game-clinching interception.

The Yellowjackets capitalized as Warren took a pass from Reed, hurdled a defender on the sideline and ran 47 yards for the first touchdown of the night.

Later in the first, a ten-yard Rockwall punt placed Horn near the 50, resulting in a game-tying 39-yard touchdown pass in the final seconds of the quarter.

After trading punts through the second, Xavier Castille caught a 19-

yard scoring pass to give Rockwall the 14-7 lead at the half.

The Jacket offense struggled to regain its rhythm out of the break, and midway through the third, Mesquite Horn powered through with Chris Robison's 24-yard touchdown pass to Lincoln Warren to tie the game 14-14.

From there, Rockwall took control to shut out the Jaguars in the fourth. A goal line stand by the Jacket defense and a second blocked field goal by Broach started the quarter. The block was picked up by Tamba Juanah and returned 85 yards for the score; however, the touchdown was brought back by a penalty — Rockwall had two additional touchdowns wiped out by penalties earlier in the contest.

The Yellowjackets took the lead for good with a 13-yard pass to Jaylen Veasley, putting RHS ahead 20-14 with 9:50 remaining.

Horn threatened in Rockwall territory in the quarter, but a series of penalties and defense by Rockwall ended the drive. The stop led to a 42-yard Chris Warren touchdown run with 3:31 left in the game.

With just two minutes remaining, Rockwall sealed the win with an interception by Broach at the Rockwall 24, allowing the Jackets to run out the remaining time for the 26-14 win.

The Yellowjackets begin competing for the District 11-6A title tonight against North Garland (0-4). Kickoff is set for 7 p.m. at Garland ISD's Williams Stadium.

Rockwall High School Homecoming week will be September 22

through 27. Yellowjacket's parade will be held next Thursda at 6 p.m., and the Jackets will take on the Lakeview Centenr Sept. 26.
