# McLendon-Chisholm debates water licensing issues with developer

# City Council seeks to maintain rural setting, resisting establishing water district

For the past two years McLendon-Chishom City Council members have been in talks with United Engineering Group, which is seeking to develop 1200 acres on the city's north side.

At the council's last meeting, an attorney for the developers asked the council to support efforts to obtain water district licensing which has been held up with negotiations for a developer's agreement.

Whether the city should enter into a deal with developers paying the costs for entry into the water business has been at the heart of negotiations with a vision for keeping the city "more rural" holding them in conflict.

Doug Lens of UEG asked if the council would consider forming a subgroup to give more "time and focus" and "get is across the finish line."

"From our perspective, we're really under pressure to clean this up and move forward," Lens said. "I think we're really close on a lot of things."

The council did not choose to create a subgroup and may prefer to keep the discussion among the entire council.

Mayor pro-tem Steve Hatfield also suggested moving forward and at some point taking a vote.

"I'm not sure we're in favor of moving forward," Hatfield said.

In later discussion related to the forming of a mission statement for the city, Hatfield and Councilman Lee Nichols expressed favor in incorporating a commitment to maintaining a rural lifestyle.

According to plans presented by developers, the vision for the Koch property is for two sections, a mixed-use space for retail, restaurants, office and medical parks, and light industry along FM 550 and light residential development with 2.25 homes per acre. Developers propose two amenities centers, open space and parks, a 15-acre school site and two to four acres donated to the city for public facilities.

Along with discomfort about density plans, in the past council members have expressed discomfort over the UEB business model since UEB would likely sell before the completion of the development.

As for the mission of the city, the council is asking for more community input.

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ers Electric CoOp. ees are charged by ies to new developects to offset the financial impact of increased use of water, sewer and roadways by residential, commercial or industrial concerns. In a workshop prior to the City Council meeting, council members examined the existing ordinance with its tables for analyzing fee amounts.

A hearing was opened for public input on the issue, but none was given. In the meeting following, the council voted unanimously to amend within the ordinance

an inconsistency in tables for calculating commercial and retail fees. The new formula will provide for a more equitable fee structure between various kinds of commercial development.

The council voted to accept a Strategic Growth Plan by the Institute of Urban Studies at the University of Texas at Arlington. The group was hired by the city to facilitate the development of strategic priorities for Royse

City in areas such as downtown, parks, street improvements, citizen involvement, city government structure and review of building standards.

The plan recently presented to the council and adopted will provide needed vision and direction for Royse City growth.

The council also authorized the city attorney to continue crafting a franchise agreement with Farmers Electric CoOp (FEC) for access to rights of way in portions of the city's east side served by FEC. The entities are trying to reach agreement on rate (4 or 5 percent), length of contract (10 or 20 years) and terms of renewal. Gas, electric and telecom utility providers must contract for access to rights of way for cable or conduits.

In other action, the council responded to a letter from Representative Joe Pickett, chairman of the Texas House of Representatives Transportation Committee. In the letter to Texas governing bodies, Pickett had requested local input on state transportation matters. The Royse City Council's response letter, adopted at the meeting, recommended an increase in the state gasoline tax to increase revenues for highway needs.

According to city manager Bill Shipp, their recommendation was shaped by information that highway building and repair costs have outstripped income from the state gas tax, which has remained at 20 cents per gallon since the early 1990s. He said that the council also proposed indexing the tax to inflation or some other economic indicator to relieve the shortfall caused by the static tax rate.

The council also asked the Transportation Committee to

analyze the issue of drivers texting and see if some action by them is appropriate for the state.

The council approved the appointment of Richard Grist of Royse City to the Planning and Zoning Commission. Grist fills a spot on the commission created by the resignation of Brooks Williams. Williams vacated the P&Z seat when elected to city council.

The council also welcomed new city library manager Teresa Chiv, who began work at the Royse City Library in early July. Chiv has served libraries in Irving, Fort Worth, Flower Mound and Keller.

Reflecting Royse City's partnership with Rockwall County for shared-cost emergency services, the council approved the annual interlocal agreement for dispatch services provided by Rockwall County Sheriff's Department. The council also passed resolutions approving budgeted costs for Emergency Services Corporation, which serves Royse City and other Rockwall County cities.

Following an executive session, the council voted unanimously to suspend negotiations with Provident Realty for the 2800-home proposed residential development Bearpen Creek southeast of the new high school.

According to city manager Shipp, "the council is willing to enter into agreement with Provident but not without a commitment as to when the land is projected to be developed. We can't spend more time and resources... and leave it openended indefinitely."

Provident first proposed the development in 2006. The latest round of discussions began about a year ago.

# Smalley sentenced for attempted kidnapping

Desi Smalley, a 36-year-old Mesquite resident, was sentenced Tuesday to 10 years in the state penitentiary for the crime of attempted kidnapping, according to a Rockwall County Criminal District Attorney news release.

Smalley also was fined \$10,000.

The sentence, the maximum under the law, was handed down by 382nd Judicial District Court Judge Brett Hall.

Smalley was charged with attempted to abduct a first grade student from Pullen Elementary in Heath.

Kenda Culpepper, the Rockwall County criminal district attorney and lead prosecutor on the case, presented evidence that he had an extensive criminal history and was under the influence of PCP at the time of the offense, according to the news release.

The case has mobilized the community, Culpepper said.

"If you try to harm a child in Rockwall County, you will be severely punished," she said. "I applaud the courage of the first grader who alerted school authorities to a stranger in their midst and the dedication of teachers who strive to keep their students safe."



Algal blooms are naturally occurring events common to surface water supplies, according to the news release. They may cause taste and odor changes in



"Managers manually process over 300 handwritten time sheets per pay period, re-adding hours and resolving any discrepancies in employees' records to prepare them to be manually loaded into the payroll system," Sinclair said. "Additionally, every request by an employee for information about days worked or days off requires a manager's time to pull the paper documents, review and respond."

Sinclair, along with nearly 40 county department heads and members of their staff, have viewed demonstrations and proposals from three companies offering time-

keeping services. Sinclair recommended a web hosting agreement with Executime as the one best suiting the county's needs and budget. He said Executime software meshes with the county's existing software platform, has the greatest simplicity of use and a web hosting arrangement with the company requires no additional office space or server purchase.

A budget approved two years ago for procurement of a timekeeping system was \$35,000. With approval from county commissioners for an online system, funds required for the initial agreement and monthly contract for a three-year period totaled \$31,000.

The online time and attendance system should be functional by the end of 2010, according to Sinclair.

Despite July rains, construction of the new Rockwall County Courthouse is proceeding on schedule, Manhattan Construction project manager Nick Link reported to county commissioners.

The four-story structure is scheduled for completion in Sept. 2011.

Commissioner Lorie Grinnan reported that the FM 740 (Ridge Road) widening project will enter roadbed construction phase Oct. 2. Utility relocation is complete, including implementation of a drainage pattern passing from the roadway to the lake through Chandler's Landing.

The court made a second issue of road bonds in the amount of \$2,480,561.71 from 2004 and 2008 voter-approved bonds of \$117.25 million for changes to connectors to I-30.

Joan Terry, assistant superintendent for the Rockwall Independent School District's Department of Policy, Planning and Research, presented the Commissioners Court with copies of the school district's 2010 Strategic Plan. In her presentation, Terry said the report "details the accomplishments of the district related to the Strategic Plan [for the period 2005-2010], but by no means all the accomplishments of the

Acting on a proposal from county technology manager Brian Crenshaw, commissioners approved the purchase of updated county aerial photographs from Aerial Focus Inc. for \$1,210 to use with current computer applications. This represents a savings of more than \$13,000 annually, Crenshaw said, compared to the price of photos purchased biannually for \$30,000 from North Central Texas Council of Governments (NTCOG). Discussion of the item centered on whether the resolution of the photos meets needed county use requirements and on assurances that the county does not have an ongoing contract with NTCOG.

The court acknowledged receipt of insurance funds of \$59,006.45 for vehicles totaled in accidents during year and approved replacement of them.

Commissioners approved an agreement with Post, Buckley, Schuh & Jernigan for \$328,769.06 for engineering services for the section of FM 549 from SH 66 to I-30. Commissioners also approved advertising for bids for a stop loss carrier for health insurance for county employees as well as for a provider for the pharmacy benefit part of the plan. A stop-loss policy caps risk for individuals and for the overall county employee health

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# RHHS drum major, communication violinist plans future with strong musical roots

Sitting across the table from 18-year-old Emily Davis, it's hard to believe this pretty and petite young lady was the head drum major of the Rockwall-Heath High 200-member band this past year.

Being born into a musical family, her mother, Tracy, introduced her to the violin at the tender age of 3. Starting with a tiny 12-inch instrument, Emily remembers receiving a gold star at her first recital when she was just 4 years old. As she grew bigger, so did her violins.

"My mom has all my violins displayed, from the smallest to the biggest," laughs Emily.

When Emily was about 9 years old, she was performing as a member of the Fort Worth Youth Orchestra. During a rehearsal, her mother noticed that Emily's violin bowings were different from those of her older colleagues. While everyone else's bows were moving up and down in unison, Emily was

During the break, her mother asked, "What are you doing up there? Why are you not playing your part?"

Emily's response was, "I don't like my part. I like the flute part better because it is prettier."

The child was making up her part and playing it by ear. Amazingly, the conductor didn't notice.

She began playing the oboe when she was a sixth grade student in the Midlothian School District.

"My family had gone to dinner with a bunch of my dad's band director friends. I knew I wanted to be in the band, but I didn't know which instrument I wanted to play," she said. "Everyone was throwing out ideas. My dad suggested the oboe, because the notes are the same as the violin and there aren't a lot of people who play the oboe."

The family moved to Rockwall when Emily started high school because her father, Benny, was offered the position of band director at RHHS, and her mother began work as head of the Rockwall Independent School District orchestra program. Emily continued to excel at both violin and oboe, making All-Region all four years she competed in oboe and all three years she competed in violin. She also went to state all four years in violin. (Contestants are not allowed to audition for the state level with more than one instrument.)

When asked which instrument she likes the best, Emily said, "I love the oboe and don't want to ever stop playing it. But if I had to pick just one, I'd choose the violin. I play the violin on a whole different level than I play the oboe."

When talking about her experiences in the RHHS band, Emily said, "It's more than just music. The members of the band are people who want to do something with their lives. They're disciplined and smart. The goal of the band is to improve you as a person."

During summer freshman band camps, the drum majors try to instill a feeling of family, of belonging, in the new band students. "We don't want to intimidate them," she said. "We want them to know that we're their friends, and we want to make them feel at home."

One of her biggest "wow" moments during her time in the band occurred at one of the competitions last fall.

"I had a 102-degree fever, and I had even passed out during the prelims. Everyone gave me lots of water, and my dad said, 'Honey, I can't just let you out of this. You have to do this."



# Making Americans sick

Health and Human Services Secretary Kathleen Sebelius promised, "The U.S. government plans to increase funding to battle obesity and views healthcare reform as an opportunity to encourage better eating habits." Rather than spending money and attacking the food industry, the secretary and others concerned with the health of Americans ought to go after the U.S. Congress. Let's look at it.

According to a study by researchers at the University of California, Davis, published in the Journal of Clinical Investigation (May 2009), widespread use of fructose may be directly responsible for some of the ongoing increase in rates of childhood diabetes and obesity. Consuming fructosesweetened, not glucose-sweetened, beverages increases abdominal fat and decreases insulin sensitivity in overweight/obese people. The participants in the study who consumed fructose-sweetened food showed an increase of fat cells around major organs including their hearts and livers, and also underwent metabolic changes that are precursors to heart disease and diabetes.

Other studies have linked diets rich in high-fructose corn syrup to elevated risks of high triglycerides (a type of blood fat), fat buildup in the liver and insulin resistance, notes Dr. Gerald Shulman and his colleagues at Yale University School of Medicine.

"This is the first evidence we have that fructose increases diabetes and heart disease independently from causing simple weight gain," said Kimber Stanhope, a molecular biologist who led the UC Davis study, adding, "We didn't see any of these changes in the people eating glucose."

You say, "Williams, glucose, fructose -- what's the fuss?" Glucose is the sugar sold in 5- or 10-pound bags at your supermarket that Americans have used as a sweetener throughout most of our history. Fructose is a sweetener that has more recently come into heavy use by beverage manufacturers and food processors. You ask, "How come all the fructose use now?"

Enter the U.S. Congress. The Fanjul family of Palm Beach, Fla., a politically connected family, has given more than \$1.8 million to both Democratic and Republican parties over the years. They and others in the sugar industry

give millions to congressmen to keep high tariffs on foreign sugar so the U.S. sugar industry can charge us higher prices. According to one study, the Fanjul family alone earns about \$65 million a year from congressional protectionism.

Chairman Emeritus of Archer Daniels Midland Company, Dwayne Andreas, has given politicians millions of dollars to help him enrich ADM at our expense. For that money, congressmen vote to restrict sugar imports that in turn drive up sugar prices. Higher sugar prices benefit ADM, who produces corn syrup (fructose), which is a sugar substitute. When sugar prices are high, sugar users (soda, candy and food processors) turn to corn syrup as a cheaper substitute sweetener. Early on, some sugar-using companies found out they could import products like ice tea, distill out its sugar content and still beat the high prices caused by Congress' protectionist sugar policy, but to do so was eventually made illegal.

Congress' sugar policy not only reduces the health of American people it reduces American jobs as well. Chicago used to be America's candy manufacturing capitol. In 1970, employment by Chicago's candy manufacturers totaled 15,000 and now it's 8,000 and falling. Brach's used to employ about 2,300 people; now most of its jobs are in Mexico. Ferrara Pan Candy has also moved much of its production to Mexico. Yes, wages are lower in Mexico, but wages aren't the only factor in candy manufacturers' flight from America. Sugar is a major cost and in Mexico, they pay one-third to one-half what they pay in the U.S. Life Savers, which for 90 years was manufactured in America, has moved to Canada, where wages are comparable to ours, but their yearly sugar cost is \$10 million less.

Working in the favor of Congress with these and other life-threatening and health-reducing schemes is American unawareness and the fact that most often, their victims are invisible.

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# Judge gets it right!

Do you remember the "shoe bomber"? This is the guy who a few years ago put a plastic explosive bomb in his shoe, boarded an American Airlines plane from Paris to Miami and tried unsuccessfully to detonate it just before it landed. Smelling smoke from matches, two flight attendants and several passengers poured water on the 6'3" would be bomber, overpowered him and tied him up with seatbelt extensions and headphone cords. A doctor on board injected him with a tranquilizer, and the plane made an emergency landing in Boston. Do you remember that the "shoe bomber" was already tried and sentenced? Do you recall seeing or hearing any of the federal trial judge's comments reported in the media? Not likely, because they were not widely reported.

The "shoe bomber" was sentenced by Judge William G. Young, a U.S. District Judge in the District of Massachusetts. Judge Young is a Harvard Law School graduate and was appointed by President Reagan. Before the

bomber" proudly admitted his guilt and proclaimed his allegiance to Osama bin Laden and to Islam. Defiantly he said, "I will not apologize for my actions ... I am at war with your country".

Judge Young responded by sentencing him to a life sentence, four consecutive 20 year sentences, an additional consecutive 30 year sentence plus over \$2 million in fines. But then Judge Young said these remarkable and memorable words;

"This is the sentence that is provided for by our statutes. It is a fair and a just sentence. It is a righteous sentence. Now let me explain this to you We are not afraid of you or any of your terrorist co-conspirators, Mr. Reid We are Americans. We have been through the fire before. ... You are not ar enemy combatant. You are a terrorist. You are not a soldier in any war. To give you that reference, to call you a solider, gives you far too much stature ... You are a terrorist. And we do not negotiate with terrorists. We hunt then down one by one and bring them to justice."

"It seems to me you hate the one thing that to us is most precious. You hate our freedom. Our individual freedom. Our individual freedom to live as we choose, to come and go as we choose, to believe or not believe as we individually choose. Here in this society, the very wind carries freedom. I carries it everywhere from sea to shining sea...We Americans are all abou freedom. Because we all know that the way we treat you, Mr.Reid, is the measure of our own liberties. Make no mistake though. It is yet true that we will bear any burden; pay any price to preserve our freedoms. Look around this courtroom. Mark it well. The world is not going to long remember wha you or I say here. The day after tomorrow, it will be forgotten, but this, however, will long endure. ... See that flag, Mr. Reid? That's the flag of the United States of America. That flag will fly there long after this is all forgotten. Tha

flag stands for freedom. And it always will." This judge got it right!
