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Bad News, Good News' headlines Monday's County Commissioners' budget session

County Commissioners Court resumed business Monday (5/31/11) continuing last week's budget discussions. With a number of special firefighters, in attendance, the court's agenda included discussions on options, redistricting, public safety funding for unincorporated areas of Rockwall County and a major announcement involving construction.

County Commissioner Jerry Hogan called the meeting to order with "bad news and good news" as the first item on the agenda.

"Bad news, you're going to see a lot of construction in Rockwall," he said. "The good news is, there's a lot of money coming in to do it."

County attorney Jonathan Thatcher reported details of the agreement with the Texas Department of Transportation that approved the high financing project Rockwall County's improvements to I-30. According to a TxDOT news release dated May 26, a total of 17 "Pass-Through Financing" projects were approved across the state, totaling an estimated \$173 million.

Through financing, TxDOT's website explains, "allows local or private entities to pay for projects and be reimbursed over time by the state for construction costs, once a project becomes operational."

According to Thatcher, Rockwall County could face as much as \$32 million in implementation costs along I-30, but the Pass-through Financing would roughly \$11 million back in the county's pocket over a 10- to 12-year period.

Hogan questioned what impact these costs may have on the tax rate, as projects could involve major spending in 2013. Whether or not Rockwall County can see the construction through without a tax increase in 2013 depends on the timing, they were advised. Staff planned to meet next week to "hash out the details" to be able to answer this question at the next meeting.

On a different matter altogether, the court discussed the possibility of hiring a marketing company to add video content to its website, allowing local businesses to advertise on the Rockwall County site.

After viewing a brief demo on the Wise County website, the court was in agreement, despite endorsements by the National Association of Broadcasters (NAB).

The marketing company seeking this contract does not require any payment from the county. They proposed to provide the production, film whatever is asked, assist with the script and provide and edit the films from the Rockwall County. The company then sells the films to local companies, whose banner ads would appear on the Rockwall County website.

The arrangement would not generate any revenue for the county from advertising, but the county would benefit from the publicity and an avenue for advertising to a major website (the county's).

During the first discussion on the subject, the court weighed the advantages and disadvantages against several legal issues. Concerns were expressed over lack of control over the advertising content, and perceptions of vendors might be receiving preferential treatment if others were not advertised on the county website.

Hogan continued to urge caution and inquiries as to how deeply the county had been investigated, Commissioner Lorie Grinnan was asked to look further into these concerns to report at the next meeting.

A number of firefighters in attendance, the court issued an invitation to the public to speak, but no one indicated they would ask questions or share their views at that time.

The safety-related items on the draft budget proposal included the potential reduction of law enforcement and the reduction of fire department services by the county. Hogan explained that originally the recommendations for contributions to various fire departments was based on coverage of the area.

"ETJ's jurisdiction limits have extended out so far that the county area is being reduced from the time these contributions were first started," Hogan further explained that since municipal statutes require — and provide for — their own fire departments, that "any other monies you pay are a plus."

"We look at a reduced area of coverage, the recommendation was that the board should depart be reduced in proportionate amount in the unincorporated areas."

Hogan said although they certainly don't want to have the county unprepared in these areas, he found no fault with reducing funding in this area. He reminded everyone that a decision has yet to be made on this resolution, however, and emphasized that anyone was welcome to talk to them in a workshop or a regular meeting to be heard on this issue.

Discussing whether proposed money-saving measure, Hogan detailed the options for considering outsourcing some county services.

The possibility of contracting out local law enforcement has already been discussed. The court's consensus was against such an arrangement, as they felt the county would not have the same type of security or control with contracted services.

Contracting services, on the other hand, could be effectively outsourced for savings of \$100,000 per year, according to the draft proposal. Currently, employing its own cleaning staff costs the county a total of \$289,000, not including supplies and equipment. Bidders recently responded estimates of \$131,000 to clean all county buildings.

Hogan said that for most is a very significant business decision that is very easy to make.

The court has not yet voted to approve any of these bids; they will all be discussed at the next commissioners meeting.

Heath rocket team captures national title

It's not every day that a group of high school students is invited to their congressman's house or qualifies for a free trip to France, but these are no ordinary teenagers. These young men are members of the Heath-Side Boys Rocket Club that captured the national title in the 2011 Team America Rocketry Challenge.

On May 21 the foursome gathered with their parents and teacher adviser, Susan Vogel, at the home of Congressman Ralph Hall, who presented each student with a flag that had been flown over the Capitol, posed for photographs and praised their efforts.

Since Hall is chairman of the Science, Space and Technology Committee, the praise meant a lot to the boys. Hall issued a news release on May 13, which read, "I would like to congratulate the four bright young men from my hometown who won this year's rocketry challenge. Out of more than 600 teams, I couldn't be more proud that a team from my congressional district took home the first prize. Competitions such as these are a great way to encourage students to prepare for careers in the aerospace industry, by giving them hands-on experience in applying science, technology, engineering, and mathematics (STEM) skills."

He concluded by saying, "I wish these four young men the very best as they travel next month to Paris, France, to compete against talented teams from other countries."

The Heath-Side Boys Rocket Club is made up of four students: project manager, rocket designer and web designer John Easum; payload lead and outreach manager Michael Gerritsen; safety officer Colt McNally; and construction manager and payload integration specialist Landon Fisher. The group has been together since 2006 when Rockwall Independent School District science teacher Ursula Rakow presented the Team America Rocketry Challenge to her science class. With a \$60,000 grand prize as incentive, the Heath-Side Boys Rocket Club was formed.

Last spring the group placed 12th in the competition, but this year they came out on top, beating 99 qualifying teams out of the 600 that registered, to win the world's largest student rocket contest. Students were required to build a 2.2 pound (or lighter) rocket that would reach an altitude of exactly 750 feet and return an egg safely back to earth. The Rockwall team launched its first rocket to a height of 736 feet.

The weather proved a huge factor in their triumph. The day of the launch, low clouds and dense fog

hung over the grassy field where participants prepared their rockets for lift-off. Many teams were not prepared, but the Heath team was ready.

"The one thing that sets our team apart from the majority of other teams is the amount of flight testing that we do," Easum said. "We launch dozens of times throughout the year in various types of weather. At every launch we record all of the numerous weather conditions, so that after many tests we are able to set up our rocket to reach near the target altitude."

The contest is designed to encourage students to pursue careers in the aeronautical engineering field, which is an area in which the United States is currently experiencing a shortage in the work force. The competition is sponsored by the National Association of Rocketry and the Aerospace Industries Association, which represents civil, military and business aircraft manufacturers.

Receiving the title includes a chance to compete against British and French teams June 24 at the Paris Le Bourget Air Show. Defense and aerospace contractor Raytheon Corporation is funding the trip for the team. The team from Heath is eager to see Paris. McNally plans to skip his chance to accompany his soccer team to the state championship. The group will be staying in a hotel located directly across from the Louvre and plans to tour the catacombs and take a boat ride on the Seine while in France.

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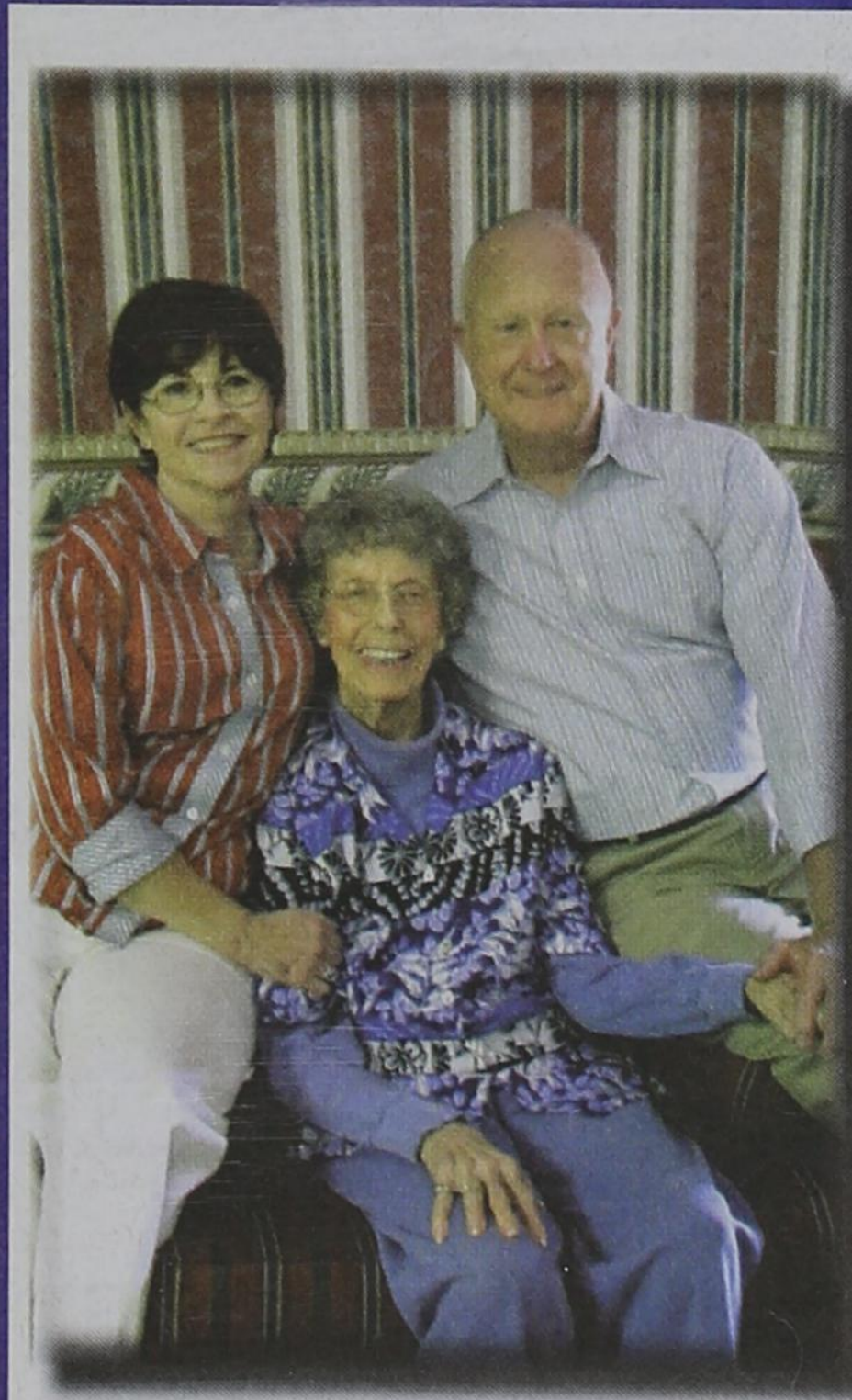
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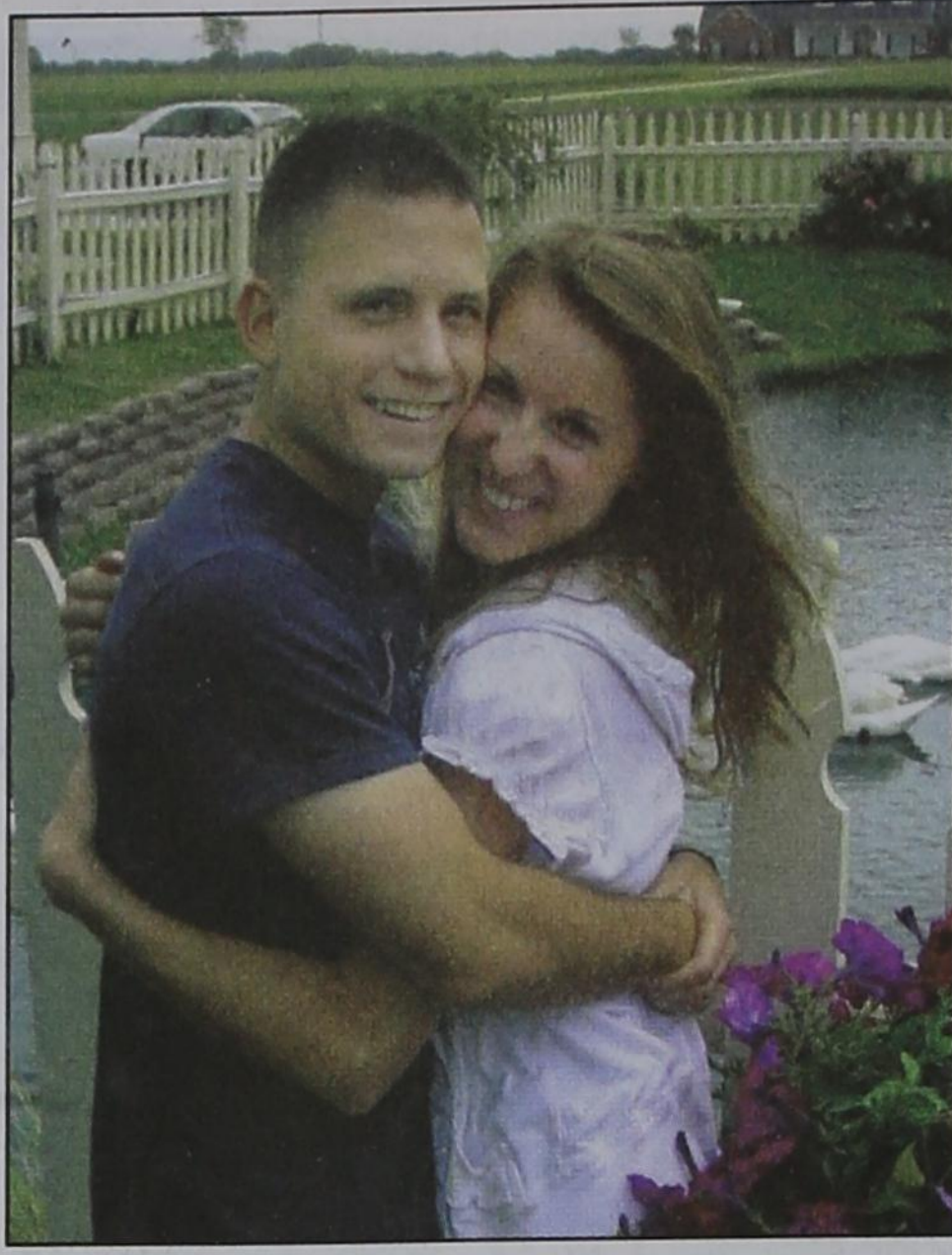

Finally, the court discussed an outsourcing option for third party management of the county library. The company providing the estimates is active in the Texas area, having managed libraries for Farmers Branch and Lancaster, with particularly high recommendations. Lancaster reported that the company raised grant funding, revamped programs, and took measures that allowed them to resume operations on their own.

If approved, the plan would maintain all current library programs and service hours, and all current employees would be invited to interview to continue in library. Overall, the plan would reduce operation costs by \$300,000. This item will be placed on the next agenda to formally vote on issuing a Request For Proposals (RFP) from interested vendors.

Throughout the budget process, the court will continue to make relevant documents available to the public, such as the draft proposals and PowerPoint explanation already posted on the county website. Hogan emphasized that budget matters would remain open for discussion at all meetings.

The court broadcasts its meetings in live streaming audio on the county website at rockwallcountytx.com.

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neering protocol to design, test, build and launch a high-powered rocket that would travel to a height of one mile while carrying a scientific payload. As a result of the presentation at the Team America Rocketry Challenge, the team was recognized as the national champion in the presentation category.

The Heath-Side Boys Rocket Club was recognized at the Student Launch Initiative for achieving a flight closest to one mile. Their rocket apogee within 16 feet of the target range, which was closer than other teams including Vanderbilt, Purdue and MIT.

The team's sponsor still uses the word "unbelievable" when talking about the group's victory as the National Champions of TARC. "It has inspired so many students to want to join the program including a girl who would like to start a girls team at the high school."

Being a part of the Heath-Side Boys Rocket Club has been an official to all its members. Each member is taught each one valuable lesson.

"I learned that hard work with horrible luck, will pay off in some way," says Maxine Harber.

"HSBR has been an experience in applied problem-solving. We've run into countless situations where we just had to put together and come up with a solution," Fisher said.

Gerritsen adds, "HSBR students with the tools and knowledge allows them to create, test, and shoot their own creation."

The team's success has earned them celebrities in their hometown. They have been featured in local and national newspapers. A display case at Rockwall High School is dedicated to their achievement. In addition, the Trustees Awarded the RHCISD board meeting on May 24, 2011, for their recognition at the RHCISD ceremony on May 24.

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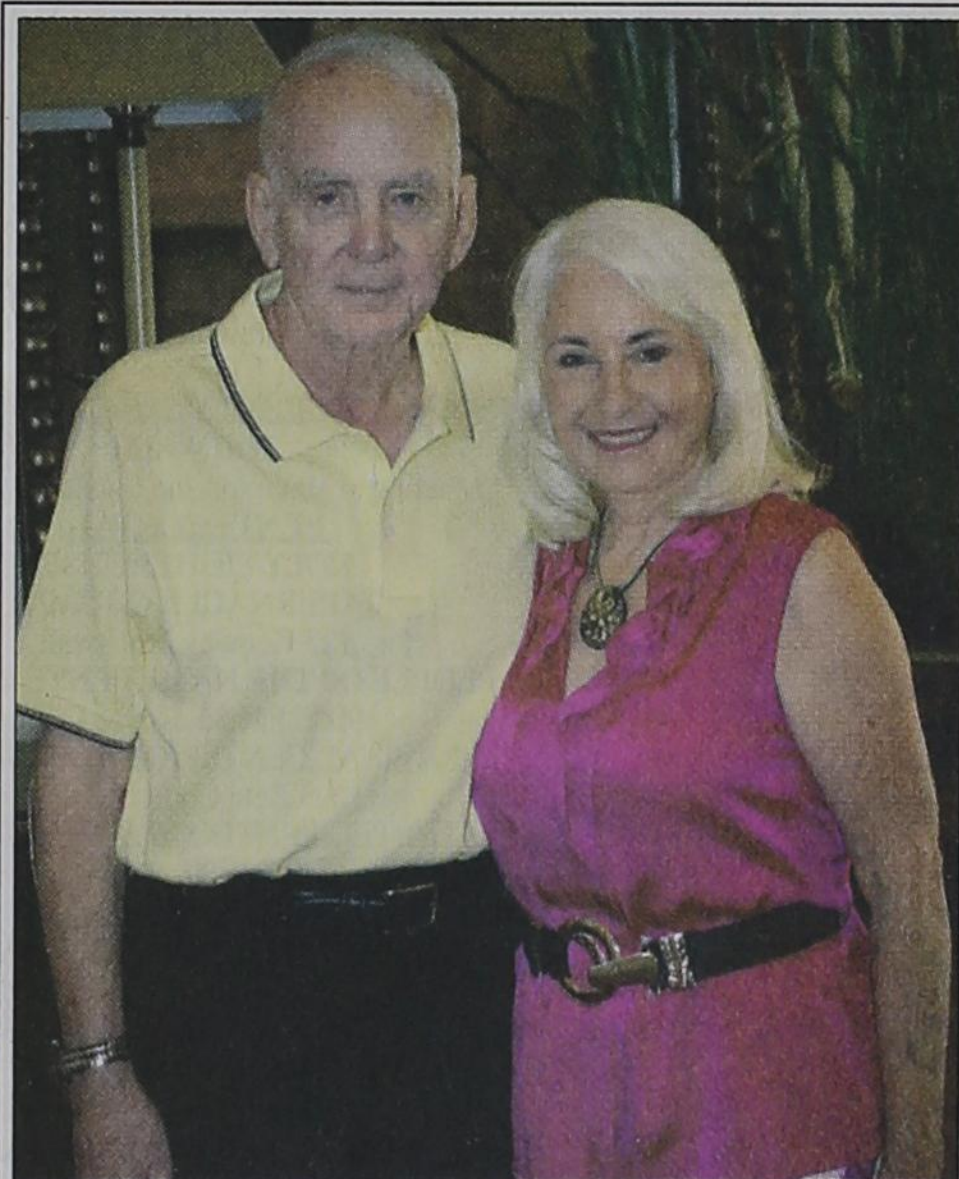
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On God's Word

1Corinthians 12:28-30 says, "And God has set some in the church. 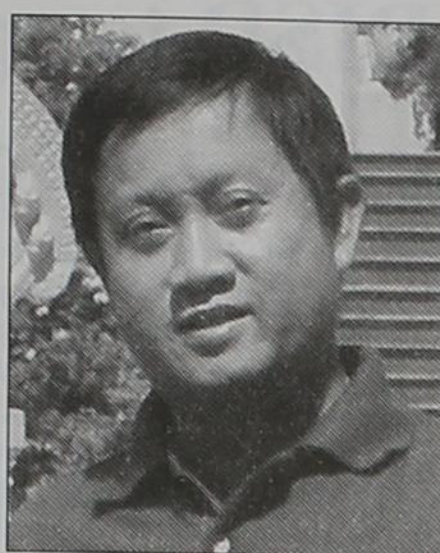

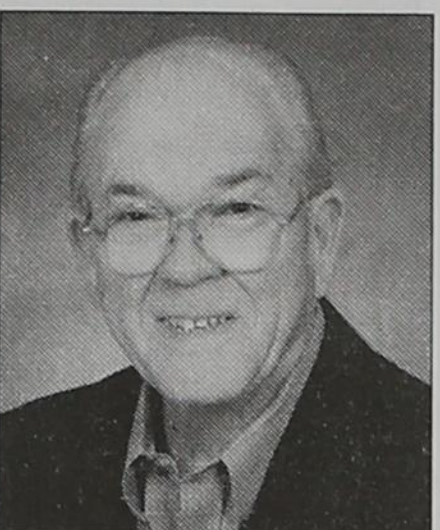

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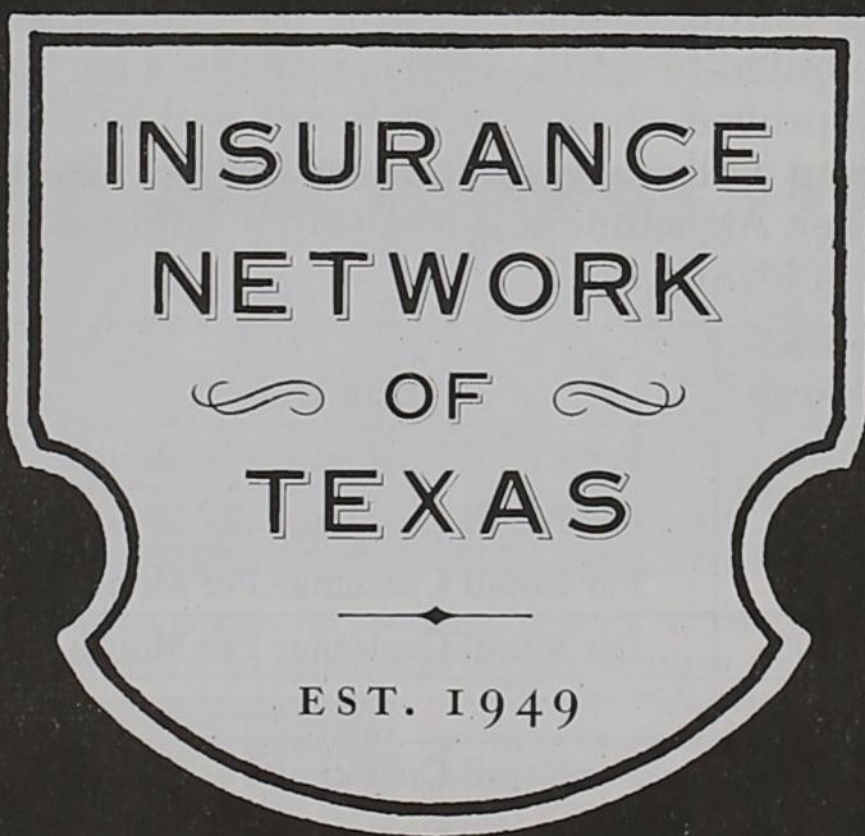

Boaters are encouraged to help save Texas' lakes by cleaning, draining and drying boats each time they are used, according to a city news release.

The mussels negatively impact native fish and mussels and foul beaches with their sharp shells, in addition to creating havoc for boaters by damaging hulls and reducing the performance of boating equipment. Zebra mussels also can clog water intakes, costing taxpayers.

The mussels already have invaded Lake Texoma, and state officials are concerned they could impact all freshwater sources in the state.





In defense of liberty and due process of law

Editor's Note: The following is a series of letters and news releases related to last week's U.S. Department of Justice threat to the Texas State Senate regarding the passage of legislation protecting Texans from abusive and unlawful searches and seizures by federal agents. The information is provided from the web site of Texas State Representative David Simpson, who introduced House Bill 1937.

An Open Letter to State Officials from State Representative David Simpson (District 7), dated May 24, 2011 to Gov. Rick Perry, Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst, Rep. Joe Straus and Attorney General Gregg Abbott.

Dear Sirs:
Today you received a letter from Mr. John E. Murphy, United States Attorney, Western District of Texas in regards to House Bill 1937 currently up for consideration by the Senate.

In his letter, Mr. Murphy made a veiled threat to the elected officials of Texas that if we move to protect the constitutional rights of our citizens, the TSA could shut down flights to and from Texas airports.

175 years ago in the first battle of the Texas Revolution against Mexico, a small band of Texans stood in defiance at Gonzalez, turning back the attempt to deprive them of their weapon of defense, a single cannon.

Gentlemen, we find ourselves at such a watershed moment today. The federal government is attempting to deprive the citizens of Texas of their constitutional rights under the Fourth Amendment of the United States Constitution and Article 1, Section 9 of the Texas Constitution. If we do not stand for our citizens in the face of this deprivation of their personal rights and dignity, who will?

Time is critical. If the bill does not pass the Senate tonight it may very well be dead until the next legislative session. Meanwhile, our wives, our children, our mothers and grandmothers, will be rudely violated by federal employees out of control.

My response to Mr. Murphy's factually inaccurate letter follows. Please give this matter your immediate attention.

For Texas And Liberty!

John E. Murphy, U.S. Attorney letter states:

TSA False Statement: "As you no doubt are aware, the bill makes it a crime for a federal Transportation Security Official to perform the security screening that he or she is authorized and required by federal law to perform."

Truth: HB 1937 states that a person commits an offense if, while acting under color of the person's office or employment without probable cause, performs a search for the purpose of granting access to a publicly accessible building or form of transportation and intentionally, knowingly, or recklessly touches the anus, sexual organ, buttocks or breasts of the other person. We know of no federal law that requires this kind of search without probable cause.

TSA False Statement: "The proposed legislation would make it unlawful for a federal agent such as a TSO to perform certain specified searches for the purpose of granting access to a publicly accessible building or form of transportation. The provision would thus criminalize searches that are required under federal regulations in order to ensure the safety of the American public."

Truth: HB 1937 grants a defense to prosecution for an offense that the actor performed pursuant to and consistent with an explicit and applicable grant of federal statutory authority that is consistent with the United States Constitution.

So, if there is actually statutory authority consistent with the Constitution, all an agent must do is bring that statute to the attention of the court. In other words, Texas needs to tell the Department of Justice, "You show me yours (statutory authority) and I'll show you mine (privates)"

TSA False Statement: "The legislation also makes it crime for a public servant, as defined in the bill, to deny or impede another person in the exercise or enjoyment of any right or privilege, knowing that the public servant's conduct is unlawful. As a result, it appears that the intent of the bill is to preclude a TSO from turning away from the secure area of an airport someone who otherwise would have been subjected to a pat down as a condition of entry."

Truth: Actually, it is already current law in Texas that public servants cannot intentionally deny or impede another person in the exercise or enjoyment of any privilege, power, or immunity, knowing the public servant's conduct is unlawful. TSO would only be precluded from touching specific private areas of an individual without probable cause to believe the person committed an offense. The bill will not prohibit a TSO from using administrative screening methods with metal detectors, scanners, explosive sniffing dogs or pat downs that do not include touching the travelers anus, breasts, sexual organs, or buttocks.

TSA False Statement: The effect of this bill, if enacted, would be to interfere directly with the Transportation Administration's (TSA) responsibility for civil aviation security. 49 U.S.C. Section 114 (d); 6 U.S.C. Section 202 (1). Congress has directed the Administrator of TSA to take "necessary actions to improve domestic air transportation security," 49 U.S.C. Section 44904(e), and directed him to "prescribe regulations to protect passengers and property on aircraft . . . against an act of criminal violence or aircraft piracy." Id. Section 44903(b). Congress has directed TSA to provide for "the screening of all passengers and property . . . before boarding," in order to ensure that no passenger is unlawfully carrying a dangerous weapon, explosive, or other destructive substance. Id. Sections 44901(a), 44902(a), 114(e). If the Administrator determines that "a particular threat cannot be addressed in a way adequate to ensure . . . the safety of passengers and crew of a particular flight," he "shall cancel the flight or series of flights." Id. Section 44905(b)

Truth: Nowhere in the language cited is there statutory authority for a government agent to touch the breasts, anus, sexual organs, or buttocks of a traveler. And, no where in the Texas legislation does it prohibit that touching if there is probable cause to believe an offense has been committed. HB 1937 merely works on the premise that Texans don't have to forfeit their dignity to exercise their right of free travel.

TSA False Statement: HB 1937 would conflict directly with federal law.
Truth: It is perplexing that the United States Attorney would make a statement saying one thing while citing examples that do not substantiate the remark. Either he intentionally misrepresented the truth, was unaware of the actual language of HB 1937, or has other statutes to validate his statement. No comment on the first two scenarios, but if the third scenario exists, then the defense to prosecution will apply and Americans will be made aware of the actions of their elected officials.

TSA False Statement: The practical import of the bill is that it would threaten criminal prosecution of TSA personnel who carry out the security procedures required under federal statutes and TSA regulations passed to implement those statutes. Those officials cannot be put to the choice of risking criminal prosecution or carrying out their federal duties. Under the Supremacy Clause of the United States Constitution, Texas has no authority to regulate federal agents and employees in the performance of their federal duties or to pass a statute that conflicts with federal law.

Truth: HB 1937 only threatens criminal prosecution if there is inappropriate touching and there is no federal statute consistent with the United States Constitution to do so. As elected officials, Texas legislators have taken an oath to uphold both the U.S. Constitution and the Texas Constitution. In that capacity, they not only have authority to pass a statute that would reign in the daily violation of Fourth Amendment rights, they have a responsibility to do so.

TSA Threat: If HB 1937 were enacted, the federal government would likely seek an emergency stay of the statute. Unless or until such a stay were granted, TSA would likely be required to cancel any flight or series of flights for which it could not ensure the safety of passengers and crew.

Truth: The United States Attorney has thrown down the gauntlet. Either Texas backs off and continues to let government employees fondle innocent women, children and men as a condition of travel, or the TSA has the authority to cancel flights or series of flights.

Homeland Security Secretary Janet Napolitano says, "Well, actually, very, very, very few people get a pat-down."

Atlanta TSA spokesman Jon Allen told us (Hot Air) that during March, 3 percent of air passengers were subject to a pat-down. The TSA collects this data by monitoring "data from select airports throughout the year," he wrote in an email. That number is "consistent with that of previous time periods." . . .

So, 97 percent of people who go through the nation's airports do not go through these offensive searches. And yet, a United State's Attorney warns that flights to Texas could be shut down because TSA would not be able to ensure the safety of passengers and crew if agents could not touch the genitals of the other 3 percent.

Someone must make a stand against the atrocities of our government agents. As Reagan said, "If not us, who? And if not now, when?"

Federal bullying stops Senate despite overwhelming public support
Thousands of phone calls and emails arrived Wednesday in support of HB 1937 to stop the TSA from groping travelers other options for bill's passage explored.

(Austin) Despite overwhelming support from the public for HB 1937, a bill to protect the Fourth Amendment rights of Texas citizens, the federal Department of Justice (DOJ) succeeded in intimidating the Texas Senate into submission with a threatening letter full of misleading statements. The bill was brought up again for discussion by its Senate sponsor Dan Patrick (R-Houston) late Wednesday night, but after the DOJ's bullying tactics several Senators were unwilling to sign back on to the bill. Rep. David Simpson's (R-Longview) office is currently exploring other avenues for passing the law.

The Governor's office as well as a Senate office confirmed that multiple thousands of both emails and phone calls arrived Wednesday and Thursday in support of HB 1937, as it was being reconsidered by the Senate. The Lt. Governor's office would not release the number of contacts they had received, citing privacy considerations, but they did redirect callers to a comment hotline to handle the influx of calls regarding the TSA and other issues.

"Despite about a dozen Senators falling for the DOJ's bluff, Sen. Patrick and I were encouraged by the incredible outpouring of support for the protection of dignity and freedom by concerned citizens," said Simpson, the bill's author. "Individual Texans from across the entire state made their voice clearly heard. Unfortunately, the federal government's bullying tactics drowned out the voice of the people."

The DOJ delivered an ultimatum to the Texas Legislature on Tuesday: Allow the TSA to keep touching the privates of innocent women, children, and men or they'll shut down flights in Texas. Some Senators wavered and the bill lost more than one-third of its support in the Senate after having been passed unanimously on all four previous legislative votes the House Criminal Jurisprudence Committee, second and third reading in the House, and the Senate Transportation and Homeland Security Committee.

The DOJ attempted to justify their action by an appeal to the Supremacy Clause of the United States Constitution and by claiming that the bill "would conflict directly with federal law." However, HB 1937 already grants a defense to prosecution for an offense that the actor performed pursuant to and consistent with an explicit and applicable grant of federal authority that is consistent with the United States Constitution.

"I will continue to work with colleagues in the newly formed organization United States for Travel Freedom, led by Rep. Cissna in Alaska and Sen. Stevens in Washington State, to promote legislation that will protect our citizens' dignity and constitutional rights from an overreaching federal government," Simpson said today.

HB 1937 would prohibit the TSA or other public officials from using invasive pat-down procedures as a condition of travel that include touching the private areas of a traveler unless probable cause can be demonstrated that someone has committed an offense. It is intended to ensure that security officials abide by the 4th Amendment to the US Constitution and Article 1 Section 9 of the Texas Constitution.

Legislators in nine states join forces to change TSA policies

JUNEAU The United States for Travel Freedom, a newly created bipartisan caucus of legislators from nine states, announced its determination to fight for the rights of Americans to travel free of the invasive scanning and pat-down policies now mandated by the Transportation Security Administration.

At least a dozen USTF legislators have introduced bills in their states to halt the TSA procedures. The Texas House recently passed a bill introduced by USTF member Rep. David Simpson. The measure calls for the prosecution of any agent who unlawfully and unreasonably searches a citizen in a Texas airport.

"Our citizens are waking up to the unconstitutional policies of the TSA," said USTF founder, Rep. Sharon Cissna of Alaska. "Our constitution guarantees us the right to travel free of unreasonable searches and seizures, yet ordinary citizens are subjected to dangerous x-ray scans that expose them to unconfirmed health risks and pat-down procedures that are so invasive they actually constitute sexual assault in many states."

The USTF reports that momentum is building to stop TSA procedures and replace them, if necessary, with less intrusive security measures such as bomb-sniffing dogs or interview techniques similar to those used by anti-terrorist experts in Israel.

"One of my main concerns is the effect of the TSA procedures on children," said state Sen. Val Stevens of Washington. "Parents will wisely not want their small children subjected to the scanners' x-rays, so they opt for the pat-down. As children are touched in places they have been told to protect, they become traumatized. One six-year-old from Kentucky, subjected to a pat-down in New Orleans, started crying from humiliation. It was just heartbreaking. We should not be doing this to our kids."

As a breast cancer survivor, Cissna has refused to travel by commercial air flights after being subjected to a humiliating and offensive pat-down when her TSA scan showed the result of her treatment.

"Ordinary citizens across this country have told us they are being treated like common criminals by the TSA," said Cissna. "Many of them are cancer or other health-related survivors, whose prostheses, pacemakers or other surgically implanted devices cause them to be continually subjected to embarrassing pat-down procedures."

Other members of the USTF include: Rep. Will Tallman of Pennsylvania, Rep. Diane Sands of Montana, Assemblywoman Alison McHose and Sen. Michael Doherty of New Jersey, Reps. Jenn Coffey and Jordan Uley of New Hampshire, Reps. Chris Tuck and Max Gruenberg of Alaska, and Sen. Sam Slom of Hawaii.

"This is not a partisan issue," said Cissna. "We invite any state legislator or federal for that matter to join us in this effort. Americans deserve to travel safely, but not at the expense of their freedom and dignity. There is a way to do both, and we're here to reclaim these rights for every citizen."

Texans may need to take note of these words from The American Declaration of Independence:

When in the Course of human events it becomes necessary for one people to dissolve the political bands which have connected them with another, and to assume among the powers of the earth, the separate and equal station to which the Laws of Nature and of Nature's God entitle them, a decent respect to the opinions of mankind requires that they should declare the causes which impel them to the separation.

We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness. — That to secure these rights, Governments are instituted among Men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed, — That whenever any Form of Government becomes destructive of these ends, it is the Right of the People to alter or to abolish it, and to institute new Government, laying its foundation on such principles and organizing its powers in such a manner as to them shall seem most likely to effect their Safety and Happiness. Prudence, indeed, will dictate that Governments long established should not be changed for light and transient causes; and accordingly all experience hath shewn that mankind are more disposed to suffer, while evils are sufferable than to right themselves by abolishing the forms to which they are accustomed. But when a long train of abuses and usurpations, pursuing invariably the same Object evinces a design to reduce them under absolute Despotism, it is their right, it is their duty, to throw off such Government, and to provide new Guards for their future security.

Feds Issue Threat to Fly Zone for Texas

Yesterday (May 24, 2011) the U.S. Department of Justice issued a high-stakes political game of chicken. Lobbying against the Texas legislature which would criminalize any TSA search without probable cause, U.S. Attorney John E. Murphy sent high-ranking members of Texas' government warning against the bill and threatening a complete closure of all flights to and from Texas airports.

"If HR [sic] 1937 were enacted, the federal government would seek an emergency stay of the statute," Murphy wrote. "Unless such a stay were granted, TSA would likely be required to cancel any flights for which it could not ensure the safety of passengers and crew."

No doubt written with the threatening intent one reader added: "We urge that you consider the ramifications of this threat to your vote."

Previous to the federal government's threat, the Texas legislature considered the ramifications of the bill. More importantly, they considered a clear need to uphold the Fourth Amendment and ensure the right "to be secure in their persons, houses, papers, and effects, against unreasonable searches and seizures" — a right which the Constitution mandates "shall not be violated."

Repeated TSA violations of the Fourth Amendment

That need has demonstrated itself in great abundance in the past. The TSA has aggressively pursued its new policy of invasive searches at the nation's airports. The "ramifications" to which the U.S. Attorney refers are evidently an easily dismissed matter of little importance to the federal government; to those affected by these policies, the ramifications are anything but minor. To prevent further occurrences is no doubt a welcome development.

It was less than a month ago at the Dallas, TX airport where USA Susie Castillo tearfully produced a viral video describing her experience. She had just then endured at the hands of a TSA agent a search that "actually... touched my vagina," Castillo said through her tears. "I choose to either get molested... or go through that's completely unhealthy and dangerous. I don't want to go through this. I am crying."

Castillo isn't the only person who would be protected by this legislation. All other innocent travelers would likewise be affected. This includes the six year old girl who made the headlines last month when she was groped by a TSA agent (an action which the TSA defended, since it "followed the current standard operating procedures") and an eight-month-old infant subjected to a pat down while cradled in her mother's arms.

These are but a few of the myriad confrontations that occur at airports. Agents detain, invasively search, and seize items from innocent travelers who are not suspected of any crime whatsoever. Texas' bill would prohibit the perversion of the law within its state, but the federal government is clearly interested in justifying and maintaining its statist status.

Repeated Threats from the Federal Government

Evidence of that arrogant persistence is found in letters sent to Texas officials last night by the U.S. Attorney to Texas officials. Also, a similarly threatening letter was sent to Oklahoma by the U.S. Attorney. In it, the state is warned against pursuing a constitutional amendment to make the English language official. The threat was to withhold appropriated funds to the state.

Another letter was sent in 2009 to both Montana and Tennessee to those states passing a Firearms Freedom Act. Rather than an attempt to challenge the act, these letters completely dismissed any constitutional concern by the states, instead (incorrectly) affirming the federal government's supreme authority over the issue at hand.

More recently, a U.S. Attorney wrote to the Governor of Texas warning against that state's implementation of medical marijuana laws which would constitutionally regulate the manufacture, distribution, and consumption of the plant within the state. The attorney trumpeted the state's laws relating to the "controlled substance" and assured the Governor that the Department of Justice's full resources would be brought to bear on the state (theirs included) which attempted to oppose the federal government's policies.

Rob Natelson, recognized national expert on the founding of the Constitution, considers these letters to be far more ominous than the 2009 letters, he said. "I look at this letter which gets close to looking like an order from the federal government to a sovereign state legislature, and I say... WOW! That's something that (Roman Emperor) Septimius Severus would have done to local officials." He continued, "It reminds one eerily of the communications that started to come out from the Emperor to the provincial governors in the Roman Empire, beginning the course of the ultimate destruction of the empire."

Despite Threats, Moving Forward

For now, it appears that the U.S. Attorney's threat has resulted in the sponsor of the Texas bill has decided to concede defeat in the Texas legislature and stand for liberty in the state of Texas," said Senator Dan Patrick. As such, as of right now, the bill has died.

This much is clear: the federal government should not consider itself above the law. As individuals are being unjustly molested on a daily basis, it is becoming apparent that there exists a strong, emotionally-charged resistance against the TSA and its invasive searches and seizures.

If anything, the withdrawal of Texas' legislation last night should be seen as a sign of the calm before the coming storm of state-based opposition to the TSA.

Texas is Not Alone

If anything can serve as a rallying cry to unite the states against the unconstitutional action on the part of the federal government, it is the institutionalized and fear-based justification of the molestation of men, women, and children. The U.S. Attorney's stern counsel to "cancel flights" of the Texas bill speaks more in support of the state than against it.

Indeed, when one considers the ramifications of not opposing the federal government on this issue, it is difficult to imagine how many states will be felt up by the feds for no valid reason whatsoever. That is the nightmare is enough to encourage a single state — in this case, Texas — to stand strong in the defense of the individual liberties of its citizens.

But Texas is not alone. Already, four other states are considering "travel freedom" legislation. And, sources close to the U.S. Attorney tell us to expect at least ten others in 2012. Taken together, the evidence that many other states will soon be picking up the baton and having the courage needed to put the federal government back in its place — which isn't inside the waistline of innocent passengers.

The TSA's resident propagandist, Blogger Bob, will have his work cut out for him in the months ahead.

Hawks again rally, return to Regional finals

 Jovan Hernandez blasted a three-run home run in the top of the fifth inning Saturday to turn around a deficit and send Rockwall-Heath to the Region II-4A baseball finals for the second consecutive year.

The Hawks (35-7-1) had lost the day's first game 4-2 to allow Waxahachie to tie the best-of-3 semifinal series at a game apiece. That forced Game 3. Playing on their home field, the Indians (28-13) then

took a 2-1 lead with a third-inning run.

RHHS' Austin Stewart led off the fifth with a walk against Waxahachie starting pitcher Ryan Cawthon. Cameron Phillips replaced Cawthon, and retired Bret Boswell on a fly ball. Working carefully, Phillips walked Jake Thompson, whose home run had accounted for the Hawks' runs in Saturday's first game.

Hernandez then hit a shot toward left field, directly into a wind blowing at 25 miles per hour or more throughout the day. The junior hit the ball hard enough that it carried over the left field fence at Paul Richards Park to give Rockwall-Heath a 4-2 lead.

Waxahachie came back with a fifth-inning run to cut the deficit to 4-3, but RHHS went back ahead with an unearned run in the sixth.

Thompson then moved to the pitcher's mound and held the Indians scoreless to save the 5-3 victory for the Hawks and winning pitcher Jake Baxter (5-1). He also had won the deciding third game in the Regional quarterfinals against Dallas Hillcrest.

The semifinal victory allowed RHHS to return to the Region II-4A finals, this time against Mesquite Poteet. The Pirates advanced with a 10-2 victory over defending Regional champion Frisco Wakeland in a one-game playoff Friday, May 27.

The Hawks' semifinal series began as if it would be a breeze. Playing at RHHS Thursday, May 26, they scored three runs in the first inning, four in the second and two more in the third for a 9-0 victory.

Each team put two of its first three batters on base in the first inning, but that was the only similarity between them.

Thompson gave up a one-out single to Seth Sims and walked Kyle McElroy. After that, Thompson (11-3) pitched what head coach Greg Harvey called "his best game of the year."

A strikeout and a groundout ended Waxahachie's first-inning threat. The visitors didn't put another runner on base until Thompson hit Michael Bosch with a pitch with one out in

the sixth.

That wasn't the only way Thompson starred. He hit a three-run homer in the second inning. After moving to first base for the seventh

inning, the junior made a diving stop of a ground ball and threw to pitcher Caleb Copley for an out.

The Hawks scored their first runs of the series in the bottom of the

first. With one out, Nick Moore hit a home run and walked Thompson. He then threw a strike to Hernandez to tie the ball far over the

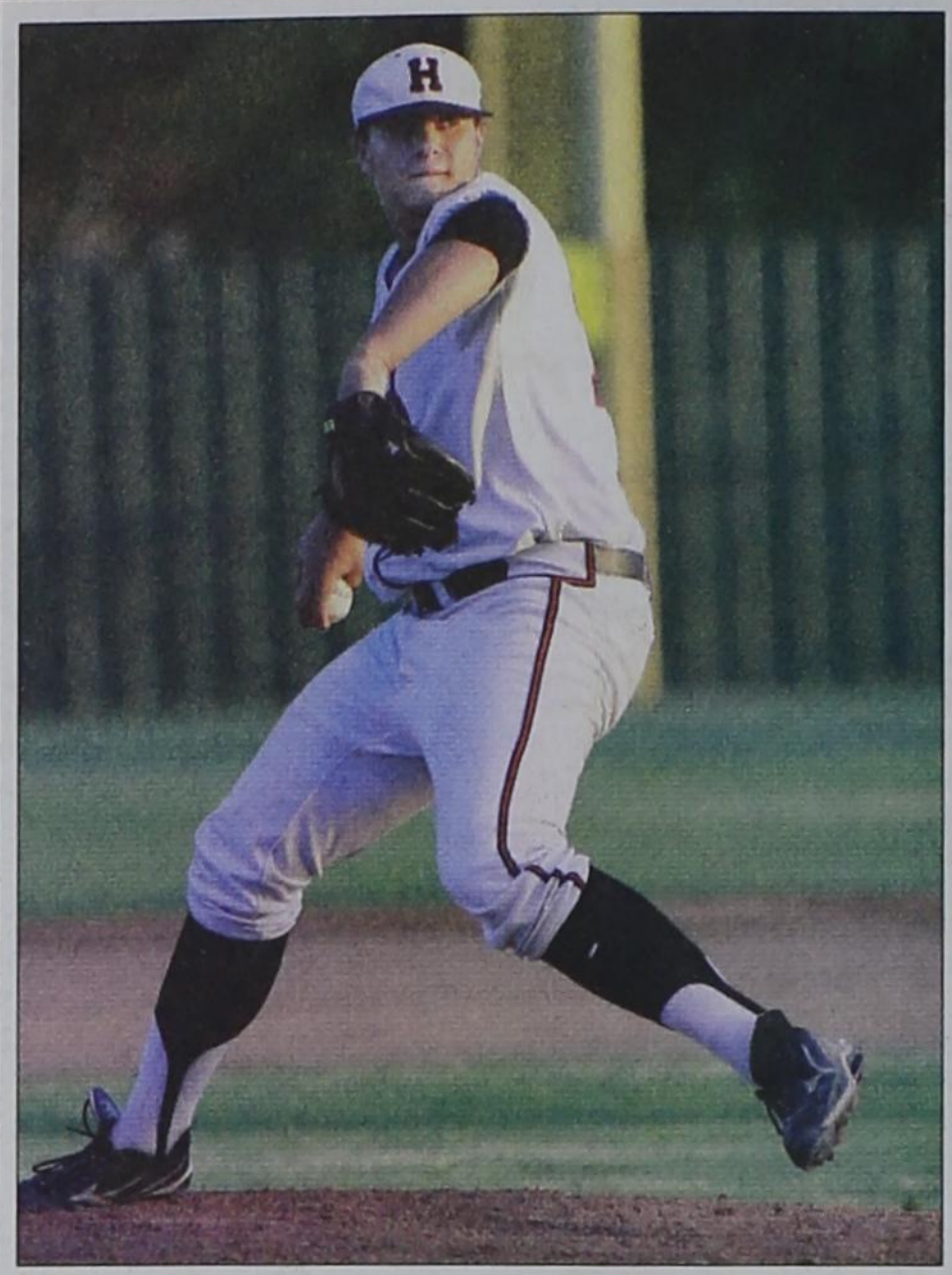
In the next inning, the homer was farther field. The ball hit the wall in left-center and Nick Petersen singled the fourth run of the game.

A week before, on May 22, Malak took first place, with Scott Self second in "Soap Opera."

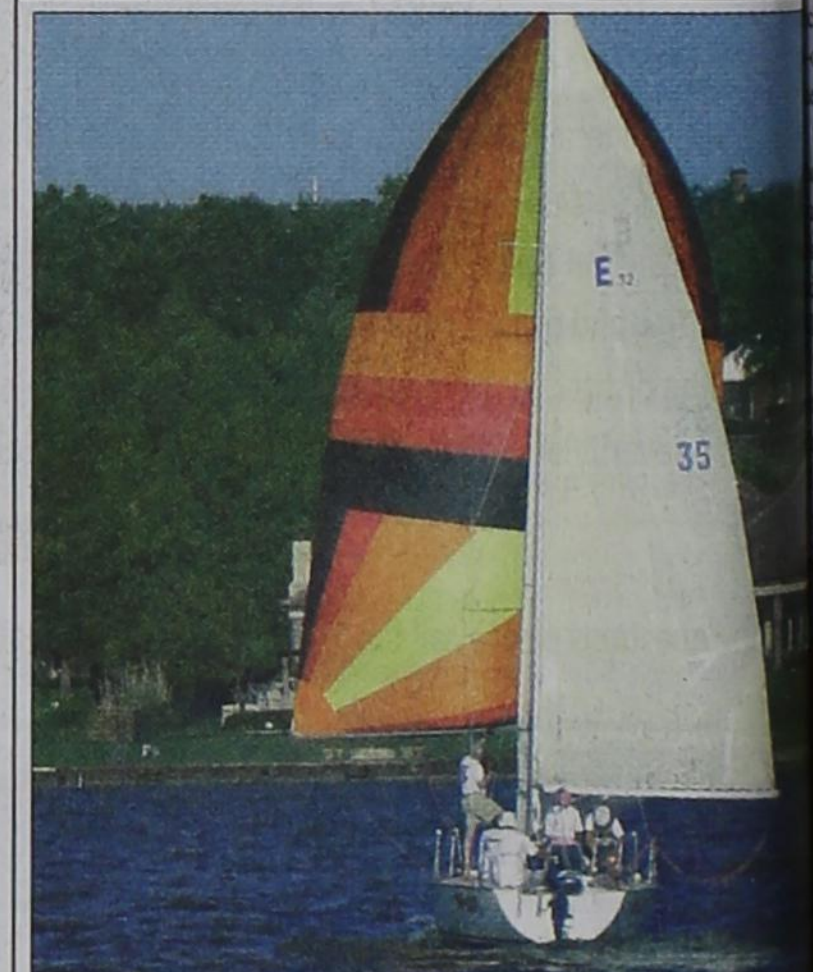
The Wednesday Night Series on the lake has had two separate fleets competing.

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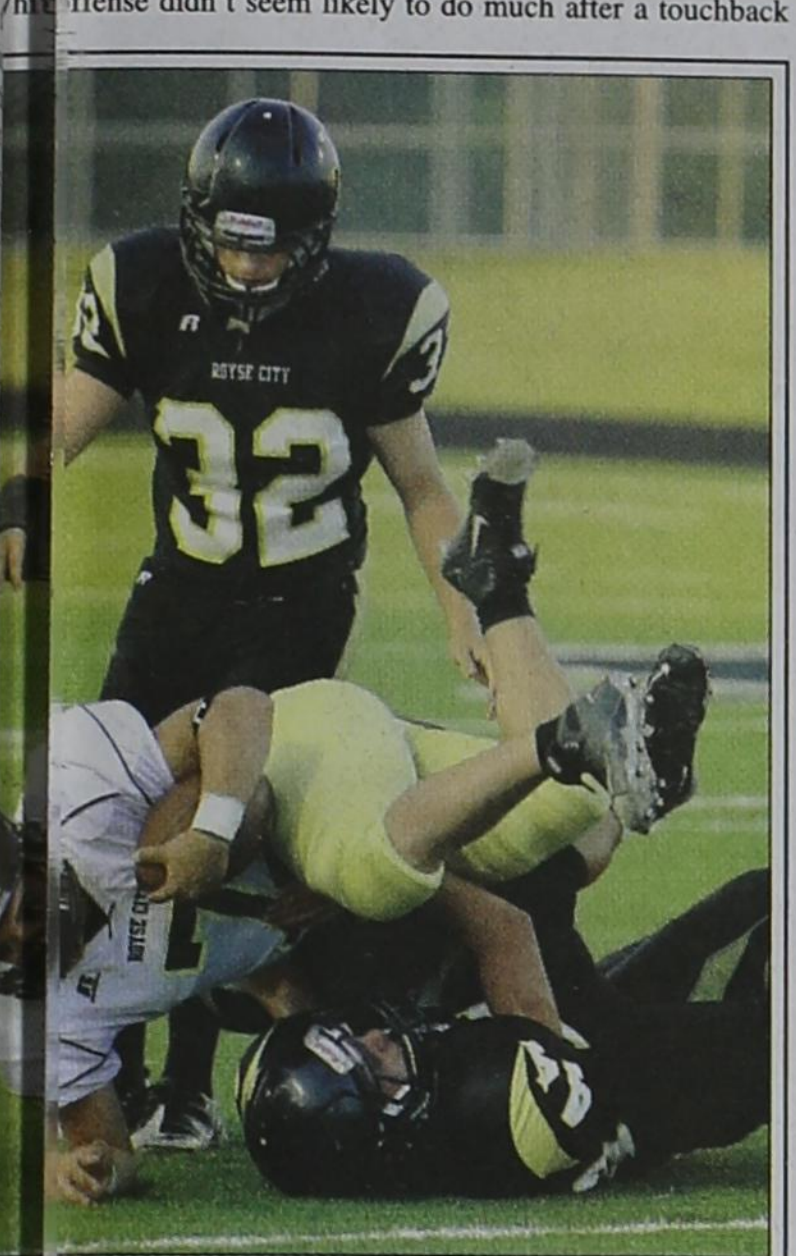
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Angsters shine in Royse City spring football game

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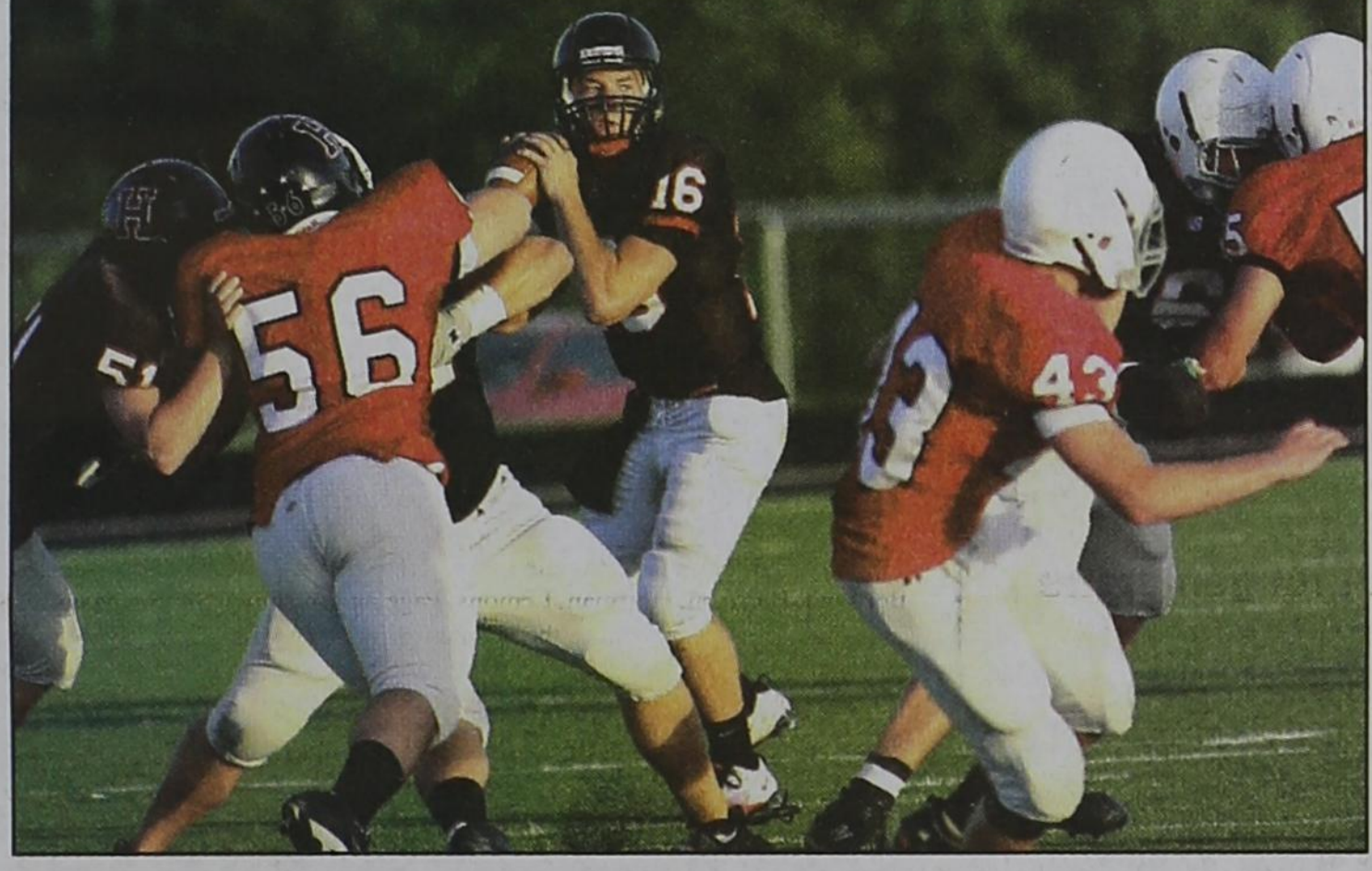

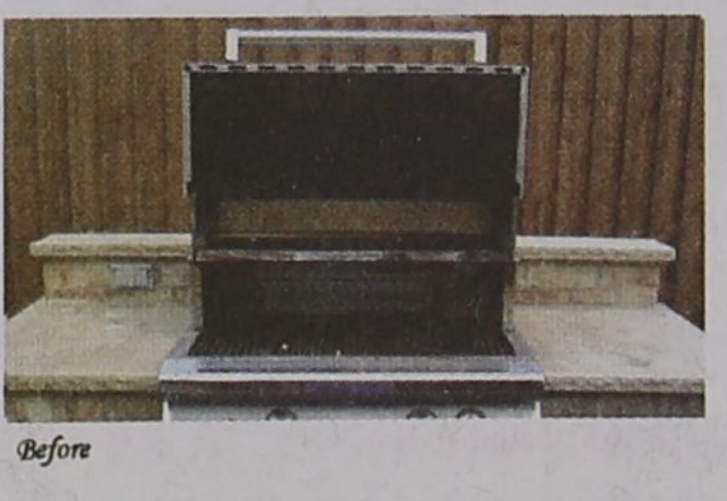

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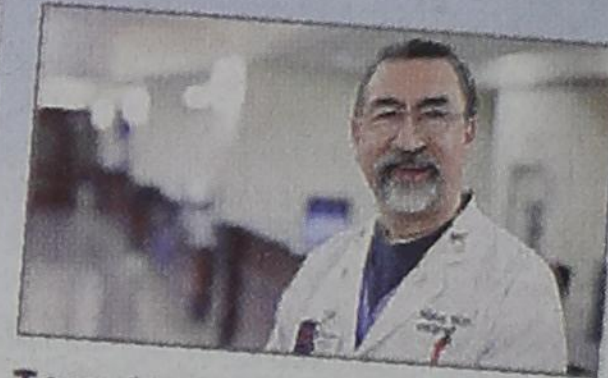
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
