Rockwall History

The area that is now Rockwall was occupied by Caddo Indians in the early 1800s. The Creek Indians began to arrive and the two tribes were in conflict. The first Anglo settlers came to this area in the early 1840s.

In the mid-1840s, the National Road of the Republic of Texas was constructed northeast from the Red River to Peters Colony, near the site of present day Dallas. The cities of Rockwall and Heath were founded along this road. In 1852, farmer Terry Wade discovered an underground rock wall while digging a well near what is now the Downtown Square. Debate still continues today whether this is a natural formation, or is as local folk tales continue to say, that it was built by prehistoric natives. When the

town of Rockwall was founded. it was named for the rock forma-

In 1836, this area was established as part of Nacogdoches County. When Texas joined the Union in 1845, it was included in Henderson County. In 1847, when Kaufman County was formed, the area now known as Rockwall County was placed in Kaufman County.

Rockwall was platted as a community on April 17, 1854 by Elijah Elgin, who purchased a 40-acre tract from W.B. Bowles. This was a small part of the 572-acre homestead owned by Benjamin F. Boydstun.

The county seat of Kaufman was thought to be too inconvenient for Rockwall citizens, and in 1873, Rockwall County was






On Saturday, coffee, juice and doughnuts will be served beginning at 8 a.m., sidelined by on-site registration and pre-registration package pick-up until 9:30 a.m. At that time the skippers' meeting will be conducted. Warning Signal Race No. 1 will begin at 10:30 a.m., with additional races back to back. Lunch will be as permitted by the Race Committee, and afternoon races will continue as conditions permit. Following Saturday's races will be the Founder's Day Dinner and 40th Anniversary Celebration.

On Sunday, a continental breakfast will begin at 8 a.m., followed by the warning signal for the first race at 9:30 a.m. Lunch and awards will be conducted at noon.

Registration costs \$45 for dinghy classes, \$75 for other classes. Registration fee includes the skipper's lunch for Saturday and Sunday; other classes include three lunches for Saturday and Sunday. Meals for additional crew and other guests need to be reserved at registration time. Extra lunches cost \$7.50 per meal.

Scoring will be according to the USYRU 1969 Low-Point system, with throw-outs as defined in the sailing instructions. A minimum of one race constitutes a regatta.

The Founder's Regatta Perpetual Trophy will be awarded to the winner of the largest fleet participating in the regatta.

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Rockwall County Book Review

'Thunderstruck' by Erik Larson

For this month's review, I chose Erik Larson's "Thunderstruck." "Thunderstruck is a work of nonfiction but it reads like a mystery novel. The novel consists of two divergent plot points that converge to form a spectacular conclusion.

Erik Larson is a prominent author in the non-fiction novel genre. You might have already read and enjoyed "Isaacs Storm" or "The Devil in the White City"

and, if you have, this book is for you. If not, don't despair. You will be entertained, mortified and amazed by the novel "Thunderstruck."

"Thunderstruck," at its heart, is a tale of scientific achievement by one man, who single-handedly revolutionized communication and its impact on the schemes of another man. The achievement was wireless telegraph transmission and this breakthrough is attributed to Guglielmo Marconi. The wireless telegraphy breakthrough entailed a great deal of controversy and dispute. Other notable scientists had claimed earlier successes but, for some reason or another, did not receive credit or the financial windfall that suddenly came with this discovery. Larson describes in great detail the various battles that break out over Marconi's new invention and the forces that seek to control or exploit the man and his discovery. Larson describes Marconi as an aloof, socially insensitive yet hardworking Italian inventor who was driven by an insatiable curiosity, especially concerning the field of electrical engineering and telegraph technology.

Marconi felt that electrical engineering was the way of the future and he knew this discipline, and the technology that would spring forth from it, would change the world. The second actor in this story

is a mild mannered doctor named Hawley Harvey Crippin, who happens to be a Doctor of Osteopathic medicine, who is blessed with sharp business acumen and the good fortune to be at the right place, at the right time. Crippen is married to a domineering woman who openly flaunts convention whenever possible, yet is embraced and adored in several prominent British social circles. Before the end of the book, Crippen will be at the center of a worldwide manhunt, with several police agencies acting in unison in an attempt to track down the elusive doctor. It is in this chase scenario that the very real implications of Marconi's discovery are realized.

Erik Larson seamlessly blends history, crime and mystery into an intensely readable work of non-fiction. The twin characters of Marconi and Crippen are identical in so many ways, yet their ambitions and means to achieve them are devastatingly different. If you prefer a good mystery and a well-written non-fiction volume, then "Thunderstruck" is the book for you. "Thunderstruck" is available at the Rockwall County Library in the Adult non-fiction collection.

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MRSA is methicillin-resistant Staphylococcus aureus, a potentially dangerous type of staph bacteria that is resistant to certain antibiotics and may cause skin and other infections. As with all regular staph infections, recognizing the signs and receiving treatment for MRSA skin infections in the early stages reduces the chances of infection becoming severe. MRSA is spread by having direct contact with another person's infection, sharing personal items such as towels or razors that have touched infected skin or touching surfaces or items, such as used bandages, contaminated with MRSA.

The signs and symptoms of MRSA like most staph skin infections appear as a bump or infected area on the skin that may be red, swollen, painful, warm to touch, full of pus or other drainage and may or may not be accompanied by fever.



What Is MRSA?


If you suspect an MRSA skin infection cover the area with a bandage and contact your healthcare professional. It is especially important to contact your healthcare professional if signs and symptoms of MRSA skin infection are accompanied by fever.

Treatment for MRSA skin infections may include several regimens such as having a healthcare professional drain the infection and in some cases, prescribe an antibiotic. Do not attempt to drain the infection yourself as doing so could worsen or spread it to others. If you are given an antibiotic, be sure to take all of the doses (even if the infection is getting better); unless your healthcare professional tells you stop taking it. If you are hospitalized in an acute care hospital such as Presbyterian Hospital of Rockwall you would typically be placed in "Transmission Based Precautions" or "Contact isolation Precautions" that include the hospital staffs use of "Personal Protective

Equipment" (PPE) such as gloves, fluid resistant and meticulous hand hygiene processes when en and exiting the patients "contact isolation room" as the patient would be asked to wear this PPE at meticulous hand hygiene when in public areas of smoke on the hospital as well. 



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

Jesus meekly gave his life...

After Jesus Christ faced Jewish and Roman judgement, he endured a most excruciatingly painful punishment and death. More information can be found in Matthew 27:26-56, Mark 15:15-41, Luke 23:26-49 and John 19:16-37.

Actor/Director Mel Gibson directed a movie about the crucifixion of Jesus Christ. Although we found it difficult to watch, we were able to stay with it from beginning to the end. Had Mr. Gibson depicted the events more accurately, very few Christians would be able to endure it to the end.

According to God's word in the Old Testament, Jesus' closest companions would not have recognized him. It says in Isaiah 53:2,"...he has no form nor comeliness. And when we shall see him, there is no beauty that we should desire him..." This verse is part of scripture in Isaiah that explains what happened, and why it happened.

The subject is revealed in Isaiah 52:13, "Behold, My servant..." This is about God's servant Jesus Christ who gave himself to be the final Passover lamb for all of mankind. The related scripture continues to Isaiah 53:12, "Therefore will I [God] divide him [Jesus Christ] a portion with the great, and he shall divide the spoil with the strong because he has poured out his soul unto death. 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

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

Libertarians to Testify Against State Checkpoints SB 298

The Libertarian Party of Texas will testify against the state checkpoints in Senate Bill 298 at today's Criminal Jurisprudence hearing.

"These checkpoints, combined with proposed laws allowing police officers to draw blood, are an intrusive government assault on privacy," said Texas Libertarian Chair Patrick Dixon. "These checkpoints are unconstitutional searches, and even the FBI says they are ineffective."

In a January 2003 FBI report, Jeffrey Greene states, "Overall, measured in arrests per hour, a dedicated saturation patrol is the most effective method of apprehending offenders. Such concerted efforts also may serve as a general deterrence if their activities are publicized and become widely known."

"In addition to the effectiveness problem, we have seen that other states with similar laws abuse them to search for undocumented immigrants, drug possession, and a range of other issues." said LPT Executive Director Robert Butler. "In some cases, checkpoints were set up based on the race and ethnicity of the neighborhood. These checkpoints are advertised as sobriety checks, but the driver's license, registration, the vehicle's contents, proof of insurance, and other facts will all be under scrutiny."

In May 2007, the Columbus Dispatch reported that a sobriety checkpoint was set up in a Hispanic neighborhood during Cinco de Mayo celebrations. "I feel like on Saturday they were looking for Latinos," a man said in Spanish. "They asked me for my license. They didn't ask if I had been drinking."

On December 12, 2008 the California Highway Patrol, in conjunction with the San Bernardino Sheriffs Dept and USMC military police, conducted a sobriety checkpoint. This act was in direct violation of the 1878 Posse Comitatus Act which bars military from engaging in civilian police activity. **CHP News**

In Washington DC, checkpoints were used to "seal off" neighborhoods. According to the Washington Examiner, "At least six officers will man cordons around those zones and demand identification from people coming in and out of them. Anyone who doesn't live there, work there or have "legitimate reason" to be there will be sent away or face arrest."

"We know that checkpoints do not result in more DUI arrests," said Dixon. "So let's stop the potential for abuse before it begins."

On Af-Pak: Stop "Helping"

While much of the country's attention is on other issues, a serious situation is developing in Pakistan that threatens to plunge us into another fruitless and bloody war. It is very frustrating to see that many who were so vehemently against the wars of the last administration have suddenly lost interest in foreign policy simply because we were promised change.

Very little has changed, except perhaps rhetoric, but what does that matter when the bombing missions are only getting deadlier? We are helping the Taliban and other enemies to actually gain numbers and strength, while driving them down from the mountains in the border regions deeper into Pakistan, where they have been making a menace of themselves. As our bombings follow them, beleaguered villagers have little choice but to leave their homes and join the swelling numbers of refugees or take up arms and join the fight against us.

Nonetheless, instead of recognizing the cascading unintended consequences of trying to deal with Pakistan's problems, all signs in Washington point to further escalation. Both the House and Senate have newly introduced bills

We are broke. This is money we don't have, and it is an insult to the American people to run up the national credit card for this type of military adventurism after many Americans thought they were voting for peace.

The bottom line is our involvement in Pakistan's internal problems is not making us safer. In fact, we are adding to the numbers of our enemies and increasing the threats to our security here at home. We are inciting the very terrorism and extremism we are trying to stop. Every dollar we send, even if it is for humanitarian purposes, frees up resources to make war and potentially prop up unpopular leaders. The factions and politics of the Middle East are irrational and dangerous. We play with fire when we meddle in their affairs, and we isolate ourselves diplomatically by making more enemies than friends. We need to bring our troops home, end all foreign aid, and maintain a neutral stance on the world stage. It, in fact, is the only foreign policy we can afford right now, and it would gain us more friends and trading partners than our bombs ever could. Besides, that's what the Constitution permits and our founders strongly advised.

Season comes to an end for Lady Hawks in third round with 4-0 loss to Frisco Wakeland

Unlike the last two years, when their trips through the playoffs came to gut-wrenching ends, the Rockwall-Heath Lady Hawks' season-stopping 4-0 loss to Frisco Wakeland at Plano East High School May 19 was one of those cases where the other team was just better.

For one game at least.

Although the Lady Wolverines managed just two bloop hits against pitcher Chelsey Eddy (23-8), they took advantage of some shaky Heath defense - the Lady Hawks committed four errors - and some great execution in their own short game to improve to 30-6-2 for the season.

Heath, meanwhile, ended another very successful year with a 28-10 mark. The Lady Hawks, who lost in the first round two seasons ago to Frisco 1-0 in nine inning and in the second round last year to Little Elm when they surrendered three runs in the bottom of the seventh in a 5-4 loss, also finished as the runnerup in District 10-4A.

Th 9-4A champion Lady Wolverines got the only run Wakeland pitcher Alexis Cantu (25-5) would need in the second inning when they used an error, a soft single just beyond the reach of shortstop Sarah Deimling, a walk and a ground out to score an unearned run for a 1-0 lead.

They added another unearned run in the fourth on a walk, a fielder's choice and another error to make it 2-0.

Wakeland then added a pair of runs on only one hit in the fifth, using perfectly executed back-to-back squeeze bunts to push the score to what would prove to be an insurmountable lead of 4-0.

Although Cantu gave up six hits, the tall righthander struck out 13, with several of the punch outs coming when she needed them most. With a runner on second in the third she ended the threat with a strikeout, as she did in the fourth with runners on first and second by striking out the last two hitters.

In the fifth she ended a first-and-third Heath uprising with back-to-back strikeouts, and left a runner at first with her final strikeout in the bottom of the seventh.

Eddy, meanwhile, pitched masterfully herself, striking out eight with four walks and didn't allow a single hard hit ball, with both of the looping hits she gave up barely getting beyond the infield dirt. She finished her season with 283 strikeouts.

The Lady Hawks lose six seniors to graduation, including a pair of starters that were unavailable for the Wakeland game. First baseman Hailey Galloway, who was injured in an automobile accident last week and remains hospitalized with non-life threatening injuries, and Sarah Long, last year's leading hitter for the Lady Hawks, missed the game.

Long, who had a 32-game hitting streak coming into the season, missed the entire year with what was at first thought to be a stress fracture in her back. A recent diagnosis, however, is that she has a benign tumor in her spine and will have back surgery after the school year ends.

Also moving on to college will be Eddy, Devin Edgemon, Taylor McLoughlin (2-for-4) and Taylor Blair.

Junior Sarah Deimling was 2-for-3 while junior Kaeleigh Lutz and sophomore Dakota Whittern had Heath's other four hits.

When North Dallas brought in reliever Jason Gonzalez with the bases loaded and no outs in the third inning against explosive Rockwall-Heath in the Region II Area championship game May 19 at Wylie High School, the Bulldogs were probably hoping he could somehow keep the Hawks from increasing their 2-0 lead.

And after setting the first two hitters he faced down on strikes and getting two strikes on senior Drew Benefield it looked like he might get the Bulldogs completely out of a tough situation.

They are a great team with tremendous tradition."

Pitcher Crayton Bare (9-3) leads Highland Park, which swept McKinney 7-1 and 4-1 in the Bi-District round before ousting Hillcrest by scoring three runs in the bottom of the seventh for a 6-5 win.

Freshmen Jake Thompson (6-1), who leads the Hawks with six homers, went the distance for the win, allowing just four hits while striking out six and walking two.

"We had several guys with multiple hits and a couple of big blasts by VerHagen and Benefield," Harvey said. "Jake Thompson did a great job

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



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
