Rockwall University Leadership Program was set up in 2002 to proeducation and information to the employees of the City of Rockwall. me 12 courses of the Rockwall U program are designed to educate city yees about the operations of city departments and to promote the pment of leadership skills. Examples of core courses are studies courses are taught by department directors and provide employees insight into city departments other than those in which they work.

The program also consists of leadership courses such as ILead and the Ralph Hall Lecture Series. Graduates from the program must earn 36 hours of course credit. Each three-hour credit requires attendance in five two-hour class meetings, for a minimum of 120 hours.

Bruce Hanby, an engineer designer for the city, was hired in 1989 as an engineering technician. He left employment with the city in 1999, but returned in 2000. Hanby took his first Rockwall U course on City Council/ City Manager's Office in 2002 when Rockwall University began.

He said he learned a lot about the City and felt like all employees should be required to take these courses.

"It makes us appreciate each other's position and learn more about each other than anything else we could do here. The City of Rockwall is a great place to work and eventually retire from," Hanby said.

Hanby has been married to his wife, Cindy, for 34 years. They have two adult children, Crystal and Clint, and a baby grandson, Jacob.

Shon Bellah began employment with the city of Rockwall in 2008 as a crew leader for the water department. Bellah started his career in the water utility industry in his home state of Georgia. Since his employment with the city of Rockwall, he has achieved licenses for TCEQ State Class B Water Distribution, Backflow Prevention Assembly Tester and Customer Service Inspection.



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

Justo Garcia threw two first-half touchdown passes, then Rockwall Christian Academy's defense took over to preserve a 12-7 victory over Cumby Friday night.




