Dee received her Bachelors degree from the University of Texas at Dallas in 1980, once her children were grown. She also received a Master of Liberal Arts in English from SMU in 1985.

When thinking on her own long-term marriage and the difference in attitudes today, she said, "It's awfully easy to get a divorce. It's just too easy. If you are going to get married and raise a family, it's a commitment. You have to give 100 percent. You have to work things out. Maybe you're not going to be rich or you may have problems, but you stick together.'

Hal said Pat has been a wonderful mother to their children. "She's just done such a wonderful job with the kids. I wish I could take the credit. Back when I was young, men didn't say 'I love you' and things like that. You have to tell your kids that."

After Korea, Hal worked in a bank then moved to Borrows Corporation for 25 years, then spent the last 15 years of his career in recruiting. Dee helped in his office once she received her degree.

Dee recalled an incident where her son, Greg, was telling his widowed grandmother about an argument he had had with his wife. His grandmother let him express his concerns and frustrations, then looked him in the eye and said, "I wish I had somebody to fuss with." Dee said, "You don't quit because you have a disagreement. You don't stay married that way."

Hal said having a church family has helped them through the years as well. Although Dee is a Baptist and Hal is a Methodist, he said in the last several years, he has become a great admirer of the Rev. Billy Graham, "and I believe in Jesus Christ."

Although they are both retired, they keep busy with their church, volunteer work and leading classes and other volunteer work for the National Alliance on Mental Illness.

Hal said the "biggest thing" that has held him and Dee together for 60 years is "the love that we have for each other and our children. We've worked at it and we receive that love back from our kids." "The first Commandment is to love and we love each other dear-

Dee said, "In sickness and in health, till death do us part. You have to believe in that."

## Local woman's family prompts Relay involvement

I think my heart skipped a beat when my 9-year-old daughter casually said, "Mom, we're The Cancer Family."

We were on our way to the Rockwall County Relay For Life last year, and she was looking at the many luminarias I had decorated with family photos. (Luminarias are paper bags that are filled with sand and candles and line the track during Relay to honor those who have battled cancer.) Suddenly I realized why I was at Relay. It wasn't because I was asked to volunteer on a committee, and it wasn't because the event is like a giant block party. It was because I needed to be there to raise money to find a cure for a disease that was eating

away at my family. My first loss from cancer was my paternal grandmother who died when I was a freshman in college. She was a petite, energetic woman who worked in my grandfather's printing office and taught a couples' Sunday school class. She was a shining example of living a Christian life. My grandparents were deeply in love, and he was heartbroken when

she died from breast cancer. He remarried years later with the family's blessing, but was later diagnosed with lymphoma soon after the birth of his first grandchild. I still remember how sweet it was to watch him hold my son. Sadly, they never got to know each other.

Not long after that, my dad was asking me about a spot on his lip that wouldn't heal.

"That's a symptom of skin cancer!" I practically yelled at him. "You need to get it checked out."

That was the beginning of my father's battle. He routinely has painful treatments to eradicate years of sun damage. Thankfully, he is a survivor.

A few years later, our family was dealt another blow. Many jokes are made about mothersin-law, but I adored mine. She made holidays extra-special with Easter baskets and Christmas stockings for children and adults, and her Southern cooking was delicious. She was diagnosed with bile duct cancer when she was in her early 70's. There was no effective drug for the disease, so she struggled through experimental to ments. Sadly, two years | Barefoot we buried her.

Then my mother found lump in her breast. How ca describe the fear I felt who 112 heard the news? She stoice went through a mastecto and more than five years la she has no sign of cancer. and my dad walked the Su vor Lap at Relay last year.

The death that rocked family was when my cou Steve, died from skin cance handsome, muscular, 40-ye old fireman who lived in C fornia, he got sick and s gone so fast that no one co believe it. A year later, his ter was diagnosed with a br tumor. She was terrified ! she would die and leave teenage daughter alone. I grateful that she is a two-y survivor of cancer.

### Electronic recycling events set Feb. 2

A pair of electronic recycling events will be conducted Feb. 21 under the sponsorship of Wal-Mart and the Environmental Co-op, a nonprofit environmental organization based in Terrell.

The local event will be conducted in the parking lot of the Wal-Mart Supercenter in Rockwall, located at 782 I-30, while the second event will take place at the Wylie Wal-Mart location on Hwy. 78. Both events will run from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m.

Most items will be accepted at no charge, including computer CPUs, keyboards, laptops, scanners, printers, copiers, fax machines, cell and corded phones, inkjet and laser cartridges, stereos, microwaves, shavers, mixers, fans, air conditioners and batteries, both rechargeable and non-rechargeable.

Those dropping off items with hard drives will be responsible for wiping out all information before depositing their electro-

while televisions will be accepted as follows: \$10 each for TV sets up to 13", \$20 for sets 14" to 19" and \$30 for any television larger than 19".

Organizers indicated in their news release that the charge is necessary because of the process required to recycle the glass in monitors and TV sets.



Boy Scout Troop 314 of Heath graduates Eagle Scouts every year thanks to the fact that its members are active.


