it zens call for Wimpee resignation, criminal charges over flag pole tampering

The decision by Rockwall County Commissioner Jerry Wimpee to have the center flag pole at the county courthouse cut down to match the height of the two surrounding poles continues to land him in hot water, with angry citizens and veterans calling for Wimpee's immediate resignation and criminal charges for his actions.

The court heard numerous comments on the subject during Open Forum at its Feb. 28 meeting. No action is taken by commissioners during Open Forum.

Also as a result of Wimpee's order, Rockwall County District Attorney Kenda Culpepper and Sheriff Harold Eavenson made a request to the Texas Rangers to investigate if any crimes were committed by having the flag pole altered.

"The Texas Rangers are looking to see if any criminal activities took place," Sheriff Eavenson said. Eavenson also said the sheriff's office could not comment further on the issue until the Texas Rangers complete their investigation.

When the building was designed, it included three flag poles on the east side pavilion directly in front of the Rockwall County Veterans Memorial. The design jury, made up of county staff and citizen volunteers, decided to include the POW/MIA flag along with the United States and Texas flags. The two outside poles were each 35 feet high, while the center pole stood five feet higher.

Wimpee said his decision to have the flag pole lowered was based on Texas Government Code 3100.005 State Flag, Subchapter A, which reads:

Sec. 3100.055. DISPLAY ON FLAGPOLE/FLAGSTAFF WITH FLAG OF THE UNITED STATES:

(a) If it is necessary for the state flag and the flag of the United States to be displayed on the same flagpole/flagstaff, the United States flag should be above the state flag.

(b) If the state flag and the flag of the United States are displayed on flagpoles/flagstaffs at the same location:

(1) the flags should be displayed on flagpoles/flagstaffs of the same height;

(2) the flags should be of approximately equal size;

(3) the flag of the United States should be, from the perspective of an observer, to the left of the observer;

In a statement, Wimpee said a "mistake" was made when the center pole was installed taller than the others. On Jan. 28, 2012, at a personal cost of \$760, Wimpee had a contractor trim the top of the center pole to come into compliance with the Texas Flag Code. He has now submitted the receipt to the county for reimbursement.

Opponents of Wimpee's actions said the original height of the pole was correct, as the Texas Flag Code refers to only two flags on display together. But the United States Flag Code, Chapter 1, Title 4, Section 7, Subparagraph E, states:

The flag of the United States of America should be at the center and at the highest point of the group when a number of flags of States or localities or pennants of societies are grouped and displayed from staffs."

Connie Christensen, who served on the design jury and dedication committee for the Veterans Memorial, said the committee spent a great deal of time studying the flag placement.

"That flag placement... was how these flags and poles were purposely designed and erected and not by some design defect or construction mistake as Mr. Wimpee proclaims," she said.

"The very idea that anyone would think that something as important as the placement of the flags at the Veteran's Memorial had not been researched to the Nth degree is absurd and insulting to those who worked tirelessly on this project to honor those to whom the memorial is dedicated."

Christensen continued, "I stand before you today as a citizen of Rockwall County and demand that the flag pole that Mr. Wimpee had cut off at his own personal direction be restored with a new flag pole at the height and standard it was before he had it altered and that Mr. Wimpee be under criminal investigation for his acts just as any other citizen would be. Because one serves in an elected position, that does not put them above the law."

The court also heard from Gene Allen, Commander of the Tri-County Veteran's Honor Guard, Commander of the Disabled Veterans Chapter 137, and an officer of American Legion Post 117.

Rockwall resident arrested in largest ever health care fraud

Dr. Jacques A. Roy of Rockwall was indicted and arrested Tuesday, Feb. 28, on multiple charges of health care fraud, accused of bilking Medicare and Medicaid of nearly \$375 million. Following their arrests on Tuesday for their alleged participation in the scheme, Roy, his office manager and seven others who were also named in the indictments, appeared in federal court in Dallas.

The indictment was filed in the U.S. District Court, Northern District of Texas-Dallas Division and unsealed Tuesday.

In a statement from the U.S. Department of Justice, also named in the indictment were Cynthia Stiger, 49, of Dallas; Wilbert James Veasey Jr., 60, of Dallas; Cyprian Akamnonu, 63, of Cedar Hill; Patricia Akamnonu,



RHHS art students recreate famous works through recycling by Darcy Rocha

Students in Rockwall-Heath High School's National Art Honor Society have been working on pieces that are not only visually stunning, they are environmentally friendly.

The recreations' likenesses to their subjects are so accurate, perhaps even Matisse and Klimt would approve.







With one piece adorning the school's library and the other in a main hallway, these unique pieces of artwork boast not paint or graphite, but cardboard, wrappers and bottle caps, all salved from the waste bin during school lunches or brought in from students' homes.

"Contemporary art is going in the direction of using medium in a new way. There are a lot of artists using recycled objects," said RHHS fine arts teacher Mandy Cooper, who is the adviser to the NAHS and oversaw the creation of the pieces, which began in November and was completed on Valentine's Day

One piece depicts the famous painting "The Kiss" by Gustav Klimt. The other depicts "The Red Room" by Henri Matisse.


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
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On God's Word

The Love of God...John 3:16

It is written, "For God so loved the world, that He gave His only begotten son, that whosoever believeth in him should not perish, but have everlasting life" (John 3:16). People who believe with the heart that God raised Jesus Christ from the dead, absolutely shall be filled with holy spirit (Romans 10:9-10, Acts 2:4). They are cleansed by the blood of the Lamb and become one of God's righteous saints. It is in the name of Jesus Christ that every person who believes, should not perish, but have everlasting life. Notice that God loved the world, and that God gave life. John 1:17 shines more light on God's love, "For the law was given by Moses, but grace and truth came by Jesus Christ." True grace came by Jesus Christ. This perfectly fits Galatians 3:8-14, "Christ hath redeemed us from the curse of the law..." (v. 13b).

Our salvation is not by the law of God that was passed down to Moses, but by the true grace of God that came by Jesus Christ. Just as Jesus Christ laid down his life for the brethren, so also should we lay down our lives. Not as dead, but living sacrifices (Romans 12:1). "But whoso has this world's goods, and sees his brother have need, and shuts up his bowels of compassion from him, how dwells the love of God in him?" Because God loved, He gave life everlasting to all who believe. God is the giver of life. Contrary to popular doctrine, God is not the giver of death, but of life. John 10:10 perfectly reveals this distinction, "The thief cometh not, but for to steal, and to kill, and to destroy: I am come that they might have life, and that they might have it more abundantly."

This life originates from God the Father. It was God who gave life to His beloved son by conceiving him in the womb of Mary. And it was God in heaven who put life back into the dead body of Jesus Christ, giving him a new and glorious body unto everlasting life.

Those who enjoy reading and studying the Bible will probably notice an apparent contradiction here. Throughout the Old Testament, there are plenty of scriptural references that show God killing and harming people. In truth, there is no contradiction. The problem rests in the interpretation of the scriptures without an understanding of the figures of speech being used.

In the book Figures of Speech Used in the Bible, author E.W. Bullinger explains that figures of speech are God's way to emphasize something, and are not to be interpreted literally. They were the linguistic tools of the Hebrews. One of the figures is called "condescension." In short, it ascribes human and earthly attributes to God. The Bible is filled with these beautiful linguistic tools. Another figure employed is the Idiom. Particularly an Idiom of permission, where the one who allows the event to occur, is put for the one who actually causes the event. God did not leave His people ignorant concerning the origin of death and de-

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

My interest was piqued when I saw "The Kiss" from a distance and as I got closer delighted in discovering that it was a collage of tiny parts, perfectly placed, overlapped and shaped into what feels almost like a mosaic. If they auction this piece off, I may have to throw in my hat.

The project evolved out of the upcoming annual RISD Students Serving Others day. This "green" theme of this year's event strives to encourage students to act responsibly towards the environment. The NAHS students are also working on a sculpture to display at the event, which will be held March 24 at Wilkerson-Sanders Stadium.

"Seeing them get excited about what they can create, and seeing them excited after they've created something beautiful... that's probably my favorite part of being an art teacher," says Cooper, who is in her third year teaching at RHHS.

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Prior to beginning work, the students discussed the documentary "Waste Land" which follows the creativity of Brazilian-American artist Vik Muniz. Muniz creates art based on the "catadores," the workers who pick recyclable materials from the world's largest garbage dump. The result was not only visually stunning, but a commentary on art's affect on the human condition. Senior Kaitlin York is the president of the NAHS and was involved with both pieces.

"We spent a couple weeks collecting trash, and it got thrown away a couple of times," she says. "We decided to do two recognizable pieces of art. We spent a couple weeks cutting out pieces and pasting them on there and trying to make it look as much like the picture as we could."

Cooper, who holds a degree in art education, uses oil paints as her medium of choice and enjoys creating portraits. She currently has a piece in the Plano Art Association's annual show.

The NAHS is a group of 20 students that must be sophomores or above and maintain at least a B average in art class.

"It provides recognition of the artistic talents and leadership roles for visual arts students," says Cooper. "In addition to regular art classes we get to engage in projects specifically for show in our own school, participate in field trips and art related service projects, and provide scholarships. It's just a lot of fun."



CUSTOMER NOTICE INCORPORATED AREAS OF THE MID-TEX DIVISION

On January 31, 2012, Atmos Energy Corporation, Mid-Tex Division ("Atmos" or "the Company"), filed a Statement of Intent with each City served by the Mid-Tex Division (hereafter "Affected Cities") with the exception of the City of Dallas. The Company's Statement of Intent proposes to increase its gas rates and implement a new schedule of rates and riders applicable to all customers within the Affected Cities. The proposed effective date of the requested rate changes is March 6, 2012. If approved, the proposed changes will affect approximately 1,194,420 residential, 100,461 commercial, and 705 industrial & transportation customers.

If approved, the proposed rates will increase the Company's annual revenues by \$49,080,069 or 4.36%, including gas costs, or 11.94% excluding gas cost. The proposed change in rates constitutes a "major change" as that term is defined by Section 104.101 of the Texas Utilities Code. In addition to the rate changes, other proposed tariff changes include revision of the Company's residential and commercial rate schedules (Rates R and C), as well as its Rider WNA and Rider GCR to change the current billing rate basis from Mcf to Ccf. The Company further proposes to revise the Rider GCR to: (1) remove the 2009 interest rate reference, (2) clarify that the calculation of (b) Pipeline Cost is inclusive of interest, and (3) update the Upstream Pipeline Charge Allocation (Factor D). Atmos also proposes to modify its Rider WNA to update the heat load and base load factors. The Company further seeks to implement a new Rate Review Mechanism ("RRM") tariff, as well as a new conservation and energy efficiency tariff ("Rider CEE"). In addition, the Company seeks to recover all of its rate case expenses and all city rate case expenses as allowed by law. The exact amount will not be known until the case is completed.

Based on the proposed rate design, the average monthly bill for each customer class within the Affected Cities will change by the amount and percent shown in the table below:

Celebrating Texas Independence

In recognition of Texas Independence Day (March 2), we present to our readers the following document which details the grievances of loyal Mexican citizens living in the State of Texas, chaffing under the tyranny of a Mexican dictator. Those iTejanosi who rebelled against the government corruption and abuse, had for years attempted to defend their rights guaranteed by the Republic of Mexico constitution. However, the dictorial Mexican government refused justice in the courts, resulting in an open rebellion.

The Texas Declaration of Independence (March 2, 1836)

The Texas Declaration of Independence was produced, literally, overnight. Its urgency was paramount, because while it was being prepared, the Alamo in San Antonio was under seige by Santa Anna's army of Mexico.

Immediately upon the assemblage of the Convention of 1836 on March 1, a committee of five of its delegates were appointed to draft the document. The committee, consisting of George C. Childress, Edward Conrad, James Gaines, Bailey Hardeman, and Collin McKinney, prepared the declaration in record time. It was briefly reviewed, then adopted by the delegates of the convention the following day.

As seen from the transcription below, the document parallels somewhat that of the United States, signed almost sixty years earlier. It contains statements on the function and responsibility of government, followed by a list of grievances. Finally, it concludes by declaring Texas a free and independent republic.

When a government has ceased to protect the lives, liberty and property of the people, from whom its legitimate powers are derived, and for the advancement of whose happiness it was instituted, and so far from being a guarantee for the enjoyment of those inestimable and inalienable rights, becomes an instrument in the hands of evil rulers for their oppression.

When the Federal Republican Constitution of their country, which they have sworn to support, no longer has a substantial existence, and the whole nature of their government has been forcibly changed, without their consent, from a restricted federative republic, composed of sovereign states, to a consolidated central military despotism, in which every interest is disregarded but that of the army and the priesthood, both the eternal enemies of civil liberty, the everready minions of power, and the usual instruments of tyrants.

When, long after the spirit of the constitution has departed, moderation is at length so far lost by those in power, that even the semblance of freedom is removed, and the forms themselves of the constitution discontinued, and so far from their petitions and remonstrances being regarded, the agents who bear them are thrown into dungeons, and mercenary armies sent forth to force a new government upon them at the point of the bayonet.

of the earth.

The Mexican government, by its colonization laws, invited and induced the Anglo-American population of Texas to colonize its wilderness under the pledged faith of a written constitution, that they should continue to enjoy that constitutional liberty and republican government to which they had been habituated in the land of their birth, the United States of America.

In this expectation they have been cruelly disappointed, inasmuch as the Mexican nation has acquiesced in the late changes made in the government by General Antonio Lopez de Santa Anna, who having overturned the constitution of his country, now offers us the cruel alternative, either to abandon our homes, acquired by so many privations, or submit to the most intolerable of all tyranny, the combined despotism of the sword and the priesthood.

It has sacrificed our welfare to the state of Coahuila, by which our interests have been continually depressed through a jealous and partial course of legislation, carried on at a far distant seat of government, by a hostile majority, in an unknown tongue, and this too, notwithstanding we have petitioned in the humblest terms for the establishment of a separate state government, and have, in accordance with the provisions of the national constitution, presented to the general Congress a republican constitution, which was, without just cause, contemptuously rejected.

It incarcerated in a dungeon, for a long time, one of our citizens, for no other cause but a zealous endeavor to procure the acceptance of our constitution, and the establishment of a state government.

It has failed and refused to secure, on a firm basis, the right of trial by jury, that palladium of civil liberty, and only safe guarantee for the life, liberty, and property of the citizen.

It has failed to establish any public system of education, although possessed of almost boundless resources, (the public domain,) and although it is an axiom in political science, that unless a people are educated and enlightened, it is idle to expect the continuance of civil liberty, or the capacity for self government.

It has suffered the military commandants, stationed among us, to exercise arbitrary acts of oppression and tyrrany, thus trampling upon the most sacred rights of the citizens, and rendering the military superior to the civil power.

It has dissolved, by force of arms, the state Congress of Coahuila and Texas, and obliged our representatives to fly for their lives from the seat of government, thus depriving us of the fundamental political right of representation.

It has demanded the surrender of a number of our citizens, and ordered military detachments to seize and carry them into the Interior for trial, in contempt of the civil authorities, and in defiance of the laws and the constitution.

It has made piratical attacks upon our commerce, by commissioning foreign desperadoes, and authorizing them to seize our vessels, and convey the property of our citizens to far distant ports for confiscation.

It denies us the right of worshipping the Almighty according to the dictates of our own conscience, by the support of a national religion, calculated to promote the temporal interest of its human functionaries, rather than the glory of the true and living God.

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When, in consequence of such acts of malfeasance and abdication on the part of the government, anarchy prevails, and civil society is dissolved into its original elements. In such a crisis, the first law of nature, the right of selfpreservation, the inherent and inalienable rights of the people to appeal to first principles, and take their political affairs into their own hands in extreme cases, enjoins it as a right towards themselves, and a sacred obligation to their posterity, to abolish such government, and create another in its stead, calculated to rescue them from impending dangers, and to secure their future welfare and happiness.

Nations, as well as individuals, are amenable for their acts to the public opinion of mankind. A statement of a part of our grievances is therefore submitted to an impartial world, in justification of the hazardous but unavoidable step now taken, of severing our political connection with the Mexican people, and assuming an independent attitude among the nations

It has demanded us to deliver up our arms, which are essential to our defence, the rightful property of freemen, and formidable only to tyrannical governments.

It has invaded our country both by sea and by land, with intent to lay waste our territory, and drive us from our homes; and has now a large mercenary army advancing, to carry on against us a war of extermination.

It has, through its emissaries, incited the merciless savage, with the tomahawk and scalping knife, to massacre the inhabitants of our defenseless. frontiers.

It hath been, during the whole time of our connection with it, the contemptible sport and victim of successive military revolutions, and hath continually exhibited every characteristic of a weak, corrupt, and tyrranical government.

These, and other grievances, were patiently borne by the people of Texas, untill they reached that point at which forbearance ceases to be a virtue. We then took up arms in defence of the national constitution. We appealed to our Mexican brethren for assistance. Our appeal has been made in vain. Though




