Ten apply for city police chief

The City of Muleshoe has received 10 applications for the job of city police chief.

Muleshoe City Manager James Fisher said he will postpone interviews until after the Christmas holidays. In the meantime, Fisher will send all applicants a 1-page questionnaire.

'Resumes are not accurate comparisons of applicants," Fisher said. "With the questionnaires I'll be able to compare apples to apples."

Fisher hopes to fill the posi-

tion by early to mid February.

Muleshoe has been without a police chief since the resignation of Julian Dominguez last November. Jay Livingston has been the acting police chief since then.

Former City Manager Dave Marr was in the processes of hiring a replacement when he resigned Aug. 15.

City Council members decided that it would be best for Fisher to conduct his own search for a new police chief. Three current applicants, Livingston, Walter Yerger and Michael Mezger were on Marr's finalist list.

Jay Livingston --- Has held his current position as Acting Chief of Police for the Muleshoe Police Department.


Mark Hensley --- Chief of Police of the Little River-Academy Police Department of Little River, TX. Hensley has both active and reserve military experience in the U.S. Army,

Michael Shelton --- Patrolman for the Pampa Police Department. His nine years of police experience include an assignment as Assistant Chief of the Amarillo College Department of Safety and Security.

Roy McGaa --- Chief of Police of the Farwell Police Department. McGaa has served two stints in the U.S. military, serving in the Marines from 1962 - 1966 and in the Army from 1974 - 1977.

Walter Yerger, Jr. -- Currently serves as a reserved deputy of the Randall County Sheriff's Departments as well as an instructor in the Criminal Justice Program at Caprock High School in Amarillo. Yerger has worked as a police officer in the Amarillo area for more than 20 years.

Confused and stifled by Nazareth's matchup zone, Muleshoe scored just six points during a 10-minute stretch of the second half and suffered its first loss of the season, 69-59, to the Swifts Tuesday at WJHS gym.

Nazareth picked up its defensive intensity in the second half while alternating between straight man and a matchup zone.

'They were doing some things that confused our kids," Muleshoe coach Ralph Mason said. "We looked like we were in a stupor. "

Nazareth (4-1), the topranked team in Class 1A, reached the state semifinals last year and is loaded with experience with six seniors and four juniors. The Swifts were by far the most physical team the Mules faced this season.

"That was a good team," Mason said. "I expect they'll be back at the state tournament again this year. It was a good learning experience"

Coming into the game, Muleshoe had averaged 96 points a game in its last three outings.

Muleshoe led most of the first half and still held a 46-42 lead with 4:41 left in the third quarter.

But Nazareth, the topranked team in Class 1A, outscored Muleshoe 11-2 the rest of the third quarter to take a 54-48 lead. Senior sub Justin Bingham capped the run with a fastbreak hoop and a threepoint play off a steal back-to-back.

Nearly four out of five respondents were satisfied with the health services available in Bailey County according to a recent phone survey conducted by the Muleshoe Area Hospital District.

The random survey of 106 county residents conducted in November focused on the availability and use of hospital, physician, home health and outreach services within the county.

MAHD administrator Jim Bone said he was "pleasantly surprised" with the results of the survey which also revealed that 74 percent felt the health services they needed were available in Bailey County and 73 percent used a local physician for primary care.

Muleshoe has three primary care physicians.

"It gave us a pretty good reflection of the attitude of the community toward the availability of health services and the kind of job being done," Bone said. "It also gives us an idea of things we might address."

Bone said the survey indicated that the hospital district needs to do a better job of advertising its services and should explore the possibility of providing additional outreach services, including




"We're getting to the point where we are doing a good job of providing the basics and beyond that what is realistically available," Bone said.

One surprising result of the survey was that 41 percent of those questioned had been hospitalized in the last two years.

A bi-annual community health care assessment is a required for hospitals to be involved in the Medicaid Disproportionate Share Program.

The federal and state program helps offset some of the money that the hospital is not able to recover from Medicaid patients.

The hospital received \$300,000 through the program last year.
