C. S. KNOTT

Addresses the State Convention
Well Posted on Western
Conditions

A few weeks ago the State Real Estate Association met at Fort Worth and our Mr. C. S. Knott was on the program for an address which he made and we give it below.

The relationship between the real estate man, the railroad and the commercial organizations of the state in the future development of Texas.

All these interests have one and the same object in view. The development of the resources of Texas as rapidly as possible along lines that will be conducive to material and permanent prosperity. These interests in this great work are so mutually dependent upon each other that their relations towards each other should be most friendly and helpful. Without commercial organizations, there will hardly be any railroad.

The organized lines of railroad will be put in shape by talking the matter up and creating an interest in the enterprise such that it will be possible to secure the bonuses and right-of-way that are now universally required. At present the state is making no donations towards the building of railroads, the larger part of her land having been sold. Capital demands that those who are so greatly benefited by the building of railroads through undeveloped territory shall share in part of the expense. Atter roads are built, the work of development would be very slow without the assistance of the real estate man. As it is he who alone reaches the great mass of people who have money and induces them to invest in undeveloped territory. Without the railroads, this work of development through the real estate men and the commercial organizations, would be very much circumscribed. The real estate man has found how difficult it is to interest capital in lands that are distant from a railroad. There is, at the present time, to some extent, a sentiment favorable to organized capital. As railroads can only be built by this means, we think it would have a salutary effect upon such people, were they required to live from fifty to one hundred miles from a railroad for a term of ten to twenty years, as many of our people have done. I am sure they would see things differently, and hail with joy the building of a railroad near them. As much has been said that is favorable to the work of commercial organizations, and to the railroads, as a great means of development of the resources of Texas, I desire in a few words, to mention some things about this work and its final effect for good of the real estate man. We think that in the past he has been too lightly esteemed. In order that his work may be

brought before us, and also the fact that it effects for good, almost every business enterprise, I will take a common example of the way his work operates, carried to its legitimate end. Every real estate man, to begin with—that is every real estate man worthy of the name—provides an office, supplies it with furniture, and such other conveniences as are necessary, orders stationery and matures his plan by which he is to get his work before the people. As he, by the means selected, executes his plan, the railroads and hotel people are immediately benefited. This is by no means a small affair to them, as perhaps, on an average, about one in five persons make an investment who actually go upon the ground. But when the party buys and improves the land bought, the effect is as follows: The new comer brings capital which is so much needed in the development of a new country; he secures and pays for his land, he returns to his former home, winds up his business affairs there, charters a car to convey such of his effects as he desires to take with him, buys a ticket for himself and family to his new home; he arrives at his destination, himself and family will probably stop at the hotel for a few days until he has made other arrangements for them. He now buys lumber, hardware, groceries, employs mechanics and unskilled laborers to make his improvements and prepare his land for cultivation. His house built and his land cleared, he now needs agricultural implements and some additional furniture. He will also insure his property. Soon a school house is built, the children will need stationary, books, etc; a teacher will be employed. Now comes the gathering of the crop; while the crop is being gathered every person, young and old, can have employment at good wages. The crop is marketed and every avenue of trade at once feels the result. It is seen in this short review of the work in which the real estate man has aided so materially, how effective has been his work. It has been especially effective for the past two or three years, since they have organized and gone to work more systematically. So much so that the commerce of the country has increased by such leaps and bounds that, notwithstanding the ordinary eagerness with which every line of business has formerly sought to get a larger share of trade, all have been more than satisfied. The railroads have said "enough"; the laborer has cried "give me rest"; the merchant has called "give me more goods"; the banker has anxiously studied how to safely place the thousands piled up in his vaults; the cotton yard men have said "give me room"; the oil mill men have said "hold up a little"; the compresses have been put to their utmost capacity

to keep up with their part of the work; towns have sprung up as if by magic and with them there has been a constant song "give me more material and more men" with which to build homes. Land has now gone up during this short time from \$2 to \$6 per acre to \$10 to \$25 per acre. The effect of having the soil developed is further seen in the fact that before this land was put in cultivation it took from ten to twenty acres to sustain one cow worth from \$15 to \$20 after two or three years. When developed one acre of this same land in one year has produced \$25 or more per acre, and when planted in alfalfa, one acre has sustained two cows. I will allow you to compute the rate of increase, if you desire. As to the final result for good, of the work of the real estate man in inducing people to invest in realty, history and observation show us clearly that no other line of investment is so certain of ample returns. We know of very few wealthy men who did not gather the larger share of their wealth by investments in real estate. No matter how unpromising the outcome looked at the beginning nor how many obstacles seemed to be in the way, where the soil was fertile every other obstacle has been overcome and the investment made a good one. The wise man said of the wise woman, after speaking of how she made money spinning flax, that "she considereth the field and buyeth it." There are thousands of people today, who if they would follow her example and buy even a few acres, they would find it a most profitable investment. History also teaches us that land gradually and surely grows in value. The first settlements were made on the Atlantic coast, and it was at a great cost of money and even of lives that they began to make the land habitable and valuable. Since then brave people who have studied these facts have been pushing farther and farther westward with this same result. So that it seen by these things that the real estate man who acquaints himself with the real advantages of the country and gives his purchasers the benefit of his knowledge, has not only done a great work in the development of the country but has been a great value to his patrons and country. With these three interests working in harmony as they should, may we not look for marvelous development in every corner of the state at no distant day. As for the Colorado and lower plains country, I expect to see beautiful, happy and prosperous homes, on almost every 160 acres of land. Railroads will have crossed it in every direction; the towns of Tahoka, Brownfield, Lamesa, Seminole, Salt Lake and Sterling will be flourishing railroad cities; a great daily published at Colorado by Whipkey Bros., will be sent out to these and other outlying points by the fast mail trains then running out in every direction from Colorado and from these places sent over the rural routes to the country homes and laid on the breakfast table. Then Will the father take his child upon his knee and tell him of the great changes that have come about since he was induced to purchase. He will also tell him of three great influences which brought this change about so rapidly.
