TO PROMOTE FRUIT GROWING

Large Orchard to be Developed and Shares Sold. A Good Market and Prices Guaranteed.

To develop the fruit growing interests of this community. J. A. Forbes is planning to put in 300 acres of trees a short distance north of Colorado, which he proposes to divide into 20-acre blocks and sell to different parties, setting to such variety of tree as the purchaser may elect. The entire 300 acres will be enclosed rabbit-proof and cultivated under Forbes' direction until the trees are three years old and bearing, when each purchaser will receive his orchard, and by which time he will have paid for it in easy installments. After bearing begins, a buyer will come every season to buy, pack and ship the fruit. Owners may handle and ship their own stuff if they prefer to do so.

Mr. Forbes claims with such an orchard he can give it his entire attention. With this orchard as a nucleus, an extensive industry will soon be built up and growers attracted from other quarters, and a cannery finally established, which would take care of all the fruit and truck at home.

Several prominent citizens are already interested to the extent of putting out 1000 Elberta trees each, on their own land. These aggregate 12,000 trees, which with the 300-acre orchard would stimulate the fruit business and develop a market at our doors. The fruit crop, coming in midsummer, would be like two cotton crops a year. A united or a co-operative effort in this business, would afford a sure and steady revenue, not alone for the present generation, but for those who come after.






