Postoffice Report.

Postmaster Hazzard is working hard on his annual report, which is to be sent in to the post office department April 1st. The postoffice year ends April 1st, and this annual statement will make a good showing for Colorado. The total annual receipts will be in excess of \$8000, which will raise this office from a 3rd to a 2nd class office, which means a raise in the office pay, as also will the department pay all clerical hire. The change will be made July 1st, next. Mr. Hazzard has already arranged for one new clerk, having secured the services of Fred L. Story, who will go to work April 1. The annual report now shows \$7,908, and as the average income is about \$22 per day it will be seen that the report on April 1st will run over the \$8000 mark.

There is some little complaint among the patrons because the office does not open up earlier in the morning. People do not stop to think that the same force now handles the mail as did several years ago, and yet the mail has doubled twice over, in fact the volume of mail has doubled since last January. Mr. and Mrs. Hazzard, with their able assistants, only smile at the complaints, conscious of the fact that that they are doing their duty, as but few people know that they are at the office working every morning at 5:30, getting the mail up for the morning opening.

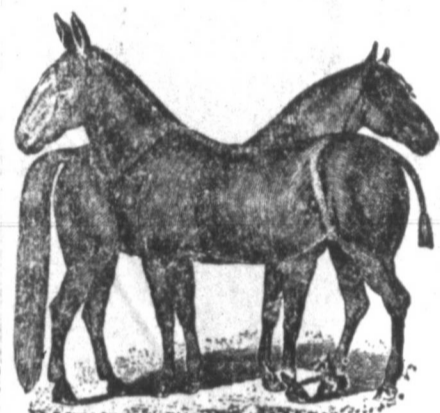

Cattle Raisers' Program.

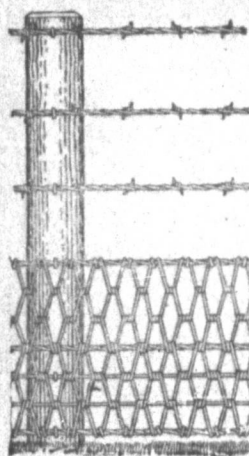

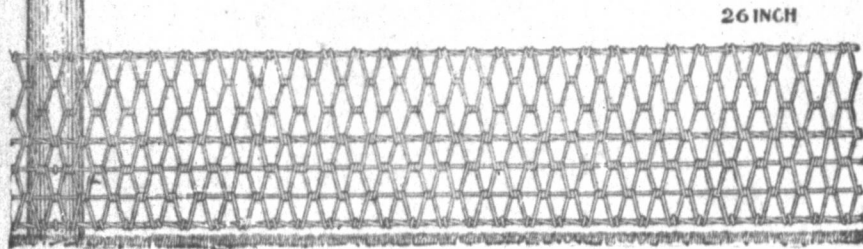

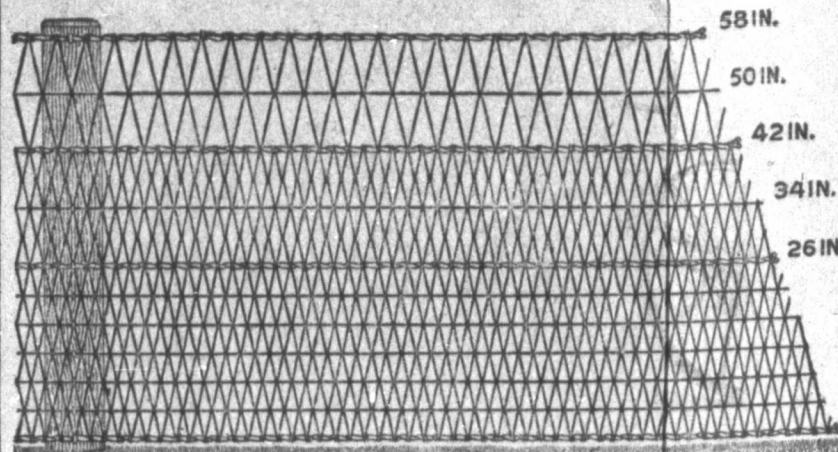

Hit Pretty Hard.

Mr. E. V. Bell was hit pretty hard by the action of the city council. He had bargained for the lots between Lasky's store and Graves' Lumber Yard, and had made arrangements to build a wagon yard there and, we understand, the council sat down on him pretty hard. He even went so far as to agree to build a corrugated iron fence and sheds, but our city fathers said nay, nay, Pauline. Thus a hard working man from the country who wished to engage in a legitimate business in town is shut out from doing so. Where is the justice of such action?—Colorado Daily News.

The News seems to be a bit fogged as to the rationale of the incorporation of the city of Colorado. The most urgent and important reason being protection against the rates of insurance by being rated as a third class risk. In pursuance of this, the first set of ordinances I introduced before the City Council (Articles 3 to 9 of the Fire Ordinances) defined the fire limits and named such restrictions as seemed best to conserve the highest safety of the town.

The Council plays no favorites; it stands for the best interests of Colorado, regardless of private pique or personal interest.

The facts in the above clipping have been grossly perverted and exaggerated, the inference being that Mr. Bell had been put to great financial loss by the action of the Board in refusing his petition. His loss can be but nominal.

Would it be just to 90 per cent of the property owners of Colorado to serve the private interests of Mr. Bell to the hazard of their own?

Would the Board be a safe custodian of public safety to risk a raise of 35 per cent insurance on all the property of the town had it granted the petition? Had the Board changed the fire limits as requested by the petitioner, to serve his interests only, how long before some other citizen would ask the same favor, and plead the fatal precedent?

The greatest good to the greatest number is the policy and fixed purpose of the Board.

It may be significant to the general public to observe in conclusion, that a large majority of the signers of Mr. Bell's petition were men bitterly opposed to incorporation, and there is a well founded suspicion that the News itself was at heart among the "Obstructionists."

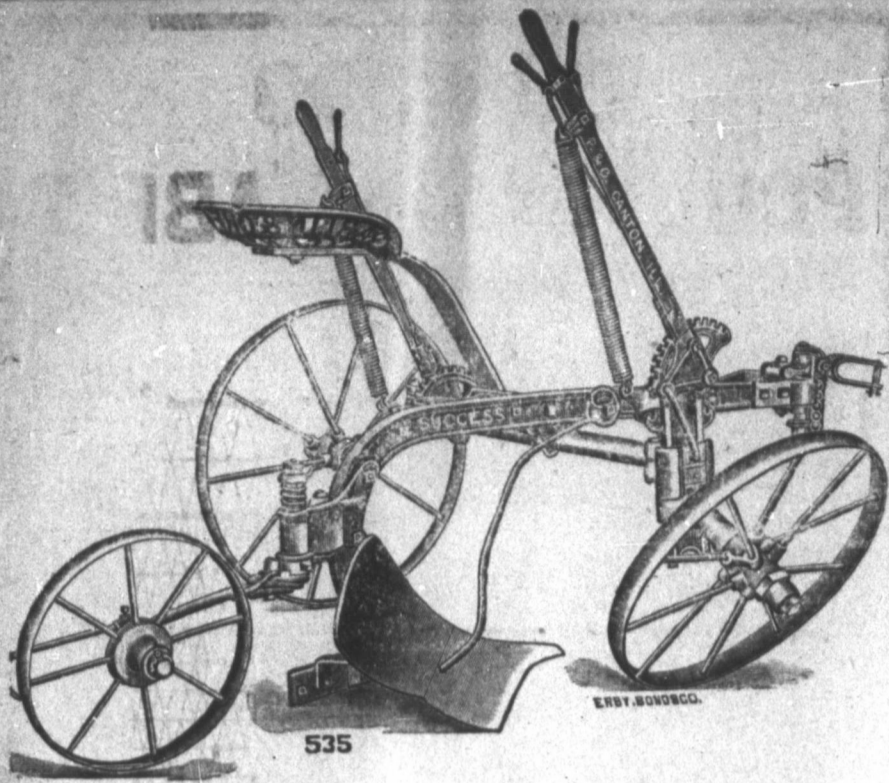

ORDINANCES

OF THE CITY OF COLORADO,

ADOPTED AT A REGULAR MEETING OF THE CITY COUNCIL MARCH 11, 1907.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF COLORADO, That the following articles numbered 24 to 57 inclusive, are enacted and shall hereafter constitute ordinances of the City of Colorado:—

SANITARY DEPARTMENT.

ARTICLE 24. The Health Physician of the City of Colorado shall have such authority as is conferred upon him by the Revised Statutes of Texas and the ordinances of this city. He is authorized to exercise for the time being such of the powers and perform such of the duties of the marshal or the Chief of Police as the Council may in its discretion direct or as may be necessary to effectually carry out the sanitary regulations prescribed by the ordinances of the City; and he is authorized to enter all houses and other places, public or private, at all times, in the discharge of his duties, having first obtained permission of the owners or occupants thereof.

ARTICLE 25. The Health Physician may establish such sanitary regulations for the government of places under his charges as he may deem necessary, with the consent of the city council, and it shall not be lawful for any person to violate such regulations when established, nor to hinder or interfere with the Health Physician in the discharge of his duty.

ARTICLE 26. The Health Physician shall, when he is informed of the existence of any malignant fever, small pox, or other pestilential, infectious or contagious disease in this city, cause the person affected to be taken to such place as he may designate for treatment; and the Health Physician is hereby empowered to make and enforce all proper rules and regulations to keep the diseased person isolated, and to prevent intrusion from parties not under his direction and control.

ARTICLE 27. It shall be the duty of the mayor and the health physician to require the destruction or removal from the city of all furniture, wearing apparel, bedding or property of any kind which shall be suspected of being tainted or infected with pestilence, or which shall be likely to pass into such a state as to generate or propagate disease.

ARTICLE 28. The Health Physician shall keep himself advised of the existence of any pestilential, infectious or contagious disease within this State or elsewhere, and if at any time there may be danger, in his opinion, of such disease being introduced into the city of Colorado, he may require all persons and property to remain in quarantine at such place or places as the city council may direct.

ARTICLE 29. Whenever in the opinion of the City Health Physician it may become necessary or advisable for the preservation of health or the prevention of disease in this city, to use any disinfectant or deodorizer, or to use any other precaution therefor, he may by and with the consent of the City Council order the same to be done, and it shall be a misdemeanor for any person to fail or refuse to obey such order, and each day of such failure or refusal shall be deemed a separate offense.

ARTICLE 30. Any person who shall bring or cause to be brought into this city any person or property of any kind tainted or infected with malignant fever or pestilential, infectious or contagious disease, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor.

ARTICLE 31. Any owner, driver, conductor or person in charge of any railroad car or engine, or any stage, wagon or other vehicle, or any kind of public conveyance, who shall enter into the City of Colorado having on board any person sick of a malignant fever, or a pestilential, infectious or contagious disease, unless such person became sick on the way and could not be left, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and such owner, driver, conductor or person in charge shall within three hours after the arrival of such sick person, report to the Health Physician, in writing, the facts, with the name of such sick person, and the house where he was put down in the city; and any neglect to comply with the provisions of this article shall be deemed a misdemeanor.

ARTICLE 32. Every keeper of any hotel, boarding or lodging house in this city in which any person shall be sick with small-pox, varioloid, yellow or other malignant fever, or any infectious, contagious or pestilential disease, shall, upon such fact coming to his knowledge, forthwith report the same to the Health Physician. Every physician in this city shall report under his hand to the Health Physician the name, residence and disease of every patient whom he shall have sick of any infectious or pestilential disease within six hours after he has visited such patient and discovered the existence of such disease.

ARTICLE 33. The City Health Physician shall, as soon as any case of contagious or infectious disease comes to his knowledge, or is reported to him, either alone or in connection with the attending physician, at once visit the person reported afflicted with such disease, and examine him carefully, and if found so afflicted to immediately establish such quarantine regulations, by the aid of the Marshal, and use such disinfections as will prevent the spread of the disease among other members of the family, or to other persons or families and the public generally, and to see personally that such quarantine as he may establish is strictly enforced, and to continue the same until all danger is passed, as determined by the best medical authorities, on which the decision of the Health Physician shall be final. It is the duty of the Marshal to co-operate with and obey the orders of the Health Physician in the establishment of quarantine to prevent the spread of any infectious or contagious disease. The cost and expense of quarantine and of disinfectants to prevent the spread of such disease, shall be borne by the persons afflicted, or by those legally liable for the same, but if no one is found able or willing to pay the same, then the City Council may order the same paid out of the city treasury. It shall be the duty of the City Health Physician to report any physician who may fail to report promptly and without unnecessary delay any case of such disease that may come to the knowledge of such physician.

No child or person who has been afflicted with a contagious or infectious disease shall return to or enter school or mingle with the public until examined and permitted to do so by the City Health Physician.

ARTICLE 34. Any person who shall violate any of the provisions of the foregoing articles relating to Sanitary measures, numbered 24 to 33 inclusive, or any regulation made by the City Health Physician pursuant thereto, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction shall be punished by a fine of not less than five nor more than one hundred dollars.

ARTICLE 35. Any person who shall in this city get on or off or cling to, or hang on any railroad engine or car while the same is in motion, said person not being a regular passenger on such car, or an employe or official of the railroad company, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction shall be punished by a fine not less than five nor more than twenty-five dollars.

ARTICLE 36. It shall be unlawful for any person to obstruct or fence any street or alley in this city or any with posts, lumber, wire, timber or any other thing in any manner, and each day such person shall allow such obstruction to remain after being notified by direction of the mayor or the city council to remove the same, shall constitute a separate offense.

ARTICLE 37. It shall be unlawful for any person to be asleep in this city in the night time, in or on any street, alley, sidewalk or other public place, or in any other place not belonging to him, without the consent of the owner or person in charge of such place.

ARTICLE 38. It shall be unlawful for any person denominated a vagrant by the laws of this State, or any tramp, to enter or remain within the city of Colorado; and any able bodied person over sixteen years of age found begging or subsisting upon charity, who enters or attempts to enter any dwelling house or to go upon the premises of another without the consent of the owner or person in charge of such premises, or who, having entered any house or gone upon such premises, persists in remaining against the will of the owner or person in charge thereof, or who takes possession of any school house, church building, out-house or other building, or any public or private place, for the purpose of spending the night therein, or who shall kindle a fire in such building, or on the land of any person, or on any street, alley, or other public property, without the consent of the owner or person authorized to give such consent, shall be considered a tramp within the meaning of this article.

ARTICLE 39. It shall be unlawful for any person within this city to willfully or wantonly deface, injure or destroy any public property, or the property of any corporation, or to put upon any house, fence, or other public or private place within this city any written, printed or painted advertisement, bill, notice or picture, without the consent of the owner or person in charge of such property or place, or to injure, remove or deface any building, fence, gate, tree or other property, public or private, belonging to another.

ARTICLE 40. It shall be unlawful for any person to enter or attempt to enter any theatre or other place where any exhibition, performance or entertainment is being given, in this city, without first paying the admission fee or having an admission ticket, and against the consent of the lessee, agent or manager of such place, or the person in charge of such exhibition, entertainments or performance.

ARTICLE 41. It shall be unlawful for any person by loud talking or singing, or by any unusual acts or exhibitions to attract a crowd on any sidewalk, street, alley, railroad platform or right-of-way in this city, after having been warned by the marshal or other officer of the city to desist therefrom, or for any persons composing such crowd to refuse to desist when ordered by such officer.

ARTICLE 42. It shall be unlawful for any person to place or leave or cause to be placed or left upon any sidewalk, street, alley, or other public place any article whatever, which may obstruct free passage over the same, or litter or render the same unclean, or unsightly.

ARTICLE 43. It shall be unlawful for any person to allow the side-walk in front of any property owned or controlled by him to become unclean, or in any manner out of repair, or in such condition from any cause as to render it dangerous or interrupt free passage thereon.

ARTICLE 44. It shall be unlawful for any person to place or cause or permit to be placed upon any street, sidewalk or alley, or upon any other property in this city not owned, occupied or used by him, except the dumping grounds designated by the city council, any sweepings, trash, tins, iron articles, wire, bottles, broken glass, oil tanks or cans, boxes, barrels, rags, paper, rubbish or any filth of any character, and the finding of any such material on a street, sidewalk, alley, or vacant property adjacent to any premises owned, occupied or used by any person shall be prima facie evidence of the guilt of such person.

ARTICLE 45. It shall be unlawful for any person owning, occupying or using premises in the city of Colorado to allow tin cans, bottles, broken glass, wire, oil tanks or cans, barrels, boxes, rags, paper, rubbish, trash or filth of any character to accumulate on such premises. Such accumulation when existing as waste material is declared to be a public nuisance, injurious to the health of the inhabitants of this city and violative of this article; PROVIDED, if a box, barrel or other receptacle is kept for storing such material, and when full the contents are hauled outside the city limits, or to such dumping ground as may be designated by the City Council, there shall be no violation of this article, but decaying animal or vegetable matter shall not be placed in such receptacle.

ARTICLE 47. The growth of weeds, and mesquite, cat-claw and other like brush on any premises in or on any street or alley in this city is declared to be a nuisance, injurious to the health and comfort of the inhabitants of the city, and the owner or person in control or possession of any premises in this city, or using or occupying the same, is hereby required to keep such weeds cut down and burned, and such mesquite, cat-claw and other like brush dug up and burned or removed from such premises and from that portion of any street or alley upon which such premises may be situated, between the line separating such street or alley from said premises, and a line extending along the middle of such street or alley and lengthwise the same; and each day that such weeds or other growth herein specified shall be allowed to remain on such premises or in such street or alley shall constitute a separate offense.

ARTICLE 48. It shall be unlawful for the owner or the harbinger of any animal of the dog kind, to harbor or permit such dog to run at large within the City of Colorado without first having paid the City Collector an annual license tax upon such animal as follows:

On each male dog \$1.00.
On each female dog \$2.50.

Such tax to be due whenever such animals are found in the city limits.

ARTICLE 49. Upon payment of such license it shall be the duty of the City Collector to furnish the owner of such animal a metal tag on which is stamped the words, "tax paid," with the year for which the same is paid, which tag at all times shall be securely attached to a collar around the neck of the dog paid upon.

ARTICLE 50. It shall be the duty of the City Marshal to cause to be taken up and impounded all dogs found running at large in the city between the first day of June and the first day of December of each year, except such as have the metal tag heretofore prescribed.

ARTICLE 51. The owner of any dog impounded shall have the right to redeem the same upon payment to the City Marshal of the sum of one dollar and fifty cents for each animal so redeemed, in addition to the tax, and fine, if any.

This sum, less twenty-five cents retained as fee, so paid the City Marshal, shall by him be paid into the city treasury. The time for redeeming said animals shall be twenty-four hours after their capture and impounding. All of such animals not redeemed within said time shall be killed.

ARTICLE 52. It shall be unlawful for the owner of, or any person having the custody or control of any vicious dog, to permit the same, at any time, to run at large in the city.

ARTICLE 53. It shall be unlawful for the owner of, or any person having the custody of any female dog in heat to allow the same to run at large in the city. In addition to the penalty to be imposed upon such owner or person, the City Marshal may kill such female dog found running at large.

ARTICLE 54. Any person violating any of the provisions of the foregoing articles pertaining to dogs shall be fined in any sum not exceeding twenty-five dollars; PROVIDED that the same shall not apply to dogs following countrymen or strangers through the city.

ARTICLE 55. It shall be unlawful for any person to have or keep within the corporate limits of the City of Colorado or to cause or allow to be kept in this city any pen in which any hog is kept, and the keeping of any hog pen in this city is declared a nuisance, and each day the same shall be kept or allowed shall constitute a separate offense.

ARTICLE 56. Any person who shall in the City of Colorado pursue any business, profession, occupation or calling, or do any act upon which an occupation tax is levied by any ordinance, without first paying such tax and obtaining a license therefor, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction punished by a fine not less than the amount of such tax, and not more than double that amount; and each day that such violation is committed shall constitute a separate offense.

At any time before conviction any person prosecuted under this article may have such prosecution dismissed, upon the payment of the tax due and all costs of such prosecution, and obtaining a license to pursue the business, profession, occupation or calling for pursuing which without a license the prosecution was instituted; provided such payment and license shall cover the entire time such person may have followed such business, profession, occupation or calling.

ARTICLE 57. The doing of any act forbidden, or the failure to do any act required by any penal ordinance of the City of Colorado, shall constitute a misdemeanor, and unless otherwise provided by any ordinance, any person guilty of such misdemeanor shall upon conviction be punished by a fine not exceeding one hundred dollars.

The foregoing ordinances, embracing Articles 24 to 57, inclusive, are approved as ordinances of the City of Colorado, this 12th day of March, 1907.

MEETING OF CITY COUNCIL.

A BUSY SESSION HELD MONDAY NIGHT AT THE FIRE HALL.

City Council met Monday night at fire hall, Mayor Homan in the chair, and the following aldermen answered to roll call: F. M. Burns, J. E. Pond and W. H. Moeser. Alderman Knott came in later, but alderman Johnson was absent from the city. City Marshal Ransom was present, as were a number of visitors, among them Ed. W. Smith, Royall G. Smith, F. B. Whipkey, El. Bell Neil Gross, Constable Key and others.

The first order of business was the adoption of a rule limiting any one who might wish to address the Council, to not more than 20 minutes time on any one subject.

The vagrant law was taken up and a very stringent law passed by the council.

The occupation tax law was taken up, and the council went over this matter thoroughly, and passed a fair and equitable law on this subject. The tax was made one-half the amount levied by the State.

Hotels, restaurants and chili stands were assessed a tax, the hotels to be taxed according to the number of rooms in use, but private boarding houses shall be exempt, provided that they do not entertain transient trade.

Each lumber yard was assessed a tax of \$50 per year, wood and coal yards \$15 each, each telephone, electric light and water company \$10, dray or float lines \$10 each, opera houses \$12.50, ten dollars for each person owning or operating a store or warehouse, compresses \$50, and so on down the line, all of which are more fully set out in the ordinances.

The ordinances governing the sanitary and health department were adopted, and if thoroughly enforced as they should be, will result in a clean and healthy town. Better get busy at once, as the health physician and marshal are going to pay you a visit soon. We must have a clean town, and you are in duty bound to help make it so.

We desire to call the attention of parents to one ordinance that the council passed that ought to be of great concern to you, and that is the one prohibiting the jumping on or off or hanging on or riding on any train or engine in the city. Don't give this matter just a passing thought. If your boy should be brought in home some day crushed to death or a leg or arm mashed off you will then wish you had been more strict and at least tried to know where your boy spent his idle time, at home or on the streets. And then, the marshal was instructed to enforce this law to the

letter, and you may have to pay out a few dollars in fines and get your boy out of jail, and Mr. Ransom hopes he will not be forced to perform this unpleasant task. Keep your boys away from the depot and off the streets.

The ordinance against the throwing of cotton, paper, or trash of any description on the streets or in the alleys was passed and will be rigidly enforced. Put your trash in a box and have it hauled off.

The hog pen nuisance came in for some strong remarks from both mayor and aldermen, and an ordinance was passed against any hog pens being allowed within the city limits, and a fine not exceeding \$100 is the penalty for any violation. Better see about your hog pens before the marshal comes around.

Quite a number of good and wholesome laws were enacted by the council, but for want of space cannot all be mentioned here. Hunt them up and read them and help make Colorado indeed and in truth a clean and progressive city.

It looks like somebody will be forced to get busy and open up some streets and alleys, judging from the way the Council went after this matter. Look up the law and read it.

A petition from J. M. Meek, W. A. Stepp and 18 other citizens of South Colorado, protesting against the feeding pens recently erected there by the oil mill, was presented to the council and an ordinance was passed against it, or any others that might hereafter be erected or maintained.

Petition from Colorado Drug Company asking for permission to dig an underground sewer from the corner of Second and Walnut Streets to the bed of Lone Wolf Creek just above the railway trestle. Granted.

Petition of J. O. McCreless and J. J. Bromley asking permission to use their peanut and popcorn machines in front of their places of business, was refused.

Petition of E. V. Bell and Jno. R. Smith, asking permission to open a wagon yard and feed store in the rear of the Lasky block, signed by C. W. Simpson, C. H. Lasky, A. J. Coe and 11 others, was presented by Hon. Edward W. Smith. The council did not see where it had any authority to grant the petition unless they repealed the fire limit ordinance, and so the petition went over until next meeting.

On motion city secretary was instructed to prepare rules of procedure for the Council and report at next meeting.

Council authorized mayor and marshal to select and designate a dumping ground for the city.

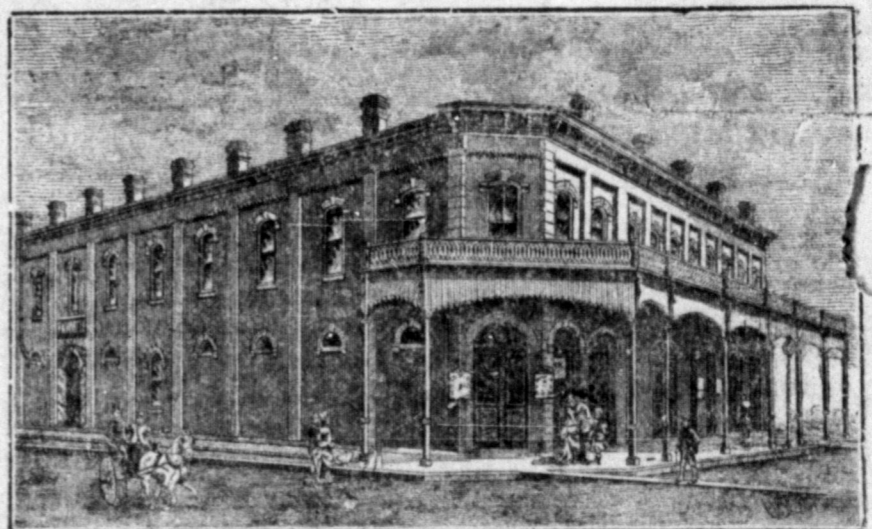

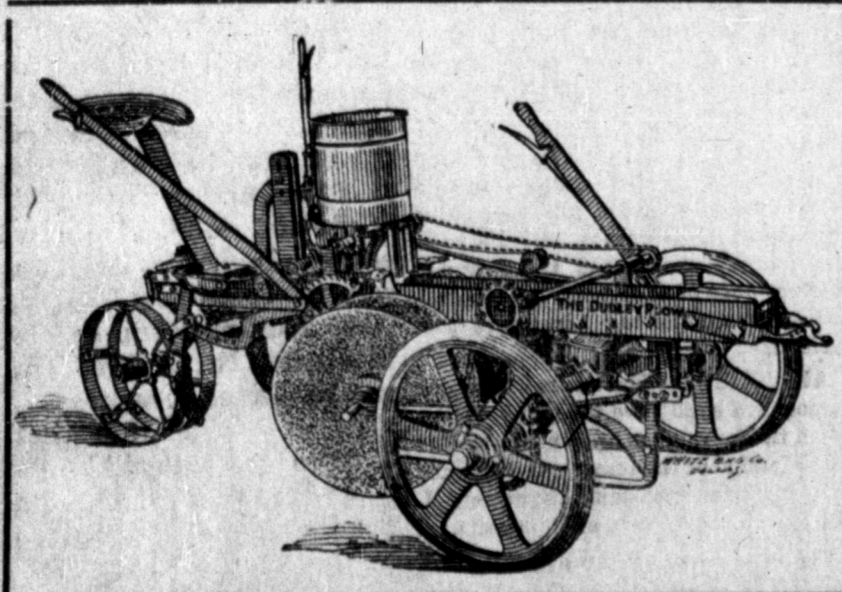
