**WAS LINCOLN A PROHIBITIONIST**

Harpers Weekly some time ago made the assertion that Lincoln was not a prohibitionist and has been busy ever since trying to prove its assertion.

History says and almost every student of history knows that on February 22, 1842, Lincoln delivered an address before the Washington Temperance society of Springfield Ill., in which, among other things he said "whether or not the world would be vastly benefitted by a total and final banishment from it of all intoxicating drinks seems to me not now an open question. Three-fourths of mankind confess the affirmative with their tongues, and I believe all the rest acknowledge it in their hearts. Ought any then refuse their aid in doing what the good of the whole demands?" In 1852 Lincoln joined the Sons of Temperance, in Springfield and on one occasion said:

"The liquor traffic is a cancer in society, eating out its vitals and threatening destruction, and all attempts to regulate it will not only prove abortive, but aggravate the evil. No there must be no more attempts to regulate the cancer, it must be eradicated, not a root must be left behind." At another time in an address he said:

"If the prohibition of slavery is good for the black man, the prohibition of the liquor traffic is equally good and constitutional for the white man." On April 13, 1865, Lincoln said:

"After reconstruction, the next great question will be the overthrow of the liquor traffic." When Lincoln was notified of his nomination he ordered a pitcher of cold water brought in, and pouring out a glassful, rose and said: "Gentlemen, we must pledge our mutual healths in the most healthful beverage God has given to man. It is the only beverage I have ever used or allowed in my family, and I cannot conscientiously depart from it on the present occasion. It is pure Adam's ale from the spring." All historians and biographers say Lincoln was a total abstainer which every school boy knows and almost everybody else except the editor of Harpers Weekly.

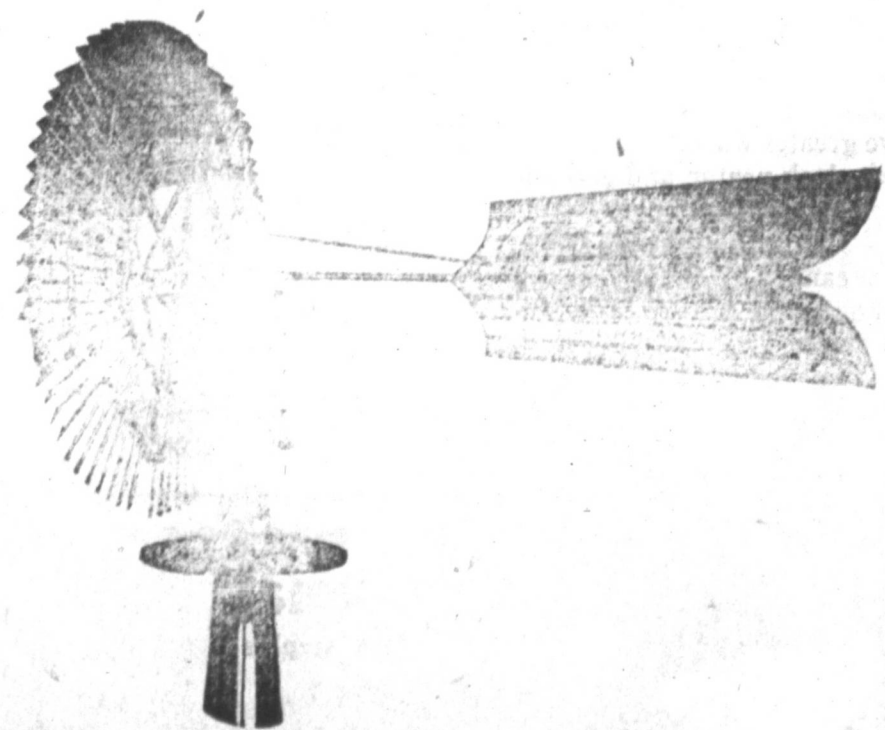

**THE POWER TO DIVIDE TEXAS.**

But few people know that in 1845 a joint resolution was passed by congress authorizing the cutting up into states this big Texas of ours. We print a portion of the resolution which will serve to refresh the memory of many Texas history students and native born Texans:

"Joint Resolution—Giving the consent of the existing government to the annexation of Texas to the United States:

"2. And be it further resolved. That the foregoing consent of congress is given upon the following conditions, and with the following guarantees, to-wit:

"3. New states of convenient size, not exceeding four in number, in addition to said state of Texas, and having sufficient population, may hereafter, by the consent of said state, be formed out of the territory thereof, which shall be entitled to admission under the provisions of the federal constitution. And such states as may be formed out of that portion of said territory lying south of 36 degrees, 30 minutes north latitude, commonly known as the Missouri compromise line, shall be admitted to the union, with or without slavery, as the people of each state asking admission may desire. And in such state or states as shall be formed out of said territory north of said Missouri compromise line, slavery, or involuntary servitude (except for crime) shall be prohibited."

**Delicious Doughnuts.**

If you like crisp, flaky doughnuts, richly browned, and yet with not a suspicion of greasiness, try the following recipe by Mrs. Mary J. Lincoln:

Beat one cup sugar and two eggs very light, add one teaspoon melted Cottoleone, one cup sour milk, and one-fourth level teaspoon each of cinnamon and salt. Mix one-half level teaspoon soda and one scant teaspoon of baking powder with one cup flour, stir it in and add more flour till stiff enough to roll out. 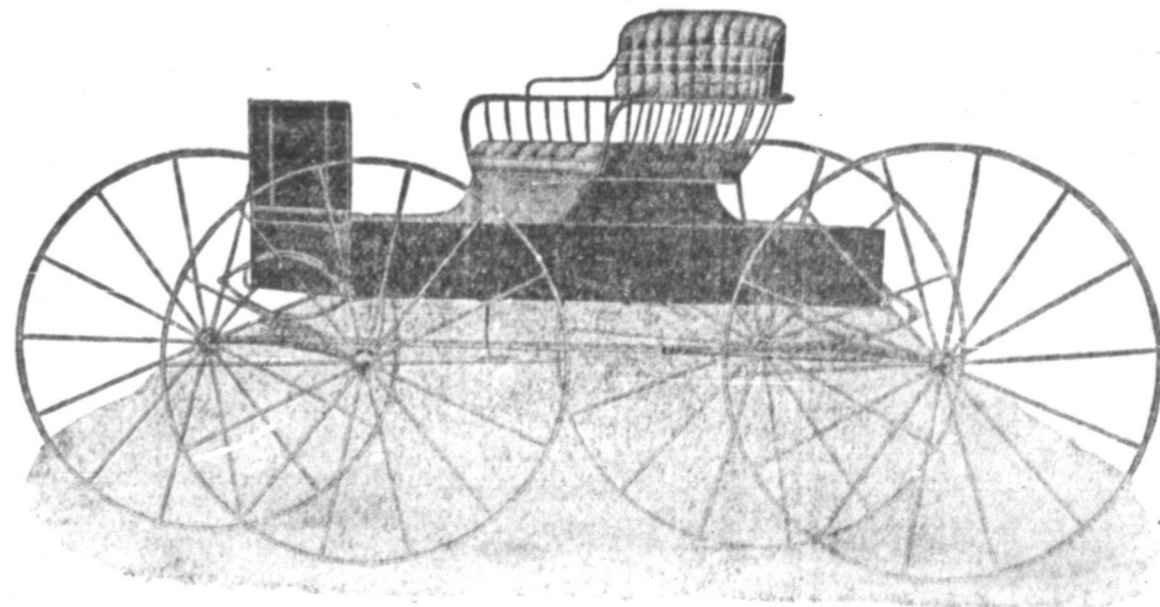

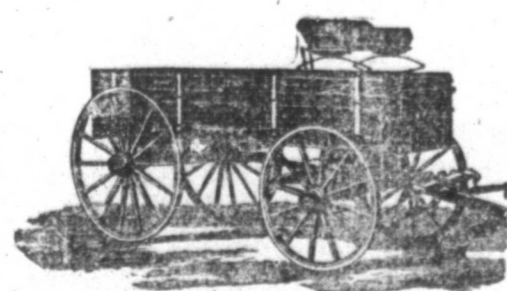

It requires no small skill to bestride the mare, Opportunity, and ride her safely to the goal of success.

There are men who eke out a living upon the reputation of what they have had—who have whatever credit comes to a man who has spent much in a short time.

The people of West Texas have much to be thankful for this good year of Grace. Bountiful crops, freedom from pestilence, cyclones, drouths, and other cataclysms of nature, have made this section of the state the Mecca of thousands of good, sturdy settlers.

The Record would ask a favor of its correspondents. Please do not write Xmas for Christmas. The only connection such a corruption has with the birthday of the savior, is that the X is an imitation of the Greek letter Chi (ch) which begins the word Christ. Owing to the form of the letter, it has been confounded with the symbol of the cross. "Xmas" no more means Christmas than church means church, or xapel means chapel. Its use is anything but an evidence of scholarship.

The man who fools with whiskey, even in the slightest degree, is taking big chances. Let it alone entirely or it will get you one way or another. You may console yourself with the fatuous belief that you can let it alone if you want to, but the odds are always against you. A farmer up in Kansas who was a tetotaler, bought an empty whiskey barrel to put cider in. He lit a match and held to the bunghole to see that everything was all right inside. A gas had generated and exploded. When last seen the farmer was soaring over the tree tops with his clothes on fire. A posse was organized to catch him when he came down, and it may be hoped the lesson will prove of value to him.

A statistical crank has figured that there are at least two home-made quilts in each of the 15,000,000 homes of these good United States; one that "her mother" made, and one made by "his mother". These quilts are made during spare time, and allowing one quilt a year, or 15 cents an hour, and a half hour's work a day for 300 working days, makes the cost of piecing a fancy quilt \$22.50. The thirty million home-made quilts represent \$675,000,000 in overtime labor. Rockefeller could hardly under the hammer realize this sum on his billion dollars of wealth. And so it is pleasant to reflect that the richest man in the world, who can buy national assemblies, senators, legislatures, elections, railroads, gold mines, etc., could not buy all the home made quilts in these United States if he wanted them.

Count your blessings to-day, and return thanks to Almighty God for the measure of strength and prosperity you enjoy. Show it by assembling in his sanctuary and giving your highest service. Remember that you are your unfortunate brother's keeper and that your happiness and prosperity imposes upon you obligations to the least of his creatures.

### COLORADO AND ITS ROADS

It is frequently remarked that the condition of the roads leading into Colorado has been a great factor in building up the adjacent towns which have become rivals of Colorado for the trade of the territory. No town can be better than the roads leading to it any more than water can rise above its source. One thing is patent to the most casual observer; with the building up of the little towns around us, the trade that Colorado now enjoys will be further deflected to other markets unless drawing inducements are offered to keep it. To this end therefore, good roads are the chief factor. If farmers can haul twice as much stuff to Colorado, (though twice the distance) over good roads as they can to rival towns over bad and expensive roads, they will come to Colorado. The farmers of this state pay more every year directly for bad roads than they do in two years for state, county and special taxes. This is a serious matter, and is fraught with grave contingencies to the business men of Colorado. If the time is not ripe for the submission to the people of the county of a special road tax, the town should do something in self defense. Otherwise its trade will slip through its fingers and go to more enterprising rivals.

The time has long since past when people had to come to Colorado for supplies or do without. There are now a score of towns that can supply their needs at the same price that Colorado can, and are eager to do it. Colorado can no longer assume the role as dictator and command the trade to come to it no more than Mohamet could make the mountain come to him. So wise man that he was, he went to the mountain. Colorado must go to, or go after the trade it can no longer command—there's but one way to do it—MAKE IT EASIER AND CHEAPER TO TRADE HERE THAN ELSEWHERE.

### WHAT THINK YOU OF IT?

Colorado has certainly sufficient material to maintain a literary club among its young men. There is a move now afoot to organize a club for the entertainment of men, both young and older, who are employed in Colorado, but have no home, and who must spend their evenings and spare time, in their rooms, sitting around boarding places, or on the streets gossiping. It will be composed of bachelors as active members, yet married men may become associate members, sharing the benefits, but having no voice in the club's management. A comfortable meeting place will be secured, the best papers, books and magazines will be taken and the men in Colorado without a hearthstone of their own provided with a place that will at least supply an initiation of that great school wherein are laid the foundations of the highest type of American citizenship—The Home.

The matter will be canvassed among the eligible men of the town and if sufficient encouragement is given, an organization may be developed along the line of the Y. M. C. A. Such a place in Colorado, where even the clerks and other homeless employees could spend their evenings, writing to folks at home, reading, or engaged in other wholesome diversions, would be worth more than its annual maintenance to their employers alone. If the idea is encouraged, a meeting of those interested will be soon called. In the meantime, think it over. On the ladies' help and sympathy we know we can count in any good and wholesome movement.

### A GOOD START

The Record voices the satisfaction of many citizens of the county and town, as well as its own, on learning that some steps have been taken to preserve and repair the county court house. It is a good building, an imposing structure for its size, set in a park which could be made a pleasure for the grown-ups and an annual delight for the young. Few counties of Texas have a nicer or more commodious administrative building and it should be the pride of every patriotic citizen of Mitchell county. In the past it has been sadly neglected and considerably abused. No one who has seen it can deny this. The clock in the graceful dome is dumb and lifeless—for lack of attention. The north porch is falling into dilapidation, and the tower and fence show crying need of paint.

The new commissioners' court have taken the matter up and the building will be looked after more attentively hereafter. A janitor has been employed who will see to it that many things are done that apparently have not been done in the past. The Record sincerely hopes that the county commissioners may see their way to do yet a great deal more in this direction. ### OLD TIME ZOOLOGY.

The Queer Insects Lawson Discovered in North Carolina.

In the Raleigh state library is an interesting old volume presented by President Madison in 1831. This quaint book is the first history of North Carolina, written in 1741 by "John Lawson, Genl," a surveyor general of the lands proprietors. The history is well worth reading, but perhaps the most entertaining portion of its many pages is that in which Mr. Lawson describes the flora and fauna of the new country. He is evidently the ancestor of the railway conductor who decided that, according to the rules of the road, "dogs is dogs and cats is dogs, but turtles is insects."

"We will next treat of Beasts," says the historian. "The chief are the Buffalo, or Wild Beef; the Tyger; the Beaver; and the Bearmouse. The Buffalo is a Wild Beast of America which has a Bunch on his Back. These monsters are found to weigh (as I am informed by a Traveller of Credit) from 1100 to 2400 weight."

"The Bat or Bearmouse is the same as in England. I have put this among the Beasts as partaking of both the Nature of the Bird and the Mouse. Now I shall proceed to the known Insects of the Place."

"Insects of North Carolina: Alligators, Rattlesnakes, Frogs, Vipers, Tortoises, Terebinth, Rottenwood Worms (etc.)."

"The Alligator is the same as the Crocodile. After the Tail of the Alligator is removed from the Body it will move freely for several Days. I have named these among the Insects because they lay Eggs, and I did not know well where else to put them."

### FERN LEAVES.

They Are Valuable For Preserving Articles of Food.

The fern plant, which grows almost everywhere, is an excellent preservative for packing articles of food, fruit, etc. People who have lived in England know that the English have used it successfully for many years. Valuable fruit, fresh butter, etc., are no longer seen in the English markets packed in grapevine leaves, but almost always in fresh fern leaves, which keep the articles excellently. This is done where grapevine leaves are to be had in abundance. Every one posted well in botany knows the high preservative power of fern leaves with reference to vegetable and animal substances.

On the Isle of Man fresh herrings are packed in ferns and arrive on the market in as fresh a condition as when they were shipped. Potatoes packed in ferns keep many months longer than others packed only in straw. Experiments made with both straw and fern leaves in the same collar showed surprising results in favor of ferns. While the potatoes packed in straw mostly showed signs of rotting in the spring, those in ferns were as fresh as if they had just been dug.

Fresh meat is also well preserved by fern leaves. It would seem as if the highly preservative qualities of fern leaves are due to their high percentage of salt. No larvae, maggots, etc., approach ferns, as the strong odor keeps them away.—New York Times.

### Postmaster Not to Be Hhuried.

A nobleman's new laud agent and steward, who went to live on the estates about fifteen miles from Granada, sent letters to the village postoffice every day for three weeks, but got no replies. Thinking this very strange, he rode over to the village and interviewed the postmaster.

"Oh," exclaimed the postmaster, "you are the new agent on the dual estates! Well, your letters are all safe. The villagers rarely write letters, and as I have to ride on my donkey four miles to the railway station to catch the mail train you don't suppose for one moment, do you, that I am going to undertake this pilgrimage every day with your stupid letters? I have them all here in a broken jug, and when the Jug gets full I shall take a ride to the station and post the whole lot at once."

#### THE SOUTH'S AWAKENING

In national affairs there remains no longer reason why the people of the south should not follow men and principles which to them seem best and promise most to national growth and national prosperity. The south will not continue longer a mere voting machine."

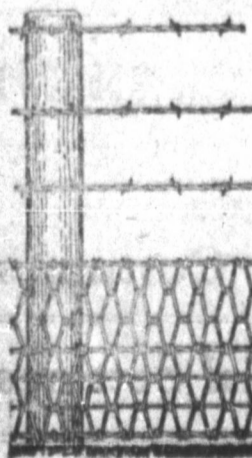

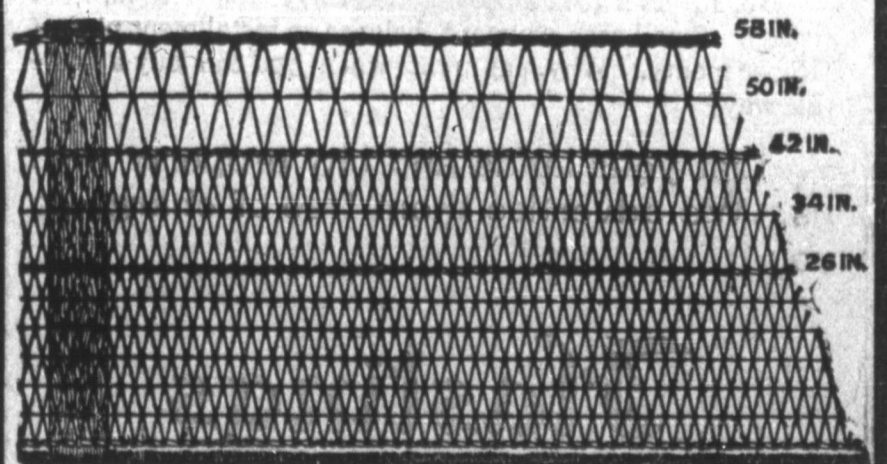
